BUENOS AYRES.

The news of the week has not presented much variety. In the Provinces nothing of moment appears to have occurred, although it has been reported that some of the troops of General Quiroga were in Catamarca, and that the Governor of Santiago del Estero (Ibarra), was about to take the field to oppose the orders of the Governor of Cordova.

The House of Representatives of this Province has been chiefly occupied in discussion upon the decrees which the Committee of the House had proposed, and which it is probable will be sanctioned with some modifications. The President Don Felipe Arana, has addressed a communication to the Governor, dated 14th instant, stating that the prosecution ordered against the editors of the *Lucero* had been discontinued, they having acknowledged their error, and made every possible reparation.

The first operation under the new act for the redemption of the Bank notes took place on Sunday last, when a specified quantity of them were destroyed. Various opinions have been given upon this measure, and the works of Dr. Price and David Ricardo largely quoted. The best and probably the only means of supporting public credit and bettering the circulating medium of the Province, is the continuance of public peace and the extinguishment of those direful passions which have so long been its bane.

The government has issued a decree dated 13th inst., annulling the letters of citizenship granted by a decree of the 23d June 1829, to those foreigners who had taken up arms in the capital under the late government, and orders that any foreigner who, without a letter of citizenship, should take part directly or indirectly in the civil dissensions of the country, shall be reputed as enemies of the public peace, and expelled the Province.

A decree of the 12th inst. has appointed 37 Justices of the Peace for the Province of Buenos Ayres. Those for this city are: Don Ezequiel Realdeazua for the district of the Cathedral to the North, and Don Pablo Barnechea for do, to the South;

Pablo Hernandez, San Nicolas; José Maria Perez, Montserrat; Juan Bravo, San Telmo; Miguel Fernandez, Piedad; Hilario Gonzalez, Socorro; Eulogio P. Polero, Concepcion.

The exordium to the decree annulling the rights of citizenship granted to those foreigners who took up arms in this city under the late government, states that after the Conventions of 24th June and 24th of August last had terminated the civil war, it would be contrary to the spirit of these acts and to the real interests of the country, if the decree of 23d June 1829 was allowed to remain in force: that it was illegal, and trespassed upon the conditions which the law has provided when granting the title of citizen; that it confounds men who may be without character in their own country with respectable foreigners whose residence here does honour to the Province, and by whose industry and conduct the Republic is benefitted; and to allow citizenship to the natives of a nation with whom the Republic is at war, and its independence perpetually threatened, whilst it is not acknowledged by the Spanish monarch, is an offence to all good feeling, and sanctions the fatal principle that foreigners may interfere in the unfortunate domestic dissensions of this country, and any foreign adventurer may by this means compromise the rest of his honest and industrious fellow countrymen in the disasters of intestine war.

Art. 4 of the decree states that the law of the 17th December 1828, relative to the enrolment in the militia of foreigners resident in this Province only applies in cases of foreign war.

Captain Leonardo Rosales, of the National navy, has again addressed the public, and in a printed paper containing 6 pages he has replied to the articles in the *Lucero* Nos. 80 and 81, which reflected upon his conduct in the late civil war; and declares that it is a calumny to implicate the Marine as having cognizance of or assisting in the movement of the 1st December 1828, and that if he had rendered obedience, it was not until after Gen. Lavalle had been appointed Governor that he (Captain Rosales,) complied with the received forms.

The Ecclesiastical Senate has elected Dr. José M. Terrero as Provisor and Governor of this Bishopric, vice Dr. José Le Banegas, resigned.

The speech of Don Pedro Pablo Vidal in the House of Representatives upon the occasion of granting extraordinary powers to the Governor Don Juan Manuel Rosas, has been published. It is strongly in favor of that measure.

A grand *Funcion Gimnástica* is advertised at the *Parque Argentino*, (Vauxhall,) in which Señor Chearini and his family are to perform. It is to be divided into three parts, and to commence precisely at 6 o'clock in the evening; the entrance money 1 dollar 4 reals.

The gardens are always open at an early hour in the morning.

The evening gun is now fired from the Fort every evening at 9 o'clock. This regulation was put in practice for the first time (at least since we have been in Buenos Ayres,) on the 8th instant.

The non-arrival during the week of any of the schooner Packets from Montevideo, caused various speculations and rumours in this "city of rumours," and all agreed there was something wrong." An arrival from thence solved the mystery, and it was found that they had been employed in endeavouring to save cargo from the American ship *Paragon*, wrecked upon the English Bank.

A boat capsized near the Mole during the high wind on the 10th, crew saved. The American schr. *Splendid*, and French schr. *Ida* got foul of each other; the latter was much damaged, and must undergo repair; she was ready to sail for Rio Janeiro, with a cargo of 1410 quintals of jerked beef.

A French brig from Marseilles about 7th Oct., bound to this port, was spoken on 4th Nov. near Madeira, by the British brig *Eliza*, which arrived here on the 6th inst. The name of the brig was understood to be the *Brilliant*.

The American ship *Paragon* from New York about 80 days, with flour, gln, &c., was lost upon the English Bank on 11th instant, crew saved, and arrived at Montevideo.

The British brig *Belina*, Lamb, was to sail from Liverpool for this on 10th Nov. She had sailed on the 1st, and put back from contrary winds.

The performance at the Theatre, advertised by Mr. Fay for the 18th inst., which proposes by the efforts of a single performer to amuse the audience perhaps for the space of two hours, is an arduous undertaking. The exhibition of Mr. Mathews, which it professes to imitate, had various circumstances to recommend it, such as its novelty, the faithful delineation of living characters and manners, and above all, the extraordinary talent of the actor.

Several of our Portefino readers have asked the meaning of the words *at home*. The expression we believe originated a few years since in London: when any of its fashionable dames intended to give a *Tertulia*, cards of invitation were issued to the effect that Lady or Mrs. Such-a-one would be *at home* on a certain evening. The "Morning Post" would take care to describe the affair in glowing language, and therefore this paper has long been a necessary appendage at the breakfast tables of the Ladies of *ton* of the British capital.

Many years have elapsed since Mr. G. A. Stevens delivered his "Lecture on Heads" in London. This entertainment was at that time very popular; the portraits of the persons lectured upon being successively exhibited to the public.

Mr. Robert Palmer, the actor, introduced a similar performance at the Lyceum Theatre in London about the year 1806 or 1807; this likewise proved successful, but it being at a period when considerable party spirit existed, the house was often a scene of confusion: for example, when the portrait of Mr. Pitt was shown, his admirers would instantly rise and rend the Theatre with their shouts. This was answered by the disapprobation of the other party, and on the production of the portraits of Mr. Fox or Sir Francis Burdett, the "Pittites" would instantly retort; but these ebullitions soon evaporated, and after quitting the Theatre were scarcely thought of, and often the "Pittites" and the "Foxites," so violent there, might on the same night be seen amicably seated together in the coffee houses and over the jovial bowl, expressing the hope that "The difference of opinion may never destroy friendship."

Of Mr. Fay's "at home" we can only wish that he may succeed:—we think it will amuse all who understand the English language, and likewise the technicals upon which the entertainment treats.—Some author has somewhere written in purport, that "he who in this sorrowful world can make us laugh, takes a nail from out our coffin."

Mr. Fay has upon this Theatre in 1826 convinced the public of his histrionic talents; instance his *Lope Tocho* in the *Mountaineers*, and *Risk in Love* laughs

at *Locksmiths*, which in conjunction with his excellent prototype, *Old Totterton*, obtained for him amongst the natives the appellation of the *gracioso Ingles*.

After several days of intense heat, the thermometer at 90, the wind suddenly shifted on the evening of the 8th to the South,—a storm seemed to approach from that quarter, and the town was inundated with dust. The washerwomen on the beach took the alarm, and the bathers hurried homewards. This change in the weather was followed by heavy and congenial rains, so much wanted in the country, and the thermometer fell to 70.

The bathers this season have been very numerous, forming an extended line N. and S., presenting to the stranger a very curious spectacle. Before sunrise the river was thus occupied, and in the evening "all the town," particularly the female part of it, flocked thither. "Dollond's night and day" was in request, but the accustomed and proper mystery prevailed, and no discoveries could be made. Carts filled with male bathers proceeded along the beach, bringing to mind the prize fight cavalades at home, and the simile cannot cause offence when it is recollected that even the present Emperor Nicholas of Russia when on a visit in England in 1816-17, did for nearly one hour in company with Sir Wm. Congreve and others, stand in an open cart at Moulsey Hurst, to view a prize fight.

The Alameda has lately been better attended than usual, and on the evening of "twelfth day," (6th inst.,) a number of the fashionable fair graced the promenade.

OFFICIAL DOCUMENTS.

A decree of the 5th instant states that in spite of the precautions taken by the police, several persons have been lately stabbed with knives, and in order to repress this abuse and augment as much as possible the security of the public, it is decreed, that any person found guilty of wounding another with any sharp instrument or with ball, shall be summarily punished; and if the wounds should be mortal, and it is proved they were not inflicted in self defence, but with circumstances of premeditation, the authors and the accomplices shall suffer death.

A communication from the Minister Don Tomas Guido, to the Minister of H. M. the Emperor of Brazil at Rio Janeiro, states the sincere regret of the government of Buenos Ayres at the accident which had befallen H. M., in being thrown from his carriage, and satisfaction that the august friend of the Argentine Republic had not suffered serious inconvenience therefrom.

A circular was sent from the Minister Don Tomas Guido, to the masters of the different schools, stating that the dissensions which had unfortunately prevailed in the country amongst other evils might produce an injurious effect upon youthful minds, and that if it was grievous to see brothers of the same nation divided in opinion, it ought not to be tolerated that youths whose education forms the first care of the government, and on whom the country places its best hopes, should take part in it. The Minister therefore requests that care should be taken instantly to repress amongst the children the least word which foment the differences produced in families by the diversity of political opinions.

The Chief of Police Don G. Perdriel, has addressed letters of thanks to the two operatic companies of Tani and Tani, for their exertions of several nights in which they performed for the benefit of the widows and orphans injured by the civil war.

The Chief of Police has published an account of the receipts on the two nights above mentioned, by which it appears that the *Gazza Ladra*, performed by the Tani Company, produced 6,628 dollars, deducting 525 dollars for the orchestra, illuminations, &c.; and *Otelo* by the Tani Company, 5,694, deducting 561 dollars: total 11,236 dollars.

On the first night, (the *Gazza Ladra*) several individuals and families attended who contributed large sums at the door.

A resolution of the House of Representatives of the 4th inst. empowers the Committee of the House during the recess to approve the election of the individuals of the class of land proprietors and merchants who are to compose the Committee of public credit, and the proceedings of the said Committee which may need the approbation of the Legislature, and likewise relative to the expenses of the House for the year 1830.

The House of Representatives for the year 1830 is to consist of 47 members.

A communication from the President of the House of Representatives to the Governor notices the state of the Church in the Provinces of the Republic, and the general desire that something should be done to remedy it, and therefore solicits H. E. to open as soon as possible correspondence with the Pope of Rome, in order to obtain from his Holiness the necessary aid to sustain and foment the Catholic religion, which it is wished should be preserved in all its purity in the Republic.

A second report of the committee of the House of Representatives adheres to

the first proposition presented by it to the House to confer certain honors upon the Governor Don Juan Manuel Rosas, and the officers and troops who served under his command in the late civil war.

In a sitting of the House of Representatives of this Province on the 12th inst. it approved in every part the conduct of its President, (Don Felipe Arana) from the 1st December 1828 until the Legislature reassembled on the 1st December 1829.

A decree dated 7th instant, imposes penalties upon those who purchase arms, ammunition, &c. from the troops.

A decree dated 7th inst., states that in order that the resolutions of the government may be more speedily brought to the notice of the inhabitants of the Province, the decrees, &c. which have hitherto been published in the daily papers will be separately printed, under the title of the Provisional Register, which is to be affixed in the public places of the capital, and forwarded to the Justices of Peace of the country districts, to be read to the inhabitants on holidays after service at the Parish Church.

A communication from the Minister to the Chief of Police dated 7th inst., notices the abuses committed in the Saladeros by throwing offal, &c. into the Riachuelo, and imposes penalties upon those who offend in future.

Don Pedro Ximeno has been appointed Adjutant of the Port, *vice* Pinedo, who has taken command of the schr. of war *Sarandi*.

Colonel Crespo has been appointed Commandant of Patagonia, *vice* Colonel Oyuela.

The Governor, attended by his brothers Don Gervacio and Don Prudencio, Col. Ramirez, Don M. Lozano, Rev. S. Figueredo, and various others, left town on Sunday last for San Isidro, to attend a funeral service at the Church of that town for the late Governor Dorrego.

Don Leon Sola has been elected for the third time Governor of the Province of Entré Rios, upon which occasion he issued a proclamation to the citizens, and amongst other topics congratulates them upon the appointment of Don Juan Manuel Rosas as Governor of the Province of Buenos Ayres.

A prosecution has been ordered by the President of the House of Representatives against the Editor of the "Lucero," for having asserted that the House had come to a resolution in a debate without having a sufficient number of members present.

On Sunday at half past six o'clock in the evening, according to a previous announcement, bank notes to the amount of 131,260 dollars, were publicly burned in the altos of the Cabildo, in presence of the Minister of Finance, Don Miguel de Azcuena, and others of the Committee of the Sinking Fund for the redemption of the bank notes, and a numerous assemblage. The notes we believe were consumed in an urn. Some thought that a fire would have been kindled in the Plaza for the purpose, and that the citizens would

"Round about the cauldron go."

It is said that several foreigners are in confinement, charged with forging the bank notes.

On the night of the 8th instant at half past 12 o'clock, as Don Francisco Leon de la Barra (Consul General of Chile,) and his lady were returning from a *Tertulia*, they were stopped by two soldiers in the calle de la Florida, and robbed and slightly wounded. These soldiers had committed other depredations in that street; they were apprehended the same night, and lodged in prison.

On the 12th instant it was reported in town (on the authority, we believe, of letters from Chuquiaca,) that Gen. Bolivar had died at Guayaquil of a fever.
