BUENOS AIRES.

The Subscribers to the *British Packet*, are respectfully informed that the Editor is under the unpleasant necessity of raising the price of the subscription to Seven Dollars per quarter, and 4 reales each number, commencing from this date.

When it is recollected that on its first publication in 1826, the subscription was three hard dollars per quarter, and that the equivalent for that sum, would at the present moment, amount to twenty seven Paper dollars, and the great rise which has taken place in every article connected with the Press, the trifling advance now made, will scarcely create surprise, particularly with the additional difficulties of printing a Paper in a language, which is not that of the country. Several English Compositors, have lately left Buenos Ayres, not from the lack of employment, but the impossibility of giving them an adequate recompense. This it was, that occasioned the removal of the printing of this Paper from the State Printing Office, where it received every possible attention. In fact if Messrs. Hallet & Co. had not taken it in hand, the *British Packet*, in spite of its numerous friends must, (from the absolute want of a crew to work her,) have unbended her sails, struck her masts and yards, and taken a birth in "Ordinary," until better times.

BRITISH CHAPEL.

On Monday the 5th Instant, His Britannic Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires, laid the foundation-stone of the British Protestant Chapel, in this city. The Committee of Management having assembled, the chaplain commenced with a prayer for a blessing on the work then to be undertaken. The inscription being deposited, the first stone was laid by Mr. Parish pronouncing: "In the name of the Father, the Son, & the Holy Ghost, one God, blessed for ever, I lay this the foundation-stone of the Protestant Chapel of the British Residents of Buenos Ayres, to be formally called and known as the British Chapel of Saint John." The Chaplain then proceeded: "O Father Almighty, through whose aid we have commenced this work of duty, we bless thee that we have lived to this day. O prosper the work to its conclusion: and grant that so many of us as thy Providence may preserve to witness its solemn opening and dedication, may join

together in heart and in spirit in praising thy mercy, and in supplicating thy favour to this house evermore; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The following is a copy of the Inscription deposited in the foundation-stone:—

"On the fifth day of April 1830,
In the Eleventh year of the Reign of George the IV.
King of the U Kingdom of Great Britain & Ireland
Woodbine Parish, Esquire, His said Majesty's
Chargé d' Affaires & Consul General to the
United Provinces of the Rio de la Plata,
Attended by the Reverend John Armstrong Chaplain.
And the members of the Committee of Management
Appointed by the British Residents in Buenos Ayres,
Laid this Foundation Stone of the
British Protestant Church;
The funds for its erection being raised by contributions
Of the said Residents, conformably to the
Act of the British Parliament, passed in the
Sixth year of the Reign of George IV. Cap. 87.
The site of ground for the purpose being the
Liberal Donation of the Government
of Buenos Ayres,

In the 1st year of the administration of His Excellency
Señor Don Juan Manuel de Rosas,
Governor and Captain General of the said Province

Our Paper of to day, contains the statement of the exports and imports, of the province of Buenos Ayres, for the year 1829, and which we alluded in our last number, and at the same time, made some observations to prove that taking into account the duties and charges upon the same, the difference instead of being upwards of 11 millions, would in fact only amount to about One Million.

The agitation during the week, in the Money Market, has been extreme. *Ounces*, it is said, have been "done at" 164, but not in sufficient quantities, to make a price. Various causes are assigned for this panic; coupled with the probability, that War may be renewed in the interior. Certain it is, that the holders of the precious metals, do not care to sell, to supply the great demand which exists. There are some, however, who think that things have approached their worst, (indeed they cannot be much worse,) and reason upon the old adage "That it is a long lane which has no turning."

Various plans having been recommended to remedy the present alarming state of the currency, such as prohibiting the exportation of specie; invalidating those contracts in which Gold and Silver only are to be received: asserting that extraordinary circumstances require extraordinary measures etc. etc. Hereafter we may offer a few observations on the above subject.

From the Provinces of the interior, we have absolutely no news.

The Governor of this Province (according to the *Gaceta Mercantil* of the 7th inst.) was a few days since, at the town of Lujan reviewing some cavalry Milicia and artillery.

In consequence of the holidays, the *Gaceta Mercantil* and *Lucero* have not been published since Wednesday last, and will not reappear until Tuesday.

The brig *Comet* has not brought any particular news from Lima or Chili.

The British barque *Sir William Wallace*, Matthews, sailed on the 8th instant, from Ensenada.

The United States' sloop of war *Vandalia*, capt. Gallagher, intends to sail for Montevideo and Rio Janeiro on the 11th inst.

The thermometer at the commencement of the week was again at "summer heat." On Wednesday night at 10 o'clock the wind shifted to the S. filling the streets with dust, followed afterwards with heavy rain.

"Holy Thursday," proved a delightful day; the streets in the evening, were, as usual, thronged—particularly with females, in sable attire, in order to pay the accustomed visit to "Seven Churches." At 8 o'clock, two military bands of music, in best dresses, preceded by the globular lights, left the Fort, marched in slow time, and halted at intervals in the streets, to perform "solemn airs" in presence of attendant crowds. It was a lovely moonlight night, and the scene altogether possessed great interest.

In our perambulations, we paid a visit to five Churches, all of which were very tastefully illuminated; but the vespers at the Cathedral, formerly so attractive, were not on this evening performed.

The Members composing the Mediatory Commission, to the Belligerents in the Interior. A note dated Buenos Ayres 5th inst., request the public to suspend their judgment upon the injurious imputations contained in the communication from the Gov. of Cordova, which they state they can completely contradict, and justify their conduct in the negociation committed to their charge.

A communication from the Minister Don Tomas Manuel de Anchorena, dated Buenos Ayres 2d inst., to the Justice of Peace of the district of Exaltacion de la Cruz, acknowledges the receipt of a note from the latter dated 30th ult., advising the Government, that the citizens Don Estanislao Urruchua, V. del Aguila, R. Zarate, Manuel Dorrego, Maria- and H. Melo, had given for the service of the State, the sums awarded to them for the aid they had afforded to the Militia, in the late campaign.

That the Government has viewed with the most lively interest, this trait of patriotism so commendable in its authors, it proves they are not indifferent to the actual state of the public treasury, and that it affords the flattering expectation, that the country will soon recover from its distresses, while it contains Sons with sentiments so noble as the above named Citizens.

The Justice of Peace is requested to convey the thanks of the Government, to the parties concerned.

A decree dated 3d inst., appoints Don Gregorio Silva Zeballos, Justice of peace of the Parish of Concepcion, for the present year, in the room of Don Eulogio Polero, who since his appointment, has been destined to another service.

A note from the Treasury department, allows a month in addition to the time which was fixed by the decree of 3d November last for taking out of Licences, and that a longer period will not be granted.

IMPORTANT PACKET INTELLIGENCE.

The Meteor Admiralty Steamer, has been directed to take the next Mediterranean Mails. By the same conveyance also, we understand the mails for India, will be dispatched for the purpose of ascertaining the practicability of expediting the communication between Great Britain, and her East India possessions. After leaving the mail bags at Malta, the steamer will proceed to Egypt with the mails for India, whence they will be transported across the Isthmus to Suez, and there taken charge of, by the Enterprize steamer, which sailed some time since for India for that purpose: of the success of this experiment, we think there can be little doubt.

The daughter of the Emperor of Brazil—Dona Maria da Gloria, Queen of Portugal, completed her eleventh year on the 4th inst, upon which occasion, the Brazilian Vessels of War, and Merchant Vessels in this Port, were decorated with colours—No salute was fired.

We have seen two Lithographic drawings, done by M. Charavel, of Paris, after the original pictures of Pittaluga, the Italian Painter; one represents the house, in which Columbus was born and the Street, with numerous figures drawn. It is situated in the Village of Cogoleto, near Genoa—The house has some poetry attached to it, composed as tradition states, in the year 1550.

The other picture, by the same artists, represents the village of Cogoleto.

The above have only lately arrived in this country, and have not yet been published in Italy. They form two very interesting pictures, and we should think, would be an acquisition to the amateur, and particularly to the admirers of the "Great Navigator." But very few copies of these drawings are in Buenos Ayres, and they are to be disposed of, upon application at No. 47, calle del 25 de Mayo.

The Tani family, sailed on Monday last for Montevideo in the Schooner Packet Flor del Rio. Dona Angelita was attended to the place of embarkation by a number of Ladies, who shed tears in abundance. Angelita embraced them all at parting, her eyes streaming with tears: there was no acting then. "It was not counterfeit, there was too great testimony in the complexion; it was a passion of earnest."

She has quitted a city, perhaps for ever, in which she had endeared herself to its inhabitants, both in her private and public capacity. The Theatre has lost its chief attraction; and the Opera, which commenced its career under such flattering auspices, and which seemed likely to become an ornament not to Buenos Ayres alone, but to the whole Nation has in losing Angelita, sunk (at least for the present) to the "Tomb of all the Capulets."

Dona Margarita Tani, was in a manner led to the place of embarkation. She appeared to be suffering under severe indisposition.

An address to the inhabitants of Buenos Ayres, signed by Angelita Tani, and her brother Pascual, on the part of themselves and the rest of the family, was published in the "Gaceta Mercantil" of Monday last—

It regrets the circumstances which renders the separation indispensable, that the kindness and hospitality with which they had been honoured, would fill them with eternal gratitude, that neither time nor distance could efface from their memories, the soil upon which their first lyrical efforts had been fostered, that they felt the most bitter pang at parting, and in regions the most re-

mote, would dwell upon the praises of a people, by whom they had been so kindly treated.

The new packet, *Bella Portena*, which is to sail between Montevideo and this, has been fitted up at the former port, at a considerable expense. She has 14 births, including two separate state cabins for lady passengers: each birth is provided with curtains, and when drawn, forms an entire private cabin.
