### BUENOS AIRES.

We have again to notice the paucity of political events, and perhaps this state of things may not be without its advantages. From the interior Provinces of the Republic there is absolutely no news. The Governor of this Province is still in the country upon his tour of inspection; the last accounts left him at Salto. The house of Representatives has not sat during the week, except in Committee to report upon the Message. To-morrow the election is to take place of *Prior, Consul, 2nd Sindico*, and the respective officers, of the Tribunal of Commerce; the individuals who have been appointed Scrutineers upon the occasion, are Señores Isidoro Peralta, Manuel Anchaurregui, N. Cordero, and Antonio

reference to our Prices Current will show that the price of specie is rather on the decline, produced no doubt by the scarcity of money at the present moment, and the hope that time, and existing circumstances, will secure the public peace.

Señor José María Rojas has been appointed Deputy to the Government of Buenos Ayres, to act in conjunction with those named by the Provinces of Santa Fé, Entreríos, and Corrientes, to celebrate a definitive treaty of friendship and alliance between the four Provinces, according to the preliminary stipulations of the late treaty.

The *Lucero* of the 2nd contains an extract of a letter from Montevideo, dated 9th ult, in which it is stated that the Negroes, in the town of Bahía, joined with those in the country, had risen against the authorities there, and had taken possession of the Arsenal, but that the military had dispossessed them of it, and dispersed them with great slaughter. It is added that Brigadier Calado, the new Governor, had arrived off the Port during the disturbance, but did not disembark.

The Schooner Packet *Bella Porteña* sailed from Montevideo on the 1st inst,

and has not brought any particular news, more than what is related in another part of our paper, except that some Troops, 2 to 300, marched from Montevideo on the 1st, for the country; and a rumour that General Fructuoso Rivera was at Canelones. A Correspondent of the *Universal* of Montevideo, states that General Rivera had imposed a contribution of 4000 dollars upon the inhabitants of Paysandu, and during its collection some of the Troops were under arms in the Plaza; that he has also ordered a contribution of 15 head of cattle on every 1000, in order to maintain the Colony of Cuareim.

The Governor of Montevideo, has appointed Don Pedro Lengua Minister of war and marine.

### Chili.

Accounts to the 15th March state that Concepcion, and the Province in its neighbourhood, were in the hands of the *Liberales*, excepting a detachment of 150 men under Col. Cruz at Chillan, who were entrenched in the barracks, and closely watched by about 200 Troops, and a large body of Indians, under General Viel, with whom is also Colonel Tupper.

Several attempts have been made to dislodge Cruz from the strong position he holds, and much blood has been shed without effecting the said purpose; Freyre had a few days previous landed at the River Maule, and was marching to *Caucanes*, to cut off the communication between Cruz and his party in the neighbourhood of *Santiago*, commanded by Prieto, who has 700 men with him, besides 100 at Valparaiso.

Col. Rondisone, acting under Freyre, is in the Province of Coquimbo, keeping Prieto in check. It is supposed that when Cruz's party in Chillan is taken, Freyre, with Viel and Tupper, will march against Prieto, whilst Rondisone threatens him in the north; and a general battle will take place, which from the exasperated feelings of the two parties, will doubtless be very sanguinary. All hopes of an accommodation are at an end; the Country is tired of the disastrous effects of civil war, and would be glad of a reconciliation, but the Chiefs of the army, and the leading men in the Government are so violently opposed to each other, that

nothing but force can decide the question. Freyre's party, the *Liberales*, is by far the most popular, but Prieto's the *Pelucones* and *Estanqueros*, who have united, are the most powerful in resources; Prieto's bad faith has lost him many friends, and frequent desertions occur from his army.

Previously to the investment of Chillan by Viel, Tupper had made an attempt to board the Brig of war *Aquiles*, which was blockading the port of Concepcion, but was unsuccessful, and he received rather a serious wound from which he had recovered. In a cavalry combat between Viel and Cruz's party, more than 100 lives had been lost, the latter having been completely routed.

### THEATRE.

The Theatre has been open on almost every night lately, to tolerably numerous audiences. On the 30th and 31st ult, the house was literally craded.

It would exceed our limits to notice all the performances; it will be sufficient to state, that the Comedy of *Los dos Mendocás*, and a new play (we have forgotten the name,) and the Comedy of *la Fulgencia* created a great deal of laughter, which in these gloomy times is no trifling object.

Of the Performers we must say that Señor Quijano is an improving actor, and has a better wardrobe than many of his professional brethren in Europe; he was attired the other night in the British military costume, of the Marlborough age. Another actor on these boards has a face almost the counterpart to the late Mr. Oxberry of Drury Lane Theatre; but the simile proceeds no further.

Señor and Señora Cañeta danced on Thursday night the *Seguidillas Manchegas*; our opinion of these *Artistes* is not changed; grace is wanting. The Lady in the course of the exhibition displayed shapes, which would have extorted applause, even from "Fops' Alley," of the London Opera House.

The box circle of this Theatre has not lately presented the beauty and fashion, which once was its constant attendant; some of its former fair visitors now and then appear, and force recollections of other times.

..... Can such things be  
And overcome us like a Summer cloud  
Without our special wonder?"

We have received another communication "from a correspondent" relative to the deceased Peter Jones, in which we are requested to add "a caustic commentary" upon the affair. Its insertion we should think could not effect any possible good after the publicity which has been given to the question, therefore our correspondent must excuse its non-appearance.

A circular letter, dated Santa Fé 10th ult, has been sent by Don Estanislao Lopez, to the Governor of the Province of Santa Fé, stating that his political conduct will not vary from that which he has hitherto observed, and that he will not hesitate at any sacrifice in order to co-operate in the consolidation of public peace, and to constitute the country.

The Governor of the province of Buenos Ayres Don Juan Manuel de Rosas, replied to the above dated 22nd ult, congratulating Governor Lopez upon his re-election, adding that his political sentiments are in consonance with those of the Governor of Santa Fé, and that he possessed the same constant desire for the happiness of the Provinces.

A note from the Government of Entre-rios to that of Santa Fé, dated Parana 23rd April, acknowledges the receipt of a communication, informing him of the interview which took place at San Nicolas, between the latter and the Governor of Buenos Ayres, and the Representative of the Government of Corrientes, and expresses the gratification which such intelligence afforded him.

The treaty offensive and defensive between the Provinces of Corrientes and Entrerios has been published; it is in spirit the same as that celebrated between Buenos Ayres and Santa Fé, which was published in full: It is dated the 3rd ult, and is prefaced by stating the urgent necessity which exists; that the four maritime Provinces of the Parana, viz: Buenos Ayres, Santa Fé, Entrerios, and Corrientes, should be closely united under the federal system, which system it is added is in accordance with the opinion of the majority of the provinces which form the Republic.

A circular note was sent by order of the Governor, to the different Justices of Peace of this Province, signed by his private Secretary (Don Manuel Vicente Maza,) and dated San Nicolas, 1st. May; it related chiefly to the observances of the 25th May, that solemn thanks should be offered to the Almighty in the different Churches; and that although the state of the public revenue did not permit the usual demonstrations, yet that every homage should be paid on the anniversary of that day, in which Buenos Ayres broke the chains of colonial slavery.

Dr. D. Bernardo Pereda Saravia has been appointed Judge of the 1st instance, in civil causes; vice Dr. D. M. Gamboa resigned; Drs. P. Valle, J. E. Elias, and

and M. Insiarte, are to continue in their official employments, the former in civil causes, and the two latter in criminal.

Don Juan Manuel Silva, residing at Ensenada, having communicated to the Government his wish to appropriate for the benefit of the state, the sum awarded to him for the aid he afforded the Troops in the late Campaign, proffering at the same time his services to sustain the laws, and the Government the Minister Don Tomas M de Anchorena, addressed a communication to Señor Silva, dated 17th ult, thanking him in the name of the Government for his patriotism.

The Lady Patronesses of the Beneficent Society, (Señoras Maria S. de Mendeville, and Cipriana O. Benavia,) have addressed a communication to the Minister Don Thomas M de Anchorena, informing him the result of the examinations of the scholars of the different female schools in this City, particularizing those to whom they had awarded the Premiums for Industry, Morality, Filial love, &c., to which the Minister returned a reply, stating the pleasure which the Government felt, to find the labours of the Society in promoting the education of females so amply recompensed.

Don Leon Sola, Governor of the Province of Entrerios, addressed a communication to the Governor of Buenos Ayres, dated Parana 14th ult, in answer to one from the latter dated 24th April, stating that Don Tomas Guido was appointed Commissioner to the Court of Brazil, to revise the political constitution of the Oriental state of the Uruguay, in compliance with the 7th article of the treaty of peace, and expresses his high approbation of that measure.

A communication from the Governor Lopez, dated Santa Fé 27th April, to the Government of Buenos Ayres, acknowledges the receipt of the note dated 3rd April, relative to the convention signed between the Provinces of Buenos Ayres and Corrientes, on 23rd of March, and stating, that the principles adopted by the Government of Buenos Ayres are fortunately the same which serve as the basis of his (Governor Lopez) political conduct.

The *pampero* wind of last week, not only brought with it extreme cold, but prevented arrivals from sea. On some mornings before sun-rise the ice was a quarter of an inch thick, a circumstance not known in this country since the winter 1824.

Considerable anxiety existed for arrivals from Montevideo, and when on Sunday morning last, about 10 o'clock, the *Joven Sarandí* was seen through the haze which prevailed, the observatories in the neighbourhood of the beach had a portion of spectators: on the boat's approach to the shore, the landing place was crowded: such is the eagerness for news among all classes of this news-loving city.

#### Montevideo.

Four of the Schooner Packets, which had been wind bound at Montevideo, arrived at Buenos Ayres on Sunday last.— It was reported shortly after their arrival, that Don Manuel Lavalleja had been taken prisoner, in the skirmish at Paisandu, and that General Rivera could only muster 400 men, chiefly Indians, the *Paisandos* not having evinced any disposition to join him. It was added that General Lavalleja, (the Governor) intended to march out of Montevideo on the 1st June, at the head of the Regiment of Cazadores.

A friend has informed us, that Don Manuel Lavalleja made the attack at Paisandu, with 25 men against 100; he was slightly wounded and made prisoner; it was said that General Rivera was present at this action, or skirmish, and that he has 440 Cavalry troops; it is however affirmed that hitherto the influential men in the Country districts have declined taking any active part in these domestic disputes, stating their readiness to take arms against a foreign foe, but not in civil war.

General Rivera has forwarded to the House of Representatives at Montevideo, the petition of the land proprietors, and inhabitants of the Country districts, with a dispatch from himself, dated Durazno 19th ult, in which he expresses the most ardent hope and confidence, that the house will listen to the prayer of the petition, as the only step which can save the Country from foreign intervention in its domestic affairs.

The despatch throughout is couched in respectful, and temperate language, and breathes nothing of war; but alas, "seeing what we have seen," it is a folly just now to hazard a positive opinion upon the subject.

The Justice of Peace of *Las Vacas* having been requested to recognize as Comandante of that department, Col. Anacleto Medina, belonging to the Argentine Republic, he stated that he could not do so without the consent of the authority at Colonia, whom he addressed upon the subject; the latter declined all interference, except by order of the superior authority at Montevideo, to whom he immediately forwarded the particulars.

The City of Montevideo was illuminated on the 24th May, and the Plaza decorated on the evenings of the 24th, 25th, and 26th.

The Lady President of the Benevolent Society has, in a public communication dated the 26th ult, returned thanks in the name of the Society to the chief of Police, Don Gregorio Perdiel, for his great attention, in order to preserve due decorum during the presentation of the Premiums, to the Scholars at the College Church on the 26th ult; and also thanks to the Commissary of the Police Don Manuel Inna.

The operatic Corps celebrated the *Tani Company* is still at Montevideo, and have frequently performed at the Theatre there in musical selections, and in the insipid Opera of the *Engaño feliz*, with the assistance of a new performer named *Foresti*, an Italian, who (according to the advertisements,) is *Profesor de musica formado en el Imperial y Real Conservatorio de Bergamo, en Italia*.

The merits of the Opera Company which this City once possessed, are now fully appreciated:—it had then the great Vacani, (now gone to Rio Janeiro,) Rosquellas, Ricciolini, and the interesting Angelita Tani, who here was the "Queen of song." (She will never be so happy any where else.) It was herein which her first lyrical efforts were exerted and fostered; the arrival of the *Schironi* company with overrated pretensions, created jealousies and contentions, and was the occasion, in conjunction with the distresses of the times, of forcing both parties from Buenos Ayres.

The Brothers Marcelo and Pascual Tani, are excellent vocalists, but it is in a peculiar and confined sphere: they are not "general performers".

In the years 1825, 26, 27, and 28, this Theatre could boast a strong Opera, which delighted both natives and foreigners. We fear it will be a long time ere such another is formed.
