BUENOS AIRES

After some time of non-intercourse with the interior, the first numbers of a new Paper published at Cordova have been received, which confirm a report which had been bruited here, that a change of Government had taken place at Santiago del Estero.

It appears that a party of 25 men was sent from Tucuman, with the object of seizing the person of Ibarra, but not succeeding a formal expedition was prepared of troops from Catamarca and Tucuman, under the command of the Governor of the latter Province, Xavier Lopez. On the 26th May the expedition arrived in the vicinity of Santiago, and Governor Ibarra finding himself unable to make a stand, after having had an interview with Lopez, capitulated. "The terms were that he should resign the Government, and place his troops at the disposal of Don Manuel Alcora, who should act as Provisional Governor, until the Provincial Representatives should name a successor to Ibarra; that a contribution should be levied on the inhabitants to defray the expenses incurred in fitting out the expedition; and that the persons and property of Governor Ibarra and his adherents should be guaranteed.

Prior to this invasion Governor Ibarra had invited to General Paz connivance at the attempt to seize his person in violation of the most solemn engagements, but the latter denies having any previous knowledge of the circumstance, and in a letter to Governor Lopez after the capitulation of Ibarra, the delegate Government of Cordova states that it was preparing to seek redress for the insult, when it received official intelligence of that event.

Thus has fallen the last Federal Governor in the interior, the boundary Provinces excepted. In the late papers we notice the acknowledgment of Don Francisco Delgado, as Diplomatic agent of the Government of Mendoza; and Don Andres Deampo, as Agent of that of La Rioja. We long we presume it will have a numerous Corps Diplomatique.

On the 25th May, the National flag was

substituted in Cordova, for the Provincial one which had hitherto been adopted.

Nothing is known of the state of the pending negotiations between the confederate Provinces, and Cordova.

On 22nd May General Guido had an audience with the Emperor of Brazil, at Rio Janeiro. The address which he made to the Emperor has been published in the Periodicals of this city. It is to the following effect.

That the second time he had the honor to present himself before his Majesty, it was under the beneficent auspices of peace, but that the compact which produced this great blessing had still some forms to go through, which he was charged to fulfil on the part of the Argentine Republic, and in the name of his Government, General Guido felicitated the Emperor upon the re-establishment of his health, and upon the safe arrival at Rio Janeiro, of his august daughter the Queen of Portugal; and the desire which existed to preserve perpetual peace between the Empire and the Republic, that the new world might offer to Europe the spectacle of two nations who had known how to change the odium caused by war, into liberal principles, free commerce and durable friendship. The address concluded stating the desire of the Government of Buenos Ayres, and that of General Guido personally, for the prosperity of the Emperor, and acknowledgments on the part of the General for the attentions he had received from his Majesty on his first mission, which he hoped he should still continue to merit.

The Emperor replied to this address, expressing to General Guido that desirous of giving a solemn testimony of his sentiments for the prosperity of the Argentine Republic, and the high esteem which he had for the Government of Buenos Ayres, he was disposed to enter into every class of negotiation for which General Guido might be authorised.

The Government of the Province of San Luis has addressed a communication to the Governor of Buenos Ayres dated 5th inst, approving the appointment of

General Guido as Commissioner on the part of the Argentine Republic, to revise the political constitution of the Oriental State of the Uruguay.

THEATRE.

The Play of *El delincuente honrado* was performed on the 12th inst, in which Señor Quijano displayed talents of no mean description: his acting in the prison scene when parting from his father, was impassioned and feeling; the *fair* in the *Cazuela*. (Judging from the show of white handkerchiefs to efface the falling tears) evidently thought it appalling. In voice and countenance, nature has done but little in favour of señor Quijano, he is however an able actor.

After the play a *petit* dance was exhibited, founded on the well known ballet of *La fille mal garée*; Señor and Señora Cañete personated the lovers with much effect. Felipe David was very amusing as the *Señora Madre*, and bating a little grossness, his humour would not have disparaged even the famed Grimaldi, particularly in the mock *pas seul* and *pas de deux*.

A crowded house attended his benefit on Monday night, and the upper and lower tier of boxes contained several of our fashionable beauties.

On Wednesday evening Señora Cañete danced the *Cachucha*, which was encored: she appeared to great advantage and was richly attired, and in the glare of the Theatre lights looked a very charming woman, with nothing to remind us that it might be illusion.

"When once the lamps and candles fall."

And yet it is said that

"Woman like stars, shine best at night."

Amicus.

A decree dated 9th inst. states, that the Government who had the glory of establishing the line of frontier, and overcoming the great difficulties opposed to it, had likewise the indubitable right to give to Fort Federation that name so glorious in the war of independence, and that it cannot be viewed but as injurious to the honor of this Province, that an intrusive power has dared to substitute that of Junin in order to perpetuate the memory of the result of a fatal action of war, consequent upon the scandalous military mutiny of the 1st December, 1828.

The decree of 13th July, 1829, is therefore declared null and void, by which to Fort Federation, was substituted the name of Junin, and the former denomination of the said fort which it took at its foundation is ordered to be reestablished.

A decree dated 9th inst. provides some further regulations respecting the marks to be put upon hides and cattle, introduced into this city, to take place from the 1st August next.

The election of Members to compose the Tribunal of Commerce, took place on the 6th instant. The following is the result.

The Brig Scotia has brought London papers to the 30th March, they contain very little news, in addition to what we inserted last week, and are chiefly occupied with Parliamentary debates. A report prevailed that a change in the French Ministry was about to take place.

It is said to be the intention of the Spanish Government, to send a powerful expedition against Peru, to sail in August, the land forces are to consist of 22,000 men, General Ricoforte to be Commander in Chief: That Officer (according to the Spanish papers) was on his way to Europe, from Manilla, where he had been Viceroy; his services in the Peninsular campaign, and in Peru, are much bruited, and that great deeds may be expected from a man of such military talents. The same papers add that Spain has been urged in the strongest terms, both from Guayaquil, and Arequipa, to lose no time in rendering assistance to the peaceable inhabitants of those regions, to put an end to anarchy and bloodshed; and that not a doubt was entertained of success.—*Veremos.*

The arrival of the Hope Packet at Fal-mouth conveyed news to Europe from this to the 14th January: The intelligence she took is laconically stated in the London Papers: they are absorbed in more important politics, and this part of the world is too distant to create with them any extraordinary degree of interest.—*N'importe.*

The *Morning Herald* of the 24th March. gives a detail of the changes in the Government of Chili, and notices the provisional Government which had been formed:— Upon this subject it has the following remark.

“Every thing is done provisionally, except the payment of dividends, which these Republics disdain, either partially or totally, provisionally and finally.”

The New York Papers contain the full report of Mr. Webster's Speech in the Senate, in opposition to the Tariff-Bill, it has created considerable sensation in the United States, indeed the Speech is altogether eloquent and reasoning; in parts, *piquant* and playful, particularly the handle he makes relative to Banquo's Ghost, in allusion to the quotation made by Mr. Hayne, from Macbeth.

We have received Papers from Rio Jansiro to the 22nd May, by H. B. M's. Ship Eden, arrived at Montevideo. The Minister of this Republic (General Guido) had had several conferences with the Brazilian Government. The *Jornal do Commercio* of the 22nd ult, contains a few remarks: panegyric upon Señor Guido.

The Emperor of Brazil, had fallen from his chair in a fit, which for some minutes deprived him of his senses; he was however quite recovered.

#### Montevideo.

The reports from the above City are rather pacific than otherwise. It is now said that General Fructuoso Rivera, is not so strong in the country districts as was suspected. General Lavalleja on the 12th inst. remained at Montevideo. The greater part of the Troops had left that City; detachments of the Cazadores mounted guard at the Gates, and at the Cabildo, &c., and the Civicos were on guard at the Custom-House:—The Pilot boat Comet, has been purchased by the Government of Montevideo, and has sailed for the Uruguay.

It is stated that on the 10th instant, a proposition was received from General Rivera for an interview between the Governor (General Lavalleja) and himself, for the purpose of arranging matters; but a private letter states that it will not be acceded to, unless Rivera acknowledges the Government, which it is not thought he will do.

The official despatch from General Prieto, relative to the victory he gained

in Chili over the forces of General Freire, was published in the *Lucero* of Saturday last. The despatch is dated, “Field of battle of Lircai, April 18th, 1820; and is addressed to the Minister of war of the Republic of Chili. It is a lengthy document, and describes the manœuvres of each army. Our last number contained the result, and some particulars of the action, and any further recitals upon occurrences so distressing would be both heartless and unnecessary, at least to those who wish well to the New States of South America.

Don Manuel Irigoyen has been appointed first Clerk in the office of the Minister of foreign affairs, *vice* Dr. D. Eduardo Lahitte, resigned. The latter addressed a communication to the Minister dated 14th instant, stating that he could not fulfil the duties of the above office, and that which he held as Secretary to the House of Representatives, now that the House was in Sessions, and therefore tendered his resignation of his employment in the foreign office.

On Monday last was *Collar day*, with the privileged corps of the canine race, consequent upon the notice from the Police Office, that all dogs found in the streets without a collar would be massacred; it was a humane caution. This City is certainly too much thronged with these animals, but the present mode of destroying them is somewhat disgusting, if not cruel, and we should be glad to hear that other methods were attempted. A tax upon dogs punctually levied would increase the revenue and decrease the nuisance; few would grudge to pay a trifling sum to preserve a favorite dog.

On the day of *San Antonio*, (13th instant,) the Brazilian vessels in this Harbour hoisted their colours, the brig Eolo in the Inner Roads was decorated with flags, and fired cannon at intervals during the day.

The Brig Malvina, has not brought any particular news from Gibraltar. Trade was dull there consequent upon making Cadiz a free Port; but it is added that the heavy Port charges laid on Shipping at Cadiz, made the expenses nearly the same as when the duties existed.

The British Government had ordered the Houses upon what is called the “Neutral Ground” at Gibraltar, to be pulled down.

The Telegraph, from the Guard Vessel in the Outer Roads to the marine Office, is now in full activity and promises great advantages to Commerce in general. A few minutes are suffi-



cient to convey to Shere all the particulars of Vessels arriving in the Outer Roads, names of consignees, &c. &c.

On Saturday last it was extremely warm for the season of the year. The Church at Colonia, and the opposite coast were plainly seen: In the evening there was vivid lightning from all points, but chiefly from the W., and at night heavy rain without much wind; several days of pleasant weather followed with an agreeable temperature.

By the last papers, from Europe, it appears that unseasonable heat had succeeded the late severe Winter, and in England during some days of the generally bleak month of March the thermometer was at 80.

On the 29th April, a hurricane took place at Bahia, in which the British brig Asoph, late from Montevideo, and loading for Liverpool, was driven upon the rocks and before dark had only her bowsprit standing. The American brig Alliance, Latterman, from this 17th March, put into Bahia on 29th April, from distress of weather.

The Packet Lady Mary Pelham, from Fal-mouth 22nd March; sailed from Rio Janeiro on 2nd June for Montevideo and Buenos Ayres, she had been obliged to put back at Rio from contrary winds.

The Editors profess that the new Publication will uphold the public rights, &c. &c.

The *Lucero* of the 15th instant states that the new Paper has adopted the same name as one which was edited in this city in 1812, by Señor Monteagudo.

We have received by way of Rio Janeiro London Papers to the 5th April, they do not contain any news of moment.

The American brig *BUENOS AYRES*, which arrived on the 7th instant, is intended we are informed as a regular Trader to this Port. She is a fine coppered vessel of about 220 tons, entirely new, (this being her first voyage) sails fast, and has good accommodations. We wish all success to the attempt to give some thing like regularity to the communication between this Country and the United States, and have no doubt the qualities of the Vessel, added to the skill and urbanity so justly attributable to Captain Adams, will render the enterprise both permanent and profitable.

On Sunday last, was interred in the Protestant burial ground of this City, the remains of the Wife of Peter Chisnell Esqr. The body was followed to its last home by numerous friends, including the greater part of the British merchants residing here, on foot, in consequence of the decree of the 29th October, which prohibits more than two carriages to attend the funeral of private persons. The corpse was cased in a leaden coffin, and that placed within a mahogany one.

Mr. Whitaker superintended the arrangements of the funeral, which attracted considerable attention, both from the respectability of the attendants, and the novelty of the procession. It was conducted altogether in the English fashion.
