BUENOS AYRES.

We have no intelligence to communicate this week, from the interior.

The speech of *Señor Figueredo* in the House of Representatives, in the sitting of the 17th inst., upon the subject of the arrest of *Señor Jardon*, has been published. It is an eloquent harangue in which the orator takes a view of the country, and contends that the most urgent necessity exists for strong measures, that the Government has made out a clear case in this respect, and that sending from the Province a few suspicious and unquiet men, in virtue of the powers it possessed, ought only to be viewed as a necessary precaution to preserve peace, and that if in a period like the present it faltered in its duties, the Government would lose and deserved to lose the confidence of the people, and the House of Representatives; that it could not be accused of private vengeance, as the parties arrested were not of so much importance as to make the Government forget its dignity, good name and its duty in order to ruin them, that

it was certainly true that the rights of each citizen ought to be sacred, but that the country had also its rights to protect, else the scene of 1st December 1828, and the tragedy of the 13th December, might be repeated.

The Orator then alludes to the Foreigners introduced into this country, (particularly the Spaniards) who have joined in its intestine commotions, and states that the civil war of 1829 would not have been so fatal if they had not taken part in it; and draws a distinction between those foreigners who either by error, or force, have been obliged to espouse a particular cause, and that the allusion was only meant to those strangers who, having no interest in the country, or love for its inhabitants, are decided enemies to its independence. That Spain had not yet lost the hope of enslaving this country, that Spaniards under the title of Constitutionals, from Cadiz and other parts, were spread all over the Republic, encouraging domestic dissensions in order to forward their object, and that actual experience had proved the assertions of the Government to be true.

Señor Figueredo concluded a long speech in supporting the measures pursued by Government, in ordering the arrest of *Señor Jardon*.

Several other members took part in the debate, and the house decided against the petition of *Jardon*, and appointed a committee consisting of *Señores Vega, Figueredo, Olavarieta, Ugarteche, and Cavia*, to report upon the measures best to be adopted in order to meet the dangers which threaten the independence of the country and the peace of the interior.

These Gentlemen have advised that the Government be invested with extraordinary powers, or in other words that the *Habeas Corpus* act be suspended till the crisis is over.

Dr. Cernadas, in the course of the debate stated that the secret Club in the Spanish interest existing in this city is denominated *la Aurora*.

An order has been issued by the Police for all Spaniards residing in this city, to present themselves at that department within the term of 8 days to be registered.

Montevideo.

On the 18th inst., the Constitution was sworn to. We are informed that it was a ceremony little imposing. In the evening the City of *Montevideo* was illuminated, and transparencies displayed on different public buildings: The *Consulado* was lighted with lamps of various colours arranged in figures, which added to some showy transparencies made a splendid appearance. An ode, composed upon the occasion by *Don Juan de la Cruz Varela* was inserted in the *Universal*.

Chili.

We have little to add to our intelligence of last week from *Chili*. On the 22nd June the country remained quiet, the residue of *General Freire's* army had capitulated, and the General himself was banished to *Peru*; notwithstanding which considerable apprehension prevailed that affairs would not long remain quiet. A portion of the middling orders and all the lower class of people were decidedly hostile to the existing Government, and its supporters, which they denominated as the aristocracy of the land.

Don Isidoro Peralta has been appointed Justice of the Peace, of the district North of the Cathedral, for the present year, vice Don Antonio Reyes resigned.

H. B. M's. Ship Beagle has lately surveyed the coast of Terra del Fuego, from the Western entrance of the Straits of Magellan to Cape Horn, in the accomplishment of which it is easy to conceive many privations and severe trials must have been endured on that stormy and iron-bound coast. Too much credit therefore cannot be given to Captain Fitzroy, and those under his Command, for their patience and pre-averance in this arduous service.

For seven months and ten days they never saw a sail, and depended upon their guns for a fresh meal.

Observations were taken from the summit of Cape Horn, and specimens of Natural History have been procured. It was generally supposed that no quadruped but dogs existed in that Island (Terra del Fuego,) several Guanacos were however shot at the most Southern part of it.

The brig Pomona has brought intelligence from Cadiz to the 28th of May. It appears that 7000 troops had sailed from that Port for the Havannah during the month of April, in company with 5 frigates.

The French expedition to Algiers was finally to depart from Toulon on the 1st June. The Day, it is stated remained firm, and seemed resolved to "fight it out." A number of persons had left Cadiz and Gibraltar, for the purpose of viewing the combat.

London Papers to the 9th May had been received in Cadiz, and the King of Great Britain was said to be recovering from his illness.

On the 19th inst, at 1 o'clock, H. B. M's. Brig Algerine and the Packet Hope, at anchor in this port, fired a Royal Salute of 21 guns, with flag at each mast head, it being the anniversary of the Coronation of H. M. George the Fourth.

We have received two printed Pamphlets published in London, translated from the Portuguese: one is entitled "Observations of the Count de Saldanha," and complains bitterly of the conduct of the Marquesa de Palmella, and some members of the Junta at Oporto, respecting the disasters which befel the Constitutional Army in the above city; indeed the conduct of several of the Chiefs of that army

as depicted in the Pamphlet, partook of great indecision.

The second Pamphlet is entitled "Oath and no oath." It is a defence of the conduct pursued by the Prince Don Miguel, asserting that all oaths forced or extorted by fraud or violence, have no validity, that the great majority of the Portuguese nation wished Miguel to rule over them, and that any promises or oaths given by him when under the influence of foreign nations were compulsory, and consequently of no effect. Amongst other remarks the Pamphlet contains the following:

"Will it be maintained that, considering the treacherous circumstances under which Richard the Lion-hearted of England was detained a prisoner in Austria, he was bound to fulfil his engagements with the Duke of that Country, which were, that he should pay one hundred thousand marks and acknowledge himself the Emperor's vassal. He did pay the money, but was he bound to do so? if it be affirmed he was, then he ought also to have considered himself a vassal of the Emperor, and England a fief of the Empire.

Don Miguel being forced to enter into promises and engagements, ought he to the prejudice of his country, to imitate the simplicity of Cœur de Lion?"

THEATRE.

On the 16th inst, was performed for the benefit of Señor Fontaneau, Scene-painter to the Theatre, the *Melo drama* of the Forest of Bondy, or the dog of Montargis: it attracted a full house. The dog came upon the stage with a great deal of confidence for a *debutant*, but he had overrated his talents, and did not perform half so well as some well-bred dogs we have seen in Europe.

On the 18th a play, (the scene in Britain,) founded upon an incident in the escape of Prince Charles Edward, after the battle of Culloden. It was not so well acted as we have before seen it at this Theatre.

The house was full, the Governor was in the state box in citizen attire, with sash, &c., attended by the Chief of Police, (Señor Perdiel); Col. A. Ramirez Valle; Lieut. Col. J. Quesada, &c.

On the 19th, for the benefit of Señor Quijano, the play of *Lanusa*, the hero of the piece was personated by the *beneficiado*, and he greatly exerted himself, but not always with success, he was at times too boisterous, and has not the power like that gifted actor Kean, to fall at once from "passion's height," to subdued calmness as in Othello, when delivers the beautiful soliloquy.

"O now for ever Farewell the tranquil mind! farewell content!" which the Times newspaper in its criticism upon Kean's Othello, compared to the notes of divine music.

Señor Quijano however made some excellent points in *Lanusa*: he has "metal in him" and qualities to make a good actor. Cossio looked extremely well in his Spanish dress of "golden times," and performed very respectably.

After the play a dance called the *Quacaras* was exhibited, and afforded much amusement, the juvenile part of the audience laughed as heartily as those at our Christmas pantomimes in England. Three Quakers in full Quaker's costume were introduced upon the stage; and performed a solemn dance the action of which had nothing *outré* in it: But these sage men were not able to resist love's allurements for "love levels all," and while each of them is poring with ecstasy upon a "love letter," three mischievous girls set fire to the letters, and at "night fall" break the windows in the dwelling houses of the Amorous Quakers, obliging them to get up in their night caps to seek the disturbers of their repose. Felipe David personated one of the Quakers.

The house was crowded in every part, the Governor was again present, accompanied by the same individuals as on the preceding evening, and Lieut. Col. Delgado.

It behoves the Police to be upon the alert when the Theatre is so excessively crowded, several robberies have lately been committed upon the audience, of handkerchiefs, & pocket-

books, the handy work probably of some of the numerous boys in attendance at the Theatre.

We cannot forbear noticing the great improvement which has taken place in the *Costume*, at this Theatre. The dresses are at times brilliant and often classically correct. Strangers have been surprised to find the scenery so well designed and painted: it is creditable to the artist, considering the limited scale upon which he has to operate.

The Theatre itself is totally unworthy a city like Buenos Ayres, but these are not times to erect a new one. It has been well attended this winter; the loss of the Opera has however proved a source of infinite regret; it has made even the amateurs lukewarm in their musical pursuits.

Without wishing to disparage the talents of the Schironi Company, we decidedly wish they had never come to Buenos Ayres: their appearance created disunion, and finally broke up the old Operatic corps which had so long delighted this City.

We have been always particular in our notices of the Theatre, under the full impression that in a civilized land, it is (when properly conducted) "both useful and ornamental," and the mirror which reflects "the very age, and body of the time its form and pressure."

The selection for the Vocal Amateur Concert advertised for the 29th inst., appears to be in good taste. We anticipate that the attendance will be numerous, and commensurate to the charitable object in view.

The British brig Mansfield, Martin, from Montevideo, arrived at Liverpool about the 4th May, and sailed immediately for London.

A committee of the British House of Commons is employed in the examination of Mercantile individuals, relative to the expediency of taking the monopoly of the China trade from the East India company, and throwing it open to the public at large. Mr. William Cartwright, formerly a Merchant of Buenos Ayres, was examined, and he adduced several instances in which British Merchants had from the existing monopoly been obliged to employ foreign vessels in their commerce from Buenos Ayres to China, to the great detriment of British interests.

We have received (by way of Montevideo, English Newspapers to the 7th May; brought by the David Campbell.) The King at that period, according to the bulletins, was slowly recovering.

Lord Combermere, (the Commander in Chief of the Forces in India,) had arrived in London, and immediately proceeded to Windsor Castle to make personal enquiries respecting the King's health; Windsor was crowded every day, by enquirers for the same purpose, consisting of the Nobility, Gentry, foreign Ambassadors, &c., among them we observe the name of Mr. Adams, late President of the United States.

The din of preparation respecting the expedition to Algiers, still continued in France. It was said that the Barbary States had formed an alliance to combat the invaders, and that in consequence 20,000 more troops were to be added to the original armament. General Bourmont, the Commander in Chief of the expedition, although a brave and excellent soldier, is accused in all quarters by paragraphists in allusion to his desertion previous to the battle of Waterloo, stating that the moral of the army under his guidance cannot be good, and that even those to whom he deserted, however they may love the treason, yet hate the traitor.

The King of Spain was indisposed with the gout in his hand.

A deputation from the Committee of

the South American and Mexican association, waited on the Earl of Aberdeen, at the Foreign Office in London, on the subject of the injury to trade and commerce, from the continuance of hostilities between Spain and her late South American Colonies.

His Lordship said it was the intention of Government to observe the strictest impartiality between the belligerent parties, but at the same time to use all their influence to induce the Court of Spain to adopt just views on this important question: His Lordship also stated that Government were not in possession of any information, leading them to believe that any attack on the New States was at present in contemplation by the Spanish Government, either from Cuba, or elsewhere.

One of the principal Mercantile houses at Calcutta, that of Palmer, and Co., has become insolvent; the debts are estimated at from two to three millions sterling. It is expected that a dividend of ten shillings in the pound will be paid.

The South American securities were upon the advance on the London exchange, in consequence it was said of considerable orders from the Continent to purchase. On the 4th May, the Buenos Ayres Stock was at 40.

Patagonia.

The accounts brought by the Jacinta, from the above place are satisfactory: all was quiet and the Indians from 30 to 40 leagues distant. The Cacique Chanil often visited Del Carmen, and the Indians generally for the purpose of trade.

A General Meeting of the Proprietors of the British Commercial Rooms, is requested for Monday 26th inst at one o'clock precisely at said Rooms, to take into consideration sundry subjects which will be laid before them.

The Comet originally discovered by Mr. Bernard Kiernan of this city about the middle of march last, became visible in Europe towards the end of April; agreeably to that Gentleman's announcement, contained in the British Packet No. 189.

It was first observed there in the constellation Pegasus, by M. Gambart, director of the Observatory of Marseilles. The calculations contained in the late Papers are not so minute as those made by Mr. Kiernan; a sufficient series of observations not having yet been taken, but those that are given perfectly agree with our Astronomer's.
