BUENOS AYRES.

The late events in Entrerios have formed the chief topic of discussion during the week. It had been supposed that the change of Government that was had in view by the revolutionists, would cause a material alteration also in the National policy of that Province. But the Papers of this city, as well as those of Santa Fé, affirm that the forces of D. Ricardo Lopez Jordan, entered the towns with strong exclamations in favour of federalism. On the other hand a paper has been published in Montevideo, purporting to be the copy of a manuscript bulletin, which asserts that the principal object of the movement was to disengage the Province from the compromises which its Government had contracted with those of Buenos Ayres and Santa Fé, in regard to the question at issue with the Provinces of the interior. The bulletin certainly differs materially from the official accounts inserted in another part of this paper; and the *Gaceta Mercantil* suspects it to spurious.

Some disturbances have taken place in the interior. The *Aurora* of Cordova of the 14th ult. merely mentions the fact without giving any particulars. In San Juan an ineffectual attempt was made to seize the barracks and military posts, and several of the assailants were killed. San Luis was attacked by the Indians, in conjunction it is said with some malecontents who were repulsed, the Cacique *Faustino* having fallen prisoner.

The *Federal* of Santa Fé contains various reports, viz; that Salta has withdrawn its troops from Cordova; that Tucuman was about to follow its example; and that Mendoza has refused to send its contingent.

The same paper announces that Gen. Paz has made overtures for an accommodation, offering to accede to the federal system of Government; and alleges that Gen. Paz on a former occasion in a confidential letter to the ex-Governor Ibarra, stated that he would send Deputies to the National convention in Santa Fé, which however was not done.

The Legislature of the province of Buenos Ayres closed its session on 30th ult. The following gentlemen, together with the President and vice President, are to compose the standing Committee: D. Manuel H. Aguirre, and D. Juan José Anchorena. The 9th Legislature, one half of whose members are to be elected in the interim, will meet on the 1st May next.

Rio Janeiro.

The last accounts from the above city state that the dispute between the Senate

and the House of Deputies, still continued. The Emperor had held council every day, and secretly advised the Senators to comply with their opponents' wishes.

The *Pigeon* Packet had been detained to learn the result. She sailed for Falmouth on 16th November, having some time before sent her Buenos Ayres and Montevideo mails, by the Packet *Eclipse*. H. B. M. Ship Wolf, for the Cape of Good Hope and East Indies, had put into Rio Janeiro sickly. H. B. M. Ship *Thetis* was to sail from Rio for England, upon the arrival of the Brig of war *Algerine*, from Buenos Ayres.

OFFICIAL DOCUMENTS.

A decree dated 29th ult., orders that a monument shall be erected in the Cemetery of the Recoleta, at the expense of the Government, to the memory of Dr. D. Gregorio Funes, in consideration of the eminent and patriotic services he has rendered to the country.

A decree dated 29th ult. provides some regulations relative to the interment of deceased persons, at the cemetery of the Recoleta.

A decree dated 1st inst., states the necessity which exists, that the vessels of war and other departments of the Marine should be provided with a sufficient military guard, and in order to prevent the inconvenience of employing the soldiers of the line, it is ordered that a force exclusively for the said purpose shall be formed; to be under the superintendence and direction of the Marine office. And to be composed of a company of Marine artillery of 146 men rank and file.

The soldiers are to be engaged for two years, and are to receive one hundred dollars bounty.—The barrack of the said company is to be at the Marine office.

Some other regulations follow relative to the officers, the clothing, &c.

A notice from the office of the war department, states that the Government is taking every measure to discover by what conveyance, and from whom the newspaper *Caduceo* of Montevideo received the particulars which it has published, of the force of the *Esquadrilla* which lately sailed from Buenos Ayres.

No one can justly complain of the want of variety in the climate of Buenos Ayres. The last week has partaken of heat and

cold, rain, sunshine, and strong winds, with its concomitants of thunder and lightning. It rained heavily on the evening of the 28th., the thunder made a

"Dreadful pother o'er our heads," and frightened the few ladies that attended the theatre, which for a wonder was open on that rainy night. On the 30th a beautiful rainbow appeared in the eastern sky, which according to antique chronicles conveys

"A pledge twixt God and man,
That earth shall never be drown'd again."

The embargo upon vessels bound to the opposite coast was taken off on 1st inst., and numerous coasting craft sailed to the N.

A Penguin, the property of Dr. D. B. Muños, lately brought to this city from the Falkland Islands, in the brig *Maria Antonia*, attracts considerable notice from its docility. It takes excursions two or three times in a day to the water side, attended by a servant, amid a crowd of spectators, walks with all the dignity of a city Alderman, and views the concourse around with perfect composure.

VAUXHALL.

We regret not having been able to attend the first performance at this place, which from the windy and dusty afternoon, was we understand attended by only about four hundred spectators. The actors are generally approved, and we are anxious to judge personally of their merit. It appears that the first piece advertised for Wednesday next, *La Pupille*, is the original, in one act, from which *Garrick* translated into two his *Guardian*, a genuine comedy though concise.

OFFICIAL DOCUMENTS.

A communication dated 29th November, from the Revd. Dr. D. Santiago Figueredo to the Government, states that when he had determined to make the important sacrifice of accepting the Rectorship of the University, it was from motives of gratitude for the honor conferred upon him by the Government, and his desire not to hesitate at any sacrifice to be useful to the country. With such a stimulus interest could have no share, and he therefore requests to decline the salary attached to the office of Rector, adding that the approbation of Government and his fellow citizens was the only reward to which he aspired.

The Government replied to the above on the 27th ult., stating its satisfaction at the disinterested patriotism of Señor Figueredo.

Don Francisco Vega has been appointed commissary of Police, *vice* Don P. Viera resigned.

A communication from Don Manuel V. de Maza, private Secretary to the Governor, to the Minister (Señor Anchoarena), states that H. E. having a few days before his departure for the country visited the Hospital for men, he had noticed the peculiar situation of some old slaves employed there, and thought that from their general good conduct that humanity dictated that they should be released from their state of slavery. He wished their case to be placed before the House of Representatives, in order to afford them relief.

A Bulletin containing the following particulars was published in this city on Saturday last.

No. I.

Head quarters on March, November 1830.

A communication to the House of Representatives of the province of Entreríos, signed by the following individuals, viz; Ricardo Lopez y Jordan, Pedro Espino, Felipe Rodriguez, Eduardo Villagra, Justo y Urquiza, Miguel Acevedo, Pedro Alzamendi, stating that in their own name and that of the force they commanded, then in march to the Parana, that they could no longer tolerate the aggressions made upon the H. C. the arbitrary management of the public funds, and the want of individual security of honourable citizens, and therefore claim of the Representatives, as fathers of the Republic, that they will come to a vote in order to displace the present Governor, and proceed to name a provisional Governor in the interim, and the above named persons are confident that the H. C. will act to that effect; thus preventing the evils and blood which may be shed, should efforts be made to sustain a Governor who had been placed in his situation by intrigue and violence; that it remained with the H. C. that the course of the law should not be interrupted, and that it would have to answer to the country for the fulfilment of a claim so just.

No. II.

Santa Fé, 19th November, 1830.

The Governor of Santa Fé feels it in-

cumbent upon him to address himself to the chiefs who head the forces of the 2d department, frankly to inform them that in consequence of intelligence which it was thought might be relied upon, that the Government of the province of Entreríos had been invaded by forces coming part from the Oriental State of the Uruguay, in order to favour the views of those who under the title of *Unitarians* only pretend to destroy and dominate over the Republic, he had sent some troops in its aid under the command of Commandant Mendez, but that he had ordered him to retire, having learnt from this same Commandant that the movement had a very different object.

Notwithstanding which the undersigned cannot remain satisfied with merely vague intelligence, he therefore requests the chiefs to answer him categorically, if the movement is intended to sustain the cause of the Unitarians, or if it has only in view a change of Government following the *system of Federation*, for which this worthy province has always given its vote.

The undersigned Governor confidently hopes that the chiefs who have taken the lead in this movement, will act for the *holy cause of the people*, recollecting that for it Entreríos has constantly fought with honour and fortune.

In this case the undersigned will not mingle in any way in the affairs of the province of Entreríos, and laying aside every other consideration he only desires a certainty from the chiefs, whom he salutes with respect, &c.

No. III.

The individuals to whom the above was addressed, forwarded a reply dated Parana, November 21st, 1830, stating, 1st.—That the movement was made solely against the ex Governor D. Leon Sola, and was purely provincial.

2nd.—That it had no other object, but to destroy a Government which had violated the institutions of the Province.

3rd.—That this event would not alter in the least the principles which had been hitherto followed by the Province.

And that one of these principles would be to cultivate peace and harmony with the province of Santa Fé.

No. IV.

A communication dated Parana, 19th November, 1830—from the provisional Governor of Entreríos, (Don Pedro Barrechea,) to the Governor of Santa Fé; stating his election to that office by the H. C. of the province of Entreríos, and that nothing could be more grateful to him than to see remaining unimpaired the relations of mutual union, friendship and alliance which exist between both Provinces, which he (the provisional Governor,) desires to preserve in all its plenitude. That he wishes the Governor of Santa Fé to be assured of these sentiments, which neither the empire of circumstances, nor the complication of events are capable of altering.

No. V.

A communication from the Governor of Santa Fé, dated Santa Fé, 20th November, 1830, to the Provisional Governor of Entreríos, congratulating him upon his election, and that that event possesses various motives to give satisfaction to the Government of Santa Fé, peace re-established in an allied Province, the

certainty that the enemies of the holy cause of Federation will be disappointed in their vain hopes, &c., &c.

Señor D. Leon Sola arrived at Santa Fé on 16th ult.—accompanied by Señor Taborda, and about one hundred *Entrerianos*.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

In a sitting of 27th ult., two documents were read, one from the delegate Government inclosing a communication received from D. Juan Manuel de Rosas, Governor and Captain General of the province, dated Buenos Ayres 26th ult., requesting that the House would authorize the Government to confer the rank of General upon certain officers, of those who had combated for the institutions of the country.

The Governor, in his communication, states that after the unfortunate 1st December, 1828, which had been a death blow to the institutions of the country, he (the Governor) then Commandant General of the country districts, had made a solemn offer of a grade in advance to those of his companions in arms, who would assist him to restore the laws.

If his conduct as Commandant General had elicited the approval of the House of Representatives, those who accompanied him in the arduous undertaking were equally deserving.

That he had fulfilled part of his engagements to those who held the rank of brevet Colonels, and trusted that the House would sanction the promotion to the rank of General, of those officers who are now full Colonels.

A notice has been issued from the office of the Minister of finance, dated Buenos Ayres 26th ult., prolonging until 31st March of the ensuing year, the period for the Bank to collect the Notes of the old emission, which had been advertised on the 28th ult.

General D. Lucio Mansilla left town at 5 o'clock on Sunday afternoon last, on a mission to the Governments of Santa Fé and Entreríos.

Señor Elias Galvan will fulfill provisionally the duties of Inspector General of the army.

The Governor of the fort, (Colonel D. Francisco Lynch,) has been appointed Captain of the port, *vice* Lt. Col. D. Francisco Ereznano resigned.

Col. Lynch was Captain of the port during the late war with Brazil, and on Tuesday last he re-assumed this office, upon which occasion a military band was stationed upon the *azotea* of the Marine office, and performed some congratulatory *arias*.

Whatever may have caused the resignation of Señor Ereznano, his retirement is a serious loss to the Commercial community, to whom he had recommended himself by his urbanity, activity, and attention to the business of his office.

The establishment of the Telegraph, and the improvements made in the Marine department, will be mementos of the great exertions he made for the improvement of the *Comandancia de Marina*.

We have received by the Packet Zephyr, London Papers to 23d September; Paris and Hamburg Papers to 18th do.

In France (as far as outward appearances denote,) affairs bear a favourable aspect. The new Government had been recognized by Great Britain, and the great European powers. Talleyrand has been appointed Ambassador to England; the appointment of this "wily Statesman" to such an office, has been much commented upon in the London and Paris Journals. There had been political disturbances in the South of France, (a portion of the Kingdom always much attached to the Bourbons,) some troops were in march thither, the Liberals attach but little importance to these occurrences; but in England the very few of the public Journals who have not "gone with the stream," say that the insurrection is likely to become serious. Fears begin to be expressed that the power and influence of the National Guard, now amounting to nearly a million of men, may produce fatal consequences to the state.

The "small revolution" in Brussels, and the disturbances in Belgium had nearly subsided; a body of troops under the Prince of Orange was about to enter the former city. The separation of Belgium, from the dominion of the King of the Netherlands was much bruited, both the Dutch and Belgians appear to wish this measure. Belgium and Algiers seem likely to be disputed points in Europe.

The Duke of Brunswick has been driven from his dominions, and has sought refuge in England. He was rated only as a foolish headstrong boy, and his conduct has proved him as such.

An insurrection had taken place in Saxony, the "bigot King," as he is called, consented to redress a few local grievances and the matter ended for the present.

From Spain and Portugal, we have later news than by way of England, a variety of reports relative to these countries were in circulation, but nothing beyond that.

Mr. Huskisson died at Eccles on 15th September, in consequence of an accident he met with at the opening of the Liverpool and Manchester railway, by the Rocket Engine coming in contact with him; he died a few hours after the dreadful misfortune. The decease of this Statesman, and in a manner so truly appalling, had caused the most melancholy sensations.

The ex-King of France and his family remained at Lulworth Castle. The Duchesses d'Angouleme and de Berri, often made excursions round the country, but the ex-King and the Duke d'Angouleme seldom moved beyond the grounds of Lulworth.
