BUENOS AYRES.

Accounts have been received from Cordova, which, coupled with the reports current in Buenos Ayres, would lead one to believe, that the wordy warfare so long carried on between the Periodicals of this city and Santa Fé, with those of Cordova, &c., is likely soon to give place to deadly war, and that the question at issue between the two political parties must ere long be decided by the dreadful alternative—the sword—dreadful when called upon to settle disputes between foreign nations, but a thousand times more so when employed in the arrangement of domestic differences.

On Thursday last the House of Representatives of this Province held an extraordinary and private sitting, to receive an official communication from His E. the Governor of the Province.

The following article appeared in the *Lucero* of yesterday.

Recent intelligence from the Interior.

The Liberating army under the immediate orders of the valiant Governor D. Estanislao Lopez, has made a movement towards the frontier of Cordova. Its vanguard, Commanded by Col. D. Pascual Echagúe, is composed of nearly one thousand cavalry perfectly well mounted and equipped, with numerous spare horses and a train of artillery. The wishes of all good patriots will accompany them in this gallant career of liberty and glory.

This movement commenced on Monday 10th instant. In various parts of the province of Cordova symptoms of insurrection have appeared; and in *Ranchos* and *Rio Terceiro*, the troops of the Protector have been routed by the inhabitants, whose rallying cry is *federation for ever! Death to the tyrants!*

The noble Governor Ibarra and his companion in arms, D. Pablo de la Torre, have chased the few remaining troops of Col. Desa out of the territory of Santiago; and were collecting the means to carry the war into the province of Cordova itself.

A proclamation has been issued by Col.

Izquierdo to his regiment of cavalry, stationed at Lujan. It congratulates them upon the late events in Entrerios, Santiago and Salta, and expresses a confident hope that the year 1831 will witness the final triumph of the laws, and that the regiment will ever be ready to second the intentions of the Government.

Montevideo.

We have received newspapers from the above city to 12th inst. The President of the Oriental Republic, D. Fructoso Rivero had left Montevideo upon a tour to the country districts for the purpose of inspection, and to clear the country and the frontiers of robbers who have committed depredations there: he took with him some cavalry for that purpose.

The alarm respecting the currency had in a degree subsided, and the project for its melioration proposed by the commercial body had been admitted by the Government, with a few slight alterations in the plan;—Patacones, which had been sold at 16½ a 17 copper dollars each, declined in consequence to 14 a 15.

D. José Joaquin Alem Castro has been recognized as Consul of Brazil to the Oriental Republic of the Uruguay.

Rio Janeiro.

From the above city there is no news of importance. We have received a letter, dated Rio, 30th ult., of which the following is an extract.

“I understand that it will not be possible to save any thing from the Frigate *Thetis*, until the diving apparatus arrives from England. In the meantime a net has been put over her, made of thick rope, and sunk with chain cables, as she is laying in 8 fathoms water on the edge of a very steep bank, so that when she goes to pieces it will prevent the fragments rolling down the bank into 40 fathoms.

The Emperor left Rio Janeiro to day for the Mines, accompanied by the Empress, which will render them very popular in that quarter. The Ministers are fully empowered to act in each department

during the Emperor's absence, as may be most beneficial to the country.

From the Northern ports we have no *novedades*, the accounts from Bahia are favourable. The new 74-gun ship arrived at Rio Janeiro the other day dimasted; she is said to be no great thing. The Bahiana Frigate is daily expected, and report states that she is a fine vessel.

The Alameda was extremely well attended on Sunday afternoon last, by a brilliant assemblage of ladies. The promenade was extended upon the “grass plot,” as far as the Retiro. It was a fine opportunity for the *Argentina* to note the fashions.

The bathing season is approaching its close, the sun is fast leaving us, and although the heat in the day is great, yet the mornings and evenings have been cool,—and the bathers in consequence not very numerous.

OFFICIAL DOCUMENTS.

A communication from Don Pedro Ferré, dated Corrientes, 24th ult., to the Governor and Captain General of the province of Corrientes, expresses his wish to maintain the friendly relations so happily established with the boundary Provinces, and states that no sacrifices shall be wanting on his part to consolidate the ties of union and harmony, not only with the said Provinces, but with the Republic in general.

A communication from the Government of the province of Buenos Ayres, dated Buenos Ayres, 11th inst., to that of Corrientes, acknowledges the receipt of the above, and felicitates Señor Ferré upon his election, adding that the services and efforts which he had always made in favour of order and the federation of the provinces of the Republic gave him a just title to a trust so sacred, and that the Government of Buenos Ayres would fulfil the grateful duty of maintaining the friendly relations, existing with the province of Corrientes.

A circular has been addressed to all the Governments of the Argentine Republic by the Government of Chili, dated Santiago de Chili, August 3rd., 1830, regretting the civil dissensions which prevail, the many provinces devastated, and the ruin and orphanage caused to families, the triumph such a state of things must cause to Spain, and the danger which threatens the existence of the Republic if domestic peace be not restored. That the civil war having terminated in Chili the Government of that Republic proffered its mediation to the Provinces of the Argentine Republic, proposing as a preliminary step, a suspension of arms between them—that a congress should meet to organize the country in the mode which may appear the most eligible by the majority of the Representatives of the Provinces, and that Santiago del Estero being a commodious point, should be the place of meeting.

Buenos Ayres, 11th January, 1831.

The following is a summary copy of various documents which have been published.

A communication from the new Governor of the province of Corrientes, (Don Pedro Ferré,) dated Corrientes, 21st ult., to the Governor of Santa Fé, stating that the Legislature had authorized him to take active measures as it regarded the late events in Entrerios, that he had accordingly stationed troops on the frontiers, ready to act in support of the treaty of alliance and friendship between the boundary provinces.

A communication from the same to the same, dated Corrientes, 24th ult., acknowledging the communication from the Governor of Santa Fé, giving an account of the favourable events in Entrerios, and expressing the firm persuasion that Entrerios would, now that order was re-established, consult her true interest, and fix the peace of the province on a solid basis, by adopting a line of conduct in accordance with the Governments of the boundary provinces.

A communication from the Governor of Santa Fé, dated Santa Fé, 31st ult., congratulating Señor Ferré upon his election as Governor of Entrerios, and adding that the sacrifices he had made in favour of federation, and his attachment to that system, promised the greatest advantages to the Republic.

A communication from the Governor of Entrerios, (Don Pedro Barrenechea,) to the Governor of Santa Fé, dated Parana, 2nd inst., stating that himself and the people of Entrerios felt the most lively gratitude for the assistance rendered in the late struggle, both by the Governor of Santa Fé and Don Juan Manuel Rosas, Governor of Buenos Ayres; and that during the stay of the troops of Santa Fé in the province of Entrerios, the order and discipline they had observed was admirable, and that to them exclusively was owing the salvation of the province.

A communication from the Governor of Santa Fé to that of Buenos Ayres, inclosing the note he had received from the Governor of Entrerios, and stating that the said note contained a cordial expression of the feelings of gratitude, which animated the Governor of Entrerios for the service rendered to that province by the allied Governments, in having rescued it from the hands of men who

had forgotten their country and themselves. That the province of Entrerios was now free from all interior and exterior enemies, and that those who had disturbed its peace had fled to the Banda Oriental, with the shame of having meditated in a Foreign country the ruin of their own, accompanied by the consciousness of their crimes, and of their having been uselessly exerted.

A note has been published, stated to have been addressed by Colonel Don Agustin Arias, to the most excellent Señor Governor and Captain General of the Province of Salta; Canon of its Cathedral, and Colonel of cavalry Dr. Don Juan Ignacio Gorriti, on behalf of himself Col. D. Pablo de la Torre, and the gauchos of the Campaña of that province, demanding his resignation of the gubernatorial chair, (which the note states,) he unworthily occupies to the prejudice of the sacerdotal character he invests, together with the title of Colonel of cavalry, granted to him by the *soi disant* protector of the Provinces.

NATIONAL BANK.

Don José Maria Escalada has been appointed President of the Bank, *vice* Don Miguel del Marmol Ibarrola, resigned on account of ill health.

Don Leonardo Gonzales has been appointed Treasurer of the Bank, *vice* Don Pedro Berro, resigned.

News has been received from our *Escuadrilla* in the Uruguay to the 11th inst., at which period it was off Gualeguaychú. The most perfect order and tranquillity was re-established in Entrerios, the river was free from all alarm, and Col. Coe expected immediate orders to return. Col. Caballero, (of the Oriental service,) had been on board the commodore's vessel, and confirmed the news of the arrest of Rosales, with the addition that he and five more officers had been forwarded as prisoners to Montevideo. Col. Coe had likewise been visited by the Commandant General of the province of Entrerios, Col. Don Pedro Espino.

Gaceta Mercantil.

A horse race took place on Monday afternoon, near the *Recoleta*, between *Discount*, rode by a young Englishman, and *Scrap*, rode by a Gaucho lad—both horses belonged to English gentlemen.—*Discount* gained the day, and the young Englishman not only rode well, but showed considerable jockeyship.

The race course was attended by a considerable concourse of people.

There has been the "devil to pay" among the major part of the Periodicals of this city. The Editor of the *Gaceta Mercantil* and the Editor of the *Lucero*, have "quarrelled in print by the book," with nothing like the courteousness described in *Touchstone's* definition of a quarrel, on the contrary their language was "full of comparisons and wounding flouts," without even the all-powerful *if* to help them out: however nothing but *ink* has yet been shed; an armistice has taken place, and they have "sheathed their pens and parted."

The presumed Editor of the "*Toro de Once*," (D. Luis Perez,) has been arrested, this has called forth some remarks in the *Clasificador*, in censure of that proceeding.

The *Gaucho* is defunct, the Editorship of it interfering, (as it is stated) too much with the Editor's private concerns.

The *Aljaba* is likewise dead.

The *Toro de Once* is of course for the present suspended.

THEATRE.

The play of *La muerte del General Riego* was repeated on 9th inst., with the ballet dance of *La fille mal gardée*. Señor Cañete danced with much spirit, and pouted and sulked very prettily, because the *Señora Madre* was inimical to her favorite lover. Señor Quijano personated the old lady with good effect.

The house was well attended.

On Tuesday, for the benefit of Doña Trinidad Guevara, *primera dama de esta Coliseo*, the tragedy of *Argia*. Señor Caceres and Doña Trinidad both exerted themselves greatly and were much applauded. This play has some good theatrical situations, and is always effective.

The evening's entertainment closed with a *pas de deux* danced by *Dominguila Montes de Oca* in boy's attire, and a very lovely little girl about 7 years of age, the daughter of Doña Trinidad; she was charmingly dressed and looked like a *petit angel*.

The dance was encored.

The house was brilliantly filled, particularly the boxes, in which were a number of ladies' most of them with a profusion of artificial flowers in their head dress, — a fashion (and we speak it with deference,) not to our taste.

The heat in the theatre was excessive and various gentlemen, both in pit and boxes had recourse to fans.

Doña Matilda Diez has appeared at the Montevideo theatre: she was advertised in the play bills of the theatre of that city as the *primera dama* of the Buenos Ayres theatre; Doña Trinidad must look to that, and "pull caps" with Doña Matilda: two *primera damas* is as bad as *Mr. Puff's* "two morning guns."
