BUENOS AYRES.

We have not any thing to communicate this week from the Provinces of the Interior, and but very little local intelligence. Whatever news has transpired, will be found under the usual head.

No time has yet been promulgated for the election of the six Members to the House of Representatives.

A continuation of the Diary of the division of the Army under General D. Juan Manuel de Rosas, in operations against the Indians, has been published. The Division being in winter-quarters, it is merely an account of the occurrences of the day, mingled with observations upon the country in which the army is encamped, its productions, and what it might produce. Among other things, a species of potatoe has been found. Another Report has been rendered to General Rosas, from Captain Bathurst, relative to the examination made by the latter on the river Colorado, and the discovery of a port there. The *zumaca San Martin*, deeply laden, had passed the bar, and entered the said port; and she was ordered to pass further up the river, to where the army was encamped, to discharge her cargo. It was also intended to construct two small vessels, in order to a further examination of the river Colorado, towards the frontiers of Mendoza, and the river Negro of Patagonia.

The dates of the Diary are from 30th of May, to 16th June. The weather in that quarter was cold and rainy, with sometimes hail and snow. The thermometer had been as low as 34. The latitude observed, 39. 37. S.; long. 62. 38, 52 W. of Greenwich, and 4. 24, 52 W. of Buenos Ayres.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

A communication from the Government has been laid before the House, respecting the negotiation between this Government and that of Bolivia; and stating, that although the objects which the Government had in view in sending a mission to Bolivia, had not been realized, yet it was satisfactory to observe that nothing had occurred to interrupt the peace and friendship which exist between the two nations.

A draft of a project was presented by Señor Anchorena, in order to amend the law of elections.

At a sitting on the 8th inst., the debate upon the motion of Señor Anchorena, relative to the Constitution of the Province, was terminated; and the House sanctioned a decree to the effect that the Committee of Constitutional Affairs shall present to the House, before the 30th of September next, a project of Constitution for the Province, under the Representative Republican system. After the project is presented, the House is to give it a preferent consideration, and not close its session without having sanctioned the Constitution. The Province shall not enter into a general organization with the rest of the Nation, except under the Federal system, in conformity

to the compacts entered into with the Sister Provinces.

The House approved of the election of Señor D. Pedro Trapani, for the Department of Patagonia.

At a sitting on the 11th inst., it was expected that the subject of the elections of the 16th ult. would have been taken into consideration, in consequence of which all the Ministers attended; but a previous question having given rise to a lengthened debate, the intended discussion was postponed until this day, at 12 o'clock, when the Ministers will again attend. In our last we stated that the special Committee of the House had approved of the conduct of the Government in suspending the elections on 16th ult.: the said Committee also stated, that such a proceeding might produce fatal results against civil liberty, and ought not to be put in practice except in cases of imminent danger to the public tranquillity: that after a careful examination, the majority of the Committee was of opinion that the Government had no other resource but to act as it had done in suspending the said elections. Señor Anchorena (one of the Committee,) dissented on some particular and substantial points, and presented a separate report.

On the 8th inst., the Rev. Patrick J. O'Gorman, Chaplain of the Irish Catholics here, received the degree of Doctor of Divinity in this University, after having undergone the due examination in the presence of the Rector, Dr. Gary; and the Professors Dr. Guerra, Dr. Casagamas, and Sr. Ferras. The Rev. Canon, late Vicar-General, Dr. Terreros, was the *Padrino* of Dr. O'Gorman on this occasion, when, for the first time, we believe, a foreigner has graduated in this University.

"A hall! a hall! give room and foot it, girls!"

We are informed that Mr. Beech intends to open the Buenos-Ayres Hotel (formerly Fauch's) in a few days; and what is more, that it is probable a Subscription Ball will take place upon the occasion: indeed nothing can be more appropriate than the present cold weather for such an amusement.

Those who are acquainted with the Hotel in question, have generally acknowledged that for comfort and convenience it can scarcely be surpassed in South America; and we sincerely wish its spirited proprietor every success.

We received, by the packet *Cockatrice*, London journals to 8th of May, and Paris do. to 4th; from which it appears that Peace has taken place between the Sultan of Turkey and the Pacha of Egypt. Previous to this event, some Russian troops had been disembarked at Constantinople, and more were on their march thither, for the avowed purpose of protecting that Capital; the peace, however, had rendered the presence of the Russian troops unnecessary, and it was said they were immediately to retire. This peace, according to report, has been brought about by the in-

fluence of France, who now plays "first fiddle" in Turkish affairs, as did Great Britain at one time.

The quarrel between Holland and Belgium seems as far from being settled as ever. The Dutchmen appear to be determined; and according to some accounts, have got rid of their natural phlegm, and have become enthusiastic in the cause of their country. There certainly must be some behind the scene work, some powerful backers, or the King of Holland would hardly venture so deeply. The combined fleets of France and England were about to enforce a rigorous blockade of the Dutch ports.

In Portugal, affairs remained much the same. Don Pedro's forces had, in April, made two successful sorties from Oporto, killing and wounding a great number of the Miguelites. Dismay, it was said, had seized the latter; that they were deserting by wholesale to the Constitutionalists, and that the success of the Pedroites had now become more probable than ever. The fleet of Admiral Sartorius had arrived at Oporto, and had in part returned to their duty, a portion of their claims having been liquidated.

The debates in the British Parliament have been interesting. A Bill has passed the House of Commons, emancipating the Jews of the United Kingdom, and allowing them all the privileges enjoyed by their fellow-citizens. The Bill has to receive the sanction of the House of Lords, which it was thought would be granted.

The British Ministry had been rather awkwardly situated: a motion was made and carried in the House of Commons, to take off the duty upon Malt; but this motion was done away with by a counter-motion proposed by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, (Lord Althorp,) on a succeeding evening. His Lordship declared that if the first motion was persisted in, the Ministers could not carry on the Government, and must resign. The motion of his Lordship was carried.

A Bill was brought in to repeal the house and window tax; but was negatived by a large majority. Sir John Cua Hobhouse had resigned office, and likewise his seat as Member for Westminster, on the plea that he could not conscientiously hold either, because if he voted for the repeal of the house and window tax, it would be in accordance with the wishes of his constituents, but decidedly against those of the Ministry. Sir Francis Burdett has lost a part of his popularity, by having given his vote against the repeal of the above-mentioned taxes.

The taking possession of the Falkland Islands by H. B. M.'s ship *Clio*, was known in England; but the papers scarcely notice it, at least those we have seen. The London *Times* merely states, that it had "caused a very angry feeling in Buenos Ayres." The same journal, in noticing Brazilian affairs, is equally concise, and only says that "Coffee had risen considerably." The fact is, that affairs nearer-home present "metal more attractive" to the European journalist, therefore we must pocket the affront.

Lord Foley, and Admiral Lord Gambier, died in England in April last.

FESTIVAL OF THE NINTH OF JULY.

In compliance with the annual custom, we again insert the

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

OF THE

UNITED PROVINCES OF THE RIVER PLATE.

"In the well-deserving and most worthy city of SAN MIGUEL DEL TUCUMAN, on the Ninth day of July, 1816, the ordinary sitting being ended, the Congress of the United Provinces resumed its previous deliberations respecting the grand, august, and sacred object of the Independence of the inhabitants constituting the same. The cry of the whole country for its solemn emancipation from the despotic power of the Kings of Spain, was universal, constant, and decided: nevertheless, the Representatives carefully dedicated to this arduous affair the whole extent of their talents, the rectitude of their intentions, and the interest with which they viewed their own fate, that of the people represented, and also of their posterity. After mature deliberation, they were asked, whether they considered it expedient that the Provinces of the Union should constitute a Nation free and independent of the Kings of Spain, and the mother country? Filled with the holy ardour of Justice, they simultaneously answered in the affirmative by acclamations; and then, one by one, successively reiterated their unanimous, spontaneous, and decided votes in favour of the Independence of the country: and in virtue thereof, they concurred in the following

DECLARATION.

"WE, the Representatives of the United Provinces of South America, in general Congress assembled, invoking the Supreme Being who presides over the Universe, in the name and by virtue of the authority of the people we represent, and protesting to Heaven, and to the Nations and Inhabitants of the whole Globe, the justice by which our wishes are guided, do solemnly declare in the face of the earth that it is the unanimous and indubitable will of these Provinces to break the repugnant ties which bound them to the King of Spain, to recover the rights of which they were despoiled, and invest themselves with the high character of a Nation free and independent of King Ferdinand VII., his successors, and the mother country. In consequence whereof, the said Provinces, in point of fact and right, possess ample and full power to assume for themselves such forms of Government as justice requires, and the urgency of existing circumstances may demand. All and each of them publish, declare, and ratify the same through us; pledging themselves, under assurance and guarantee of their lives, property, and honour, to abide by and sustain this their will and determination. Let the same therefore be communicated for publication to whomsoever it may concern; and in consideration of the respect due to other Nations, let the weighty reasons which have impelled us to this solemn declaration, be detailed in a separate Manifesto.—Given in the hall of our sittings, signed by our hands, sealed with the seal of the Congress, and countersigned by our Secretaries, also members thereof."

(Then follow the signatures of the Members of the Congress for the Provinces.—On the part of Buenos Ayres it was signed by *D. Antonio Saenz, Dr. José Dabreguera, Father Constante José Rodriguez, Dr. Pedro Medrano, Dr. E. Agustine Gascon, D. Tomas de Anchorena, and Juan José Paso, Secretary.*)

The unfavourable weather prevented the observations usual in this City on the 9th of July: there was no procession to the Cathedral; the shops however were closed, and the day was kept as a close holiday, but the air was cold and gloomy. It is said that this festival, and that of *Corpus Christi*, are intended to be observed on the day of *San Martin*, (11th of November,) the Patron Saint of Buenos Ayres.

The ceremonials which took place on 9th inst., in honour of the day, may be summed up in a few words. On the evening of the 8th, the Public Offices and the Theatre were illuminated. On the 9th, salutes were fired at sun-rise, mid-day, and sun-set, from the Fort, from the national schooner-of-war *Sarandi*, and from the guard-vessel: these two vessels were decorated with flags. At 12 o'clock a salute was also fired from the United States corvette *Warren*: she had, during the day, the flag of this Republic flying at her fore. The National flag was displayed all day from the Fort, at the Marine-Office, and by the National vessels in the harbour. In the

evening the Public Offices were again illuminated, and the town partially so. Military music was stationed in the gallery of the Cabildo, and performed until 9 o'clock: it had but few listeners in consequence of the rain; and the Theatre was closed from the same cause.

CELEBRATION of the Fifty-seventh Anniversary of the Independence of the U. S. of North America, by the transient and resident Citizens in Buenos Ayres.

This day, ever dear to the recollection of every Citizen of the United States, was celebrated in this city with more than usual splendour on the 4th inst. A Meeting was held at Mrs. Thorne's Sala, on the evening of the 1st, when *Mr. J. C. Flint*, being called to the Chair, and *Mr. J. W. Ridgway* being appointed Secretary, it was resolved that the festivities of the day should be delegated to a Committee, consisting of *Messrs. J. C. Zimmermann, Joseph Dorr, Francis W. Dominick, Charles Howard*, and *M. Parker*; with powers to invite such guests, and make such arrangements as the importance of the occasion demanded. In consequence of which, a dinner was provided at *Mr. Beech's* (late *Faunch's*) Hotel; where the company assembled at half-past 4, and at 5 o'clock the Declaration of Independence was read by *Mr. P. B. Hayes*, (Vice-Consul at *Porto Alegre*), preceded by a neat and pertinent Address, in a fine manly voice; and concluded with the cheers of the company, the band playing *Hail Columbia*. At half-past 5 the company marched to the banquet-room, to the air of *Washington's March*, where a table was spread for 84 persons, in a style of elegance perhaps never surpassed in this country. The room was decorated with the flags of various nations, portraits of illustrious Americans, the "Nation's Guest," Declarations of Independence, &c. &c.; with chandeliers, candelabras, wreaths of flowers and evergreens tastefully disposed; and the band of music in the gallery, which was ornamented with allegorical insignias. *Mr. Joseph Dorr* acted as President, and *Mr. Francis W. Dominick*, as Vice-President on the occasion; and we are happy to say, that not the most trifling occurrence took place to mar the harmony and sociability of the scene. Much and deserved credit is due to *Mr. Beech*, and his assistants, *Messrs. Fay & Jeffries*, for the prompt and handsome manner in which everything was arranged, considering but 48 hours were occupied in preparing the numerous viands, ornaments, and pasties. The company sat down at 6 o'clock, when the following Toasts were drank:—

- 1st. The day we celebrate.—(Three cheers.) Tune, *Yankee Doodle*.
- 2d. The President of the United States.—(Three cheers.) *President's March*.
- 3d. The Governor of the Province of Buenos Ayres.—(Three cheers.) *National Hymn*.
- 4th. The Memory of Washington.—(Silent, standing.)
- 5th. The Army and Navy of the United States. (Six cheers.) *Hail Columbia*.
- 6th. The fair soil of our country; may it never be polluted by the footsteps of a foreign marauder, but to become his death-bed.—(Three cheers.) *Washington's March*.
- 7th. The Revolutionary Patriots of America, now fast sinking to their silent homes. May their children ever emulate their virtues.—brave, generous, and free.—(Three cheers.) *Auld lang syne*.
- 8th. The fair daughters of Buenos Ayres.—(Three cheers.) *Blue-eyed Mary*.
- 9th. The memory of *Old Iron-Sides*, and her gallant Commanders, who taught the foe that assertion was no proof.—(Six cheers.) *The Star-spangled Banner*.
- 10th. Our Commerce. May the star-spangled banner be seen and respected in every harbour of the Universe; and when called into service, its stripes be visible on the backs of its enemies.—(Three cheers.) *Auld lang syne*.

11th. Our foreign relations.—friends in peace, enemies in war.—(Three cheers.) *Hail to the Chief*.

12th. The American Nation: its dominions are bounded by the tombs of its invaders, There's no spot on earth Like the land of our birth, Where heroes keep guard over altar and hearth. (Three cheers.) *Home, sweet home*.

13th. The fair daughters of our native soil, the brightest ornaments of the social world. They love to live as well as we, We live to love as well as they. (Six cheers.) *Loves young dream*.

By the President, (*Mr. J. Dorr*).—The Argentine Republic; ever taking a conspicuous part in the cause of justice and liberty.

By the Vice-President, (*Mr. F. W. Dominick*).—The Memory of the last of the Signers, *Charles Carroll*, of *Carrollton*. (Silent, standing.)

A friend has favoured us with the above details. A variety of volunteer toasts were also given, and we regret that we have not room to insert all of them. We are in fact obliged to condense those that we do publish.

The Governor gave several toasts: the first was introduced as follows: "Gentlemen; as a glorious event, and one capable of inflaming the heart of all true republicans in sustaining the honor and liberty of their country, I call to mind the celebrated battle of 8th January, 1815, at *New Orleans*, and drink to the prosperity of the illustrious General who commanded, and who is now the worthy President of the United States of North America: the able and intrepid General *Jackson*."

Mr. J. C. Zimmermann, adverting to the proud feelings of every American on the 4th of July, congratulated the company on the honor done it by the Chief Magistrate, and so many other distinguished citizens of this country, by their attendance at this celebration; and alluding to the harmony and good feeling prevailing, proposed,—Perpetual friendship and harmony between the United States of America, and the Provinces of the Argentine Republic.

Mr. Zimmermann,—reciprocating the honorable mention made by *H. E.* of so distinguished a citizen of the United States, said there was now in the deserts rendering services to his country, a citizen of this Republic who could not be forgotten on an occasion like this. He having been invested with the Chief Magistracy, was now, as commander of a military expedition, obedient to the orders of the Chief Magistrate who had before been obedient to him in the like capacity; giving a proof of republican subordination which had merited to him the title of Restorer of the Laws: and proposing the health of *Don Juan Manuel Rosas*, it was drank with 9 cheers.

The Ministers likewise proposed toasts, and Generals *Guido*, *Alvear*, &c., made short addresses to the meeting.

General *Mancilla* spoke to the following effect: "Gentlemen; on hearing strike up the North-American National Hymn, an enthusiastic fire has inflamed my patriotism. Influenced by this impulse, I rise to add the very respectable assemblage of North American citizens here met. Before I proceed, I must crave their indulgence if any expression of mine, uttered in warmth, should appear equivocal; for none will be effected by any other motive than that of justice and reason. Gentlemen; to foremen there is no inequality of physical force, because when they assault

their rights, their valour arguments in proportion to the justice of their cause. These premises laid down, I shall proceed to the subject which has given occasion to my toast, viz.: the question between this Republic and that of the United States of North America, relative to the Falkland Islands. Gentlemen, if there were on our part no other right than that of their being comprehended within the limits of our territory, which is in my opinion unquestionable; I think as they have now been rudely and perfidiously invaded by the maritime forces of the British nation, that for this reason the Government of the United States of North America, so soon as General Alvear, Minister Plenipotentiary from this Republic appears there, will doubtless settle all the differences which have occurred upon individual interests; and that those two free and independent States, united and guided by one and the same principle, will know how to deal with the Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain, upon its exaggerated pretensions. Yes, Gentlemen, the New World ought to make common cause to defend its limits. Let the people of the Old World live, if they choose, loaded with the chains

which they have not been able to break; but let them know that at all times Kings and serviles are abominable to the inhabitants of this happy land."

In addition there were also present Messrs. Daniel Gowland, and John Eschenburg, and the Adjutant of the Port, D. Pedro Ximeno.

Generals Pinto and Vidal, the Captain of the Port (D. Francisco Lynch,) Dr. D. Manuel José Garcia, and Captain Cooper of the corvette *Warren*, had been invited, but sent apologies, not being able to attend. The healths of these gentlemen were drank, and also of the other guests on their retiring.

In our last we inserted all the particulars of the salutes that were fired by the Fort, and corvette *Warren*, &c. &c.

We believe it is the first time that the Governor of the Province has attended on such occasions, and that the Fort has saluted; and we rejoice that good feeling has thus superseded etiquette.
