BUENOS AYRES.

Notwithstanding the total absence of all foreign news, or communications from the provinces of the interior, during the week, our daily papers have not been at a loss for *materiales*. The subject of the late elections,—the proceedings in the House of Representatives,—and the change which it is reported is about to take place in the Ministry, has afforded abundant food for our journalists, and they have managed to lay about them without mercy. The *Apostolicos* (as they are called,) assail the Minister of War, (General Martinez,) attributing to his "direful influence" the effervescence of party spirit which now prevails, and which, they say, has led to the insiduations and attacks against the government of Don Juan Manuel Rosas. And, furthermore, they charge the said General with having chartered a vessel for Patagonia, and bought a quantity of paper for the public service, at a sum far beyond the "market price;"—and, in fine, that nothing will satisfy the country but the ousting of General Martinez from office.

General Martinez, in reply to the first allegations, has inserted in the public journals the official correspondence respecting the vessel for Patagonia, and the purchase of the paper; in order to prove that the assertions of his political opponents are devoid of truth.

The *Cismaticos* (so named by the *Apostolicos*,) allege the incapacity of the Ministers Señores Zufiga and Maza,—the distress it has inflicted upon the country,—the army, navy, and public officers unpaid, &c. &c. &c.; and, moreover, that the Cabildo clock (the Horse-Guards' clock of Buenos Ayres,) had stopped, and could not be repaired because the Minister (Maza,) would not advance 400 dollars for that purpose. This last assertion brought forth the Cabildo clock-keeper, who, in a communication to the daily papers, flatly denied that the clock was in a dormant state for want of assets to repair it.

The journals above noticed, use the most pointed language as it regards the government of General Rosas, during the time he held the extraordinary powers; denominating various acts of that Government, as being arbitrary in the extreme.

The daily paper *Lucero*, finished its career on 31st ult., upon which occasion the Editor inserted a farewell address, to the effect, that during its career of nearly four years, and in the difficult circumstances in which the country was placed, viz.: under the Provisional Government of General Viamont, the Dictatorship of Brigadier Rosas, and the present constitutional regime of Brigadier Balcarce,—it had advocated no other principles than those which the Editor conscientiously believed would benefit the country; he also indignantly repels the charges of interested motives, &c. &c. The address concludes with the following words:—"Periculosiores sunt inimicitia juxta libertatem."

An address has been published, from the Governor of the Province of Santiago del Estero, (Felipe Ibarra,) to the inhabitants thereof, inviting them to join with the other provinces, in the operations now going on against the hostile Indians.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES of the PROVINCE OF BUENOS AYRES.

Continuation of the discussion upon the Report rendered by the Special Committee, approving the conduct of the Government in suspending the Elections on the 16th June.

Sitting of the 17th ult.

Señor Olavarrrieta defended the report of the committee, and, in a long speech, explained his motives for so doing. In his opinion the measures taken by the Government in suspending the elections, were absolutely necessary, and did not in the least attack the sovereignty of the people.

Señor Alcorta said that he was against both the projects which had been presented to the House; because, on the one hand, he could not approve of the conduct of the Government to the extent which the special committee had done, nor, on the other, could he agree to the propositions of the counter project. The Hon. Member concluded his speech by presenting a draft of a project, that the House recognised the patriotic intentions of the Governor in suspending the elections, &c. &c. &c.

Señor Cosme Argerich was also against both the projects; and in a long harangue, disapproved of the conduct pursued by the Government in suspending the elections on 16th June: he described it as unconstitutional, and full of peril as it regards the liberties of the people.

Sitting of the 19th.

Señor Martinez was also opposed to the report rendered by the special committee. He said that the present Governor of the Province had ever been distinguished for his liberal and republican principles, and would no doubt uphold them with his life; no one could justly accuse him with having any other motive than the public good, when he ordered the suspension of the elections; yet, with this salvo as it regards the good intentions of the Governor, he (Señor Martinez,) could never approve of the said suspension: he considered it an unconstitutional and arbitrary act; and that the report of the committee in approving it, was in fact acknowledging an attribution in the Government which the law did not recognize.

Señor Anchorena spoke at considerable length against the report of the special committee; and said that the interference of the Government in stopping the elections on 16th June, was at once uncalled for, unnecessary, and unconstitutional. He defended the conduct of the Police on that day, and averred that that department had not merited the obloquy which some had endeavoured to cast upon it; that in his opinion no danger whatever existed of anarchy, or serious disturbance, had the elections been allowed to go on. It is true (said the Hon. Member,) that in one parish

a blow was struck and a wound given; but that did not prove that anarchy existed. A man, for example, might break into a house in the obscurity of night, and rob a citizen, nay, perhaps might murder him; this would be a crime, but not an act of anarchy. Señor Anchorena expressed his decided opposition to the report of the special committee, and also censured the proceedings of the Government in suspending the elections.

In our last we stated that the project of the special committee was "thrown out." All the projects presented by different members, respecting the late elections, were also negatived. The new special committee who are to report upon the elections of 16th June, was named at a sitting on Saturday last, and consists of the following members: Señores Alcorta, Martinez, Riglos, Garcia, and Valdez y Silveira.

At a sitting on 25th ult., Señor Anchorena proposed a motion, which was referred to the Committee of Finance, viz.: That the Government be requested to place before the House as soon as possible, an estimate of the public expenses for the ensuing year of 1834.

Official Documents.

A communication from the Governor of the Province of Catamarca, (Valentin Aramburu,) dated Catamarca, 9th May, 1833, to the Governor of the Province of Buenos Ayres, states his election to the office of Governor of Catamarca, vice Señor Marcos Antonio Figueroa, deceased; and that his political principles will be in unison with those of his predecessor.

A communication, signed by the Governor of the Province of Buenos Ayres, (Juan Ramon Balcarce,) and the Minister, Manuel V. de Maza, dated Buenos Ayres, 22d July, 1833, addressed to the Governor of Catamarca, acknowledges the receipt of the above, and congratulates him upon his election, &c. &c.

A communication from Father Ciriaco Rodriguez Valdivieso, dated Buenos Ayres, 17th ult., addressed to the Government, states that he declines to receive the salary which has been assigned to him as preceptor of Latin, in the convent of San Francisco; his only motive being to serve his fellow-creatures.

The Government, in a communication dated 27th ult., returns thanks to Father Valdivieso, for his philanthropic conduct.

A decree, dated 29th ult., revokes the 6th article of the decree of 14th December, 1830, relative to the militia law; and re-establishes the 6th article of the militia law of 17th December, 1823.

We have received a letter from Tucuman, dated 2d ult., which says:—"Rosquellas, and his talented son *Pablito*, are still here. The Tucumaneses are absolutely in raptures with *Pablito*, and certainly he is a prodigy. They are detained at the request of the Governor, (Heredia,) in order to give grand *funciones* on the 8th and 9th of July, aided by some *Amateurs*. This is intended in honor of the anniversary of the Independence. They have already given four Operatic entertainments;—the first was on the 25th of May."

The above Statements denote but too plainly the penalty caused to this country by the Brazilian war, and the civil war which followed the peace with that Empire. Foreign commerce here (particularly from Europe,) has since greatly declined.

The blockade of the port of Buenos Ayres, by the Brazilian squadron, was officially notified as commencing on 21st December, 1825, and was raised on 30th September, 1828.

* The great number of American vessels which arrived in 1824, compared with preceding years, was in consequence of a considerable demand for flour at that period.

BRITISH THEATRICAL FUND

The following is a translation of an Advertisement which appeared, a few days since, in some of our daily papers. Should he, in addition to his other qualifications, understand the English tongue sufficiently to sing the metre of Hopkins and Sternhold, he would be an invaluable acquisition to a country clergyman in England.

"To be Sold, a Negro, who is a professor of music on the organ, and has a good voice for singing: his age 23 years. He is in good health, and well-looking; can read and write, and is likewise versed in all that regards domestic service, as well as being a tolerable Cook. — Any Gentleman of those designated who may wish to purchase the said Negro, can see him at the house of his Master, No. 198, Calle de Venezuela."

In a work which has lately been published in London, entitled,—"Historical and Descriptive Account of the Coast of Sussex, Brighton, &c.," are some new and amusing anecdotes. One is as follows:—"It appears in the time of the late Duke of Norfolk, that Lord Thurlow had acquired the sobriquet of the owl. What next will the vulgar profanate? Well, to make a fair balance, and not to wrong either party, one of his grace's owls was called Lord Thurlow. Lord Thurlow was at this time dangerously ill, and much political anticipation was thereby occasioned. Early in the morning, one of the attendants advanced hastily, and out of breath, to the Duke. 'Please your grace, Lord Thurlow—' Well, what's the news? Is he better or worse?' 'Please your grace,' answered the man, 'my lord has just laid an egg.' The duke did not expect the hatching of such a reply.

That somewhat eccentric but excellent man, the Rev. Rowland Hill, died on the 11th April last, after a short illness, at his house in Blackfriars Road, near Blackfriars Bridge, London; in the 80th year of his age.

The disease called the *influenza*, was very prevalent in the United Kingdom, during the months of March, April, and May last; and in one or two instances it has proved fatal. Various theatres in London were obliged to be closed for several evenings, in consequence of many of the performers being confined by the said disease. It had also appeared in France.

Mademoiselle Duvernay, a beautiful French girl, about 17 years of age, has appeared lately at Drury-Lane Theatre, London, in the characters of "the Sleeping Beauty," and "the Maid of Cashmere." The papers state that she dances divinely, and "raises her toe, when on the stage, as high as the dress circle of boxes." She has managed to run away with a great many hearts from among the sons of "John Bull," as well as taking their money. A young lord teased her to that degree on one evening behind the scenes, that she exclaimed in a pet, before a crowd of performers, &c.,—"Be quiet, my lord, or I'll tell your mamma of you." The "fair Duvernay" was one of the "lions" of London, during the Spring of the present year.

THEATRE.

On Saturday last, the Amateurs, assisted by the Señora Matilde Diez, and the Señorita Dominguita Montes de Oca, performed the elegant comedy of the "*Pintor Fingido*," the characters of which were thus arranged:—

- Irene, her cousin, - - - Sra. Dominguita.
- Felipo, their cousin, - - - Señor —
- Arnesto, their uncle, - - - Señor —
- Adolfo (el Pintor Fingido,) Duke of Lorena, - - - Señor —
- Trapisonda, - - - Señor —

Arnesto was personated by the gentleman who as *Rodrigo*, and *Montegon*, has made such successful essays. He had on this occasion but little to do, yet even that little gave further proof of his histrionic talent.

The part of *Don Felipo*, is merely that of a "walking gentleman." The gentleman who performed it would have rendered it much more efficient, had he not appeared to think, like many other unpractised performers, that "attitude is every thing."

The gentleman who played *Adolfo* (the feigned Painter,) made the character extremely interesting. He portrayed all that respectful timidity, when in the presence of his mistress, which has been described as the surest test of sincere and ardent love.—"We hold," says one author, "that every man behaves with awkwardness when he is in love, and the want of the one is a presumption of the absence of the other. Delicate girl! just budding into womanly loveliness, whose heart for the last ten minutes has been trembling behind the snowy wall of thy fair and beautiful bosom, hast thou never remarked and laughed at a tall and much be-whiskered young man, for the *mauvaise honte* with which he hands to thee thy cup of half-watered souchong?—Laugh not at him again, for he will assuredly be thy husband."

The Señora Matilde should never appear in tragedy; her *forte* is decidedly in comedy. She performed on this evening with more than common archness, and cruelly tantalized her lovers, aware, no doubt, that "it requires a lion's strength to conquer the weakness of love." She was splendidly attired, and so was *Don Felipo*.

We ought to mention that *Trapisonda*, the servant, was in excellent hands.

Two difficult Duets were sung with considerable taste: music of a less *sombre* cast, would have been perhaps more appreciated.

A Minuet, and the Gavota, was danced by one of the Amateurs, and Dominguita. We regret that we cannot pass the slightest compliment upon this part of the performance,—the lady, however, was the most graceful of the two.

The evening's amusements closed with the farce of *El Tio Virginia*, which was, altogether, tolerably well performed.

The house, which was extra lighted, was crowded to the ceiling, in spite of double prices; and almost every box was occupied by ladies in costly attire, with a profusion of artificial flowers, &c., in the head-dress—a contrast to the beautiful simplicity so conspicuous in former years.

On the 28th, Alfieri's 5 act tragedy of *Virginia* was performed by the regular corps. It was rather a bold attempt, considering the limited means of the company: we will not say that it succeeded. The comic dance of the *Gaita Gallego* followed; after which was repeated the grand ballet of action in 3 acts, called *El Tirano castigado*. Señor Caton deserves much praise for the manner in which he has got up this ballet: the scenery, music, and dances, and the action generally, are superior to what is usually witnessed here.—The dresses at this theatre, are almost always good.

The house (double prices again,) was well attended, and *beauty* and fashion graced the boxes. The performances did not conclude until half-past 11.

On the 31st, for the benefit of Señor Cogoy, the play of *Los Amores del Conde de Cominges*, with a farce, &c. The "play bill" of the *beneficiado* was headed by the following quotation, printed in English and in Spanish:—

"O love, what monstrous tricks dost thou play with thy votaries of both sexes! How dost thou deceive them, and make them deceive themselves! Their follies are thy delight; their sighs make thee laugh; and their pangs are thy merriment."—(FIELDING.)

In the farce, a mock Minuet was "walked" by Felipe David and Señora Campananes. The audience then called upon Doña Matilde, in evidence to which she danced the *Montonera*, with Señor Viera, and in a very graceful manner; the accompanying music was lively and pretty.

The house was not very full, but the boxes contained a select and elegant assemblage of ladies.

A late Montevideo journal complains of the little encouragement given to the theatre there, and says that the leading performers threaten to go to Buenos Ayres.

The manager of the Montevideo theatre has certainly been indefatigable in his vocation: his "bills of the play," in respect to descriptive details, might vie with many of those issued by the theatrical monarchs in England.

THE RETIRO.—This promenade had a number of visitors on Sunday afternoon last, and several carriages were in "the drive." The Alameda, during the day, was also visited by various fashionables.
