BUENOS AYRES.

FESTIVAL OF THE 25th OF MAY.

Anniversary of the Emancipation of this country from the dominion of Spain.

It was thought that the usual illuminations and other exterior observances of this festival, would have been postponed in consequence of the damp weather; but the atmosphere cleared up on the 24th, and on that evening the circle and pillar in the Plaza de la Victoria, the public offices, and the town, were illuminated. Military music was stationed in the gallery of the Cabildo, and at 7 o'clock the fire-works (which were arranged in front of the Recoba,) were discharged.

At sun-rise, mid-day, and sun-set on the 25th, salutes were fired from the Fort and national vessels of war; and a double salute at half-past 2, P. M., when the procession left the Cathedral.

In the *cortège* of the Governor which attended the Cathedral, were the Inspector-General, (General Agustín Pinedo,)—General Armaza, Envoy from Bolivia to the Court of Brazil,—the Chief of Police, (General Lucio Mansilla,) General José Ruiz Huidobro, Colonels Planes, Correa Morales, Crespo, José M. Torres, Prudencio Torres, Ponce, &c. &c. &c.

The troops were drawn up from the Fort, and extended around the Plaza de la Victoria to the Cathedral. They looked extremely well, and consisted as follows:—

The whole were under the command of General Mariano Benito Rolon, who addressed the following Proclamation to them:—

"Comrades!—This day commences the twenty-fifth year that our country has been free from the most opprobrious despotism. By your courage, four Republics breathe the pure air of liberty, and the Argentine name is respected by the brave of all nations.

"Soldiers!—Subordination and submission to the law, have conducted you to immortality:—never abandon the path of honour, and preserve your glory.

"Friends!—Viva el 25 de Mayo; Viva la Libertad; Viva la Federacion Argentina!"

On the return of the Governor to the Fort, he received the congratulations of the civil and military authorities, and replied as follows:—

"Great is this day, and immense are the recollections of triumphs and of military glory in the twenty-four years now completed. Four Republics owe their existence to the Argentine one, and to this province particularly. Hence emanated the bold enterprize of our common liberty: exult in this recollection.

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"All that was wanting to the Argentines was the dominion of the desert,—and this has been effected. A combined army undertook this great work: its divisions surmounted all obstacles, and chastised the enemies they met with on their march. The forces organized in this province, ably conducted by the illustrious General who commanded them, routed and subjected all the savage hordes who roamed in the vast extent they traversed.

"After so many exploits, so many triumphs, and so much glory, what do we now possess?—Twenty-five years of struggles and heroic sacrifices, have only produced hatred and disunion; and the Argentines who have effected such prodigies, are not able to impose silence upon those ignoble passions which agitate them, and to re-establish Peace and Union, so necessary to their welfare and grandeur. The evil is not unknown; and shall we longer abstain from applying the remedy?"

"Gentlemen:—I return you thanks for your congratulations; and request you to render them, with the wishes which the Government entertain on this memorable day, to those under your respective direction,—to all our fellow-countrymen, companions, and friends."

In the evening the illuminations, fire-works, and music, were repeated.

No salutes were fired on the 26th, but the colours were hoisted at the Fort, Marine-Office, &c.; and the female schools of this capital, under the management of the Beneficent Society, attended at the College Church, where premiums were awarded to those who had excelled in morality, industry, and filial love. This imposing and interesting ceremony, attracted, as usual, an immense concourse of both sexes,—the church was crowded with ladies. His Excellency the Governor, the Ministers, and other public functionaries, also attended; and some appropriate music was performed. Owing to a domestic affliction, the Lady President of the Society, Señora Pascuala Belaustegui de Arana, could not attend; in consequence of which, the Vice-Presidentess, Señora Casilda Igarzabal de Peña, presided.

In the evening, the illuminations, &c., were repeated.

The national vessels of war which had been dressed out with colours on the 25th and 26th, continued this display until mid-day on 27th, when they were hauled down upon a signal-gun being fired from the Sarandí.

On 25th, the foreign and national merchant vessels in the port, hoisted their colours and signal flags.

The illuminations in the Plaza de la Victoria were upon the usual scale. The pillar in the centre was tastefully lighted and decorated with flags, and had various poetical effusions in allusion to the day, inscribed thereon. The *rompe cabezas*, and greased masts, also held their customary situations. The attendance in the Plaza was more numerous than might have been expected, considering the dampness under foot. The azoteas and balconies which commanded a view of the procession to the Cathedral, on 25th, as well as the church itself, were crowded with ladies. After the service, the boys of the State

schools were arranged around the pillar in the Plaza de la Victoria, and sung the National Anthem: many of these youths were attired in Turkish costume. The fire-works on the three evenings were very indifferent, except the rockets.

If the festival of 25th May, 1834, cannot in point of splendour vie with many of its predecessors, it must be attributed to the unfavourable weather, and perhaps in some degree to the unsettled state of the political world;—but at any rate there was no falling off at the Theatre, which on the nights of the 24th, 25th, 26th, and 27th, contained the most brilliant audiences we have ever witnessed there.

Thursday last (*Corpus Christi*,) was kept as a close holiday in Buenos Ayres. The daily papers were not published on that day, nor on the 26th inst.

Official Documents.

A decree, dated 23d inst., appoints Dr. Jacinto Cardenas, judge of the first instance in criminal cases, *vice* Dr. Oliden, resigned.

A decree, same date, states that the late Convent of the Recoleta having been declared sufficiently spacious for two hospitals; viz:—one for insane persons and another for those suffering under chronic diseases; 6000 dollars are appropriated to make such repairs as may be esteemed requisite to render the building fit for those objects.

A communication, dated 24th inst., from Dr. Mariano José de Escalada, to the Minister of the Home Department, states that the report rendered by the Fiscal, in answer to his petition against the Government's retaining the Bull of His Holiness the Pope, by which he (Dr. Escalada,) was appointed Bishop of Aulon, is at once partial and unfair: that expressions had been distorted, and others attributed to him which he had never uttered.—He therefore requests the Government will consult the High Court of Justice upon the subject, as preceding Governments have done in cases of equal or of less importance than the present one.

The Minister returned the above note to Dr. Escalada on 28th inst., informing him, at the same time, that the Government desired he would abstain from solicitations which they consider both as improper and out of place.

A note, to the following effect, was published in the *Censor Argentino*, of 27th inst.:—

"To the Minister of the Home Department.

"On board the Herminie, in the Inner-Roads of the port of Buenos Ayres,—May 25, 1834."

"Consideration for the credit of a country so worthy of a better fate, and for the respect which the undersigned has rendered and always will render to the authorities of his country, however unjust they may be towards his name, person, and interests, now limit him solely to the expression of that which is absolutely indispensable.

"From the 28th April last, the undersigned has remained in the situation to which the Government had condemned him, expecting the legal and definitive resolution promised in the note of the Minister, of same date; and he has expected it, in spite of all that he has observed, and of all that he has been informed.

"This day is the twenty-fourth anniversary of the heroic commencement made by Buenos Ayres of its glorious and immense enterprise. No day, therefore, can be more suitable to ask and obtain the passport which the Government ought to give to the citizen whom they have outlawed, and torn away from his home and from his family.

"The undersigned consequently expects that the Minister will to-morrow forward to him the necessary passport, in order that he may depart without delay, in search of an asylum.

"In the mean time he trusts that the Almighty will preserve the Sr. Minister many years.

"BERNARDINO RIVADAVIA."

On the 25th inst., in conformity to the above request, the Government forwarded to Señor Rivadavia the required passport.

The *Monitor*, of 28th inst., contained some remarks upon this note; in purport,—that the Government in acting as they had done, meant nothing hostile against Señor Rivadavia; on the contrary, he ought to view the affair as his friends had viewed it, as a measure of protection for him and to secure the public tranquillity.—That if Señor Rivadavia had announced his resolution to return to his country, every one, without exception, would have counselled him against such a step; but having undertaken it without consulting or hearing any one, the Government were under the disagreeable necessity of fulfilling two duties at the same time,—one in respect to the individual, and the other in respect to the public. That if Señor Rivadavia has noticed all as he says he has done, or if more correct information had been given him, he would not complain of an act which, however severe and extraordinary it may appear, proceeds from laudable motives.

SANTA FE.—A Bulletin (No. 10,) dated 4th inst., has been published by General Estanislao Lopez, Governor of the province of Santa Fé, giving an account of further successes which he has obtained over the Indians.

MENDOZA.—A despatch, dated 27th ult., has also been published from the Governor of Mendoza, (Pedro Molina,) detailing successes gained over a body of Indians who hovered around that province.

CHILI.

A mail from Chili arrived on Saturday last, by which we received the *Mercurio* of Valparaiso, to 16th ult. They contain no particular news as it regards that Republic, if we may except the fate of the convicts who we mentioned in a former number had escaped from the Island of Juan Fernandez, in the Chilian schooner *Estrella*.—It appears that after quarrelling among themselves, one Idalgo got the upper hand, and put a number of his companions, with the women they had on board, in a launch, in order to land them on the coast between Cobija and Iquique; but it is supposed they perished on their voyage thither. Idalgo and others got on shore at Pisasagua, and proceeded into the interior with the passports of the individuals who were on board the *Estrella* when she was seized by the convicts, and who were left by them at Juan Fernandez.

PERU.

The news from Peru comes down to 1st March. The issue of the civil war in that country was thought to be somewhat doubtful, for although public opinion was against Gamarra, and he was regarded as a tyrant and the author of all the miseries of the country, yet he has a strong military force with him, and is likewise in possession

of the departments of Junin, Cuzco, Puno, Ayacucho, &c.

The President (Orbegoso,) had been invested with extraordinary powers during the continuance of the civil war; and Generals Gamarra, Elspuru, Bermudez, J. M. Frias, and Vargas, had been struck off the army list. The same was to be practised against a number of other officers if they did not within a certain time present themselves to the legitimate authorities. In the mean time Generals Nieto, Miller, Necochea, and Plaza, at the head of their divisions, were actively exerting themselves in favour of the government of President Orbegoso, and had obtained some successes; and several emigrant Argentine officers who had served with General Lavalle, viz.: Colonels Perdenera, Acha, Irigoyen, Torres, and others, had taken service in favour of the legitimate authority; Acha and Irigoyen had been appointed aids-de-camp to General Necochea.

BRITISH CEMETERY.

At a General Meeting of Subscribers, held on the 5th current, in the British Church, agreeably to public advertisement;—

CHARLES GRIFFITHS, Esq., H. M's. Consul, in the Chair.

The Committee of Management presented the accounts of the establishment, and made the following

REPORT.

"The Committee appointed to purchase and prepare a New British Burial Ground, having duly carried the object of their appointment into effect, do make the following Report of their proceedings.

"Your Committee, in the first instance, proposed to the consideration of the Government of the Province, two or three plots of ground, or Quintas, in the immediate vicinity of the Recoleta, requesting their approval and sanction for the appropriation of one of them for the interment of British subjects dying in this city. The locality of all these, however, being disapproved of, and an intimation given by the said Government that it would be more satisfactory if ground could be obtained in the neighbourhood of the Windmill; your Committee did in consequence purchase the 'Quinta de Serna,' as being so situated, and in other respects very suitable for the purpose required, to which the authorities gave the necessary sanction and permission.

"Your Committee then proceeded to the walling in and laying out of the same; and it being desirable that one Cemetery should serve as a burying-place for all Protestants generally residing in the city and vicinity, your Committee disposed of parts of the enclosure for the exclusive and perpetual use of the North Americans and Germans, they paying respectively for the parts assigned to them, in proportion to the entire amount expended in the purchase, walling in, and laying out of the said ground.

"Your Committee have also to report, that on the British part of the Cemetery, a neat Gothic Chapel has been erected, together with a small cottage for the residence of the Sexton; and that the whole is in a state near to completion.

"Your Committee, in executing the duties entrusted to them, have been desirous of accomplishing the work in a substantial manner, combining with it a neatness of appearance, and a regard to the credit and respectability of the kingdom whose name it bears; but in consequence of the Government not approving of the locality of the Quintas originally proposed, any one of which might have been purchased and converted into a Cemetery at a much less expense, they have found it necessary to incur a greater expenditure than was contemplated and provided for by the resolutions of the last General Meeting, held the 21st August, 1832, increasing the amount of the whole to the sum of 34,222 dollars 4 rials,—equal to 9984 3s. 1d. sterling; the half share of which falling upon the residents, is 17,111 dollars 2 rials; or, 4991 1s. 7d. in sterling money.

"In conclusion, therefore, your Committee have to request that the amount appropriated at the last General Meeting, viz.: of 3501*l.* may be extended to the sum of 4991 1s. 7d. sterling.

(Signed, "John Armstrong, John Barron, John Downes, Samuel Bishop, John Whitaker, John Harratt, D. Lamont.")

Which being taken into consideration by the Meeting, it was RESOLVED:—

1st.—That the Meeting approve of the accounts presented to them of the total expenditure on the New British Cemetery, up to the present day, amounting to the sum of 34,222 dollars 4 rials, currency; equal to 9984 3s. 1d. sterling; and that the said accounts be printed for the satisfaction of the Subscribers.

2d.—That in order to meet the amount in addition to the sum already provided for by a Resolution of the last General Meeting, as the share to be borne by the British Residents, the further sum of 1491 1s. 7d. sterling, be appropriated by this Meeting; making in the whole the sum of 4991 1s. 7d. sterling, to defray the half part of the expenses incurred in the purchase and preparation of the New Burial-Ground.

3d.—That the aforesaid additional sum of 1491 1s. 7d. sterling, be placed at the disposal of the Committee appointed to purchase and prepare the New Burial-Ground, on the behalf of the Subscribers; and that the said Committee be directed to give such security as the Act of Parliament requires, for the due payment of the same for the said purpose.

4th.—That the Committee of Management be requested to continue their services as a Building Committee, until the New British Cemetery be completed.

5th.—That the Rev. John Armstrong, Rev. William Brown, Mr. Sillitoe, Mr. Parlane, and Mr. Haxell, be appointed a Committee for the general superintendance of the affairs of the New British Cemetery for the present year, or until a fresh appointment by a General Meeting.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE PROVINCE OF BUENOS AYRES.

At a sitting on 28th inst., General Rolon presented a draft of a decree, that the Island of Choelecheh, in the Rio Negro of Patagonia, be made over to the citizen Brigadier-General, Restorer of the Laws and Commander of the Country Districts, Juan Manuel de Rosas.—That the said island, from the day in which the decree be sanctioned, shall be denominated *La Isla General Restaurador Rosas*; and that, as a reward for the services General Rosas has rendered to the country, he shall be denominated in future, Protector of the Province of Buenos Ayres.

Señor Lozano, in his own name and in that of three other Members, (Señores Agustin Pinedo, Pedro Medrano, and Manuel de Irigoyen,) moved that a sword, medal, and sash, be presented to General Rosas, for his eminent services, in the name of the House of Representatives of the Province, with suitable inscriptions.

The *Gaceta Mercantil*, in its leading article of yesterday, disapproves of a part of the motion brought forward by General Rolon; on the plea that national gratitude has its limits, and that under a Republican form of Government titles are unknown.

THEATRE.

On 23d inst. was performed Moratin's comedy of *El Cafe*, with the farce of *Los Caldereros*. The house had been newly white-washed, and was extremely well attended.

Performances on 24th, 25th, 26th, and 27th, in honor of the *Fiestas de Mayo*. The house on these occasions was crowded in every part,—the boxes being nearly all occupied by ladies in brilliant costume; among whom we noticed several brides, whose names we should most certainly mention, with a description of their dresses, but that such observances are not yet in vogue here. We are glad to observe that the rage for artificial flowers has considerably decreased, and that short sleeves are again coming in fashion. Several ladies wore the head-dress according to the last mode de Londres, without a comb—we do not admire it; but if generally followed, it will certainly produce a revolution or mutiny among the comb-makers here. The "Queen Elizabeth ruff," small pleated, was likewise worn, and the wearers looked very charming. The general colours of the ladies dresses were white, pink, salmon, and celestial blue.

The Governor and his aides-de-camp, with General Guido, &c. &c., sat in the State Box on each of the evenings above-mentioned. The performances were the same as noticed in our last, and prior to their commencement the National Anthem was sung by the performers, the audience standing.—The Theatre, too, was extra-lighted inside, and illuminated outside.

On 29th the play, or farce, of *El Criado de sí mismo*; in which Señor Quijano, as the *sou disant* gentleman, over-acted his part, or according to the English phrase, "played to the galleries." The house was again thronged with a brilliant and fashionable audience.

THE WEATHER was cold and damp at the commencement of the week, the thermometer at times under 50. Thursday and Friday were extremely cold; yesterday there was thin ice, and in the country it was a complete frost, the milk brought to town was frozen,—thermometer 40.
