BUENOS AYRES.

CHILI.

A Chili mail arrived during the week, but did not bring any news in addition to what we were before acquainted with, and which we inserted in previous numbers.

We have received Montevideo journals to 20th inst. They contain but little news. The *Universal* of 18th, says, that the Chief of the rebellion, (Fructoso Rivera,) with about 500 of his followers, (to which number his force had been reduced in consequence of having been abandoned on the night of the 11th, by the major part of the Brazilians,) were on the 12th marching towards Tacuarembó, and that the President of the Republic at the head of the government troops, was also in march, but in what direction was not known.

A decree dated Montevideo 13th inst., orders a new battalion of infantry to be formed. The Executive of the Oriental Republic under date Montevideo 13th inst., addressed a proclamation to the "Orientales" upon the state of the country, expressing its firm conviction that the rebellion will be ultimately put down; but that it might be prolonged unless the citizens came forward simultaneously to co-operate with the government.

The President of the United States, has named Mr. Alfred S. Slade, to be Consul for that Republic in Buenos Ayres.

DR. OUGHAN vs. SIR WOODBINE PARISH.

A commission having been issued by the Court of Queen's Bench, authorising and appointing several gentlemen in this city, to examine witnesses touching certain interrogatories of the parties in this case; Dr. Oughan applied to government for permission that the depositions of the public employes and head-officers whose evidence were requisite, might be taken before the said commissioners. This petition was referred to the State law-officers, Dr. Pedro Medrano, Attorney General *ad interim*, and Dr. Eduardo Lahitte, Government Assessor General, who uniformly reported that the allowing of the execution of the commission would be derogatory to the Sovereign independence of this country, inasmuch as it would be permitting the exercise of foreign jurisdiction within its territory, the commission being a delegation of the power vested in the Court of Queen's Bench in England. The Attorney General expressed his conviction that a similar commission from the Tribunals of this country would not be allowed in England, and as the rights of independent Nations were the same in this respect, the government could not without descending from its dignity accede to the petition. With respect to the allegation that similar previous commissions had been executed, the Attorney General observes that, even were the cases identical, the government should not be influenced by such examples, but only take for guide the principles sanctioned by reason and the consent or practice of independent nations generally. The Assessor says that he has no official knowledge of any former commis-

sions of a like nature; and that he can affirm that neither has the government, else it would have proceeded as in duty bound against those who arrogated to themselves the right of exercising jurisdictional power in this country, independently of the Sovereign authority. And, if, he adds, such acts have really been practised, they are at most but abuses, which can form no precedent. Both the learned gentlemen state that such a pretension might the more readily be dissembled, if there were no other means of surmounting the obstacles of distance and the absence of individuals whose evidence is necessary in courts of law; but that nothing is more easy without violating the Sovereignty of each nation, for that all governments and magistrates being equally interested in furthering the ends of justice, they owe to each other reciprocal aid in this respect, which they are enabled to render by the means which the laws and customs of nations have established.

The government adopting the view of the law officers, issued a decree on the 12th inst., denying the prayer of Dr. Oughan, and ordering the publication of the opinions of the Attorney General and Assessor, for the public information.

Donations to the Government in aid of the war with General Santa Cruz.

The *Gaceta Mercantil* of 16th inst., contains a note from Don Pablo Muñoz, Commandant of Tandil, dated 6th inst., with a list of individuals of that district, who have subscribed 2,062 dollars, 8 horses and 21 oxen.

Also a list of individuals of same district, who made a donation of 24 horses, for the service of government in the expedition against the indians which marched on 13th May last.

The reply of the Government to these notes follow in due order.

Official Documents.

¡VIVA LA FEDERACION!

Buenos Ayres, December 14th, 1837.
28th year of the Liberty, 22nd of the Independence,
And 8th of the Argentine Confederation.

The government considering it to be necessary to establish equality in all law suits, which have or may be brought before it as an ultimate plea against nullity and injustice, fixing to that effect an uniform rule for all the Tribunals of Justice, has ordered and decreed—

ART. I. The Tribunals of Justice shall suspend all ulterior proceedings in cases which have or may be brought before the government as an ultimate plea against nullity and injustice, until it shall have pronounced its resolution touching such cases.

2. Let this be published.

AGUSTIN GARRIGOS.

A note dated 15th inst., addressed to the government and signed by Señores Agustin Rabelo, Julian Salomon, Martin Santa Coloma, Mariano Maza and Nicolas Mariño, requests in their own name and in those of others of their fellow citizens, permission to act as a guard of honor at the opening of the 15th Legislature of the Province on 1st of January next; and that, for that purpose they be permitted to assemble

at the barracks of the regiment of Restauradores, and furnished with equipments and a band of music.

The government replied to the above same day, granting the required permission, and also that the proposed guard of honor, should be attended by four bands of music of the regiments of the garrison of this city.

The *Gaceta Mercantil* of 18th inst., contains a list of individuals who have made donations in order to provide for the expenses of the construction of a New Church at Chascomus.

A note from the government of the Province of San Luis, dated 9th inst., and one from that of Mendoza, dated 4th, to the government of Buenos Ayres, acknowledge the receipt of the circular from the latter, announcing the decease of H. M. William IV., King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and state that in consequence of said event, they have ordered the employés civil and military in their respective Provinces, to wear the correspondment mourning for three days.

Two other notes from said governments, similarly dated, express their acquiescence in the decree issued by the government of Buenos Ayres in August last, prohibiting the exportation of gold and silver to foreign countries.

A note from the government of Corrientes, dated 21st ult., expresses its acquiescence in said decree.

A note dated 12th inst., from Don Juan Magallanes, Justice of Peace of the Baradero, addressed to His Excellency the Governor, gives an account of the proceedings of the Apostolic mission which recently visited that district.

A note from the government of Corrientes, dated 22nd ult., acknowledges the receipt of the circular from His Excellency the Governor of Buenos Ayres, with a copy of the note from the government of Chili, of 3rd August, stating the proofs they have that General Santa Cruz promoted the conspiracy at Quillota, which led to the murder of the Minister Portales. The government of Corrientes express their detestation and horror at such conduct on the part of General Santa Cruz.

A similar note to the above was received from the government of Santa Fé, dated 13th inst. Also two other notes same date, relative to the success gained over the rebellious in the Oriental State on 21st ult. And of the occupation of Arequipa by the Chilean army, which the note states, affords the hope of the speedy downfall of the insolent tyrant Santa Cruz.

From official notices to the Chief of Police, it appears that on 19th inst., 44 dogs were killed in this city and its environs.

A decree dated 21st inst., orders that the Message presented to the House of Representatives on its opening on the 1st January of each year, shall bear the date of 27th December preceding.

The Chief of Police reports the death of 87 persons (41 males and 46 females,) from the 1st to the 15th of December, of which 66 were whites, 20 coloured and 1 indian.

We have conceived it to be our duty to publish the following important notice.

The Mint hereby informs the public that all Bank notes which do not bear the mark *Renovacion de 1834*, are not to circulate in this city from 1st January 1838, and in the country from 1st March of said year. It is therefore hoped that the public will hasten in what remains of the present year, to change the notes in question, in order to prevent the injurious consequences which have heretofore been felt.

The Annual General Meeting of the Subscribers to the British Episcopal Church, was held in the Vestry-room of said Church on Monday the 11th inst., at one o'clock.

CHARLES GRIFFITHS, Esq., H. M.'s Consul in the Chair.

After the usual public business of reading the report of the Trustees, and passing their accounts for the present year had been gone through, Mr. GRIFFITHS informed the meeting that the Rev. JOHN ARMSTRONG had resigned his office of Chaplain; and proceeded to read the official document which Mr. ARMSTRONG had passed to that effect in the British Consulate.

Mr. GRIFFITHS then left the Chair, and the thanks of the meeting were voted to him for his able conduct as Chairman.

Mr. DE LISLE having been called to the Chair, made a few remarks upon the heavy loss which the community would suffer by the departure of the Rev. Mr. ARMSTRONG, whose official resignation of the Chaplaincy had just been communicated to the meeting, and requested that the subscribers present would deliberate upon the steps most proper to be taken.

After some preliminary discussion, it was proposed by Mr. Douglas, that the following resolution be passed.

1. That two gentlemen be named to wait upon the Rev. Mr. ARMSTRONG, to express the deep regret of the meeting at his resignation, and to request that he will again consider the matter, as the meeting sincerely hopes he may be induced to alter his determination.

This resolution seconded by Mr. THOMAS ARMSTRONG, was put to the meeting by the Chairman, and carried unanimously.

Mr. DOUGLAS, seconded by Mr. THOMAS BARTON, then proposed—

II. That Mr. DE LISLE and Mr. BROWNELL be appointed, and that they be requested to wait upon Mr. ARMSTRONG as early as possible, in order to give in their report of his answer to the meeting, which will be adjourned till Thursday 14th inst., at one o'clock.

This resolution having been carried, and the gentlemen named having accepted the office, the meeting was adjourned.

On Thursday 14th inst., at one o'clock, conformably with the resolution passed on the preceding Monday, the adjourned general meeting was held in the Vestry room.

Mr. DE LISLE having been called upon to resume the Chair, proceeded to read the following report.

GENTLEMEN,

Your Commissioners have the honor to report to you the result of the mission which you entrusted to them, at the adjourned general meeting of the subscribers to the British Episcopal Church on Monday last.

On the afternoon of that day Mr. Brownell and myself waited upon the Rev. Mr. Armstrong at his house, and presented him with a copy of the resolutions passed at that meeting, in which you expressed your deep regret at his resignation, and sincerely hoped he would reconsider the matter and change his determination.

We have to announce to you, with feelings of the greatest satisfaction, that the tenor of your resolution and the sentiments expressed at the meeting, which we took care to acquaint the Rev. Gentleman with, much more than the arguments which we used, have produced the effect which was hoped for.

We shall not be deprived of the ministry of our worthy and long esteemed Pastor.

He has withdrawn his resignation and has consented to remain among us, as you will learn by the contents of his letter, which we have the pleasure to lay before you.

DEAR SIRS,

In consequence of the resolution of the general meeting of the subscribers to the British Church, held on Monday last, in reference to my resignation as Chaplain, and handed to me by yourselves, I have been induced to change my determination of retiring, and of applying for leave of absence, which my long residence in this country and the unvarying nature of my duties have rendered very necessary, and I have withdrawn my resignation accordingly. It is not without some considerable reluctance that I have consented to recall my determination, having a very strong desire to retire from this country; but I am unwilling to allow my own personal inclinations to have weight against wishes so kindly expressed, and by persons among whom I have so long lived and ministered: and I sincerely pray that Almighty God may be pleased to make my further stay in Buenos Ayres a blessing to my countrymen dwelling in it, having, as I can with much truth assure you, no other desire of prolonging my residence in a foreign country, except that of being useful in the exercise of the duties of my calling.

The business of the day being concluded, Mr. DE LISLE left the Chair, when the thanks of the meeting were voted to Messrs. BROWNELL and DE LISLE, for the able manner in which they have executed the mission to which they were named, and to the latter for his able and liberal conduct in the Chair. The meeting then separated.

QUEEN VICTORIA.

The London correspondent of a New York paper in speaking of the young Queen, says,—that she has a face full of beauty and expression, set off by a superb head of hair. That the United Kingdom was never so Monarchically inclined as at present,—all parties cry out "Long live the Queen," and each party claim her as their own—but that in fact in his (the writer's) opinion, she has no bias for any party, but laughs in her sleeve at all of them. That she possesses by nature considerable talent, which has been increased by an education rigid and almost monastic. That as Princess, she rarely visited any place of fashionable resort, and her country excursions were limited to a few trips to Tunbridge Wells and Hastings.—That she is decidedly and strictly a Protestant, having imbibed from her earliest infancy the principles of that creed.

In September last, Queen Victoria reviewed a portion of the Household troops at Windsor, upon which occasion she was on horseback and by all accounts looked very charming. She was attended by a splendid retinue, and was accompanied by the King and Queen of Belgium. The following puff on the affair, is not bad.

"The long expected spectacle of our youthful and beloved Queen reviewing the troops, at Windsor, took place on Thursday; and never has such an interesting event occurred for centuries in this country. Her Majesty was seated on a beautiful grey charger, and rode most gracefully. The scene altogether was surpassingly beautiful. It powerfully called to memory Queen Elizabeth reviewing her troops at Tilbury Fort. Many ladies of rank and fashion, splendidly attired, were present, whose native charms were embellished by those inestimable auxiliaries of female beauty—Rowland's Macassar Oil, and Kalydor."

The Queen of Belgium had like to have met with a serious accident—her charger took fright, at a sudden burst of thunder when riding in company with Queen Victoria, in Windsor Great Park, and ran away with her. Two of the officers in attendance immediately galloped round another part of the Park, came in contact with and stopped the run-away courser without any accident having happened.

CORRIENTES.

Accounts from Corrientes, state that Don Rafael Atienza, late Governor of that Province, died at Curuzú-Cuatia, in said Province, on the 2nd inst., after a lingering illness, the first cause of which was Pleurisy. He was attended by Drs. Fonseca, Salinas, Acuña, Gibson, M. Bonpland and another Physician from the Paraná. The Provincial Legislature had elected Lieut. Col. Gervasio Beron de Estrada, Provisional Governor, and on the 14th inst., he was put in possession of the supreme command by Sr. Gramajo, Delegate of the late Governor.

The Militia of Corrientes were still upon the coast of the Uruguay, to guard against accidents, which the rebellion in the Oriental State might produce. The Imperial Brazilian Chief Brigadier General Calderon, had managed to get away from Corrientes, and news had been received there that he was in command of the Imperial troops at San Borja. The Locusts had again made their appearance, and were within a few leagues of the town of Corrientes.

Decree of the Tribunal of Commerce.

Buenos Ayres, November 30th, 1837.

Having again examined the proceedings in the cause against the bankrupt Mr. Charles Stanhope Harvey, with the proofs produced in virtue of the sentence of the Superior Tribunal of Commerce, of 1st December 1834, and that of this Court of the 23rd of same month, and finding those proofs to consist only of the report of the Accountants appointed to revise and compare the books of the bankrupt, and the charges preferred against him by the Assignees of his Estate, which from their extraordinary nature unknown in the law, can scarcely bear the character of a simple assertion; and not proving legally and sufficiently the fraudulent and clandestine management and bad faith which the laws and ordinances repute as criminal, and which the Assignees accuse Mr. Harvey in the conducting of and management of his business, finding also in another part those same charges contradicted and refuted by the bankrupt in his answer at folio 233, founded on the merits and state of his revised books;—and lastly, the opinion of the special Assessor named in the case, being only founded on the report of the Accountants whose exposition does not merit faith, and conclusive proof in cases of this nature. It is therefore declared that the sentence passed by this Tribunal, relative to Harvey's bankruptcy on the 22nd March 1834, folio 142, of the proceedings is confirmed, and this we give as our definitive sentence and judgment.

N. B. The decree of the Court of the 23rd of March 1834, declared the failure of Mr. Harvey to be of the 2nd class; which the law considers "fortuitous and excusable."
