### BUENOS AYRES.

On the 23rd inst., Baron Picolet d'Hermillon, Consul General of Sardinia, had an interview with the Minister for Foreign Affairs of this Republic, for the purpose of exchanging the ratifications of the Protocol of the 12th May last, relative to the acknowledgment of the Independence of this Republic by the King of Sardinia. The following is the text of His Majesty's ratification—

We, Charles Albert, by the Grace of God, King of Sardinia, Cyprus and Jerusalem, Duke of Savoy, Geneva, &c. &c., Prince of Piémont, &c. &c.

To all whom the present cometh, greeting:—Baron Henry Picolet d'Hermillon, Our Consul General to the States of the Argentine Confederation, having signed a Protocol with the Minister for Foreign Affairs of the government of Buenos Ayres, whereby a mutual declaration is made concerning the manner in which the flag and citizens of the Confederation, and their property, are to be received in our dominions; and *vice versa*, our flag and our subjects, and their property, in the Cities appertaining to the said Confederation, which Protocol is in tenor as follows.

(Here follows the Protocol, of which we gave the substance in our journal of 20th May last, whereby Baron Picolet d'Hermillon, in the name of his Sardinian Majesty, recognised the Independence of the Argentine Confederation, and promised to present the solemn ratification thereof by the King his Master, within eight months; and the Minister for Foreign Affairs of this Republic, and the aforesaid Baron, formally declared that the flag, authorities, subjects and properties of each nation, should be reciprocally shown the same respect and enjoy the same privileges and protection as by the common law of nations, and the particular law of each State, the flag, authorities, subjects and properties of other nations, are entitled to.)

We, having perused the preceding Protocol, and fully approved the declaration made therein by our said Consul General, do accept, confirm and ratify the same, as by these presents signed by our hand, and countersigned by our Chief Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and sealed with our seal, we do accept, confirm and ratify, promising on the faith and word of a King, to observe and cause it to be religiously observed.

Given in our Royal Palace at Turin, on the 18th of September, in the year of our Lord 1837, and 7th of our reign.

THE COUNT SOLAR DE LA MARGARITA.

The ratification of the Governor and Captain General of the Province of Buenos Ayres, charged with the Foreign Affairs of the Argentine Confederation is, *mutatis mutandis*, literally the same as the foregoing.—The Sardinian flag was displayed at the Consulate on the above day.

### ORIENTAL STATE.

Advices from Montevideo to 23rd inst., state that Fructosio Rivera with a division of his troops, was at that time within two leagues of Montevideo, and that considerable alarm prevailed in that City. Nothing is said of the movements of the government army under the command of President Oribe.

A private letter from Montevideo, accounts for these sudden appearances of Rivera's forces in the vicinity of Montevideo, and their sudden transportation from one point to another from his superior means of movability, owing to his indiscriminate seizure of horses, whilst the President of the Republic has forbore to make any extraordinary requisitions inconsistent with a due respect to property. The horses of his army are therefore completely jaded, from the wild goose chase which the revolutionists have led them from their being so well mounted.

We are requested to direct the attention of our readers to the Notice in another column, of the annual meeting of the subscribers to the Foreign School Society, which is to take place on Monday evening next. We do so with the more pleasure, as it enables us to state that the report which has circulated of a temporary suspension of the Society is without foundation, and that no interruption will be occasioned by the transfer of the scholars to another instructor.

We sincerely hope that the subscribers and other friends of this highly useful institution will rally on the occasion, and by their united co-operation give a new impulse to its operations for the present year, which we are informed have not been so efficient during the past as could be desired for want of funds. This should not be—the institution is entitled to the protection of the public, and we doubt not, we shall be borne out in the assertion by a vigorous effort in its behalf at this time.

The *Gaceta Mercantil* of 22nd inst., contains a long leading article connected with the message of the government on the recent opening of the 15th Legislature of the Province, from which we extract the following important item.

"In 1837, there was exported abroad from the Province of Buenos Ayres, 4733 barrels of flour of this country, and for the interior, 1195—the barrels being constructed in this country. Besides 1000 fanegas and 29,613 arrobas for foreign ports, and 38,920 arrobas for the interior. The value of this exportation amounts to more than 450,000 dollars. Thus, this branch of industry which was before a complete nullity, has received a great impulse and augmentations with rapidity."

*Donations to the Government in aid of the war with General Santa Cruz.*

The *Gaceta Mercantil* of 22nd inst., contains a note from Don Manuel Maestre, Justice of Peace of the parish of Monserrat, dated 13th ult., containing a list of additional subscriptions in that parish, to the amount of 160 dollars.

### Official Documents.

#### VIVA LA FEDERACION!

Buenos Ayres, January 25th, 1838.—25th year of the Liberty, 23rd of the Independence, and 9th of the Argentine Confederation.

The time having expired in which permission was given to kill nutrias in the territory of the

Province, the government has ordered and decreed—

ART. 1. It is permitted in the present year 1838, to kill nutrias in the uninhabited parts of this Province, South of the line which runs by the Sierra del Volcan, Tandil, Puyoecael, Tapalquen, Laguna Blanca, Puerto Mayo and Fedoracion.

2. It is also permitted on the islands of the Paraná of the Province, and in the country South of the Salado, where the proprietors or leaseholders of the lands give consent thereto.

3. Let this be published.

The *Gaceta Mercantil* of 23rd inst., contains an account of the proceedings in the House of Representatives of the Province on its sitting of 19th inst.

Señores Eusebio Medrano, Nicolas Marino, Fermín Irigoyen, Felipe Larrosa, Juan Manuel Larrazabal, Santiago Rubio and Luis Aldao, were on 26th ult., elected to serve as the Directive Committee of the nightly watch for the present year 1838.

A note to the Governor dated 16th ult., from Don Juan Carlos Rosado, Director of the Hospital for women, notices the bequest to said Hospital of 2000 dollars, from Don Andres Diaz, now deceased, and which has been received from his Executor Don Benito Pondal.

A copy of a note under date 6th inst., from Don Manuel Oribe, President of the Oriental State, to Captain Antonio Toll, of the Argentine gun-boat Fortena, thanking him for his services in the schooner he commands, in aiding to repel the anarchists who besieged Paysando, was published in the *Gaceta Mercantil* of 23rd inst.

Various notes dated in December last, were published in the *Gaceta Mercantil* of 30th inst., from Don Nazario Benavides, Governor of the Province of San Juan, addressed to the Governor of Buenos Ayres, acknowledgment the receipt of 100 copies of the trial of those concerned in the murder of General Quiroga and his retinue; and applauding the conduct of the government of Buenos Ayres as it regards that important trial.

Also that the government of San Juan had ordered its employes civil and military, to wear mourning for three successive days, for the death of William IV., King of Great Britain and Ireland; and that it approved of the decree of the government of Buenos Ayres of 31st August last, prohibiting the exportation of gold and silver. Similar notes respecting the trial above-mentioned were published in the *Gaceta Mercantil* of 25th and 26th inst., from the governments of Salta, Jujuy and Tucuman.

Under date 4th ult., Don Juan Miguel Costa, addressed a note to the government making the donation of a slave for the service of the State. To which the government replied on 23rd inst., thanking him for the donation.

Two communications dated Corrientes 15th ult., from Lieut. Col. Genaro Beron de Astrada, to the Governor of Buenos Ayres, informs him of the demise on 2nd ult., of Don Rafael Atienza, late Governor of Corrientes, and that he (Lieut. Col. de Astrada), had been elected provisional Governor of the Province of Corrientes, by the House of Representatives of that Province.

His Excellency the Governor of Buenos Ayres replied on the 9th and 16th inst. Under the former date in a letter of condolence on the death of Don Rafael Atienza; and under the latter, one of congratulation upon the election of Lieut. Col. de Astrada, as provisional Governor of Corrientes.

From official notices to the Chief of Police, it appears that from 26th ult. to 23rd inst., 530 dogs were killed in this city and its environs.

The Chief of Police reports the death of 152 persons (77 males and 75 females), from the 15th of December to the 15th January, of which 97 were whites, 52 coloured and 3 Indians.

The government under date 16th inst., has ordered to be received proposals for the sale of the State leased lands, whose possessors remained in arrears to the end of December 1836; and has published in the *Gaceta Mercantil* of 15th inst., a list of the defaulters.

His Majesty the King of the French, has by a decree dated 22nd October 1837, appointed as member of the Legion of Honor, M. Aimé Roger, Consul of France to the Argentine Republic, charged *ad interim* with the General Consulate, in recompense for his distinguished services.

The packet Luis, from Montevideo, brought a considerable number of passengers on Thursday 15th inst. Four carriages were in attendance on the beach to convey the lady passengers to their residence.

We hear that an arrangement has been made for building a new Theatre in this City, in which the performers who have succeeded from the present Theatre are to perform. Indeed, we are told that the foundation of the intended structure is already laid in the calle de la Victoria—so much the better;—“there is nothing like opposition.”

THE WEATHER, was boisterous last week, with strong easterly winds, thermometer 70 to 75. The summer hitherto has been temperate, with only two or three days of sultry heat.—Strong winds from the E. and E. S. E. have generally prevailed, more so than in any summer we remember here.

This week the weather has been changeable, thermometer 74 to 86.

The following notice has been published in the Daily papers.

The Mint will continue to change the Bank notes that do not bear the mark *Renovacion*, until the last day of February of the present year, which is the period when they will cease to circulate in the country. This notice is given in order to prevent injury to the public.

BATHING.—The bathers in the river have on one or two evenings during the week been tolerably numerous. The unsettled weather this summer has prevented the customary full attendance of “lady bathers.”

LONDON JOURNALS TO 13th November, have been received by way of Montevideo, and their contents are not uninteresting. Don Carlos was about to resume offensive operations at the head of 20,000 infantry, a body of cavalry and artillery. It was supposed he would march towards Castile, to effect a junction with other corps of Carlists. He has addressed a proclamation to his army, in which he highly eulogizes their

constancy and courage, and confidently prognosticates the final success of their efforts.

The details in the English journals of the Banquet in the Guildhall of the City of London, on “Lord Mayor’s Day” (9th November last), in honor of Queen Victoria’s visit there, partake more of the glowing descriptions in “the Arabian nights” than matter of fact occurrences. The following is a summary of the affair which we have extracted from a Liverpool journal.

#### QUEEN VICTORIA’S VISIT TO THE CITY OF LONDON.

From the first appearance of day-light, on 9th November last, the metropolis in every quarter presented all the characteristics of a general holiday. Before ten o’clock the whole route from Buckingham Palace to Guildhall was thronged, and from that hour to the commencement of the procession, the crowd continued to increase in such a manner as would cause alarm for the safety of the metropolis in the mind of a stranger to the feelings of the British people towards their sovereign, and each other, at the present period. Such multitudes could scarcely be congregated in any other city; and perhaps on no other other occasion could they be collected in such profound quietness, and with such order as bore the resemblance of discipline.—The most remarkable feature of the festival was the marked deference of people of all ranks to each other, and an universal regard to mutual accommodation. The Union Jack, the Royal Standard, and the flags of many nations floated from the windows and parapets along the line through which the Royal cavalcade was to pass.

The Recorder read the following address.

“May it please your Majesty,  
“We, your Majesty’s faithful subjects, the mayor and community, and citizens of the city of London, approach your royal person, to express to your Majesty the sense we entertain of your Majesty’s most gracious condescension in vouchsafing to adorn by your royal presence, on the anniversary of our great civic festival, the banquet prepared in the Guildhall.  
“The signs of gratulation and delight, the joyful exclamations of the people that greeted your Majesty’s progress to this hall, find an echo in every breast within your Majesty’s most ancient and loyal city.  
“These are not the indications of interested adulation offered to greatness in the zenith of power; they are the outpourings of an accident and affectionate spirit, that pervades and animates, as one man, the mighty masses of assembled multitudes, eager to testify, in the fervour of British feeling, their attachment to the august Sovereign in the person of their beloved Queen.  
“The most gracious declaration and assurance pronounced by your Majesty, and published to the world, upon ascending the throne of the united kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, are yet fresh in the memory, and glowing in the heart of a grateful and confiding people.  
“In the exercise of the highest privilege we enjoy, that of personal communication with the Sovereign, it was reserved for the citizens of London to receive from the lips of royalty the avowal of those principles that proved the happy means of transferring to your Majesty’s ancestors the hereditary sceptre of these realms.  
“Deign, therefore, most gracious lady, with renewed assurances of their devoted loyalty, to accept from the citizens of London the humble but sincere offering of their poor thanks and imperfect acknowledgments for the honour this day conferred upon them by your Majesty’s auspicious visit in the heart of the metropolis of this favoured empire.  
“May your Majesty long live in the enjoyment of health, and of the choicest gifts that Providence can bestow—to communicate to your subjects, and to experience on the throne the blessings that attend the good government of a free, happy, and religious people.”

Her Majesty emphatically returned the following answer:—  
“I thank you for this loyal and affectionate address, and I have much pleasure in receiving it here and upon this occasion.  
“I entirely concur in the sentiments which it expresses.  
“It has been the custom of the Kings and Queens, my predecessors, to visit upon their ac-

cession the city of London, and my regard for this great commercial community, the metropolis of my empire, renders it to me a great satisfaction to follow their example.”

Her Majesty was then graciously pleased to order letters patent to be made out, conferring the honor of a baronetcy on the Lord Mayor, and to knight the two Sheriffs, who now are Sir John Carroll and Sir Moses Montefiore. The latter gentleman is the first Jew that ever was knighted, at least so they said in the hall. He ascended to the hall, preceded by the lord mayor, the lady mayors, and the royal family, and amidst the acclamations of the company, took her seat on the magnificent throne.

Her Majesty then commanded the lord mayor and lady mayors to take their seats.  
The banquet was considered the most splendid which had ever been witnessed in the City of London. It comprised every delicacy and luxury which imagination could suggest or money procure.

During the dinner the orchestra played with great spirit. It is worth notice that Sir George Smart, in the course of his preparations for the occasion, when requiring that certain pieces should be played over again, said, “we must be very particular, for we are all at fault here; Majesty’s ear will detect our blunder.”

Her Majesty frequently expressed her gratification at the splendour which surrounded her, and the intimation was conveyed to the committee in terms which adequately rewarded them for all their labours and anxieties during the preparations.

The common cry, about an hour after her Majesty took her seat on the throne, advanced into the middle of the hall, and said, “The Right Hon. Lord Mayor gives the health of our most gracious Sovereign Queen Victoria.”

The company rose, and amidst loud applause and the swell of music in the orchestra, drank the toast.

“God save the Queen” was then sung by the principal vocal performers. After which her Majesty rose, and bowed to the company several times with the greatest affability.

The common cry then said—“Her Majesty gives “The lord mayor, and prosperity to the city of London.”

This toast was received with acclamations.  
The common cry announced the last toast in the following manner—“The right hon. the lord mayor gives “The royal family.”

At twenty minutes to eight o’clock the Queen retired from the hall to the drawing room, where she was served with tea in the splendid gold service which has already been described in the newspapers.

At half-past eight o’clock her Majesty’s carriage was announced, and she took leave of her faithful and delighted citizens of London, after having warmly expressed the gratification she felt at the most sumptuous entertainment.

The whole arrangements were so complete that not the slightest confusion or perplexity occurred during the whole of the day.

The plate in the hall (all at the Queen’s table was gold) was stated to be estimated at nearly £240,000.

When her Majesty’s carriage, on its return, arrived at the western extremity of Chesham, and opposite to the building erected for the accommodation of the City of London School, the national anthem was sung by a powerful orchestra with astonishing effect, considering the circumstances of difficulty, noise, and confusion under which it was performed. Her Majesty then proceeded on her route to the palace.

The illuminations along the line of procession were on the most magnificent scale imaginable, and the streets were thronged by countless thousands, from an early until a late hour.

His remains were conveyed to the Protestant burying ground at Montevideo, by all the British and Foreign residents, and many natives, eager to evince their respect for the memory of one, who in life was most amiable, and whose premature decease is universally deplored both here and at Montevideo. Thomas Samuel Hood, Esq., H. B. M.'s Consul General, read the funeral service.

The deceased came to this country in the year 1823, and from that period we had the happiness to enjoy his friendship—a friendship which will continue even beyond the grave.—His many virtues can never be effaced from our memory.
