BUENOS AYRES.

THE *Gaceta* of 1st inst. was published on 41 sheets of paper, and might with propriety be denominated 'The Monster Gazette.' It contained besides the usual monthly statements the Government Message to the House of Representatives on the opening of the Session on the 1st inst., a variety of notes of congratulation to the government from civil and military authorities on the Convention with France and on the victory obtained over Lavalle at Quebrachitos, a copy of an intercepted letter dated Puesto de la Viuda, November 25, 1840, from Manuel Sola to Gregorio Aranz de la Madrid, in which he complains of the disorganisation in his division, the desertions therefrom, the repugnance of his soldiers to continue their march, want of money, &c. &c., a despatch dated head-quarters Villa de los Ranchos 13th ult., from General Oribe to Governor Rosas, containing full details of the battle at Quebrachitos, with a list of the prisoners he had taken and of the officers of the victorious army, and a statement of the force which Lavalle had in the action, the correctness of which is vouched for by Colonel Pedro José Díaz, one of the prisoners. From this statement it would seem that the troops of Lavalle in said action were—

General Oribe in his despatch speaks in the most glowing terms of the conduct of his army and that when on their march they endured the most severe privations without a murmur, they only desire being to come up with the enemy. They marched for three days under a burning sun through a desert, in which not a drop of water was to be found, so that a number of his infantry and cavalry soldiers, and more than four thousand horses perished by thirst. He estimates the loss of Lavalle in the battle at Quebrachitos at more than one thousand five hundred killed, including a number of officers, besides the prisoners, armament, &c., the particulars of which we have before given. The loss on the side of the victors is stated at six officers and thirty soldiers killed, and six officers and forty four soldiers wounded.

The same *Gaceta* contains a copy of a letter dated Mendoza, November 26, 1840, from Don José Félix Aldao to Don Manuel Lopez, Governor of Cordova, in which he states that on the 4th of that month at day-break, a rising took place of the unitarians in Mendoza, who deposed the legal authority there, propagating at the same time a thousand falsehoods of their own manu-

facture, which for a time imposed upon a number of federals. On the 11th at 3 p. m. he received news of the movement, being at the time with his division 12 leagues from San Luis.—At half past 5 the same afternoon he put himself in march towards Mendoza, and on the 10th arrived at Alto Grande, where he was met by an Adjutant of the Commission, with a message from the latter, requesting an interview, to which he returned a verbal reply, and continued his march without stopping. On the 12th at half past 10 at night he advanced to within a league of the city of Mendoza, and learnt that on the same night at 9 or 10 o'clock the seven hundred unitarians who had assembled at the Retano had dispersed. On the 13th there was neither government or enemy in all the Province, and on the 14th at night he entered the city. On the 15th he published a *Bando* replacing the government and other legal authorities. On the 19th the Governorship was delegated to him, which under all circumstances he thought proper temporarily to accept.

A letter from Montevideo dated 6 in the evening of the 6th, states that a vessel had just arrived at that port in 53 days from Glasgow, bringing intelligence that affairs between France and England on the Eastern question had been amicably settled. Other accounts state that M. Thiers had resigned office and had been succeeded by Marshal Soult.

The town on New Year's night presented a very lively appearance. The weather was fine, which with the illuminations and show consequent upon the opening of the House of Representatives, attracted a considerable throng to the streets.

We have received United States journals to 13th November, by which we perceive that the contest for the Presidency of the United States has ended in the election of General Harrison.

THE WEATHER has been moderately warm this week. Thermometer 70 to 82.

Saturday last was a holiday at the Custom House, in consequence we believe of the opening of the House of Representatives.

"Twelfth Day" (6th inst.) was kept as a close holiday in Buenos Ayres. The *Alameda* in the evening had a portion of visitors.

Our paper of to day presents a list of nearly 200 merchant vessels in this port. We hope that one of them will have to go away in ballast. A fine new British barque called the *Buenos Ayres*, commanded by Captain Coal, built purposely for this trade, which recently arrived at Montevideo from Rio Janeiro, has changed her destination and proceeds for Cacueta instead of Buenos Ayres.

It is said that the British war steamer *Etna*, 1800 tons burthen, carrying 8 guns including 4 84 pounders, has touched at Rio Janeiro on her way to China.

House of Representatives.

The opening of the Eighteenth Legislature of the Province on the evening of the 1st inst., was attended with considerable eclat. A numerous citizen guard of honor of infantry and cavalry, with band and colours, were drawn up from in front of the House of Representatives along the street. Representatives. The public offices, plaza de la Victoria, and various streets were decorated with flags and laurel boughs, and illuminated. A profusion of beautiful rockets were continually discharged. The bells of the Churches rang a merry peal, and music paraded the streets. A band of music also performed in the court yard of the private residence of H. E. Governor Rosas. The House of Representatives was crowded with spectators, both native and foreign. Amongst the latter (in full dress) were J. H. Mandeville, Esq., Minister Plenipotentiary of H.B. Majesty, and J. C. Zimmerman, Esq., Consul for the City of Hamburg. Also (in full uniform) Commodore Charles Goodwin Ridgely, of the United States navy, Commodore Christian Wulff, of that of H. M. the King of Denmark, and several French naval officers whose names we could not learn.

At 7 p. m. a salute of 21 guns was fired from the Fort. At 8, H. E. the Delegate Governor, accompanied by the Minister of Finance, took their seats in the House, the President declared the *Legislature of the Province* to be opened, and then was read the following—

MESSAGE TO THE EIGHTEENTH LEGISLATURE

Buenos Ayres, December 27th, 1810.
 This year on the 24th of May, 24th of the first I signed, since,
 And 14th of the Argentine Confederation

The Executive,

To the Hon. Representatives of the Province.

MESSES REPRESENTATIVES,

The government feels infinite satisfaction on saluting the Eighteenth Legislature of the Province on this solemn day of its installation.— This Session opens under the most auspicious for the Republic; your august mission marks out to you the honorable road which you ought to follow in order completely to reap the fruits of those heroic sacrifices, which have gained a glory which will preserve without blemish. To you is reserved the noble task of cementing a work founded on justice and equity, trusting ever that the Supreme Arbitrer of the Universe, before whom I bow submissively, rendering profound homage and gratitude for the visible protection with which he has watched over the desires of the Confederation, will enlighten your councils. The government congratulates you on the energy, wisdom and virtuous co-operation which you have given, and feels pleasure in rendering an account of the state of public affairs, soliciting your sovereign decision.

Department of Foreign Affairs.

The relations of the Argentine Confederation with friendly nations remain unimpaired.

The government of H. B. Majesty, ever animated with a sincere spirit of friendship towards the Republic, has lent its high, impartial and good offices in the late disagreements with France. So noble a proceeding is worthy of the gratitude of the Republic. His illustrious Minister of Great Britain, J. H. Henry Mandeville, Esq., has acquired indelible titles to the esteem of the Argentines.

The treaty celebrated on the 24th May last, for the complete abolition of the Slave trade, has been ratified and exchanged. The Tribunals in accordance with the said treaty have been established; and the government flatters itself with having subscribed an act which will close for ever in the Confederation the shameful traffic in the human specie.

The government perseveres in its reclamations and in sustaining the rights of the Republic to the Malvinas (Falkland) Islands. It will ever retain hope in its own justice and in the elevated rectitude of the government of H. B. Majesty.

H. M. Queen Victoria has favored the government with the interesting intelligence of her marriage with H. H. Prince Albert Francis Augustus Charles Manuel, &c. &c.— The government celebrated this happy event in an appropriate manner, and congratulated H. M. with sincere interest for her personal happiness.

The same August Sovereign has deigned to inform the government of the death of H. R. H. Princess Augusta Sophia. The government has sympathized with H. M. on that imperishable loss. The employes civil and military have worn for one day the usual mourning.

In giving an account last year of the state of the relations of the Confederation with France, the government expressed to you the hope that reason and not force would determine the contest. Events have completely realized this happy presentation. The voice of justice penetrated the enlightened mind of H. M. the King of the French. The unjustifiable efforts of the agents of France were insufficient to impede it. The correct and impartial information of the distinguished veteran who relieved Rear Admiral Leblanc in the waters of the Plata, threw abundant light upon this unhappy question before the councils of the French Ministry. To Rear Admiral Dupont, the Confederation is indebted for his act of justice, loyalty and benevolence.

H. M. the King of the French accredited in the character of Minister Plenipotentiary Vice Admiral Baron de Mackau, a worthy representative of France. The ministerial facts and the simple exposition of facts re-conciliated interests which never ought to have been dissented. A Convention reciprocally honorable put an end to the calamities of a prolonged contest. The Republic saving its honor and a sacred and irrevocable rights of its Independence, feels infinite pleasure in again saluting H. M. and France amongst friendly nations. Permit the government, Honorable Representatives, to congratulate you on an event which so perfectly

satisfies the patriotic desires of the Confederation, and affords it a testimony of the justice of the government of H. M. the King of the French, and of the elevated character of its illustrious Minister Baron de Mackau.

The Secretary of Legation has been recognized *ad interim* as Chargé d'Affaires and as charged with the Consulate General of France.

The Commissioners on the part of the Republic for the fulfillment of the first article of the Convention of Peace with France have been named.

The government has good reason to believe that H. M. the Emperor of Russia and the Emperor of Austria are disposed to recognize the Independence of the Argentine Republic.

H. M. the King of Denmark has authorized with full powers Commodore Wulff, to extend and draw closer the relations of friendship, good understanding and commerce with the Confederation.

The King of Holland has not yet satisfied the reclamations of the government for the capture of the Argentine vessel *Governor Dorrego*.— Upon this point the government will occupy it with the interest the subject demands.

The Consul of Hamburg, appointed by the Senate of the Hanseatic City and Republic of Bremen near this government is authorized to acknowledge in its name the Independence of the Confederation.

Our mission in the United States of North America, is employed in the objects to which it was destined. The government expects from the enlightened Cabinet of Washington that the justice of its reclamations will not be unheeded.

The government has had to lament the loss of the Consul of the United States; his Consular conduct had given him claims to public esteem, particularly to that of the government.

A citizen of the said States has been admitted temporarily to fill the Consular functions, until the will of his government be known.

The majority of H. M. the Emperor of Brazil Don Pedro II., having been declared by the Legislative Assembly of the Empire, this interesting event was communicated to the government by H. I. M. The government experiences in manifesting to H. M. its friendly wishes.

It sincerely desires that the conservative principles of society being consolidated under his administration of the Empire, its domestic peace re-established, and secured against the intrigues of the American agents, H. M. may be fully protected with the perfidious and odious policy of that adventurer against the dignity, well being and integrity of the neighbouring States.

The Minister Extraordinary of the Empire has from the bad state of his health temporarily absented himself. The Secretary of Legation has been recognized *ad interim* as Brazilian Chargé d'Affaires and Consul General.

Since the downfall of the Usurper of Brazil, all the Continental Republics continue in the pacific enjoyment of their independence and liberty. Their relations with the government of the Argentine Confederation are preserved. Circumstances well known to lessen the inconveniences have retarded the departure of the Argentine Minister appointed to consolidate them.

The Oriental Republic of the Uruguay continues submitted to the humiliating yoke of an audacious usurper. Involved in the war into which Rivera has plunged it, it suffers impatiently under the weight of an administration anti-American and venal. The sacrilegious arm of his intrusive authority has attempted to sever the ties of friendship and union with the Argentines and Orientals, by which they reposed together in the glorious laurels of their Independence. But that immoral leader, discredited by his perfidies, has seen his base projects defeated by the splendid triumphs of the Republic. Terrified in the midst of a virtuous nation which detests him, and immortal in the eyes of Europe and America by his treasons, he wanders without concert and without plan. His presence will only humiliate the valiant Orientals until the Confederation displays its power in their aid, and re-establishes liberty and legal order by the chastisement of their oppressor.

Interior.

The Message upon this head states that the Provinces of the Confederation enjoyed profound peace after the blockade of the River Plate had

been declared, and their governments and people sympathized in the principles avowed by the government of Buenos Ayres, in defence of their liberty and independence, but that the vicaristarians taking advantage of the difficulties which surrounded the Supreme Authority, raised the standard of rebellion in some of the Provinces. Driven from the Provinces of Entre Rios, Buenos Ayres and Santa Fé, and completely defeated in the deserts of Quebrachos on the 24th November last, their final destruction is at hand.

Homic Department.

The invasion of Lavalle is here mentioned, and that no alternative remained but to look quietly on and see the property of the citizens of the Republic employed in support of the barbarous invaders, or to deprive them of all means of hostility. It would have been ruinous and imprudent to have shown unlimited respect to the property of the recreant traitors and the devastation with which this infamous traitor had annihilated the fortunes of the federalists.— The government therefore could not hesitate a moment. It declared the effects, movable and immovable, of the traitor recreant-traitors not only responsible for the losses of the federalists, but for the extraordinary expenses of the war and the rewards accorded to the army.

War.

The troops of the army of the Province and the triumphs it has gained are detailed under this head. Also that the Island of Martin Garcia has been strongly fortified, and that the government expects important services from the holding of this post.

“A flotilla (says one of the articles) is actively preparing. Our vessels of war will soon command in the waters of the Parana and Uruguay.”

“The Delegate Government, (adds the Message) by order of the Governor (proprietary) abstain from proposing any measure to meet the deficit of 1841, because the period for which he undertook the supreme command of the Province has expired, and therefore will be the work of the new administration and of your enlightened deliberations.”

With respect to the English Loan, the observations are of the same tenor as those of last year, viz.—that the government had not for one moment forgotten its pledges as it regards the debt, but that injurious circumstances had prevented the coming to an arrangement which might carry with it the probability of being fulfilled. That it would however opportunely take the affair into consideration.

Under the head of Finance, the Message enlarges on various topics, stating amongst other things that the general raises had promised to the agriculturist an abundant harvest, and that the cattle in the country districts had multiplied beyond all former example, but that the hordes of recreant unitarians, by their invasion cast a blight on these fine prospects, by withdrawing the agriculturist, &c., from their labours to take up arms against the traitors.— Providence however had prepared the way for their prompt extermination, and the country would soon return to its former tranquil and prosperous state.
