### BUENOS AYRES.

With this number concludes the quarter of the *British Packet*.

According to the latest intelligence from Cordova, President Oribe, with the main body of the Confederate army, had counter-marched from Machin to Santa Catalina. This movement was considered as indicative of the termination of the campaign, especially since the remains of the force which escaped from the defeat of San Cala, had been overtaken on the 10th inst., by Colonel Mariano Maza, on the plains of La Rioja, and tally routed. This body of fugitives, in number about 400 men, is said to have been communicated by Videla, who, with some officers, a second time escaped.—General Pacheco still remained in the field considerably in advance of the main body of the Army.

Under date 20th inst., the House of Representatives forwarded a note to the Executive in answer to its Message of the 1st. After eulogizing the wisdom of its governmental acts, the note proceeds as follows:—

"The state of our relations with friendly nations, the benevolent disposition of many of our cherished Independents, and the noble and impartial offices of Great Britain in the French question, have been duly considered by the Representatives of the People. They appreciate the ardent zeal of Y. E. to uphold the exterior credit of the Argentine Confederation, with the honor and dignity which it has known how to acquire.

"The peace with France, reciprocally honorable, has fulfilled the desires of the Argentine People, and the House feels infinite pleasure in recording that such immense glory is due to the wisdom and firmness of the illustrious Chief of the State, whom the Republic justly regards as the heroic Defender of American Independence.

"If the obstinacy of the recent unitarian band has for the moment disturbed the tranquility of some of the Confederate Provinces; the splendid triumphs which have followed have added to the glorious records of our history, and the country free from unitarian traitors proceeds majestically to its elevated destiny.

"The House contemplates with pleasure, and indeed it is one of the most eminent services of the Illustrious General Rosas, that in the midst of the difficulties of an obstinate strife, in which the passions have displayed all their violence, he has preserved the ties of subordination without neglecting for a moment public business, and the protection he has dispensed to all our institutions, no less than the zeal and patriotism of the public functionaries in the fulfilment of their duties have been most satisfactory to the Representation of the Province.

After stating that the House will take care to reward the distinguished services of the Army of the line and militia of the Province, and to provide the means which the public service demand, the note concludes as follows:—

"In the midst of the flattering perspective which the Representation of the Province has enjoyed in considering the Message of Y. E., it has experienced the most poignant regret in learning, that Our Illustrious Restorer of the Laws, the Hero of the Desert, the Heroic Defender of American Independence, General

Juan Manuel de Rosas, abstains from proposing any measure to meet the deficiency of 1841, because he considers the period for which he undertook the supreme command of the Province as having expired. The Representatives reiterating their previous resolutions, can only reply that the Illustrious General Rosas ought to devote himself to his country, and can never be indifferent to its glory and prosperity.

On Sunday morning last, during the strong Pampero wind, the boat of the British barque *Diana*, was captured when coming from the outer rocks. Of the four men that were in her, three were drowned, the other clung to two oars and was saved by a boat from the Sardinian vessel *Constante*. The *Diana's* boat has since been recovered.

### Official Documents.

Buenos Ayres, January 29th, 1841  
23rd year of the Liberty, 26th of the Just government,  
And 15th of the Argentine Confederation.  
The Government of Buenos Ayres, charged with the Foreign Affairs of the Argentine Confederation, and of the general affairs of Peace and War.

Using the right given to it by the unjust war declared against the Confederation, by the usurper of the public power in the Oriental State of the Uruguay, has ordered and decreed.

Art. 1.—The rivers of Uruguay and Paraná, are closed against the navigation of all vessels which are not licensed by the government of the Argentine Confederation under the National flag until further notice.

2.—After fifteen days from the publication of the present decree, vessels found in the waters of said rivers proceeding from any of the ports of the Oriental Republic, shall be declared with their cargoes as lawful prize.

3.—Those which are met within the period of thirty days from the publication of this decree, navigating down said rivers, coming from an enemy's port, shall be detained and examined; being permitted to proceed to their destination should no legal cause appear for their capture. After the expiration of said term their vessels and their cargoes will be subjected to the provision designated in the first article.

4.—No exception will be made as it regards vessels going or coming, which convey contraband articles of war.

5.—The present declaration shall be notified to Oriental vessels proceeding from the high seas, with intent to pass up the rivers Uruguay and Paraná, by the station at Martin Garcia, or by any of the Commanders of the National vessels of war, destined to enforce this resolution, taking note of the respective notification. If a tercio notification they are found in either of the said rivers, the vessels and their cargoes will be subjected to the provision designated in the first article.

6.—Let this be published.

Buenos Ayres, January 23, 1841.

All Argentines have a just claim to the navigation of the Uruguay whose right shore is occupied by towns belonging to the Republic.

And it not being possible to tolerate either in peace or in war, on the part of the authorities of the Oriental State, the least obstacle to vessels navigating in that river under the Argentine flag, with the exception of those measures which are indispensable for the fulfilment of the fiscal ordinances, respecting those which may touch on the Oriental coast.

Considering therefore the decree of the Oriental government, which obliges said vessels to enter the port of the Higueritas and submit to the regulations expressed in it, as being vexatious and offensive.

The government has ordered and decreed—  
Art. 1.—No vessel under the Argentine flag, passing up or down the river Uruguay, shall be considered as obliged to enter the Higueritas, nor any other port of that State on the left margin of that river.

2.—The Patron or Captain of a vessel, under the circumstances specified in the preceding article, is authorized to repel by force, all attempts to oblige him to touch on the Oriental coast, and if compelled to do so by violence, he must protest against it and the damages and losses which may accrue therefrom.

3.—The boats of National vessels of war, cruising in the river Uruguay, shall give protection to merchant vessels which may be in the situation mentioned in the preceding article.

### Appointments by the House of Representatives.

Señor Nicolas Anchorena, to be President of the Administration of Public Credit. Señor Juan Alsina, Vice-President.

Protocol of the Conference held in the Foreign office of Buenos Ayres, on the 20th of January, 1841, with Commodore Christian Wulff, of His Danish Majesty's frigate *Bellona*, Commander of the order of *Dannebrog*, &c. &c., 32nd year of the reign, 26th of the Independence, and 12th of the Argentine Confederation.

Being present in the Foreign-office H. E. the Minister for Foreign Affairs Don Felipe Arana and Commodore Christian Wulff, expressly authorised by H. M. Christian VIII., King of Denmark, to visit the government charged with the Foreign Affairs of the Argentine Confederation, and to treat with it upon the means to extend and draw closer the good understanding between both Nations, according to the instructions which he presented in his note of 24th December last, of which he left a certified copy, the original being returned to him, from the necessity that he should make a like use of it, near the governments of the Republics of the Uruguay, Chili, Bolivia, Peru and the Ecuador; after having expressed the just intentions of his government, and the desire which he entertains to cultivate sincere relations of friendship with that of the Republic, and having solicited H. E. the Minister, to ascertain the sentiments of H. E. the Governor and Captain General of the Province, charged with the Foreign Affairs of the Confederate Provinces, relative to the authorisation with which Commodore Wulff had been instructed to recognise the Independence: as soon as H. E. the Governor had been fully informed of these friendly intentions, and of the authorisation for the recognition of the Independence of the Argentine Confederation in due order; the following formal declaration was made in presence of H. E. the Minister, by which in the Royal name of H. M. Christian VIII., by the grace of God, King of Denmark, and in virtue of the full authorisation conferred on the 18th of August 1840: "The Republic of the Argentine Confederation, is recognised as a Sovereign Nation, Free and Independent."

I, Commodore Christian Wulff, &c. &c. &c., solemnly authorised by full powers conferred on the 18th August 1840, by the Minister of State and Foreign Affairs of the Kingdom of Denmark, to visit the government charged with the Foreign Affairs of the Argentine Confederation, and to treat with it upon the means of extending and drawing closer the ties of friendship and good understanding between both Nations—Declare: That H. M. Christian VIII., King of Denmark, &c. &c. &c., recognises the Republic of the Argentine Confederation, as a Sovereign Nation, Free and Independent, with all the extension of territory which appertains to it; and consequently declare that in the ports and territories of H. M. the King of Denmark, the Argentine-Flag, Ministers, Authorities, Agents and Subjects, shall enjoy in their persons and property, the immunities, considerations and rights conformable to the common law of nations, and which are dispensed to other nations equally sovereign and independent; and that the laws and peculiar ordinances of the Argentine Republic will be respected, in the same manner as the King my Sovereign respects those of other States. And, inasmuch as H. M. has manifested his desire to extend and draw closer the friendly relations and good understanding with the government of this Republic, as soon as this could be effected by means of this frank and explicit declaration; I, Christian Wulff, promise with the same solemnity, that in eight months from the date hereof, H. M. the King of Denmark my August Sovereign, will forward to this government his ratification of this declaration and solemn recognition which by his Royal and Sovereign authorisation I have made of the Sovereignty and Independence of the Argentine Republic; in faith of which I have signed and sealed the present in Buenos Ayres, on the 20th of January 1841.

H. E. the Minister accepted the foregoing declaration, with the express understanding that it be ratified by H. M. the King of Denmark, and having accorded to the subjects of his said Majesty, in the name of the government, charged with the Foreign Affairs of the Confederate Provinces, the same immunities, considerations, rights of Flag, Authorities, Ministers, Agents and due respect to the laws and peculiar ordinances of His Majesty, in the same manner as with other friendly States, the conference closed and was signed the same day.

J. Kick, Esq., to exercise *ad interim* the functions of Consul of the said State in this City, until H. M. the King of Denmark should know his determination in this respect; the government charged with the Foreign Affairs of the Argentine Confederation has ordered and decreed—

Art. 1.—J. J. Kick, Esq., is admitted to fill temporarily the functions of Consul of Denmark in this City, until H. M. the King of that State, makes known his determination in this respect to the government charged with the Foreign Affairs of the Argentine Confederation.

LONDON GAZETTE EXTRAORDINARY.

Buckingham Palace, November 21, 1840.

This afternoon, at ten minutes before the Queen was happily delivered of a Princess, His Royal Highness Prince Albert, her Royal Highness the Duchess of Kent, several Lords of her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and the Ladies of her Majesty's Bedchamber being present.

This great and important news was immediately made known to the town, by the firing of the Tower guns; and, the Privy Council being assembled as soon as possible thereupon, at the Council Chamber, Whitehall, it was ordered, that a Port of Thanksgiving for the Queen's safe delivery of a Princess be prepared by his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, to be used in all churches and chapels throughout England and Wales, and the town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Sunday, the 29th of November, or the Sunday after the respective ministers shall receive the same.

Her Majesty and the young Princess are, God be praised, both doing well.

Buckingham Palace, November 24, 1840.

Half-past 9 o'clock, a. m.

The Queen has slept perfectly well. Her Majesty has not had a single unfavourable symptom.

The infant princess continues well.

It is generally supposed that the Princess will receive the names of her august mother—Alexandrina Victoria; and that the christening, which will be on a magnificent scale of splendour, will take place within a month.

FALL OF ST. JEAN D'ACRE.

The Maritime Prefect to the Minister of the Marine.

The English steamer the Phoenix, arrived at Malta on the 12th instant, has announced the taking of St. Jean d'Acres.

This news is given by the captain of the Euratos.

Commercial Treaty with Texas.

A commercial treaty has been concluded between Great Britain and the Republic of Texas. It was signed on Monday week, by Lord Palmerston, and General James Hamilton, envoy from Texas. General Hamilton is, we understand, a native of South Carolina, of good family, and possessed of extensive estates, who, like many other subjects of the United States, has made Texas his country. On the advantages of a commercial treaty with the people inhabiting an extensive region of great fertility, of the same Saxon race with ourselves, it is unnecessary for us to dwell. For many years, the most profitable of all occupations to the Texans, and the industry of this country will

long find there an advantageous market. But this is not all, the Texans deriving their manufactures directly from us and not through the United States, our goods will not be subject to the duties which the people of this last country have, in imitation of our own monopolists, been so unwise as to impose on imported manufactures. Texas will hold the United States in check. It is impossible to overrate the advantages we may derive from this source.

Separation of the British Squadron in the River Plate.

The Southampton, 50 guns, Curacoa, 26, and Clío, 16, sailed from Montevideo on Saturday last—the first for the Cape of Good Hope—the second for Rio Janeiro—the third for Buenos Ayres.

The Grecian, 16, and Camelion, 10, had previously sailed on a cruise—leaving our British vessel of war at Montevideo.

The Rose, 16 guns, was however expected there.
