### BUENOS AYRES.

The fitting out of the corvette *Twentyfifth* may be completed, a gun was fired at midday yesterday from Admiral Brown's flag-ship and a blue petrel hoisted, upon which all officers and others proceeded on board. Three of the Riverista vessels of war, commanded by Commodore Coe, have been lying lately in Colonia and its vicinity, not at any time making their appearance in sight of Buenos Ayres; it is said however, that on Wednesday last they were under way standing down the River towards Montevideo. Doubtless in a few days the hostile squadrons will have a meeting.

Intelligence was received in town on Saturday of the death of General Harrison, President of the United States, who expired on the 4th April, at Washington, having only occupied the Presidential Chair thirty days. On Sunday, Monday and Tuesday last, the flag at the Consulate of the United States in this City, as well as those of the American merchant vessels in as far as they were displayed half-mast. On Monday Admiral Brown's squadron, immediately after firing the salute in honor of the coronation of Queen Victoria, was placed in mourning, each vessel having her flag half-mast. On Tuesday the proceeding was repeated, with the addition that Admiral Brown's flag ship fired minute guns, with the United States flag at her fore half-mast.

#### FUNERAL OBSEQUES IN NEW YORK.

The funeral obsequies on the occasion of the death of President Harrison are thus described by the correspondent of the National Intelligence.

The mails, by order, are to close at two o'clock, which leaves me but a moment or two to recount the imposing ceremonies of the day. All nature has worn a sombre and solemn appearance through the day. The Heavens are hung in black, and the sky is fringed in its darkest drapery. The sun has been withdrawn from the face of the earth, and the clouds, hanging heavily and mournfully above us give a fitting correspondence to the gloom which prevails below. Every visible thing in creation gives sign of the general sorrow. A city of three hundred thousand souls is in mourning for the loss of the President of the United States. Our flags are clothed in weeds of woe and float at half mast. Our public buildings, many of them, wear the same sable weeds. The banners of our little legion of associations—none of them political though—are dressed in the same symbolical signs of the public grief. The drums, which may be heard all around, are muffled, and, like the hearts of the populace of the nation, beat but the death-march to the grave.

It is impossible for the eye to reach or the pen to picture the scene which presents itself in the Park as I write. The military spectacle alone surpasses any thing of the kind ever seen in the country, and the assembly of citizens make up a multitude of men whom no man can number. I count nearly one hundred civic societies and some thirty military divisions, all in mourning. In addition to these, are the entire corporate officers of New York, Brooklyn, and the surrounding towns, with Mr. Van Buren, the ex-President of the United States. The officers of the General, State and City governments are

all in attendance with the Judges of the Courts, Legislators, (State and National,) Revolutionary soldiers, and the remnants of Revolutionary societies. The veteran of four score and ten, and the youth who has just entered his school are in the procession, which has just formed, and with them all orders of merit, from the humblest citizen to the most elevated man in the military and civil service of the country.

You can have no conception of the display, grandeur, and effect of the scene presented—Whole streets are dressed in mourning, with crape hung on the house-top, and from one side to the other, and from window to door-way, and from door-way to balcony. The banners, too, present a most imposing appearance, especially those of the tradesmen and foreigners. The Irish Harp, enclosed with roses and hung in black, was a beautiful device. So of the Fusile, and of every emblem, whether representing our native land or the birthplace of adopted citizens. The military spectacle, too, was, to the end, one of the most imposing parts of the procession. The banners of the twenty-six States, two classes of them, hung in crape, with a white star and a black rosette upon them, the whole upon blue silk, was another of the attractions.

The *Ura*, borne by the sailors of the Navy who had served in the good ship *Constitution*, and under the especial guard of a detachment of the United States army, was another attraction, and, perhaps, the great one of the procession. A full band of music preceded it, playing the death march. A noble steed followed, without a rider, and led by an aged servant of the deceased President. Twenty-six pall bearers, made up of our most aged and respectable citizens, came next, and after them the ex-President, in a carriage with the Mayors of New York and Brooklyn. The procession, in its progress, would reach from the Battery to Harlem, a distance of nine miles, and eight abreast. It is two o'clock as I close, and although advertised to leave at twelve, the multitude have hardly begun to move from the Park. I might fill your columns with descriptions, but, after all, you would have but a faint idea of the solemn pageant.

The 28th ult., was the anniversary of the coronation of H. M. Queen Victoria, upon which occasion H. M.'s ship *Pearl*, in the outer roads, was very prettily dressed out, and at 11 P. M. fired a salute of 21 guns, in which she was accompanied by the whole of Admiral Brown's squadron and the French brig of war *Aleyone*, each saluting with 21 guns. Admiral Brown's flag ship and the *Aleyone* displayed the British flag at their fore. The firing of the vessels having ceased, the flag at the Fort was 'run up' and a salute of 21 guns was fired from that fortress in honor of the day. At night there was a ball at the residence of Mr. Mandeville, Her Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary.

General Tomas Guido and his two sons, embarked on Wednesday morning last in a French man of war and proceeded on board the French brig of war *Tactico*, which sailed the same day for Rio Janeiro, at which Court, the General, will be the Representative of the Argentine Republic, at the ensuing coronation of the Emperor of Brazil. The General was attended to the place of embarkation by various French officers whom were General Alon, the Chargé d'Affaires of Brazil, and that of France, Captain Baudé of the French brig of war *Aleyone*, Señores Pedro A. Plomer, Pedro de

Angels, Francisco C. Belauitgui and John C. Zimmerman, Esq.

The Tactico saluted the General with 13 guns on his going on board.

#### Buenos Ayres Subscription Library.

At a general meeting of the subscribers to the Buenos Ayres Subscription Library, held at the Library-rooms on Wednesday the 30th June,

Mr. R. H. Wilson, in the Chair.

The Treasurer presented the accounts for the year ending 31st May 1841, showing a balance of 1484 dollars 4 rials in his hands, which were approved of and ordered to be passed.

It was proposed by Mr. S. Hesse, seconded by Mr. A. Barler,

That the Library be closed from this day forward for the delivery of books, and that an advertisement be inserted in the public papers requesting that all the books now in circulation, be returned without delay.

It was moved by Mr. F. A. Clint, and seconded by Mr. W. Gilpin, that a general meeting for the reorganization of the Library be held at the Library-rooms on Monday evening next the 5th July, at 7 o'clock, and that notice of the same be given in the public papers.

Which resolutions were passed.

We received by the *Plomstead*, London papers to 15th April. Every thing looked peaceable at that period and the English funds were looking up. Consols being as high as 90. Great alarm prevailed for the safety of the President steam-ship—she sailed from New York bound to Liverpool, and had been out 35 days and no tidings received of her. Forty per cent. premium had been paid upon her at Lloyds, but according to the last accounts it had decreased to 35.

Tuesday last was the day of 'St. Peter and St. Paul,' and was, as is customary, kept as a close holiday in Buenos Ayres. The usual observances took place at the Cathedral Church, which was crowded on the occasion.

The Commander in Chief *interino* of the vanguard of the united army of the Argentine Confederation,

To H. E. the Governor and Captain General, Illustrious Restorer of the Laws, charged with the Foreign Affairs of the Republic, Commander in Chief of the united army of the Argentine Confederation, Brigadier General Juan Manuel de Rosas.

EXCELLENT SIR,

The campaign on the plains of Rioja having terminated, I have thought it my duty to render to Y. E. the following report.

The occupation by the recreant unitarians of that important portion of the Province of Rioja, formed the principal, if not the only hope of the miscreant Lavalle, and called the attention of a part of the united army of the vanguard of the Confederation, which I have the honor to command to that spot.

I therefore, accompanied by General Angel Pacheco, set out from the City of Cordova on the 30th April last, with 560 infantry from the battalions Defensores de la Independencia and 3rd regiment of the Guardia del Monte, commanded by Lieut. Col. Marcus Rincon and Major Casario Dominguez, and 300 cavalry under the orders of Lieut. Cols. Ramon Bustos and Julian Sosa.

The instant we set foot on the plains we were joined by the brave federals who had accompanied the illustrious General Quiroga in his glorious campaigns, a testimony, that the error was only momentarily which the infamous impostures of the odious unitarians Brizuela and Lavalle had led them into, and that they were still ready to shed their blood in defence of the sacred cause of Federation.

We had scarcely reached the small town of Oita on the 18th May, when there passed over to us, well armed, having just quitted the ranks of the recreant unitarians, Captain Prudencio Gomez, at the head of his company, with Lieut. Juan Gregorio Luna, and Ensign Eusebio Diaz.

On the same day I despatched General Angel Pacheco, with 400 infantry and 40 cavalry to reconnoitre. He marched to the village of Pacatani, where on the 19th in the morning he received a note from Commandant Juan Francisco Villafra, expressing his wish to come over to us, with the squadron under his command well armed, including officers and spare horses, which was effected on the 20th, when they joined the troops of General Pacheco.

I had scarcely perused the despatches from the General, relative to this event, when I was informed that Lieut. Luciano Quinteros, with two other officers and the troops under their command, had come over to us and presented themselves at my head quarters.

On the following day 21st, General Pacheco having rejoined us, we marched to the town of Malenaz, where leaving a detachment as we had done at other places in our route, we proceeded to Ilica; Lieut. Col. Bustos, with the cavalry went towards Chapco, in order to attack the enemy on that side of the hills, whilst I should operate on the other, and General José Felix Aldao, with a light division spread among the Sainas and Patiqua, close the Rioja pass, to prevent them joining Lavalle.

On the approach of Lieut. Col. Bustos to Chapco, the enemy retreated thence precipitately, but the roads being closed, they began to separate, at first in small groups and afterwards in squadrons, as was the case with the squadron Cullen, whose worthy Commander Major Juan de Dios Videla, his officers, troops and others, have come over to us, abandoning the recreant unitarians by whom they had been misled and returning to the path of Liberty, Federation, honor and patriotism, thereby rendering themselves worthy of the consideration of Y. E. and all federals.

To enumerate, Excellent Sir, all the particulars and fortunate events of this campaign, would occupy too great a space; but it will be satisfactory to Y. E. to know that without firing a shot this territory has been tranquillized and liberated from the recreant unitarians.

Permit me to recommend to Y. E. the conduct of the officers and soldiers of this division,

who have given such repeated proofs of constancy and valour.

I have removed my camp to the Panto de la Iglesia, in order to assemble there, all the divisions of the army which I have the honor to command, and continue operations on the plan agreed upon in a very pleasing and satisfactory interview with the Commander in Chief Brigadier General Manuel Oribe, President of the Oriental State, with which I was honored at the Panto del Corzall.

General Rosas replied to the above under date Buenos Ayres 25th ult., congratulating General Aldao and the army under his command on "results so glorious against the recreant unitarians, enemies of God and man."

The *Gaceta* of Monday last contains copies of communications to General Oribe from General Pacheco, Lieut. Colonel Bustos and other officers, relative to the officers, troops and others who have passed over to the unitarians.

Also a note dated Edmond's 9th inst., from Major Juan de Dios Videla to General Oribe, stating that on the previous afternoon he had put into execution the ardent desires he had long entertained of quitting with his squadron the bandit miscreant unitarian Lavalle, and passing over to the federal ranks.

Also a note addressed to General Pascual Echague, Governor of Entre Rios, from General Servando Gomez, expressing his thanks for the sword and cattle awarded by the decree of the government of Buenos Ayres of 17th December last, for his services at the battle of Sauce Grande, accepting the former and making over the produce of the latter in aid of the war.

Also similar notes to General Gomez from Colonels Constancio Quintero, Gerónimo Serrano, Diego Lamas and Lieut. Col. Gregorio Vergara, gratefully accepting the medals awarded them by the aforesaid decree and making over the produce of the cattle in aid of the war.

Also a note to General Echague from General Justo José de Urquiza, accepting the sword awarded him by the decree in question for his services at Sauce Grande, which he states he shall ever know how to use with honor in defence of the sacred federal system and sovereignty of the people, and making over the produce of the cattle to the widows of the brave men who in the field of battle sealed their blood the glories of the country.

General Echague enclosed these notes to Governor Rosas, who in his reply requested the General to convey the honors in his own and the thanks of the Argentine Confederation for their generous patriotic donation.

A note under date Cordova 14th ult., from the Delegate Governor of that Province Don Claudio Antonio de Arredondo to Brigadier General Juan Manuel de Rosas, Governor of Buenos Ayres, congratulates him on the recent glorious successes of the federal arms and the agonizante state of the recreant unitarian ringleader Lavalle, Madria and Brizuela, abandoned as they are by so many whom they had allured to their fatal and deceit.

Governor Rosas replied to the above on the 23rd.

The same paper also contains two notes dated Buenos Ayres 14th ult., from the Captain of the Port Juan Francisco Segui to the Delegate Governor, giving an account of the mutiny on board the riverine barque at Montevideo 11th ult., and the arrival here of Peter Roberts, Joseph Atkinson and Henry Parks, late belonging to the boat of the Captain of the Port at Montevideo.

Also a note to Governor Rosas dated San Isidro 21st ult., from Don Mariano Epelta, Justice of Peace, giving an account of the arrival at that port, on that day of the riverine privateer boat Bernardina, which had delivered herself up to the government of Buenos Ayres (as stated in our last number), by John Higgins an Englishman, in conjunction with the seamen Marcos Raso, Harro Giganti, Juan Salva and William Johnson.

"St. John's Day," (24th ult.) was kept as a close holiday in Buenos Ayres. The Junas, Juanas and Juanitas of our City, received the customary compliments from their friends, and the *tertulias* in the evening were numerous.

From 'The Times' of April 15.

The conclusion of the discussion on the extraordinary credits for 1841, in the Chamber of Deputies at Paris on the 12th April, turned principally on the expenses said to have been incurred in consequence of the mal-administration of M. Thiers. M. Guzin, the Minister of Finance in the Cabinet of the 1st of March, contended that the deficit was enormously exaggerated by his successor, in order to discredit him who had given umbrage to the present Ministry, and to afford the new director of the financial department the easy merit of retrieving the shattered finances of the country. He next maintained, and endeavoured to show by calculations, that the former Ministry were accountable for only a very small portion of the deficit, and that, after all, the resources of the country were fully adequate to supply the deficiency, without any danger to the national prosperity. M. Humann next rose to reply, and after recapitulating the different burdens entailed on its successors by the Cabinet of M. Thiers, proceeded to demonstrate that the latter had mistaken its resources, and not sufficiently matured its projects, and that an aggressive war—a war of ambition against Europe—could only be carried on by a dictator. This expression excited a violent uproar in the assembly, and M. Thiers having ascended the tribune, unadvisedly on the imprudence of asserting, in the face of Europe, that France was unable to make war, because her government would be impotent to preserve order in the interior without the strong arm of a dictator. He then repeated the same arguments already adduced by M. Guzin, and maintained that the real cause of the financial embarrassments of France was the too great extension given of late to public works for the sake of gratifying the deputies, who, to recommend themselves to their constituents, were incessantly claiming the establishment of roads, canals, bridges, and railways, in the districts which they represented. M. Passy closed the debate on that day, by a speech in which he depicted the obliquity of France in retaining possession of Algiers at the cost of so many sacrifices.

Died.

On the 15th ult. aged 38, MR. ROBERT HALKETT, a native of Bathhead, County of Renfrew, Scotland. His remains were deposited in the British Protestant Cemetery on the 16th ult.
