BUENOS AYRES.

On the 12th inst., Don Luis Montinho de Lima Alvarez y Silva, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the Court of Brazil to this Republic, had an audience of Governor Rosas, to whose residence he was conducted in the carriage of H. E., accompanied by the Minister for Foreign Affairs and the Principal Aid de Camp of the government, and attended by a cavalry escort. On presenting his credentials, the Envoy addressed the Governor, stating that H. M. the Emperor of Brazil was desirous of giving a new proof of the value he places upon the friendship of H. E., and to draw closer the good understanding which exists between Brazil and the noble Argentine Confederation, and that for himself he felt infinite gratification in being appointed by his government to a mission so important and honorable. He would make every effort to merit the confidence of H. M., and hoped to obtain that of H. E. then this new diplomatic mission would form an epoch in his varied career.

To this address H. E. Governor Rosas returned a suitable reply.

The Envoy was conveyed back to his residence in the same form as he came.

Letter from H. M. the Emperor of Brazil.

Don Pedro II., Constitutional Emperor and Perpetual Defender of Brazil, to our great and good friend the Illustrious Governor and Captain General of the Province of Buenos Ayres, charged with the Foreign Affairs of the Argentine Confederation, greeting.—Desirous of giving a fresh proof of the value I place upon your friendship, I have named the Caballero Luis Montinho de Lima Alvarez and Silva, belonging to my Privy Council and Treasury, Knight of the orders of Christ and of Malta, Member of the Imperial orders of the Cross and of the Legion of honor of France, and Commander of the order of the Tower and Sword of Portugal, to reside near your person in the character of my Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary, and I trust that in making this communication you will see in it a fresh proof of the sincere desires which animate me and the ambition I feel to draw closer the ties of friendship which so happily exist between this Empire and the Argentine Republic.

The distinguished talent, merit and services evinced by Señor Montinho, in various State employments and other Diplomatic missions, assure me that he will know how to fulfil this honorable Commission so as to conciliate your benevolence, &c. Deign then to give credit to all he may express in my name of the invariable sentiments of true esteem, &c. &c. Illustrious Governor and Captain General of the Province of Buenos Ayres, charged with the Foreign Affairs of the Argentine Confederation—May the Almighty take you into his Holy keeping. Given in the Palace at Rio Janeiro, on the 6th of June, 1841.

DECRETE.

Buenos Ayres, September 12th, 1841.
22nd year of the Liberty, 26th of the Independence, and 12th of the Argentine Confederation.

The government of Buenos Ayres, charged with the Foreign Affairs of the Argentine Confederation, on view of the Imperial letter presented by H. E. the Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary Don Luis Montinho de Lima Alvarez y Silva, &c. &c., has ordered and decreed—

Art. 1. Don Luis Montinho, de Lima Alvarez y Silva, &c. &c., is recognised in the character of Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of H. M. the Emperor of Brazil near this government.

Official Documents.

THE WEATHER.—We have again to notice the continuance of dry weather—Thermometer during the week 84 to 64.

Rear Admiral August Samuel Massies Clerval, Commander in Chief of the naval forces of France on this station, arrived here on Wednesday last, in the French brig of war *Tactique*. His flag was saluted by the French brig of war *Cygne*, H. B. M.'s ship *Perle*, United States ship *Decatur*, and Brazilian brigantine *Camaron*, each firing 13 guns, which salutes were returned by the *Tactique*. She afterwards came into the inner roads, hoisted the flag of this Republic at her main and saluted the town with 21 guns, which was answered from the Fort.

The Admiral came on shore about mid day, accompanied by Captain Baudé of the *Alecyon*, M. Becour, Chargé d'Affaires of France, and Captain Odet-Pellon of the *Cygne*, were on the beach to receive and accompany him to the carriage which was in waiting, in which the party proceeded to the residence of M. Becour.

From the "Albion" Liverpool paper July 10.

THE FRENCH IN ALGERIA.—Lord Palmerston's speech at Tiverton, in which he was committed by the French army in Africa was severely censured, has raised a tempest of wrath in Paris. Most of the journals are furious at the idea of Frenchmen being accused of inhumanity in war, and make up the annals of our Indian conquests to find missiles to cover us with confusion. The *tu quoque* style of defence will not do here. The French government has pompously set forth, in the official columns of the *Moniteur*, the number of ravages executed by French troops, and the journals have all quoted them amidst acclamations of joy. Now a *redia* is the surrounding of a village (often in *nocturne*) by a strong body of troops, butchering the inhabitants, firing their dwellings, taking the way their entile, and carrying their women and children into slavery. Is this a system of honourable, manly, or human warfare? Is it not rather a system worthy only of savages?—The French journals are furious because they have the grace to feel ashamed that the world should be made acquainted with acts so atrocious. Lord Palmerston struck home, because there was no denying the truth of his statements.—(Sun of Thursday.) The speech of Lord Palmerston at Tiverton has put our French contemporaries absolutely beside themselves with rage. The *Commerce* and the *National*, of Wednesday, set no bounds to the outpouring of their wrath. The *National* denounces us as a nation of assassins, to whom the knife is more familiar than the sword in the subjugation of our enemies.

We received by the *Chalco*, English papers to the 10th July, at which period the elections had terminated in the United Kingdom, with the exception of those for 5 Counties, viz—4 in Ireland and 1 in England. The returns are stated to be as follows—

With such a majority the accession of the Tories to office seems to be placed beyond a doubt. Lord Alperth (a Cabinet Minister) and Lord Milton lost their election for the County of Yorkshire, and two Tories Messrs. Wiles and Donk were returned. Mr. O'Connell and his nominee Mr. Hutton were ejected from Dublin (City) and two Tories elected. Mr. O'Connell has been returned for the County of Cork, by a majority of 868 over his Tory opponent. As rats will always leave a falling house, the Tories calculate that on receiving the seals of office, at least 20 members will rat over to them and swell their majority to 100.

The following extract is from the 'Liverpool Mercury' of 17th July.

THE GENERAL ELECTION.

According to the accounts which we have received up to yesterday evening, the members returned from England, Scotland, and Ireland, including the double return from Theford, are 630, leaving 29 still to be accounted for. Of the members returned, counting the return from Theford on both sides, 273 are Reformers, and 357 Tories, giving the Tories a majority of 84. The Reformers have gained 73 seats, of which 32 are in English boroughs, one in the Welsh counties, one in the Scotch burghs, two in the Scotch counties, and one in the Irish boroughs. The Tories have gained 73 seats, of which 37 are in the English and Welsh boroughs, 22 in the English counties, two in the Scotch burghs, five in the Scotch counties, five in the Irish boroughs, and two in the Irish counties.

The borough elections in England, Scotland, and Ireland, and the county elections in England, are now completed.

Supposing the Irish and Scotch counties, from which we have still to hear, to stand as they were in the last Parliament, the Tories will have a majority of eight in the new one. This majority, it is probable, will be greatly cut down by election committees hereafter; and it is quite certain to be so, so far as relates to Ireland, for it would be preposterous to suppose that the infamous proceedings which have taken place, and the illegal decisions which have been given at Dublin, Belfast, Waterford, &c. other places, will be countenanced for a moment, even by committees thoroughly Tory in their constitution, but in the meanwhile the majority stands to vote on the Speakership, or the address, or in favour of whatever line of conduct Sir Robert Peel may choose to adopt for three months after the meeting of Parliament; and however infamous the usurpation of many of the members constituting that majority may be, Sir Robert is not the man to stickle at the tools which help him in his purposes.

On the night of the 15th inst., aged 33, JOHN GIBBS, a native of Sunderland.

The deceased was a sober and trustworthy servant, and was in the employ of Mr. Thomas Lewis, stable-keeper, residing in the Plaza del 25 de Mayo. At 8 o'clock on the above mentioned evening, Gibbs left the stables at the corner of the Calle del 25 de Mayo, and had proceeded about 50 yards, when he was knocked down by some heavy weapons and robbed of about 120 dollars, which he had in his pocket. Upon recovering himself he managed to reach his master's house, where surgical assistance was immediately procured, but he died during the night from the injury he had sustained. All information thereon will be thankfully received as above.

In our last we had very special notice of the death of ROBERT BILLINGHURST, Esq., whom those observations we had intended to make.—He was born 23rd February, 1781, and came to this country we believe in the year 1810. He possessed talents of the very first order, and was distinguished as a poet, instance the difficult task he accomplished in translating from Spanish to English the *Canto Lirica de Itustingo* of Don Juan C. Varela, commencing—

"The foundation of time's earnest."
The *Repertoire Americain* in London eulogised the various beauties of this poem, at the same time candidly pointed out its defects.—Billinghurst was equally felicitous in rendering English into Spanish verse.—A short time since, in consequence of some remarks we had made in our journal, he forwarded to us a Spanish version of the beautiful air sung by Clara in Sheridan's opera of "the Duenna," when taking leave of the Convent—

"At an impromptu he had infinite talent. The following he made upon our being absent from home when he had called to see us.
"Tee off been told that Love is light
And leave's his volaries out of sight,
I never thought that saying I was
"Till I had look'd in a stern for you."
Time, however, is a vain destroyer—
"A stern teacher, partial to none,
And friend and foe pass away one by one."
Billinghurst—farewell—you leave behind you many that will ever cherish your memory—farewell—farewell.

Of the family of the deceased, we have to remark that the Billinghursts sprang from Adam de Billinghurst, who founded the town of Billinghurst in Sussex, England, after the battle of Hastings, about the year 1066 or 1070. He was sprung from the noble house of the Counts of Billingshausen, Barons of Normandy, who date back their line to Carlo Magno.
