BUENOS AYRES.

The intelligence of the death of Lavalle has been fully confirmed. The *Gaceta* of yesterday announces the fact.

Respecting the fate of La Madrid, nothing positive is yet known. Two Indians who lately came over the Cordillera, report that before their departure from Chili, a group of about 20 men had reached the first post-house there, in the greatest distress, and that on their passage across they met with nearly 100 dead bodies, upon some of which they found considerable sums in gold.

The last advices from Corrientes, to which quarter attention is now directed, represent Fax and Ferrás as having retreated across the river Corrientes, upon the North bank of which General Echagüe had encamped.

In the Banda Oriental the Rivera government are taking active measures to avert the threatening storm. Among other steps, a general enrolment of males is ordered to be made. Every endeavour is used to restore the confidence of the despondent. General Rosas' camp at Santos Lugares is represented as being about to be broken up by frequent desertions. In proof of this, it is emphatically stated that several of his officers had lately come over to Don Frutos.—The unsophisticated fact is, that the father-in-law of Rico, and two or three more, taken prisoners in Quebracho, and who were on their parole in the encampment, lately made their escape to Las Higueritas.

The attempt of the Montevideo government to throw open the internal navigation of the Uruguay to foreign vessels has failed. The British brig *Nautilus* lately made the experiment, and was sent back by the Commandant of the island of Martin Garcia.

From the *Diario de la Tarde*, of Wednesday last.

"Of the death of the ominous barbarian Lavalle, there is not the least doubt. It has been confirmed by communications received yesterday from the Interior. Thus Divine Providence ever mindful of the cause of the people, has set the seal to its work, by causing to disappear the abominable monster, and the major part of his principal followers, who have perpetrated so many crimes in our country."

"Eleven years of an exterminatory war, in which unitarian vandalism has exhausted all the resources of its ferocity; eleven years of tumults, rebellions and perfidy, all of which were fomented by the murderer of the illustrious Barrego, the sanguinary chief of the abominable horde, who commenced his career of infamy on the fatal 1st December 1828; eleven years of treason, violence and crime against God, against the country, and against man; eleven years of extermination and of desolation, constitute the only legacy which Lavalle, the savage Lavalle, leaves attached to his execrable name and to his detestable memory...."

"People of the Argentine Confederation!—Men of every country, who have witnessed with alarm the bloody and prolonged scene of which our soil has been the theatre! Let us congratulate ourselves; let us congratulate the cause of humanity that this sanguinary hydra, who wished at one blow to decapitate all, in order to lord it over the grave of the human species has disappeared for ever! And you, ye perverse recreant unitarians; you who have taken part in the numberless crimes of the bar-

barous assassin, who has now terminated his infamous career; you, on whose forehead is stamped the mark of public execration, who plunged for ever in the chaos of opprobrium, who bear with you ignominy wherever you may drag out your miserable lives, fly to conceal even your very names, since it is not possible to efface the melancholy remembrance of your ominous existence, so that mankind may at least live without dread and without terror.

"In the mean time, fellow countrymen, faithful federals, our debt of gratitude to the renowned Chief of the Argentine Confederation, Our Illustrious Restorer of the Laws, is augmented. To his incessant vigilance, to his perseverance, intrepidity and talent, to the superiority of his genius, are owing that we now see the country free from the atrocious horde who have so many times threatened to plunge it into an abyss.—What would have become of us and of the country, if the country and ourselves had not seen the good fortune to possess the enlightened Genius of the Great Rosas, whose example inspiring us with the sublime sentiments which found shelter in his breast, conducted us by the path of heroism until our national independence and political liberty were completely secured.

"Argentines!—Let us swear a thousand times to be grateful for such eminent services, and impose upon ourselves the sacred obligation to impress on the hearts of our children the noble name of the *Illustrious Restorer of the Laws*, as an emblem of honor, patriotism, and heroism."

Festival of Saint Martin, Principal Patron of Buenos Ayres.

This anniversary occurred on the 11th inst., and was observed with considerable effect. The government, accompanied by the civil and military authorities, attended Divine Service at the Cathedral. Don Manuel Insaurto, Minister of Finance, represented H. E. the Delegate Governor on the occasion. Dr. Mariano Medrano, Bishop of the Diocese, officiated at High Mass, and the Sermon was preached by the Rev. Domingo Lima—the congregation was very great. The Grenadier company of the Guardia Argentina, with their band and colours, was stationed at the main entrance to the Church.—The customary salutes were fired from the Fort, and the national squadron saluted with 21 guns each at sun-rise, mid-day and sun-set. On firing the first salute, Admiral Brown shifted his flag from the brig General Belgrano to the brig *San Martin*—late *Oscar*—which was very tastefully dressed out with flags and looked extremely well.

The town on the 9th, 10th and 11th, was decorated with flags, and illuminated on those evenings—there were also exhibitions of fire works. The 11th was kept as a close holiday.

In consequence of the news from the Interior, confirming the report of the death of Lavalle, a salute of 21 guns was fired from the Fort, on 9th inst., the bells of the churches rang a merry peal, rockets were discharged, music paraded the streets, and the town was decorated with flags and illuminated in the evening.

The Alameda was tolerably well attended on Sunday afternoon, and a number of equestrians visited the villages in the neighbourhood of town.

The National brigantine of war late General San Martin, is now called the 'Republicano.'

A considerable number of constables have arrived during the week from the northward.

E., have resolved to give another proof, although trifling, of their decided patriotism and federal enthusiasm, and have for that purpose spontaneously subscribed 10,268 dollars currency in aid of the war against the miserable remains of the odious recreant unitarians and their colleague the incendiary tyrant *mulatto bagual* Fructoso Rivera, &c. &c.

The undersigned also congratulates himself in being the medium through which the officers and soldiers of this division, which consists of more than 1500 men, in the highest order and discipline, and filled with enthusiasm, solicit Y. E., that if for the total extermination of the recreant unitarians and of the *bagual* *mulatto* incendiary Frutos Rivera, it is necessary to send troops from this Province, that Y. E. will honor them by selecting them amongst the first for this service, and that they will with pleasure shed their blood for the sacred cause of the Confederation, and for the interesting person of Our Illustrious Restorer of the Laws Brigadier General Juan Manuel de Rosas as the only individual destined to constitute the Argentine Republic, and render it respectable and happy by a durable peace, &c. &c. SAMUEL BLINKHORN.

Sir Robert Peel, gave on 28th July, a dinner to his Constituents at Tanworth, which event has created considerable interest—the speech made by the Right Hon. Baronet on the occasion is lauded by the Tories and assailed by their opponents.

Sir Robert on proposing the health of the Duke of Wellington said—

Gentlemen, having duly honoured the Royal Family, I shall now mention to you the name of the most illustrious subject of Her Majesty—the name of a man of whom I may say, without flattery, he is the most eminent and most distinguished man that has ever been produced in Great Britain. (Loud cheers.) I shall not be betrayed by my feelings of affectionate respect and regard for him into any attempt at doing justice to his character. I need only mention to you the name of Wellington—(Loud cheers)—to ensure, in every country of grateful Englishmen, demonstrations of the most cordial feelings of esteem and admiration. (Continued cheering.) Gentlemen, with three times three, I propose to you the health of the Duke of Wellington. (Loud and continued cheering.)

Mr. W. S. Dugdale, M. P. for North Warwickshire, in his speech when proposing the health of Sir Robert Peel, said—

That Conservative party, they were well aware at the passing of the Reform Bill, numbered but a very few Members—(Hear, hear)—and their opponents imagined, at that time that they could easily annihilate the Conservative party of this country. But they had seen that party growing from very small to very extensive magnitude under the protecting care of their Right Hon. host, (Continued cheering.) It appeared to him (Mr. Dugdale) that the conduct of his Right Honourable Friend in his political tactics assimilated, in a great degree to the conduct of the Noble Duke whose health they had just drunk with so much enthusiasm, in his peculiar campaigns. (Cheers.) The Right Hon. Friend commenced as commander of a very small company. (Cheers.) He entrenched himself, however, in the lines of the British Constitution. (Cheers.) That small company by degrees increased, at the time his fostering care. (Cheers.) He sallied forth from his outposts—gained victory after victory—(Cheers)—and, at last, attacked the enemy with his whole line—(Cheers)—as did the Duke of Wellington in the battle of Waterloo—(Cheers)—and brought forward his resolution of a want of confidence in Her Majesty's Ministers—(Cheers)—carried that resolution—saying, with Wellington, Up Guards, and at 'em!—(Cheers and laughter)—and no single guard was absent from his post. (Prolonged applause.) He carried that resolution by a majority, a glorious one, though small, of an unit, and compelled the government to resort to a dissolution of Parliament—(Cheers)—and they had now seen, from the result of that dissolution, what the sense of the people of this country really was. They were well aware that the facton, as Lord J. Russell had called them, now numbered a majority of 80 or 90 in the House of Commons. (Hear, hear.) His Right Honourable Friend would shortly, by the voices of an united people be placed at the head of the councils of her Majesty. (Loud cheers.) He most cordially congratulated them and the country on the result of the late elections. They had all confidence in his Right Hon. Friend on account of his great ability and his unsullied integrity. (Loud cheers.) Above all they had confidence in his sound Conservative principles. (Hear, hear.) By those principles he would be guided in his government, by those principles would he stand or fall. (Hear, hear.) His Right Hon. Friend had stated on the bustings that he was determined to maintain the institutions of the country, both in Church and State, on their ancient and much venerated foundations. (Hear, hear, hear.) It was on these grounds that he (Mr. Dugdale) had hitherto supported, and would continue to support him, and it was for the maintenance of the principles he had indicated that his Right Hon. Friend would continue to enjoy the confidence of the people of this country. (Hear, hear.) With the greatest satisfaction, he would conclude by proposing the health of their Chairman, Sir Robert Peel. (Continued cheering.)

Sir Robert Peel made a long speech in reply, from which the following is an extract—

"Gentlemen, I am constantly asked what I mean to propose supposing I am called to the administration of affairs? Gentlemen, I will
