BUENOS AYRES.

The National Squadron under the orders of Admiral William Brown, was at anchor close to Montevideo on Wednesday last. That of his opponents commanded by Commodore John H. Coe, was getting ready in that port, and it was said would be ready to sail by Monday next.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE PROVINCE.

Sittings on the 27th ult.

The order of the day having been read for taking into consideration the project of the Committee of Petitions, viz, that each anniversary of the birth-day of H. E. the Governor Juan Manuel de Rosas, should be observed as a *fiesta civica* in gratitude for the important services he has rendered to the Province and to the Argentine Confederation—the Minister of Finance, stated that in compliance with the order of H. E. the Governor of the Province, he begged to place in the hands of the President a note which he requested might be read previous to taking the project into consideration.

The note was in tenor as follows—

Buenos Ayres, October 27, 1841.

The Governor of the Province,
To the Hon. House of Representatives.

MEMBERS REPRESENTATIVES.

Various petitions from the Justices of Peace and federal inhabitants of town and country have been presented to Your Hon. House, soliciting it to grant distinctions of honor to the Citizen General Juan Manuel de Rosas. It is necessary Hon. Representatives carefully to economise the precious right of petition, and reserve it solely for those important emergencies when the welfare of the country is at stake.—Neither can General Rosas consent to the sacrifice of his most cherished invariable republican sentiments to the splendor of benevolent distinctions, for which he feels the highest gratitude, but which he cannot, ought not, and is resolved not to accept. When through him as Governor some of those petitions were addressed to him to be forwarded to your Hon. House, he has returned them, requesting the Justices of Peace to withdraw them, and making notice to the citizens who signed the petitions the powerful reasons by which he is actuated and his unalterable determination. The Governor of the Province steadfast in these principles, relies with confidence that the Hon. Representatives, animated by similar sentiments will deign to order the said petitions to be archived.

God preserve Your Hon. House many years.

JUAN MANUEL DE ROSAS.

The above note having been read the Minister of Finance said—Messrs. Representatives.—The Citizen General Juan Manuel de Rosas, has authorized me to reiterate to the House the sentiments contained in the note just read, also his irrevocable determination not to accept the honorable public demonstrations which have been proposed in celebration of the anniversary day of his birth. The republican principles professed by Citizen General Juan Manuel de Rosas, remove him from all personal aggrandizement; because he is persuaded, that in a Republic, under the representative federal system, there ought to be no influence other than that of the law sanctioned by the Representatives of the People. Similar principles he has on another occasion evinced to the Hon. House of Representatives when it was proposed to confer honors and distinctions of honor to Citizen General Juan Manuel de Rosas and his worthy family.

In the mean time, he is impressed with the deepest gratitude towards the federal citizens, for the sentiments contained in the petitions presented to the House; and considers that such sentiments esteem and approbation of his public conduct from his fellow countrymen, are the *trust recompensa* for a republican. Because, Messrs. Representatives, should he now accept these honors and distinctions, when the time so anxiously desired by the Citizen General Juan Manuel de Rosas, shall arrive for him to retire and enjoy the happiness of private life, the succeeding government will find created an authority—if not superior, at any rate equal to it; therefore consider the embarrassment which so serious a difficulty must cause. This consideration weighed also on the mind of the Citizen General Juan Manuel de Rosas. The government participating in these principles and aware of the serious consequences, cordially coincide in the sentiments expressed by the said Citizen General Juan Manuel de Rosas, at the same time offers its profound gratitude to the federal citizens who have petitioned. The Citizen General Juan Manuel de Rosas, trusts that the Representatives, impressed with the powerful reasons thus alleged, will at the same time that they recognise the benevolent sentiments which have animated the federal citizens to use the right of petition, order that their solicitation be archived.

The President then said, that after what had fallen from the Minister in the name of H. E. the Governor, it was incumbent on the House to suspend the consideration of the order of the day and refer the affair to the Committee of Petitions, which was agreed to after a few remarks from General Manzilla and Señor Baldomero Garcia—the latter highly eulogised the sentiments contained in the note of General Rosas, and said that they gave additional lustre to the elevated and magnanimous principles which characterise that Heroic Republican.

H. E. the Governor Brigadier General Juan Manuel de Rosas, addressed a note under date Buenos Ayres 28th ult., to the House of Representatives of the Province of Cordova, declining to accept the condecorations which that House had voted to him on the 7th August, at the same time expressing his gratitude for such a mark of esteem and approbation of his conduct, adding that neither his principles nor his fixed determination would allow him to accept eminent distinctions which in every epoch of his life he had invariably refused.

General Manuel Corbalan, principal Aid de Camp to the government, addressed a note under date 24th inst., to Don Nicolas Marileo, Vice-President of the establishment of the night's watch, stating that he had the orders of H. E. the Governor of the Province Brigadier General Juan Manuel de Rosas, to inform him that from the 1st January 1842, the watchmen in crying the hour are to substitute the words *Vivid Representacion!* instead of *Viva el Restaurador!*

Official Documents.

The *Cocets* of 20th, 22nd, 23rd and 24th inst., contains details of the discussions in the House of Representatives of the Province at its sittings on the 4th and 21st May, 17th June, and 27th October last. The same paper of the 23rd inst., contains details of donations made to the State in aid of the war against the *barbaje bando unitario.*

Extract from the Circular of Messrs. Drake, Brothers & Co., dated

Havana, August 4, 1841.

"BEEF.—Jerked, South American. Two cargoes have been sold of the Stock which remained on hand at the date of our last, viz:—Hamburg ship Godeffroy which has been retailed at 9¢ ris, and Spanish polacre Rosario, which was bought by the dealers at 9¢ ris. We have had three fresh arrivals, viz., Spanish polacre Intrepida, from Montevideo, with 3900 quintals, Spanish polacre Vencedor, from Montevideo, with 2400 do., and Danish brig Anna Dorothen, with 6000 quintals, from Buenos Ayres, which with the several cargoes already advised, remain unsold; the Stock on Shipboard and in Store we estimate at about 68,000 quintals."

THE CASE OF M'LEOD.

(From the New York Journal of Commerce.)

[Continued on our last.]

Suppose one of the crew goes ashore, whether one of the "volunteers" or not, no matter.

Suppose the authorities seize him on a charge of "murder" committed in an assault made under the orders of his commander, and upon such charge commit him to prison, there to await a Peruvian adjudication of the matter under their laws—which might, for aught he knew, be periodically administered every seven years. How would "Jack" reish the assurance that he should have a fair trial, but that "the law be done?" Will we, who are Americans, say? Would they justify the application of "M'Leod law" by the Chilians or Peruvians against an officer or seaman of one of their nations? It would be a case in point—their territory would have been violated, their citizens slain, their laws outraged, the aggressor is the commander of a national ship of war, his nation responsible for his public acts, a responsibility that may be coured by reprisals, non-compliance, or war. Yet, forsooth, they, the Peruvians or Chilians, choose the dignified method of redressing a national wrong by hanging a poor sailor, one of the ship's company!

Suppose such an event to happen hereafter, and the case of M'Leod to be cited as precedent and authority, why, then, the next time Jack is ordered by his commander to fire a shot, he will turn his quid, look wise, and ask his captain, "if he's sure he's right," "caze," says Jack, "I do not mean to be hung for obeying orders." "Fire!" says the captain, "or I'll hang you for disobedience." Here is a pretty dilemma the lawyers have got Jack into! Yet this is neither more nor less than the result of carrying out the "principle" now applied to M'Leod. Does it work well upon the best of common sense? Let those ask themselves who have suffered themselves to be mystified by long-winded legal arguments and ingenious special pleadings.

It is a farce to send ships of war to sea to protect your citizens in time of peace, if their gallant crews are to be liable to be shot and hung as "murders" for doing their duty in obeying orders without question, when their own country declares in the face of the world that such is the liability she imposes upon them.

The sooner such an absurdity is accounted the better; it cannot be worked out to its ultimate results without reducing national forces to the level of banditti. No civilized nation can permit its application to the meanest soldier or sailor in its service. If she does she reserves not to have a single arm raised for her defence.

The oft-repeated charge that M'Leod brought himself into trouble by his boasting is hardly worth refutation. Suppose one of Commodore Napier's men should board an Egyptian "petti-boat" that he was at the late siege of Acre,

an "outrage" in which thousands of Egyptians lost their lives, all that could be said would be that Jack was indiscreet, but such indiscretion would hardly make him a criminal under Egyptian law.

Letters from Abroad to Kindred at Home.

By Miss Sedgwick.

Miss Sedgwick and her travelling friends landed at Portsmouth on the 4th of June, 1839, and took up their quarters at the George Hotel.

"Everything," she says, "looks novel and foreign to us; the quiet forms of the old, and colorless, the arched, antique gateways; the royal busts niched in an old wall; the very dark coating of the foliage, and the mossy stumps of the trees. We seem to have passed from the fresh, bright youth to the old age of the world. The form and colouring of the people are different from ours. They are stouter, more erect, and more sanguine."

"When I touched English ground I could have fallen on my knees and kissed it; but a wharf is not quite the locale for such a demonstration, and spectators operate like strait jackets upon enthusiasm; so I contented myself with a mental salutation of the home of my fathers, the native land of one of our dearest friends, and the birthplace of 'the bright, the immortal names' that we have venerated from our youth upward."

We remember having seen the same sentiment still more strongly exhibited, without regard to the "locale," viz., the dirty pier at Dover, where a sweet girl in the bloom of youth and beauty, on landing from a long forced detention in France, threw herself on the ground with a flood of tears, and kissed the hard and senseless stones amidst sobs of the most touching expression. But to return to Miss S. and more substantial things:—

"We ate (she records) with Daigety appetites our first English dinner: soup, salmon, mutton-steak, and every thing the best of its kind, and served as in a private gentleman's house, and, alas! with an elegance and accuracy found in few gentlemen's houses in our country. We have plenty of gentlemen, but gentlemen going home for us, are rare birds."

The Isle of Wight embraces Miss Sedgwick—she was almost raving with its beauties. "When we had ascended the hill from Ryde," she says, "and turned off into a green lane, we might have been mistaken for maniacs escaped from Bedlam, or rather, I think, for children going home for a holiday." Again:— "Call it Eden; call it Paradise; and, after all, what conception have we of those Terra Incognita?"

"We diverged at the beautiful village of Shanklin, and walked to Shanklin Chine, a curious fissure, worn, believe, in the hills by a rivulet. The place is as wild as our igiten and the rocks, instead of being overgrown with palmey ferns, maiden's hair, and lichens, like ours, are fringed with sweet peas, wallflowers, stocks, hyacinths, and all growing thick as our own. It is like the best of an old neighbourhood of civilisation. At every step some new object or usage starts up before us; and it strikes us as the more because the people are speaking our own language, and are essentially like our own. In the neighbourhood of our pathway, where the fill had become a mere thread, we had the pleasure of encountering the Halls. They were walking to Bonchurch. We asked leave to join them. You may fancy what a delightful stroll we had with this very pleasant meeting, and such accidental accessions to the lovely scenery as a ship in the distance, a rainbow dropping into the sea, and the notes of a curlew, the first I had ever heard.

History, relating, poetry, are at every moment becoming real, actual. Bonchurch, at a short distance from the road, secluded from it by an interposing elevation, enclosed by a stone wall, and surrounded by fine old trees, their bark coated with moss, is, to a New-World eye, a picture 'come to life.' In my stroll I availed myself of every opportunity of accosting the people, and when I can find any pretext I go into the cottages by the wayside. This, I suppose, is the only way to do so, and may seem to some persons very impertinent. But have you never found inquiries, softened with a certain tone of sympathy, repulsed. Your inferiors in condition are much like children, and they, you know, like dogs, are proverbially said to know

who loves them. I stopped at a little cottage this morning, half smothered with roses, geraniums; &c.; and, on the pretence of looking at a baby, made good my entrance. The little bit of an apartment, not more than six feet by ten, was as neat as possible. Not an article of its scanty furniture looked as if it had been bought by this generation; every thing appeared cared for and well preserved; so unlike corresponding dwellings with us. The woman had nine children; six at home, and all tidily dressed. I have not seen in England a slovenly-looking person. Even the three or four beggars who stealthily asked charity of us at Portsmouth were neatly dressed.

We have by way of Rio Janeiro, news from London to 4th September. The Tories on the amendment to the address had a majority in the House of Commons of 91 votes, upon which the Melbourne Administration resigned office, and the Queen empowered the Duke of Wellington, Sir Robert Peel, and Lord Aberdeen, to form a new Administration, which was effected on the 30th August, as follows—

First Lord of the Treasury—Sir Robert Peel.
Home Department—Sir James Graham.

Foreign—Lord Aberdeen.

Colonies—Lord Stanley.

Chancellor of the Exchequer—Henry Goulburn.

War Secretary—Sir Henry Hardinge.

First Lord of the Admiralty—Earl of Haddington.

Second do.—Sir George Cockburn.

Lord Chancellor—Lord Lyndhurst.

President of the Council—Lord Wharnciff.

Lord Privy Seal—Duke of Buckingham.

Secretary to do.—Lord Elliot.

The Duke of Wellington does not accept office, but of course lends his powerful influence to the new administration.

The Parliament was opened by Commission on the 24th August. That part of the Speech which related to internal affairs, was as follows

"My Lords and Gentlemen,

"We are more especially commended to declare to you the extraordinary expenses which the events in Canada, China, and the Mediterranean have occasioned, and the necessity of maintaining a force adequate to the protection of our extensive possessions, have made it necessary to consider the means of increasing the public revenue. Her Majesty is anxious that such objects should be effected in the manner least burthenome to her people, and it has appeared to her Majesty, after full deliberation, that you may at this juncture properly direct your attention to the revision of duties affecting the productions of foreign countries. It will be for you to consider whether some of those duties are not so trifling in amount as to be unproductive to the revenue, while they are vexatious to commerce. You may further examine whether the principle of protection, upon which others of these duties are founded, be not carried to an extent injurious alike to the interests of the State, and the interests of the people.

"Her Majesty is desirous that you should consider the laws which regulate the trade in corn. It will be for you to determine whether those laws do not aggravate the natural fluctuations of supply, whether they do not embarrass trade, derange currency, and, by their operation, diminish the comfort and increase the privations of the great body of the community.

"Her Majesty feeling the deepest sympathy with those of her subjects, who are now suffering from distress and want of employment, it is her earnest prayer that all your deliberations may be guided by wisdom, and may conduce to the happiness of her beloved people."

The amendment to the address was in both Houses of the following tenor—

"Humbly to represent to her Majesty, that we observe with great concern that the public exchequer has of late, in each of several years, exceeded the annual income, and that we are convinced of the necessity of adopting measures for the purpose of remedying so great an evil.

"To assure her Majesty that we are deeply sensible of the importance of these considerations, to which her Majesty has been graciously pleased to direct our attention, and to the commerce and revenue of the country, and to the laws which regulate the trade in corn.

"That, in deciding the course which it may be advisable to pursue with reference to such matters, it will be our earnest desire to consult the interest and promote the welfare of all classes of her Majesty's subjects.

"That we feel it to be our duty humbly to submit to her Majesty that it is essential to the satisfactory results of our deliberations upon these and other matters of public concern that her Majesty's government should possess the confidence of this House and of the country, and respectfully to represent to her Majesty that that confidence is not reposed in the present advisers of her Majesty.

"To assure her Majesty that in the gracious expression of her Majesty's deep sympathy with those of her subjects who are now suffering from distress and want of employment, we re-

cognize an additional proof of her Majesty's tender regard for the welfare of her subjects, and that we cordially join in the prayer of her Majesty, that all our deliberations may be guided by wisdom, and may conduce to the happiness of her people."

This amendment was carried by a majority of 72 in the House of Lords, and 91 in the House of Commons.

A most impressive funeral sermon in reference to the event, was preached on Sunday morning last, at the British Episcopal Church, by the Rev. John Armstrong. The Rev. Gentleman took his discourse from the 4th Chapter of the 2nd Book of Timothy, 7th and 8th verse.

Thus has society in Buenos Ayres, been deprived of one of its most estimable members, and ourselves of a kind and attentive friend, whom for many years we were in the daily habit of seeing. He has left a widow and one child to deplore their great loss.
