BUENOS AYRES.

We are most happy to be able to announce that the authority of the laws, momentarily dis-owned, in our at other times proverbially well ordered and quiet city, has been again acknowledged, and that order, is now entirely restored, through the energetic efforts measures adopted by the government.

So far as we have been able to ascertain, the effects of the fearful crisis, which has just past, we confidently hope never to return, have been confined to the native inhabitants, and that in no case has any foreign resident been injured in his person or property.

There has doubtless been much exaggeration in respect to the number who have fallen.

We again repeat that order is entirely restored, and orders have been issued to arrest and imprison the perpetrators of the outrages, which have held all classes in consternation.

The Gazets of yesterday was published in two sheets. It contained a number of documents from the Interior Provinces, which we have not time to notice this week except the following from General Oribe.

To H. E. the Governor Brigadier General Juan Manuel de Rosas.

Head Quarters at the Estancia de Morales, April 9, 1842.

My esteemed and kind friend,

Letters I have just received from Salta, which referring to orders from *Otosi*, announce amongst various things, the following.—Here as in all the other cantons of this Republic, great excitement prevails amongst the emigrants, because it is said that an order has been issued from the Supreme Council of the Department of La Paz, of which Señor Urquiza is President, ordering them to retire to the Valles of Cochabamba, or in default thereof to quit the Republic. General Pedernera has been sent out of the Republic and has embarked at Tacna. There is a private order that should the second Madrid move from his present residence at Chuquisaca, to arrest him."

The Ball on the 6th inst., at the department of the *Serenos*, in celebration of the anniversary of the birth day of H. E. the Governor Don Juan Manuel de Rosas, and that on the 12th at the department of Police, in celebration of the anniversary of the installation of H. E. as Governor of the Province, were conspicuous for their splendor and the universal happiness they diffused. The banquets at each of them were superb, the tables were laid out with every delicacy that could be procured, in viands, confectionary, wines, liquors, &c., and dancing was kept up until day-break on the succeeding mornings. The attendees at both was numerous in the extreme, and included Doña. Manuela Rosas daughter of H. E. the Governor, and the principal native ladies and gentlemen of this Capital, as also the Foreign Ministers and Agents, officers of the French vessels of war, and of the United States corvette *Dacota*, and a great number of foreign residents. The local at the Police de-

partment admitted of greater display, therefore the decorations and arrangements were upon a more extensive scale, and threw around an air of enchantment. Vacani, too, enlivened the scene by singing some of his favorite arias.

The 13th inst., was the anniversary of the installation of Brigadier General Juan Manuel de Rosas, as Governor and Captain General of the Province. It was kept as a close holiday in Buenos Ayres, and salutes were fired at sunrise, mid-day and sun-set, from the encampment at Santos Lugares de Rosas, the battery near the Retiro, the National vessels of war off the *Recolota*, and from the Boca. The *Foz* saluted with 21 guns at noon and had its flag flying all day. The Victoria Theatre in the evening was crowded in the extreme to witness the amateur performance.

On the 12th and 13th the public offices and town were decorated with flags, and illuminated on those evenings. The daily papers were not published on the 13th.

A salute of 21 guns was fired from the Fort at 4 p.m. on the 11th inst., in consequence of the news from Entre Rios.

The effigies of Rivera, Paz and Lopez, were burnt pursuant to the following notice published in the daily papers.

VIVA LA FEDERACION!

Rosas, Independencia 6 Muerte!

Mueran los asquerosos salvajes unitarios!

The officers and citizens of the second battalion of infantry of the Patriotics, in celebration of the anniversary of the installation of Our Illustrious Restaurator of the Laws, the Hero of the Desert and Heroic Defender of American Independence, Brigadier General Juan Manuel de Rosas, in command of the Province, invite the federals of both sexes to attend on the evening of the 13th inst., in the vicinity of the private residence of H. E., to witness the burning of the effigies of the odious unitarians the mulatto Frutos Rivera, the base traitor *mance* José Maria Paz, and the despicable infamous vile traitor *Masacrita* Juan Pablo Lopez—as also an exhibition of fireworks at half past 7 in the evening. Buenos Ayres, April 10, 1842.

H. E. the Governor of the Province of Salta Don Miguel Otero, arrived in town on Tuesday last, and took up his residence in the Calle del 25 de Mayo, at the same house in which resided General Aldao.

Official Documents.

The Gazeta during the last fortnight has contained details of various donations to the State of money, &c., in aid of the war against the unitarians.

Buenos Ayres, April 10, 1842.

MY DEAR SIR,

But it becomes me also, as the Minister of Christ, to beseech you to look unto the only source of true blessings; and to give your hearts and affections and your lives unto Him that hath loved us and given himself for us.

To me no thanks are due. To serve you faithfully and zealously, was my solemn duty and commission, my highest privilege and chiefest joy. I wish most unfeignedly that I had done so more efficiently. It is for me then to offer incessant praise to God for the opportunity which I have so long enjoyed of ministering to a flock so kindly disposed and so affectionately considerate.

I gratefully acknowledge your very kind wishes for my future welfare and usefulness. It has been, I trust, by the guidance of Divine Providence that I have been led to resign my pastoral charge over you, and which Providence, I feel assured, will direct my steps throughout life.

And I do with most unfeigned thankfulness acknowledge the token of remembrance and affection, which has, at the same time, been presented, in the name of the Ladies of my congregation, to Mrs. Armstrong, who, I am sure, will value greatly this very kind proof of their regard and esteem.

My prayer unto God for you all without ceasing shall be, that you may always possess a sound, enlightened and pious attachment to the Services and Doctrines of our Holy Apostolic Church, and that your life and habits may ever adorn your Christian profession.

"Finally, brethren, farewell. Be perfect, be of good comfort, be of one mind, live in peace; and the God of love and peace shall be with you."
