BUENOS AYRES.

By way of antidote to the portraits of torments and faithless dealing we drew in our last, we deem the following letter published in the Bolivian paper "Restaurador" as highly important. The contrast between the frank and dignified conduct of General Rosas and the habitual duplicity of Rivera cannot, certainly, be more strikingly illustrated than by a comparison of the high principle exhibited in this letter with the general tenor of the facts we alluded to in our last.

Buenos Ayres, January 12, 1842.
SEÑOR GENERAL MANUEL OBRIBO,
My dear Friend,

I will proceed at once to reply to you with reference to the overtures of the Gentlemen you have mentioned, who state that in certain Provinces of Bolivia they desire Federation; that they speak of our country with respect and interest; and moreover that it would be an excellent opportunity for the Argentine government to re-annex Tarija, and promote the spirit of Federation in those Provinces, which would greatly benefit the commerce of the Argentine Republic and the National Cause of Federation. This they have in substance urgently written to me directly: therefore I hasten to give you this reply, so that you may transmit it to them, because every thing of the kind has always been as it is now in opposition to my political principles, and to my private character. Thus it is that what I now say and what follows, on speaking with regard to Chili and Bolivia, I wrote to General Pacheco, in a letter dated 17th November 1841, in replying to him respecting the intelligence he conveyed to me from both those States.

You may therefore tell them—That neither I, nor can I, nor can this government whilst I am at its head, and as such, charged with the Foreign Affairs, be disposed to concur in such views—That our duty is to sympathise in the misfortunes of a neighbouring and friendly Sister Republic; and to preserve in its domestic dissensions the neutrality prescribed by international law, without failing as far as possible to discriminate between our enemies and our friends and place ourselves on our guard against the latter—That it is none of our business to interfere whether its form of government be that of Unity or Federation—And that as it respects Tarija, it would not be worthy of the Argentine Republic to re-annex it now by force, or claim our rights at a time when Bolivia is in misfortune and involved in anarchy—That this should be the result of peace, through the means of pacific, dignified and honorable negotiation, in which by agreement it may be restored, which will not be difficult to effect, when Bolivia finds herself in perfect tranquillity presided over by a just and truly friendly government, with which we can likewise form a treaty of limits and commerce, as those very gentlemen who have written to me desire—a treaty which can and ought to be reciprocally advantageous and of great importance to both Republics—That an Argentine Minister will opportunely set out, in order to go on gradually preparing things for this purpose—That the war with Santa Cruz, was not against Bolivia, but against him, in consequence of the invasions which he fomented against the Argentine Republic, his league with the miscreant Brazilians, and the establishment of the Peru-Bolivian Confederation, which in every sense destroyed the balance of the States of this Continent, and undermined in every shape the basis of Republican government.

The *Gaceta* of Tuesday last contained three sheets of closely printed matter, comprising numerous documents relative to public events during the last few months, amongst which the intercepted correspondence between Paz and Nuñez, and two Correntino officials, Señores Derqui and Leiva, during the temporary ascendancy of their party in Corrientes, is certainly not the least important. Both Paz and Nuñez show themselves very indignant at the rapacity of Rivera, and communicate to each other their fears of being betrayed by him. Señor Derqui says that "Rivera never was their ally, but their enemy throughout." Señor Leiva signifies the fact of Rivera having applied for British mediation as highly disgraceful to him, whatever might be the result of the step. These Corrientinos seem to have a deeply rooted antipathy to every thing bearing the name of English. Under Baron de Estrada, it will be remembered, they wished to prevail on General Rosas to consign the English treaty to the flames.

A Treaty of Peace has been concluded between Peru and Bolivia, on the basis of the reciprocal relinquishment of their respective claims of pecuniary indemnity for expenses of war, incurred by the one on account of the invasion of Santa Cruz, and by the other in consequence of that of Gamara. The Bolivian army has, in pursuance of this arrangement, begun to evacuate the Peruvian territory. We are sorry to add that scarcely had the treaty been signed when a revolution against General La Fuente, headed by General San Roman, broke out in the Peruvian army.

The two last numbers of the *Anglo-Riverian* paper at Montevideo contain little else but abuse of General Rosas. It has caused infinite disgust both here and in Montevideo, and is as discreditably to those who have countenanced its publication, as it is little calculated to favour the cause they profess to support.

Rarely has Buenos Ayres witnessed a more interesting scene than the reception given to Admiral Brown on Friday the 9th inst., upon his return from his victorious expedition to the Farant. The town, the alameda, and also the beach for a considerable distance on each side of the Fort (the colours of which were hoisted), were decorated with flags, and *carac* *co* *carac* was roared at various fires kindled for that purpose on the alameda. Military music as well as the gentlemen of the orchestra of the Victoria Theatre were in attendance—the spectators on the beach and its vicinity were immense—amongst whom were many ladies. The Admiral came to the inner roads in the National schooner of war Ninth July, where she was visited by Dona Manuela Rosas, daughter of H. E. the Governor, and several ladies, including the lady of the Admiral, as also by the Chief of Police, the Captain of the Port, Colonel Mariano Maza, Commandant Aguilar, and other military officers, and a number of Orientals, all of whom had gone on board from government and private boats; in one of the former Admiral Brown took his place to come on shore. When the boat which contained the hero neared the landing place, guns were fired, rockets in profusion were discharged, music played, the bells rang, the people cheered, and all was joy and enthusiasm. At this moment an amusing scene took place—a crowd of laundresses, each carrying a flag, surrounded the Admiral and overwhelmed him with cries and congratulations. He was in full uniform, and appeared to be in excellent health

and spirits. An open carriage, on each side of which Federal flags were planted, was in waiting, and in which (after partaking of a banquet at the Marine Office) he took his seat, with his lady on his right and Dona Manuela Rosas on his left. The procession was then marshalled and moved on to the private residence of the Governor, accompanied by the music before mentioned. In the procession were several carriages, and a portion of the *Sociedad Popular Restauradora*. At night some splendid fireworks were exhibited on the Alameda and two edifices were burnt, the town was illuminated, and dancing was kept up until a late hour at the house of H. E. the Governor Don Juan Manuel de Rosas.

The weather throughout these festivities was exceedingly fine, which gave additional zest to them.

MARKET.

The business doing in manufactured goods since our last market has not so extensive as in the preceding week, but this is attributable in many holders, which will no doubt be realized on the least active demand, as supplies of staple articles are decreasing.

The sales of iron drillings and hutchings for the summer demand, which have come to our knowledge, have been made in many instances at very low prices.

The demand for this port has become dull; the stock landed at this port, and that is estimated at 16,000 barrels, and the prices quoted last week cannot now be obtained.

In Mediterranean produce we have nothing to report; prices of Red Catalonia Wine tend downwards and the dealers talk of 900 dollars per pipe or under for the next arrivals; this is in some measure accounted for by the sale of a quantity of French cargo Claret lately arrived from Bordeaux at 375 dollars per hoghead; of the same cargo sales were made of Claret in this city at 400 dollars per 1 doz., and Brandy 34 at 1550 dollars per pipe.

The same good demand exists for Brazil produce as noticed in our last and prices are fully supported.

The stock of American and Baltic Lumber is rather large in second hands and laid in at high prices, but good assortments will bring 750 dollars per mil delivered.

There have been no arrivals of suit and prices tend upwards.

Produce has been easier to buy and the transactions although limited in salted hides have been to some extent in dry for the German and French markets. Light for North America are lower but the stock is not heavy.

There is an active demand for mixed horse hair at 42 dollars 4 rils, and for weszito sheep skins and wool for the French market.

Nutria skins are dull of sale at our last quotations, but there are several parcels held on speculation for much higher rates in the hope that the price will rise as it increases their value in the European and American market.

Tallow although scarce can be purchased, pure at 31 dollars, and mixed at 27 to 28 dollars.

In Cordova wools we hear of nothing doing. The transactions in rights are very limited, but there is little doubt they will improve as the season advances; the rate coincides as at our last.
