THOMAS DALY.

We have received English papers to the 20th August—they contain copious details of the disturbances in the manufacturing districts in England, where a "strike" had taken place amongst the operatives, the cry being "higher wages" and the "People's Charter." They destroyed various manufactories, &c., and lodged those who had not joined them and were at work to quit their labor. These proceedings commenced in Manchester, and thence extended to Yorkshire, Nottingham, &c., but from the exertions of the Magistracy, the peaceful inhabitants and the military, order had been restored at Manchester, the people had returned to their work, and there was little doubt that such would soon be the case in the other districts. Troops had arrived from all quarters, particularly from Ireland, and were obliged on some occasions with the sanction of the civil power to fire upon the mob, by which several persons were killed and wounded.

The discontented issued a number of inflammatory placards and held meetings, in which resolutions of the same nature were voted.—Other printed addresses were however issued, from one of which we make the following extract—

"Why, may I ask, have you allowed yourselves to be turned out of work? Just at the very moment when trade was beginning to take a turn for the better; just as the time was approaching which all (both masters and men) have been looking for during the last five years; when the privations and sufferings of the poor—and God knows, they have suffered much—were about to give way to a better state of things; and masters were indulging the hope that they might yet be spared the pain of losing their capital, and continue to give employment, and, in the end, better wages; when harvest prospects are so fully before you, giving an assurance of greater abundance than we have known for years; at this very moment, when the time, as I may almost say, a certainty of amendment, you have allowed a set of mis-guided men, acting upon their own selfish and misguided views, to come to your factories and workshops, and turn you and your wives and children into the street, in order to excite you against those masters who have been, to a certain extent, fellow-sufferers in the declining trade of the last few years—why, I ask you, have you allowed them to serve you thus? If, when they had come to your mills for so unworthy a purpose, you had turned out, and given them a good re-lieking" (as you know we call it in Lancashire), this would have been a turn-out worthy of you, and they would soon have taken to their heels, and found their way home again, for such feelings are always counteracted, and would let me tell you, in not doing this, and would at the present moment have been at work, and in possession of wages for yourselves and families."

The subjoined proclamation had been issued, "Victoria R.—Whereas in divers parts of Great Britain great multitudes of lawless and disorderly persons have lately assembled themselves together in a riotous and tumultuous manner, and have, with force and violence, entered into certain mines, mills, manufactories, and other places, and have, by threats and intimidation, prevented our good subjects therein employed from following their usual occupations and earning their livelihood; we therefore,

being duly sensible of the mischievous consequences which must inevitably ensue, as well to the peace of the kingdom as to the lives and properties of our subjects, from such wicked and illegal practices if they go unpunished, and being firmly resolved to cause the laws to be put in execution for the punishment of such offenders, have thought fit, by the advice of our Privy Council, to issue this proclamation, hereby strictly commanding all justices of the peace, sheriffs, under-sheriffs, and all other civil officers whatsoever within the said kingdom, that they do their utmost endeavours to discover, apprehend, and bring to justice the persons concerned in the riotous proceedings above mentioned; and, as a further inducement to discover the said offenders, we do hereby promise and declare, that any person or persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered or apprehended, the authors, abettors, or perpetrators of any of the outrages above mentioned, so that they or any of them may be duly convicted thereof, shall be entitled to the sum of fifty pounds for each and every person who shall be so convicted, and shall also receive our most gracious pardon for the said offence in case the person making such discovery as aforesaid shall be firmly resolved to prosecute for the same.—Given at our Court at Windsor, the thirteenth day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty two, and in the sixth year of our reign.—God save the Queen.

The Parliament was prorogued on the 12th August, by the Queen in person, who was loudly cheered by the people both in going to and returning from the House.

The following is the Queen's speech.

"My Lords and Gentlemen,

"The state of public business enables me to release you from further attendance in Parliament.

"I cannot take leave of you without expressing my grateful sense of the assiduity and zeal with which you have applied yourselves to the discharge of your public duties during the whole course of a long and most laborious session.

"You have had under your consideration measures of the greatest importance connected with the financial and commercial interests of the country, calculated to maintain the public credit, to improve the national resources, and, by extending trade, and stimulating the demand for labour, to promote the general and permanent welfare of all classes of our subjects.

"Although measures of this description have necessarily occasioned much of your attention, you have at the same time effected great improvements in several branches of jurisprudence, and in laws connected with the administration of domestic affairs.

"I return you my especial acknowledgments for the renewed proof which you afforded me of your loyalty and affectionate attachment by your ready and unanimous concurrence in an Act for the increased security and protection of my person.

"I continue to receive from all Foreign Powers assurances of their friendly disposition towards this country.

"Although I have deeply to lament the reverses which have befallen a division of the army to the westward of the Indus, yet I have the satisfaction of reflecting that the gallant defence of Assaibund, crowned by a decisive victory in the field, has eminently proved the courage and discipline of the European and native troops, and the skill and fortitude of their distinguished commander.

"Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

"The liberality with which you have granted the Supplies, to meet the exigencies of the public service, demands my warm acknowledgments.

"My Lords and Gentlemen,

"You will concur with me in the expression of humble gratitude to Almighty God for the favourable season which His bounty has vouchsafed to us, and for the prospects of a harvest more abundant than those of recent years.

"There are, I trust, indications of gradual recovery from that depression which has afflicted many branches of manufacturing industry, and has exposed large classes of my people to privations and sufferings, which have caused me the most anxious concern.

"You will, I am confident, be actuated on your return to your several countries by the

MARKET.

There has been active demand this week for new goods suitable for the summer season, and considerable sales have been effected at advanced prices, whilst no improvement has been taken place in staple articles.

The demand for flour has been limited and sales difficult to effect at a decline on former rates.

Mediterranean produce is rising—sales of a cargo from Cadiz, Red wine 970 dollars, and sweet Malaga 1180 dollars, Brandy 1750 dollars, Oil 72 dollars per arroba, with an active demand and an expectation of increased rates.

We have no arrivals from the United States and no sales to report.

In Brazil produce there has been little doing—Rum and good Yerba Mateo are wanted, other articles are lower.

There have been extensive sales of French fancy goods, the competition for which has caused extreme prices to be paid.

In Produce extensive operations of light dry hides at 52 dollars for North America, and 55 to 56 dollars for Spain. In heavy hides nothing doing, the stocks are large and accumulating.

Wool, Sheep skins and Nutria, are easier to buy but not lower.

Sales of Tallow at 30 dollars, and offers for good Grease 27 dollars against 28 dollars asked; both these articles are scarce and no decline can take place for some time hence.

Nothing doing in Freight.

The Acquapulo for Liverpool, and Jean Baptiste for orders, have been fixed at rates which have not transpired.

The demand for Salt is extremely limited at the prices quoted.
