BUENOS AYRES.

President Oribe has addressed, under date of the 17th inst., a circular to the foreign agents in Montevideo, together with a copy of the following decree issued by him in his quality of legal President of the Oriental State:—

“The President, &c.,

“Considering—1st. That it is necessary to employ all the means of hostility which the law of nations permits and the peculiar circumstances in which the country is placed counsel, against the infamous rebels, the recant Unitarians, who are sheltered in the town of Montevideo perpetrating on its unfortunate inhabitants every species of atrocities;

2dly. That the development of these means in all their vigour is not only a military and political resource but also a humane one, in order to abbreviate the term of the calamities consequent on a state of war;

3dly. That the unavailing, barbarous, and hopeless resistance which the aforesaid rebels, the ruthless Unitarians, are attempting, subjects them to the consequences of all the evils the country endures, and renders them unworthy of any kind of consideration, has ordered and decreed:

Art. 1. From this date all communication between the other inhabitants of the Republic and the town of Montevideo is absolutely prohibited.

Art. 2. The introduction of all kinds of provisions into the said town, whether by water or by land, is likewise prohibited in the same manner.

Art. 3. This measure shall be rendered effectual by all the public means at my disposal.

Art. 4. The infringers of this decree shall incur the penalties established by law.

Art. 5. Let it be communicated to all whom it may concern.

In unison with this measure, we understand that the Argentine Government have transmitted orders to Admiral Brown to prevent from the 1st of April ensuing, the introduction by water of beef of all kinds, live stock, and other principal articles of contraband of war. During the whole progress of this contest, the Buenos Ayres Government have respected neutral commercial interests even to a fault, in not making use of their full belligerent rights, although possessing the most ample means for this purpose. It is a notorious fact that the port of Montevideo might have long since been blockaded by the Argentine squadron with the most perfect right, and in the most effectual manner, had not the consideration of the injury likely to be inflicted on foreign commerce had more weight in the councils of General Urquiza than in those of his enemies. Even now, when the rash obstinacy of the Riveristas in Montevideo

would seem to authorize the most extreme measures, the Argentine squadron is only empowered to prevent what it were ridiculous to expect that a belligerent should for a moment tolerate. Private interest often successfully disguises itself with the cloak of humanity; but in the state to which things have now arrived in Montevideo, the conduct of those who would protract the general suffering by merely making a longer unavailing resistance to be made, would assuredly be ascribed by a true philanthropist to anything but a really humane motive.

During the last few days General Oribe had made several reconnaissances close up to the fortifications, the object of which is supposed to have been to enable the engineers to select the ground for the works they were instructed to raise.

In the town the Riveristas continue to improve upon their system of exactions. Neutral, in order to be allowed to keep open their stores and workshops, are obliged to take out every week a new license; and, as if the privations to which a state of siege necessarily reduces the population were not sufficiently pressing, an ‘impot of one rial in the dollar has been laid upon all the bakers’ bread daily consumed.

In a late number of the Anglo-Riverista journal, the following announcement is made that the clique have repudiated their organ. The ‘Britannia’ is, consequently, now issued for the sole account and risk of the Editor.

THE COMET.

On the 28th ult. and 5th inst., the comet has been seen in Rio Janeiro under similar circumstances in most respects as with ourselves. It is there thought to be the comet seen in Europe some five or six months ago, which was expected to come to its perihelion towards the close of last year, and had a retrograde motion. The Rio observers, before this time must have seen that this comet’s motion is according to the order of the signs, and this circumstance alone will shew them that they were mistaken.

Since our last we have observed it almost every evening gradually diminishing in the length of its tail, but nothing in brightness. On the 19th, at 8 p. m., the stars δ and ϵ Eridani were emerging under the northern side of the tail.

The 20th, at 9h 30m. p. m., the comet eclipsed the star ϵ Eridani, and consequently their right ascension and declination were the same.

QUEEN VICTORIA.

A very pleasing example of royal toleration, reflecting infinite credit on the sound judgment and kind heart of England's beloved Queen, was lately, and as related at our Unitarianist Leaders' meeting at Louth, last Monday night (having previously been the subject of the gratulations of the Wesleyan Conference), was to this effect:—A young female domestic of the royal household, being recently met by the physician, was asked what was the matter with her, as it struck him from her appearance she must be labouring under a worse than bodily grievance—some mental anguish had rendered her aspect very different from what it usually is.

The female replied, she was sorry to say she had been dismissed from Her Majesty's service. On being pressed for the reason, she stated it to be on account of her religion; having felt a concern for her soul, she had ventured to unite herself with the Methodists; that had offended her superior, and led to her dismissal. This coming to Her Majesty's knowledge, the superior servant was questioned on the subject, and admitted that she turned away the female because she was a Methodist. The Queen expressed her sorrow that the lady interrogated should have been led to take so austere a step with regard to her inferior; adding, "It would pain her exceedingly were any class of her subjects to suffer on account of their religion; more particularly if such should be the case in her own household. If either party was dismissed, Her Majesty thought it should be the person who could not so liberally to one who an enlightened conscience; she must inform that person, that she had no farther occasion for her services." The first discarded female was restored.—Stanford Mercury.

The treaty with China promises immense advantages to the United Kingdom. Some differences of opinion existed at Peking regarding the propriety of granting the demands of the English. The high officers of the State concurred with the Emperor, but his mother and others were averse to his decision.

The following is a copy of an important part of the treaty:—

1. After the definitive treaty of peace, is signed, the emperor will graciously allow the merchants of the English nation to bring their families and dwell on the coasts of Canton, and Pukien, at Amoy, Ningpo, and Shanghai; and as the five ports a free trade shall be permitted; the English consular sending to the said five places consuls to manage affairs, and to correspond on equal terms, with the Chinese officers at these five places.

2. English merchant vessels arriving after a long voyage, and having sustained damage, a price is to be allowed to them to repair their damages, and materials are to be supplied; and as the emperor has conferred on the sovereign of England, in perpetuity, the island of Hongkong, H. B. M. is to appoint proper authorities to conduct the government of the island.

3. The emperor abolishes the Hong monopoly, and permits the English merchants to trade with whom they like; and as the former Hong merchants are greatly in debt to English merchants, and unable to pay, \$3,000,000 have been appropriated to liquidate these debts, which sum will be paid by the Chinese officers.

The rest refers to the payment of import and export duties of the 31 millions of dollars, and the retirement of the British force from Ningpo, &c.—Canton Register.

A newspaper in the English language has for some time been published at Hongkong, and is styled the "Herald" being built there by the Exter. Mr. Phillips, a son of the Bishop of Bristol, was one of the most active persons in raising subscriptions for its erection. The presses had already arrived, and the Hongkong Gazette says—That they are talented and beautiful, and that from the superfluity of the scenery intended to be introduced at the new theatre, the chasteness and variety of the performances, and the assemblage of rank, beauty and fashion, which will attend, there is no doubt but that the blaze of splendour will dazzle the eyes of all beholders.

In consequence of the Peace the Emperor of China had ordered all the Chinese militia to return to their homes, and Courts of Enquiry, to report upon those of his troops who had behaved bravely, and to reward the English, and otherwise, so that the brave might be rewarded and the coward punished.

H. B. M.'s ship Benlueh, 78 guns, Captain Sir Thomas Herbert, K.C.B. (late of the Calcutta) sailed from China in November, for England, where, no doubt, further honours await his bravery and talent.

PAT'S POTATOES.

After an absence of several years with her liege lord in England, she returned with him to reside for a time on one of their Irish estates.
