BUENOS AYRES.

MONTVIDEO has been during the last few days the scene of an *emete* after the fashion of those which, of late years, have so often disturbed the tranquillity of the French capital. The chief actors in this affair have been a few of those restless Frenchmen whom M. Lamarine so justly characterised, not long since, in the *tribune* of the Chamber of Deputies; and the object of the movement appears to be as ridiculous as that of many of the model demonstrations in Paris. The tri-coloured flag has been paraded through the streets followed by a miscellaneous crowd singing the *Marseillaise* and other popular songs, and vociferating cries against the French Consul for his exertions to keep his countrymen within the bounds of neutrality during the present contest. In this state of uproar the mob were conducted by their leaders to the line of fortifications where a formal tender of their services was made to General Paz, who, of course, eagerly accepted it. A French commandant was immediately elected, who set about organising a corps; but the excitement having somewhat abated, the reflection that the forfeiture of French citizenship would be the infallible consequences of their folly, operated as an effectual sedative to the ardor of the greater part of the mobility, whose prudence finally got the better of their pugnacity.

Fortunately those French enthusiasts met with no sympathy among the other portions of the foreign population, except among a few *Young Italy* men, who, as in the good old days of the Republic, cordially fraternised with them on this occasion. But if our own countrymen were not involved in such disgraceful proceedings, which bid fair to render the name of foreigner odious in these countries, it was not because they had the advantage of, and were docile to, the counsel of such clear-sighted and dispassionate men as Admiral Maissieu de Clerval and M. Pichon—it was their own native good sense alone that kept them aloof. This must be evident to every one who has observed with any attention the series of transactions which has taken place since the departure of Mr. Hood from Montevideo, and more particularly since the arrival of H. M.'s ship *Alfred* in these waters. If any other proof were wanting, it would be found in the inflammatory language

employed by the print professing to be the organ of the British commercial interest in Montevideo. The *Britannia*—in referring to a circular of the Riverista Government threatening to expel all foreigners who do not take up arms—after a tirade against the Argentine Government and its pretensions to interdict the introduction of provisions and munitions of war into the besieged capital, thus, with unblushing effrontery, exclaims:—

“Our only alternative, and it is useless to think of finding any other, for the great majority is to remain where we are, to close with the terms of the National Government, to take up arms and do military service on behalf of the country, to save ourselves, our wives, our children, and our fortunes, from famine, murder and ruin.”

Such perfidious counsel, though given within the hearing of a British Commodore and a British Pro-Consul, has been however, we are happy to record, indignantly spurned by the sound judgment of the British population. It is thus that the true dignity of our national character is best upheld; and it is thus only that it can escape unscathed, in as far as the conduct of private individuals is concerned, from the ordeal to which it has been subjected in the affairs of the Rio de la Plata.

THE COMET.

The comet, according to the anticipation contained in our last, has disappeared. In our next number, we hope to give the results of some calculations which are being made relative to our late visitor.

Official Documents.

The *Gaceta*, of 27th, 28th, and 30th ult., contains numerous public documents, official and otherwise, the major part of which we have more or less noticed. Among these documents is the reply of the House of Representatives of the Province to the Message of the Government, the official account of the battle of Arroyo Grande, and details from General Benavides, relative to the defeat of Pofalosa, (alias Chaco) who in January last had, with 600 men, made an incursion into some provinces of the north.

The Committee for regulating the price of beef, in a note to the Government dated 9th January, propose that it should remain at three dollars the arroba, for the six months ending 30th June, 1843.

Various commissioners for the collection of the Contribution Directa, have made over to the Government the 1 per cent. commission to which they were entitled, in aid of the war. Several other donations for the same end have also been published in the *Gaceta*.

A notice from the Collector-General's office, states, that no valuation had been made for the payment of the Contribution Directa, of the

property of citizen Juan Manuel de Rosas, it being considered that he was exempted therefrom, by the decree of 25th March, 1841. H. E., however, had declined such exemption, and directed his agent to pay 13,099⁸ as the yearly tax upon his property.

The *Gaceta* of 5th inst., contains the prices current of this city, of all articles of importation and exportation for the last month (March).

The Chief of Police, in a note to the Government, states, that 1361 persons arrived in this city during the last month (March), and 694 departed; the major part of the departures being for the provinces of the interior.

A similar note from the Captain of the Port, states, that in the same period 1200 persons arrived in this port, and 309 departed.

H. B. M.'s ship *Samarang*, Captain Belcher, was expected at Rio Janeiro, from England, on her way to China. She is afterwards to proceed on a surveying voyage.

The Brazilian schooner *Legalidad* was dressed out and fired salutes yesterday, in honor of the anniversary of the accession to the throne of Brazil of Don Pedro II.

“Blackwood's Magazine,” of January last, contains diffuse observations on the Marquis of Londonderry's Tour, among which is the following tribute to Austria:—

But Austria has one quality, which shows her common sense in a striking point of view. She abhors change. She has not a radical in her whole dominion—except in jail—the only place fit for him. The agitations and vexations of other governments stop at the Austrian frontier. The people have not made the grand discovery, that universal suffrage is meat and drink, and annual parliaments lodging and clothing. They labour, and live by their labour, yet they have as much dancing as the French, and better music. They are probably the richest and most comfortable population of Europe at this hour. Their country has risen to be the protector of Southern Europe; and they are making admirable high-ways, laying down railroads, and building steam-boats, ten times as fast as the French, with all their gigantic plots, and a revolution threatened once a month by the calendar of patriotism. “Like the great Danube, which rolls through the centre of her dominions, the course of her ministry and its tributary branches continue, without any deviation from its accustomed channel.” The comparison is a good one, and what can be more fortunate than such tranquillity?

We insert elsewhere a compendium of the documents relative to the dismissal of the Jesuits who refused to assume the secular habit. The following is the laudable version given of this affair by the Anglo-Riverista journal in Montevideo:—

Governor Rosas has expelled the clergy of the order of Jesuits from Buenos Ayres in consequence of their having refused to hang up his portrait for public adoration over the altar of their church, as has been done by all the other friars in that city.

BRITISH MEDICAL DISPENSARY.

A PUBLIC MEETING of the Institution will be held in the School Room of the British Episcopal Church, on Thursday the 11th instant, at 7 o'clock, for the purpose of appointing a Committee of Management, and of electing the several officers of the Institution. On the 20th ult. the Rev. Miguel Cabezas, of the company of Jesuits, addressed a memorial to H. E. the Governor, in favor of the associating of the Rev. Francisco Mageste, with them, to perform service in the church of San Ignacio in this city, but maturely altered their intention, inasmuch as the said Mageste no longer belonging to the company of Jesuits, of which they are members, they cannot act with the unanimity so necessary amongst individuals of the same religious unity—affinity of action being impossible. His duty, therefore, compelled him to solicit H. E. to be removed from the charge of the church of San Ignacio, which he could not fulfil in company with Mageste; but he was ready to continue his official duties, alone, or associated with any other clergyman of the same profession, or in any service of his ministry which might be deemed useful. Adding, that in whatever part of the world Divine Providence might place him, he should ever feel grateful for the many kindnesses he had received from H. E.; and from the generous people over whom he so anxiously presides.

On the 22nd the Governor issued an order to the Chief of Police, to inform the Rev. Juan Cabezas, and the other Jesuits in the Province, who are not secularized clergyman, similar to the Rev. Francisco Mageste and Belfonso Garcia, that they are on or before the 31st of the next, to quit the territory of the Republic; and that in making this communication, he was to read to each of them, the memorial and the present decree.

In pursuance of the above resolution, the Jesuits, 16 in number, left Buenos Ayres on the 29th ult. in the packet schooner Orestes, for Montevideo, whence we hear it is their intention to proceed to Brazil.

A friend at Corrientes has forwarded to us the Message of the Government of that Province, dated 9th ult., to the House of Representatives. It is what may be called a laudatory document, and enters fully into the past and present state of the Province, its situation under the rule of Ferré, who it denominated an obscure, vile, and despicable tyrant, who by intrigue, perjury and treachery, had occupied the seat of power, now consecrated to honor, justice, patriotism, and liberty. The Message highly eulogizes General Rosas, whom it denominated the tutelary Genius of the Republic, and concludes as follows:—

"From this slight sketch you will see what has been destroyed in more than four years, and what the present Government has effected in less than three months.

"I now wait your approval, rendering to the Almighty my most ardent gratitude for having stretched forth his hand to save this unfortunate Province from the misery to which it had been reduced by the traitor Unitarians, and uniting it again to the Confederation.

"Let us tribute to the great Argentine the immortal Rosas, the most expressive demonstrations of acknowledgment, for having conducted the Republic amid brilliant triumphs to

the zenith of glory, independence, and liberty, which now render it irresistible.

Extracts from 'Circulars' dated Havana, 5th December, 1842; and 6th January, 1843:—

"JANUARY, South American. The cargo per Hamburg barque, Hamburg 1400 qrs, which remained unsold at the date of our last was disposed of at 9/3 rs. Since then we have had the following arrivals—Hamburg brig Carl Heinrich with 4450 qrs, sold at 10 1/16 rs.; Spanish polacre Desada 4600 qrs, and Bremen brig Johanna Cesar with 4500 qrs, are both retailing for want of offers. The Spanish brig Estrella 2500 qrs, Spanish ship Eliza 3250 qrs, and Spanish polacre Loreto 3958 qrs, have all been offered for sale, but no offers whatever have been made; the dealers having been asking rather high prices for some time past, the consumption has fallen off considerably, which circumstance has compelled them to lower their prices and consequently will not be sold for say more than 7/3 to 8 rs. The stock on ship board and in store we estimate at about 86,000 qrs."

"JERKED BEEF, South American. The three cargoes which remained unsold at the date of our last viz.—Spanish brig Estrella, schooner Eliza & polacre Loreto have been disposed of at 7/3 rs. Since then we have had two arrivals, the Spanish brig Prudente with 2200 qrs, which has fetched 8/1 rs. and the polacre S. J. with 3100 qrs, which has not been offered for sale. The stock on ship board and in store is reduced to about 60,000 qrs, in consequence of some quantity having been thrown away as not so good as the remainder, and the quantity of summer beef arrive we hope prices will improve."

We also learn that the cargo of the Desada, from Buenos Ayres, was sold at 7/3 rs. per arroba, and that of the Johanna Cesar, from do. at 8/3 per do.

A TENNER HEARTED JUDGE.

The following story is told of a Judge in Texas:—

A very learned and compassionate Judge in Texas, on passing sentence on one John Jones, who had been convicted of murder, commiserated his remarks as follows:—"The fact is, Jones, that the Court did not intend to order you to be executed before next spring, but the weather is very cold—our jail, unfortunately, is in a very bad condition—much of the glass in the window is broken—the chimneys are in such a dilapidated state that no fire can be made to render your apartments comfortable; besides, owing to the great number of prisoners, not more than one bunk can be made up each—to sleep soundly and comfortably therefore, will be out of the question. In consideration of these circumstances, and wishing to lessen your sufferings as much as possible, the Court, in the exercise of its humanity and clemency, hereby orders you to be executed to-morrow morning, as soon after breakfast as may be convenient to the Sheriff and agreeable to you."
