### BUENOS AYRES.

SEARCHED had our paper issued from the press last week when news arrived of further high-handed proceedings on the part of Commodore Parris in regard to the Argentine Squadron. A very deep and universal sensation has been produced in the minds of all classes of the community by this unwelcome intelligence. Strongly as we feel on the subject, we nevertheless consider the honor of our flag and the interests of fellow-countrymen here too nearly affected to adopt the current reports, without further corroboration. We forbear, therefore, for the present to notice them more fully; but as soon as we shall have obtained the necessary information, we will fearlessly speak out our sentiments, guided, as we uniformly are, by a due sense of even-handed justice.

### CORRIENTES.

On the 17th ult., the House of Representatives of the Province of Corrientes, passed a law, investing the Governor of that Province, Don Pedro Dionicio Cabral, with extraordinary powers, in order that he might root out every germ of the influence of the unitarian faction and draw closer the ties of fraternity with all the Provinces of the Confederation.

On the 20th ult., a Government decree was published at Corrientes, which says:—

That the infamous unitarian faction have given the most positive proofs of their abandonment to the vilest passions, disseminating vengeance and calumny in order to further their projects of devastation and death, which is corroborated by the insulting contempt with which they have treated the conciliatory offers of the Government. It therefore now declares, that Pedro Ferré, his accomplices and abettors, and all those who have fled from the Province, setting at naught the generosity of the Government, are traitors and outlaws, and that their property shall be confiscated to compensate in some degree for the many evils they have caused to the country, and the enormous debt, with which they have burdened it. Also, that those who hold correspondence with or conceal the property of the criminals in question, shall be subjected to the same punishment.

From documents published in the *Gaceta* of Saturday last, it appears that on the 5th ult., the Commandant at the Fort, Victoriano Aguilar, addressed a note to the Governor, soliciting for a few days, the loan from the Artillery Park of 70 lances of the largest class. H. E., in reply, wished to ascertain the motive for the request, and was informed that the lances were intended as a part of the decorations in celebration of the anniversary of the birth of H. E. It was then indicated to Commandant Aguilar, that on no account could the lances be furnished from the Artillery Park for the occasion in question, and that the Governor had issued strict orders that no public demonstrations should in future take place on the anniversary of his birth.

Subscriptions amounting to 20,645 dollars, were raised to defray the expenses of the proposed celebration, and the names of the sub-

scribers were published in the paper before named with a note from the Commandant Aguilar, dated 5th inst., to the Governor, stating, that before he had received the orders of H. E. he had expended all the subscription money, save 2482 dollars, in preparations for the fête, (the different items of the expenditure were also published in Saturday's *Gaceta*) and requested to know how he was to proceed under such circumstances. The Governor replied that he was highly displeased with the Commandant for going so far as he had done without previous permission from the authority, and that with regard to the articles purchased they must be rendered to the Chief of Police, in order to their being sold, and the produce thereof with the overplus money divided amongst the citizens who had subscribed.

### DECREE.

*Palermo de San Benito, April 11, 1843.*

The abuse which has crept in of opening subscriptions for public objects without permission from the authority, being detrimental to order and individual interests, the Government has ordered and decreed:—

Art. 1.—Subscriptions for public objects are forbidden, unless previous permission from the Government be obtained.

2.—Subscriptions, whether public or private, to celebrate the anniversary of the birth of the Governor of the Province, or that of his assuming the supreme command, are forbidden. Those who wish to make voluntary donations in aid of the war, or for the benefit of the State, or for any other public object, must do so through the medium of the respective Justice of Peace, or the civil or military authority, according to circumstances.

3.—Let this be published, &c.

### ROSAS.

The decree of the Government ordering the departure from this country of all Jesuits who should not cease to belong to the society, has been and is generally regarded as a highly expedient. Nor has the occasion chosen for its publication in conjunction with the resignation of Father Cabezas been deemed a less happy inspiration, inasmuch as this document affords an evident proof of the indifference of the missionaries that those Jesuits are. Although they would fain have made it to be believed that they were entirely devoted to the duties of the ministry, it is now beyond doubt that they were far from being animated with the least zeal for the honor and glory of God, or for the salvation of souls. Their stay in this country in the manner they were living would sooner or later have caused as much heartburning; and it is fortunate that they have gone in peace with a flourish of the trumpet of dismission and hard dollars, independently of rich and well-stocked portmanteaus, much more abundant than that of souls reclaimed by their preaching, for of those there is not a single instance. We will say nothing of the rumpers of life they have led, enjoying every thing that the heart could wish for, at the expense of the pockets of the fathers of families; all owing to the folly of the swarm of idle female devotees who constantly beset them. In the attempt to acquire a character for sanctity, these women give themselves up to a life of laziness, going and coming from the church night and day with large roasies in their hands, and making it a point to miss no function of those that, unnecessarily taking away useful time, are more of show than of piety. They do not hesitate to profane the temple of the

Almighty, sometimes running from the church to the vestry and from the vestry to the church; at others, jostling with each other, mothers and daughters, ladies and females of humble degree, mulatas and negroesses promiscuously, in order to gain the best place to get a peep at the clergyman, count the candles and flower vases on the altar, and the flowers in each vase. If it is the fête of some saint you will see them busy in counting the jewels displayed on the occasion, examining the description and quality of the robe and other ornaments, and looking whether the image's countenance be handsome or ugly, cheerful or sad, in order to go and spend the rest of the day in discussing among themselves such foolish and frivolous things. All this they do whilst the cares and chief obligations of their respective homes and families remain neglected, whereas the faithful and proper discharge of the duties inherent to one's condition is that which constitutes true Christian virtue.

The ceremonies and divine offices of our holy mother the church during lent and passion week, in which the high and august mysteries of the Passion and Death of our Redeemer are commemorated, have been celebrated with solemnity and splendour. The decorations of the churches, the processions of the sacred images, the numerous concourse of the faithful, the fervent zeal of the good ministers of the sanctuary, and the devotion and sedate bearing of the people, have been in keeping with the greatness of the object.

On Maundy-Thursaday, in the afternoon, the Government visited the churches, attended by a considerable number of civil functionaries and military officers.

The greatest order, silence and decorum, prevailed amongst the immense concourse which, both in the day time and by night, crowded the different churches.

On Saturday the public rejoicing broke forth amidst the report of the salutes from the fort, the ringing of bells and the discharge of rockets, accompanied by music and other festive demonstrations. Several Judasses were burnt during the day and evening, attired in blue and green, representing that iniquitous and ruthless unitarian, the Pardejon Rivera.

A numerous and enthusiastic concourse of people witnessed the display of these fireworks; but no incident occurred to disturb order or detract from the hilarity of the scene.

### Official Documents.

The *Gaceta* of yesterday contains the protocol of the conference held at the Foreign Office in Buenos Ayres, between Don Felipe Arana, Minister for Foreign Affairs, and Juan Christian Zimmerman, Esq., on the 11th inst., in tensor, that the latter had been appointed Consul from the Republic of Bremen to that of the Argentine Confederation, and was authorized to acknowledge the independence of the Confederation on the part of Bremen. In consequence of this acknowledgment, the following Decree was published:—

*Buenos Ayres, April 12, 1843.*

In pursuance of the solemn acknowledgment made in the name of the free and independent Hanseatic city and Republic of Bremen, by Juan Christian Zimmerman, Esq., Consul for Hamburg, of the sovereignty and independence of the Republic of the Argentine Confederation, &c. &c. &c., the Government charged with the Foreign Affairs of the Confederation orders and decrees:—

**PITCAIRN'S ISLAND.**

A letter in the *Hampshire Telegraph* gives a brief account of a late visit to this island, by H. B. M.'s frigate Curagoa. Most of the officers were enabled to land, and were received by its interesting inhabitants with that welcome which they are ever so ready to afford to those who have the opportunity of visiting them; indeed, the arrival of Curagoa was most opportune, for they had been labouring under a severe epidemic, which the kind exertions of the Surgeon, together with a supply of medicines presented to them by Captain Jones, tended much to alleviate. On the second day, they were presented with the stores sent them by Her Majesty's Government, consisting of a supply of arms and ammunition, spades, iron kettles, &c., receiving, at the same time, an address from Captain Jones, in which, after giving them all the credit due for their industrious and exemplary conduct, he admonished them to continue in the same quiet and peaceable way, as any dereliction would withdraw from them the support of Her Majesty's Government. They have increased in number to 114; the oldest person on the island being the wife of Christian, the chief of the mutineers, and one of those Otaheites, who sailed in the Bounty from Otaheite to Pitcairn's Island; she perfectly recollects the landing of Captain Cook at Otaheite.

**OWIYHEE.**

The Curagoa afterwards visited this island. It was here that Captain Cook lost his life, and the only monument which marks the spot on which he fell, is the stump of an old cocoon-nut tree, with a sheet of copper nailed on it some years ago by H.M.S. Imogine. An old grey-headed native, who lived in a hut close to the spot, intimated to some of the officers that he was present at the tragical event, and actually went through a kind of pantomime representation of the whole scene—the first attack with stones—the retreat of Cook to the boats—his death—the fear of the natives when the ship fired upon them, which he exemplified by falling down and creeping upon his belly behind the nearest bush, and then the roasting and eating of the body on a hill out of the reach of the shot. The representation was too perfect to admit of a doubt as to his having been an eye-witness, if not an actor in the business. A large party of the officers visited the famous volcano of Kirirane, situated about twenty miles from the anchorage, and deemed the largest and in the most active state of any in the known world—the circumference of the crater being about thirteen or fourteen miles, and its depth a thousand feet below the level of the surrounding plain, from which it appears to have sunk perpendicularly down. They descended, with a guide, into the great crater, and after walking over some miles of its uneven surface, arrived at a small lake of red hot burning lava, of at least three miles in circumference; they returned on the seventh day to the ship, highly gratified with the excursion, and deeming themselves amply repaid for all the inconveniences and severe toil they had encountered on their journey.

Treasury bills in circulation on 1st inst., 4,385,600 dollars.

The *Gaceta* of 8th inst., contains two communications to the Government from General Prudencio O. de Rosas, relative to some supplies furnished to the troops under his command by Señores Juan Z. Chavez, and Evaristo Grigera, for which they had declined to receive any remuneration, making over the value thereof in aid of the war.

Passion week was passed with the usual solemnity. The processions from the churches of La Merced and San Domingo, were numerously attended; in the morning paid the customary visit to seven churches on the afternoon of Maundy Thursday, the person of the Government represented by General Soler. The churches were thronged in the extreme, and an immense congregation filled the Cathedral on Good Friday. At mid-day on Saturday a salute from the fort announced the conclusion of the solemnities; the colours were then run up to the mast head, yards squared, &c.

H. B. M.'s steamer Ardent, arrived yesterday from Montevideo, with despatches from Camodoro Purvis to Mr. Manóvilve.

**CIRCO OLIMPIO.**

This place of amusement also opened on the 16th.

We have received English paper to the 15th February. They contain no political news of importance. The Parliament was opened by commission on the 2nd February. The following is an extract from the Queen's Speech:—

**"My Lords and Gentlemen,**

"We are commanded by Her Majesty to acquaint you that her Majesty receives from all princes and states assurances of a friendly disposition towards this country, and of an earnest desire to cooperate with Her Majesty in the maintenance of general peace.

"By the treaty which Her Majesty has concluded with the United States of America, and by the adjustment of those differences which from their long continuance had endangered the preservation of peace, her Majesty trusts that the amicable relations of the two countries have been confirmed.

"The increased exertions which, by the liberality of Parliament, her Majesty was enabled to make for the termination of hostilities with China, have been amply successful.

The skill, valor, and discipline of the naval and military forces employed upon this service have been most conspicuous, and have led to the conclusion of peace upon the terms proposed by Her Majesty.

"Her Majesty rejoices in the prospect, that by the free access which will be opened to the principal marts of that populous and extensive empire, encouragement will be given to the commercial enterprise of her people.

"As soon as the ratifications of the treaty shall have been exchanged, it will be laid before you.

"In concert with her allies, Her Majesty has succeeded in obtaining for the Christian population of Syria the establishment of a system of administration which they were entitled to expect from the engagements of the Sultan and from the good faith of this country.

"The differences for some time existing between the Turkish and Persian Governments had recently led to acts of hostility; but, as each of these states has accepted the joint-mediation of Great Britain and Russia, her Majesty entertains a confident hope that their mutual relations will be speedily and amicably adjusted.

"Her Majesty has concluded with the Emperor of Russia a treaty of commerce and navigation, which will be laid before you. Her Majesty regards this treaty with great satisfaction, and her foundation for increased intercourse between her Majesty's subjects and those of the Emperor.

"Her Majesty is happy to inform you that complete success has attended the recent military operations in Afghanistan. Her Majesty has the greatest satisfaction in recording her high sense of the ability with which these operations have been directed, and of the constancy and valor which have been manifested by the European and native forces.

"The superiority of her Majesty's arms has been established by decisive victories on the scenes of former disaster, and the complete liberation of her Majesty's subjects who were held in captivity, and for whom her Majesty felt the deepest interest, has been effected.

"We are commanded by Her Majesty to inform you that it has not been deemed advisable to continue the occupation, by a military force, of the countries to the westward of the Indus.
