BUENOS AYRES.

THE last accounts from Montevideo depict the situation of that unfortunate city in the most gloomy colours. And to add to the distress of the impoverished native families, that cruel despot Pacheco y Obes, after the failure of Vasquez's financial scheme, had devised a plan for robbing them of the wrecks of their fortunes, by calling upon them for *voluntary* donations of their jewels and plate. The true import of such a call from such a man, under the present circumstances, may be readily conceived. It is gratifying, however, to reflect, that the aid derived from this infamous spoliation will only enable the unrelenting oppressors to protract their sway for a very brief space. Indeed, it is questionable whether this last act of rapacity has been resorted to with any other view than to meet the exigencies of emigration; although we have but little doubt that ample provision had already been made to satisfy men of less inordinate cupidity.

The manner in which Pacheco y Obes got up the *voluntary* donation was quite dramatical. When Vasquez reported the rebuff he had met with from the merchants, the War Minister, as fruitful in expedients as Frutos himself, ordered his horse immediately to be got ready in his best set-out. Then mounting his charger thus superbly accoutred he galloped off to the lines, and, ordering the troops to stand to their arms, he commenced a spirit-stirring harangue, in which he dwelt most pathetically upon the pecuniary distress under which the Government laboured; and wound up by recommending to his hearers that every one who had any article of silver in his possession should make an oblation of it at the shrine of Liberty. And to shew his own patriotic disinterestedness, he forthwith stripped his steed of all its precious fineries and surrendered them for the public use; after which display he gracefully retired, leaving the troops thunderstruck, we know not whether most at the prospect of the stoppage of their rations, or at the magnanimous sacrifice which had been just consummated in their presence.

The news from the army under the command of General Urquiza announces the infliction of two severe blows on the main body of the forces led by Rivera in person; whilst General Servando Gomez had driven the remnants of Fortunato Silva's division into the territory of Brazil, where it was expected they would be disarmed by the Imperial authorities.

The Valparaíso '*Gaceta del Comercio*' of 13th October, contains extracts from the papers of New Granada, one of which announces the death of Mr. Robert Stewart, Charge d'Affaires of H. B. M. to that Republic, and from the

tribute to his memory contained in the '*Paynes*,' New Granada journal, he appears to have been highly respected in that country.

Amongst the China news in the Valparaíso *Gaceta*, we read that the claims of the British for the losses suffered at Canton in the riots of December last, amounting to 67,397 dollars, were paid on the 1st May. The Canton people, from these and other causes, did not appear to be very well disposed towards the English. The best understanding, however, existed between the British authorities at Hong Kong and the Chinese, and that colony had been recently visited by five mandarins of the first rank. They landed under a salute from the batteries, a guard of honour was drawn up to receive them, and great festivities took place in honour of their visit. They remained at Hong Kong for several days—Sir Henry Pottinger accompanied them on their return to Canton.

Official Documents.

Communications from the Chief of Police to the Governor, state, that in the month of September last 572 persons arrived in this city and 463 departed, and that in the month of October 803 persons arrived and 483 departed.

Similar communications from the Captain of the Port, state, that in the month of September last 725 persons arrived at this port and 241 departed, and that in the month of October 745 persons arrived and 183 departed.

The *Gaceta* of 3rd October and 3rd ult. contain the prices current of articles of importation and exportation for the months of September and October last.

The same paper of 12th, 13th, 14th, 16th, 17th, and 18th of October, contain the names of the individuals assessed for the *Contribucion Directa*, for the year 1843, and the sum in which each individual is assessed.

The same paper of 27th October contains a communication, dated 20th October, from the Chief of Police to the Governor, annexing a list of the number of shops, warehouses, taverns, &c. &c., in this capital, at the date above mentioned.

The same paper of 8th ult. contains a list of donations to the Government in aid of the war.

The same paper of 24th and 29th ult. contain the particulars of the causes between Doña Margarita Mariño and Don José Martin Salvadores, and the cause between Don Santiago Guiterrez and Doña Escolastica Melian, relict of Don Manuel Antonio Ligera, with the decisions thereon of the Tribunal of Recursos Extraordinarios, dated 15th and 24th ult.

ARGENTINE THEATRE.

The performances at this theatre have been well attended, but have presented no particular novelty.

VICTORIA THEATRE.

This theatre reopened on the 26th ult., under the management of Señor Culebras, it having been temporarily closed for the purpose of repair. The house was crowded and the performances were diversified by the dancing of Señora Guillermina Molina and her brother.

CIRCUS, RETIRO GARDENS.

The representations at this place of public amusement were, we are informed, well attended on the 26th ult.

H. B. M's. ship Pearl, fired a salute on Thursday last, upon the occasion of a visit she received from Señor Manuel Peña, Envoy from Paraguay.

On the 28th August last, Louis Philippe and the Royal Family had the narrowest escape from destruction. The King, the Queen, the Count of Paris, the Prince and the Princess of Joinville, the Duke d'Aumale, and, in fact, all the members of the Royal Family, took one of their drives in the neighbourhood of the Chateau d'Eu. The carriage was drawn by four very spirited horses. The party, it appears, in the course of their drive, had to pass through Treport, a small fishing village situated about two miles from the Ville d'Eu, and it happened to be the first time the Count of Paris visited that place, the loyal inhabitants considered it their duty to do their future Sovereign especial honour, and accordingly saluted his Royal Highness with a *feu de joie*. The guns were fired just as the carriage was approaching, and the horses, startled by the noise, commenced plunging furiously. The postillions lost all command of them, and they darted forward towards the bridge over the Brezle, the parapet of which the leaders cleared at a bound. The third horse was dragged after its companions, and for a moment the destruction of the whole party seemed inevitable; but fortunately the postillion was enabled to acquire some command over the fourth horse, and he did not follow. Assistance was happily at hand, and the whole party were released from their perilous position; not, however, before the traces had been cut, and the horses left to their fate. The three horses, of course, fell into the stream below, and were injured, but both the postillions escaped. The Queen was much affected, and wept bitterly after the danger was over. The King himself acted with great presence of mind. He held the young Count of Paris in his arms, and refused to leave the carriage till every member of his family was placed in safety on *terra firma*.

H. E. the Governor of the Province of Buenos Ayres, Don Juan Manuel de Rosas, addressed a note of congratulation, in the name of the Argentine Confederation, to H. M. Louis Philippe on the above escape.

To Major Pedro Ximeno, Captain of the Port of Buenos Ayres.

Encampment, November 17, 1843.

My Dear friend,

I am indebted in several replies to various esteemed letters received from you previous to my departure from Colonia.

I am stationed here in pursuance of orders from H. E. the Governor and Captain General of the Province of Entrerios, Commander-in-Chief of the army of operations. I have under my orders a division of 1400 brave fellows.

The important victory at Cerro Pelado, upon which I congratulate you a thousand times, puts an end to the sway of the recalcitants in the departments of Minas and Maldonado. The *Pardejon*, who a few days since was on the Queguay Chico, was quite distracted at the news.

The department of Colonia had suffered greatly from the frequent depredations of the recalcitants; but it has been fortunate compared with that of Soriano—Heavens, what horrors! After I had descended the ridge which separates the two territories, I met with nothing but a waste—the immense and fertile tracts of land between San Salvador and the Arroyo Grande completely deserted—a few wretched females who had previously lived in comfort and opulence, lately returned after having been rescued by our soldiers from the brutal lust of the hordes of Rivera, and who yet seemed incredulous at finding themselves free; some foreigners, perhaps, repentant that they had co-operated in so many disasters, and a maniac—and hundreds of handsome houses destroyed, and abandoned by their owners, who had been carried off by Pacheco y Obes—the cruel, worthless, and sanguinary Pacheco y Obes. This ruthless man likewise carried off with him all the unfortunate families, who, in major part, have perished. Many old men and sexagenary females who succeeded in escaping from the barbarous cruelty of the monsters, by concealing themselves in the woods, or temporarily changing their abode, have fallen under the assassin knife of the Calengos, the Flores, Estivaos, Corias, Pintos and other celebrated robber satellites of the imbecil *Pardejon*. In every direction the bodies of women, old men, and children, are found with their throats cut; even in my camp there is one which cannot be recognised, from the length of time and its state of putrefaction; and at a short distance, upon the top of a slight eminence, the bodies of five men were found with their throats cut. Two or three old and defenceless residents, who were incapable from their age and habits of life of meddling in party strife, have been recognised amongst them; one of the bodies appears to be that of an Englishman, proprietor of a house which is in my very camp. In the Laureles, San Martin, and other places where I have successively encamped, many bodies were found with their throats cut, of more or less distant date—some are known, but others cannot be recognised. But in the second of these streams, I was beyond measure horror-struck to see two women, mother and daughter, and a child a year and a half old, purposely placed upon an eminence. These unfortunates lived on the Estancia of the younger Sellanes, and the inhuman villain Calengo revenge himself by cutting the throats of an innocent family, because the husband of the first named had come over to us. Such is the system of the infamous incendiary *Pardejon* Rivera, and of the wretches who follow him. Crimes of desolation and blood out of number, and torrents of blood is what he has spread throughout the country. Such is the man, such the General, whom Commodore Purvis, and the ruthless piratical Lafone, and other ungrateful foreigners in this country interested in amassing fortunes by the public distress, have upheld and even protected. Some day or other even their own countrymen will upbraid them with the ruin, which they and the ruthless unitarians, their protégés, have brought upon their interests.

I trust you will keep me informed of all the news which occurs in your quarter, and believe me ever yours, &c. &c. &c.,

Extract from the *Gaceta* of 24th ult.

"The *Britannia* of Montevideo complains that the English newspapers usually accompany their insertions of political intelligence from the River Plate with a caution to their readers against placing reliance in its veracity, as they cannot vouch for it.

"So improbable and contradictory are the statements in the *Britannia* and the other organs of the press of the ruthless unitarians in Montevideo, that they find it necessary in Europe to be cautious in giving credence to tales so repugnant and absurd.

"We have a recent and what may be called a notorious example of this system of deception and falsehood which the European writers from their discrimination are beginning to perceive.

"The *Britannia* announces in its number of 11th November, that the heart of the officer who was killed at the BATTLE OF THE BUCCO, *Señor Ortega*, has been salted by the barbarous invaders and exhibited in great triumph to the crews of the men of war boats visiting that Port.

"The *Britannia* which is a periodical the ruthless unitarians publish in the English language, with the assistance of Lafone and other speculators, who are interested in sustaining them in order to carry on their immense transactions of infamous and usurious lucre could not have got up a more notorious and absurd an imposition to justify the caution which some English writers consider necessary against this sort of news put forth so repeatedly and with so little talent. Even the *Nacional* of Montevideo which daily spreads abroad such absurdities and atrocious falsehoods, has not had the hardihood to insert in its columns so gross and so monstrous a lie.

"This horrible announcement fabricated by the *Britannia* is not only notoriously false, but there was no battle at the Bucco, it was merely a skirmish in which Ortega, an officer of the besieged army, fell by a musket shot.—They secretly drew his body away and exhibited it with its throat cut and mutilated, which barbarous and atrocious operation is practised by the ruthless unitarian Paz, through the medium of his adjutants, Caceres and Sosa, in order to enrage the armed foreign population and prevent them taking advantage of the amnesty offered them by the illustrious President Oribe, making them believe by this horrible farce, that they could expect no mercy or commiseration.

"The *Britannia*, profoundly initiated in these base manoeuvres, never hesitates to propagate calumnies, or to attribute to the brave and worthy army of Orientals and Argentines, those deeds which are clandestinely and ferociously committed by the ruthless unitarians to prolong the fury of the foreigners who are the only means of sustaining the war, and to alienate from the Argentine Government and President Oribe the sympathies of the civilised world.

"Thus we see it every day more obstinate in vilifying General Rosas and putting forth audacious falsehoods with most disgusting rancour. The *Britannia* is well paid for this sort of work, but it has drawn so largely upon public credulity, that honorable and impartial men have at last began to see through the artifice."

And on the following day when Captain Morgan, of the British barque *Hesperia*, and Captain Fildes, of the British brig *Five*, in company with myself, went to the Quinta in search of the boat, H. E. received us in the most kind manner, proffering his services, and made us also partake of the hospitalities of his mansion.

The kindness and dignified courtesy of H. E. will never be effaced from my memory, and I experience the most lively pleasure in thus publicly offering to him the tribute of my gratitude.
