BUENOS AYRES.

The accounts from Montevideo come down to the 7th inst. The news of Rivera's defeat by Gen. Urquiza had produced a very demoralising effect on the garrison, as is evidenced by the increased number of deserters, no less than 63 individuals from the town, including 6 officers, having presented themselves to President Oribe, during the last fortnight. In order to check this ominous spirit the Riverista government had published a ludicrously trumped up bulletin announcing that nearly all the Provinces in the interior of this Republic, but especially Jujuy, Salta and Tucuman, were in commotion and about to make common cause with the Correntino Anarchists. The coining of some patacones and copper money, from the melted down plate and old copper of which the unfortunate natives were despoiled, is another of the expedients that had been resorted to in order to keep up the miserable system of deception so long and so successfully practised in the face of the most eloquent and unimpeachable facts. It may seem a matter of surprise, that, under such circumstances the Riverista rulers should dare to draw so frequently and so largely on the gullibility of their dupes; but the wonder will cease when it is known that their bills are always backed by Commodore Purvis or some other equally responsible neutral either in an official or a mercantile capacity. With such a guarantee, how is it possible that they should not be honoured?

Rivera in the late action lost 250 killed and 60 prisoners. Every thing combines to warrant the belief that the results of this victory will be much more important than might have been at first anticipated. From Paysandu we learn that three Riverista Colonels, whom the culpable connivance or pitiful impotency of the Imperial authorities in Rio Grande allowed to rejoin Rivera, after having sought an asylum in that province, and who were in the action of 24 ult., had with a few dispersed followers, reached the encampment of the Riverista Col. Baez, and communicated such a panic among the division, that it almost instantly broke up; Baez with the comparatively few men who stood by him precipitately retreating to the Brazilian frontier, and depriving General Gomez, who was rapidly marching upon him, of a certain victory. Let it be remembered that this General Gomez, who is now at Paysandu, with his brilliant division, is the same whom the lying press of Montevideo represented a few days ago as having been totally cut to pieces by Rivera, at the opposite extreme of the Republic, when in fact, as we before stated, this redoubted champion never came so near his antagonist as to be able to break a lance with him, even if he had been so inclined.

We have news from Enterrios to the 7th, inst. General Garzon, following up the important advantages he had gained over the devastating horde of Correntinos, had penetrated into the Correntino territory at the head of an imposing force. We regret to state that a great and useless crime was perpetrated on the 26th ult., at Nogoyá, prompted, there is every reason to believe, by the Coryphees of that iniquitous faction which on either side of the Plata, stop at no enormity to encompass their nefarious ends. H.E. the delegate Governor Don Cipriano Urquiza, was sojourning at the above mentioned town, unattended by any escort, after having forwarded a reinforcement of troops to General Garzon, when the house in which he resided was suddenly attacked by a gang of banditti which had been concealed in a neighbouring wood, and the unfortunate governor was barbarously murdered, and the house completely sacked. Before infor-

mation of this horrid deed could be conveyed to any military post, the assassins had decamped and again hid themselves in the thicket; but it was expected they would not long be able to elude the active pursuit made after them, especially as their atrocious crime had excited a strong feeling of indignation among all classes of the inhabitants, the deceased having shared largely in the popularity of his brother, the Governor proprietary, at present in command of the army operating against Rivera.

The advices from England by the last packet lead to the confident hope that H. M.'s Government have at length come to the determination of putting an end to the violent state of things in this river, the protraction of which has been fostered by the grossest breach of duty to the manifest discredit of the British character, not to speak of the injury it has inflicted on our commercial prospects. Steadfast in the principle of neutrality they have solemnly proclaimed, it appears they had directed the Fox frigate to be immediately got ready for sea, for the purpose, it was believed, of bringing out the new Commander of the British Naval forces on the Brazilian station. One thing, however, is certain, and that is the approaching removal of Mr. Dale, from the post of acting Consul General in Montevideo; Mr. Turner, the newly appointed Chargé d'Affaires having received orders from the Foreign Office to hold himself in readiness to proceed forthwith to his destination. We anxiously await the arrival of this gentleman, who, we trust will sustain the honour and dignity of the Queen's government, and shew himself inaccessible to the mischievous influence which has already produced such disastrous results in Montevideo, and which has lately so degraded a body of Merchants at home as the Mexican and South American Association as to reduce them to the same level as the knot of reckless speculators and vile calumniators which constitutes the sole prop of the tottering intrusive authority in the capital of the neighbouring state.

ON THE IMMENSITY OF THE UNIVERSE.

"About the year 1610, the telescope, then recently invented, was for the first time applied to astronomical investigation by Galileo; he with his refracting telescope, with a power of about thirty times, observed thousands of stars invisible to the naked eye. Since the days of Galileo the telescope has been very much improved. The large 40-foot reflecting telescope of the late Sir William Herschel was frequently charged with the great magnifying power of 6,450 times. With such a power, the heavens seemed, as it were, to dissolve before its strength; on directing it to that peculiarly white tract in the sky commonly called THE MILKY WAY, it was instantly perceived that 'its groundwork was of stars.' In one proportion of this track 116,000 stars swept over the field view of this telescope in fifteen minutes, at another time 258,211 stars in forty-one minutes! It has been calculated that the Milky Way alone at least contains 18,500,000 stars, which are equal to 5,314 times the number of visible stars in the heavens, or about 19,000 times the number visible to the eye at one glance in the most favourable evening. Although the other parts of the celestial canopy are not so densely crowded, yet it is astonishing to consider the increased num-

ber the telescope unfolds to view in every constellation.

It may safely be inserted, that the telescopic number of the stars is at least, 80,000,000, (eighty millions) some of which must be upwards of thirty-one thousand billions of miles distant from the Earth. It is well known that the late Sir William Herschel concluded from unquestionable evidence that his telescope enabled his eye to reach and rest on portions of space 497 times farther distant than Sirius. Suppose the distance of Sirius to be as great as the star 61 Cygni, or 62,528,490,691,900 miles \times 497 = 31,076,659,873,874,300 miles for the probable radii, 62,153,319,747,748,600 miles for the diameter, and about 195,000,000,000,000,000 (one hundred and ninety-five thousand billions) of miles for the circumference of the universe, as developed by the telescope alone! At such enlarged views of the amazing distances and numbers of worlds, as sounded by the telescope, the pious and contemplative mind may well exclaim, 'Great and marvellous are His works!' yet 'these are but part of his ways.' There is every reason to conclude that these are 'but as the small dust in the balance,' compared with the overwhelming number of worlds located in every nebula. Up to the present year there have been reckoned about 3,275 nebulae. Nebulae is a name given to a singular celestial appearance, cloudy in aspect somewhat resembling small patches of froth swimming on the surface of water. It is not improbable that each of these 3,275 nebulae may contain at least 80,000,000 of stars! What must we then think of the vast extent of the Universe and its innumerable hosts of stars! Even although these nebulae contain the great number of stars mentioned, they must only be considered as a very small part of an overwhelming and incomprehensible whole—only as a few groups clustering on the 'frontiers of the Creator's dominions.'

We received by Her Britannic Majesty's packet Viper, London papers to the 6 December, and Paris to the 4th.—

Queen Victoria, following in the steps of Queen Elizabeth, was making tours in England—She had visited Cambridge, Drayton Manor the seat of Sir Robert Peel, Belvoir Castle the seat of the Duke of Rutland, &c. The Duke of Wellington was her constant attendant, and it was remarked that His Grace never appeared in better health, so much so that, although these tours were made in the midst of winter, he always rose at day break, and was seen walking in Belvoir Park, at 7 o'clock in the morning.

The visit of the Duke de Bordeaux to England—his long stay there—the attentions paid him—and above all the manner in which he has been surrounded by a number of influential persons from France have attracted the attention of the French Government, particularly as 500 individuals had taken out their passports at Paris in order to proceed to London to visit him. A French Journal thus speaks upon the subject:—

THE FRENCH LEGITIMATISTS IN LONDON.

The *Journal des Débats* exclaims in strong language against "the scandal caused in London by deputies who, bound by the oaths taken publicly to the King in the year 1830, are now assisting at that species of inauguration which the emigrants have arranged, and at which the Pretender has been invested with the title of King of France. Let these deputies not deceive themselves! If the indulgence of our laws and the mildness of our habits place them beyond the reach of that punishment which would have been inflicted on them in any other country in the world, a serious responsibility still attaches to them. It is to the Chamber that they will have to account for their conduct. It is the Chamber that they have insulted by trampling contemptuously under foot the oath which alone gave them a right to a seat in it. M. Berryer and his colleagues must explain how they preserved their title of deputies whilst at the Court of the Duke de Bordeaux, and how they reconcile their fidelity to the King of the French with that species of proclamation of a King of France which the Charter does not recognize. They have enjoyed the pleasure of giving scandal, we admit, but they must expiate it. They have audaciously exposed before a foreign nation the little importance they attach to our laws our institutions, and to the oath which they swore to observe. They have turned the French nation into ridicule, but France will have her turn, and the Chambers will not suffer that the insult should pass without satisfaction! M. Berryer is a gifted orator, we admit. He is confident in his abilities. Let him be so! We wait for him at the bar of the Chamber, and we shall see whether public opinion, which has been outraged, and the honour of the Chamber, which has been compromised, will not be stronger than all the skill which M. Berryer can display. We shall see whether M. Berryer and his colleagues have not placed themselves in an untenable position, which he and they will find impossible to justify and defend before the public. Though there may not be a legal responsibility, there is a moral responsibility. Play the part of the emigrants as much as you please. Raise your pretender on a pedestal which your feeble arms cannot carry far. Restore to him at London a ridiculous image of that royalty which you caused him to lose in Paris. Pass the sea in order to give yourself the pleasure of crying, 'Long live the King of France,' but remain no longer deputies. Engage not the Chamber in your folly. Do not make use of its name and its authority to encourage in its presumption the most infatuated and most incorrigible of parties. M. Berryer is perfectly his master to proceed to London or to Goritz, to bear a crown to the Duke de Bordeaux, but as a deputy he has no King but the King of the French.

"With respect to those who are not bound by any tie to our institutions and our monarchy, who have not sworn allegiance to the King and to the Charter, and who are not deputies, we cannot suffer them to appoint any other government than that recognized by the French nation. Living under the protection of our laws, they owe their obedience, and public indiffer-

ence is a sufficient punishment for the scandal they have caused. As for the deputies, it is different. If the law does not reach them, the Chamber has the power to make them account for their conduct. Let them remain deputies if they will, after having repudiated their oath; but let them be stigmatized by the reprobation of the Chamber. We demand but one punishment for them, and that is, a public debate on their conduct, and the severe examination which the Chamber will commence on their conduct.

The breeding of cattle has much increased, and the planters have of late began to kill on their own estates and to salt the beef; it stands, in all, at about 14 rials the arroba, and as the use of it is getting more general, the Jerked beef from South America, will only be used when prices offer a decided advantage; the least excess in supplies is therefore likely to depress prices, while ever so great a scarcity cannot possibly raise the value beyond 14 to 15 rials.
