BUENOS AYRES.

We have received Montevideo papers to the 15th inst. It is really amusing to read the pleasing train of reflections which has been suggested to the *BRITANNIA* of the 10th by the official announcement in Montevideo that the Upper Provinces of this Republic are in a state of insurrection against the general government. The whole story, however, is sheer humbug, and whatever hopes may have been conceived from its propagation, can have no other result than to elucidate more fully the infamous character of the parties who manifest so deep an interest in protracting the present anomalous state of things in Montevideo.

In a late skirmish outside the lines the Riveristas lost another of their principal officers in the person of Colonel Marcelino Sosa, who was killed by a cannon shot. In a previous engagement, Cockney Sam, the Thames waterman, and his troop of ragamuffins, were completely cut to pieces, and, among the 35 killed, who fell fighting UNDER the BRITISH FLAG, in the presence it may be said of Commodore Purvis, was the brother of Sam himself.

News had been received in Montevideo of the arrival at Rio Janeiro of the new French Admiral, Laisné, on his way to this river. It is to be hoped that this officer will at once adopt a decided course in order to effect the disarming of the refractory legionists.

By the last advices from the army we learn that Rivera had recrossed the Rio Negro with a body of about 900 men, but after the passage of that river a great number of his followers abandoned him, and proceeded to Rio Grande. There is every reason to believe that the blow he received on the 24th ult. will prove irreparable.

Mr. Mandeville, H. B. M's Minister Plenipotentiary, had an audience on Monday last, at the fort, of H. E. the Delegate Governor, Don Felipe Arana, in order to deliver the letter from H. M. Queen Victoria, announcing the marriage, on 28th June last, in London, of H. R. II. the Princess Augusta Caroline Charlotte, Elizabeth Maria Sophia Louisa eldest daughter of H. R. II. the Duke of Cambridge, to the hereditary Grand Duke of Mecklenburg Strelitz. Mr. Mandeville, in his address to the Delegate Governor, lamented the illness of the Governor of the Province, Don Juan Manuel de Rosas, which had prevented H. E. for so long a period from receiving the royal letter, and expressed his fervent hope that he would be speedily restored to health. A guard of honour was drawn up at the fort upon the occasion, and Mr Mandeville was conducted thither from his residence, in a Government carriage, attended by a Government Aide-de-Camp.

The full particulars of the ceremony, with a copy of the Queen's letter, were published in the *GACETA* of Tuesday.

On Tuesday, the Comte Delurde, Minister Plenipotentiary of H. M. the King of the French, had also an audience of H. E. the Delegate Governor, in order to deliver two letters from H. M., one dated 8th May last, announcing the marriage, on the 20th April, of his daughter the Princess Marie Clementine Caroline Leopoldine Clotilde D'Orleans, with H. R. II. Prince Augustus Louis Victor de Saxe Cobourg; the other, dated 1st September, announcing the marriage of his son, Francis Ferdinand Philippe Louis Marie D'Orleans, Prince de Joinville, with the Princess Caroline de Brazil, on the 1st May, at Rio Janeiro.

The same ceremonies were observed as at the audience to Mr. Mandeville on the preceding day, and full particulars were published in the *GACETA* of Wednesday.

The following extract from the message of the President of the United States to the Senate and House of Representatives, delivered in December last, proves that the Government of that Country are really angry with Mexico, for its conduct towards Texas.

"There must be a limit to all wars; and if the parent State, after an eight years' struggle has failed to reduce to submission a portion of its subjects standing out in revolt against it, and who have not only proclaimed themselves to be independent, but have been recognized as such by other Powers, she ought not to expect that other nations will look quietly on to their obvious injury, upon a protraction of hostilities. These United States threw off their coloni-

al dependence, and established independent governments; and Great Britain, after having wasted her energies in the attempt to subdue them for a less period than Mexico has attempted to subjugate Texas, had the wisdom and the justice to acknowledge their independence, thereby recognizing the obligations which rested on her as one of the family of nations. An example thus set by one of the proudest as well as most powerful nations of the earth, it would in no way disparage Mexico to imitate.

While, therefore, the Executive would deplore any collision with Mexico, or any disturbance of the friendly relations which exist between the two countries, it cannot permit that Government to control its policy whatever it may be, towards Texas; but will treat her as by the recognition of her independence, the United States have long since declared they would do, as entirely independent of Mexico. The high obligations of public duty may enforce from the constituted authorities of the United States a policy which the course persevered in by Mexico will have mainly contributed to produce; and the Executive, in such a contingency, will with confidence throw itself upon the patriotism of the People to sustain the Government in its course of action.

Measures of an unusual character have recently been adopted by the Mexican Government, calculated in a small degree to affect the trade of other nations with Mexico, and to operate injuriously to the United States. All foreigners, by a decree of the 23rd day of September, and after six months from the day of its promulgation are forbidden to carry on the business of selling by retail any goods within the confines of Mexico. Against this decree our Minister had not failed to remonstrate.

The trade heretofore carried on by our citizens with Santa Fe, in which much capital was already invested, and which was becoming of daily increasing importance, has suddenly been arrested by a decree of virtual prohibition on the part of the Mexican Government. Whatever may be the right of Mexico to prohibit any particular course of trade, to the citizens or subjects of foreign powers, this late procedure, to say the least of it, wears a harsh and unfriendly aspect.

The instalments on the claims recently settled by the Convention with Mexico have been punctually paid as they have fallen due, and our Minister is engaged in urging the establishment of a new commission in pursuance of the Convention for the settlement of unadjusted claims.

In consequence of a misunderstanding between this Government and that of Buenos Ayres, occurring several years ago, this Government has remained unrepresented at that court, while a minister from it has been constantly resident here. The causes of irritation have in a great measure passed away, and it is in contemplation, in view of important interests which have grown up in that country, at some early period during the present session of Congress, with the concurrence of the Senate, to restore diplomatic relation between the two countries.

From the "Times" of 6th December.

We have received by our ordinary express the Paris papers of Monday, with a mass of foreign correspondence. The principal article of intelligence contained in the former, is one which we find in *LA PRESSE*, namely, that the telegraphic despatch which announced to the Government the dismissal of M. OLZAGA by the Queen of SPAIN, stated further that he had been arrested. The Paris journals comment very freely upon this unexpected and extraordinary Ministerial revolution, but their remarks are somewhat premature, nothing certain on the subject being yet known beyond the fact of M. OLZAGA's removal.

Our Paris correspondent doubts the assertion that M. OLZAGA had been arrested, and supposes the report to rest on "the illegality of which M. OLZAGA had unquestionably been guilty in proposing to the QUEEN to declare the Cortes dissolved without the concurrence or even the knowledge of his colleagues. One thing is certain amid all these doubts—namely, that, however agreeable to the French Government would have been the triumph of the Moderados in any other case, the fall of M. OLZAGA has been a thunderbolt to them, that eminent person being the representative of French interests in the Spanish Cabinet."

"The increased audacity of the French Legitimists in London has," says our Paris letter, "determined the Government to prosecute in every practicable form the parties participating in the recognition of the Duke de BORDEAUX as King of France, for to that extent it will be proved they have gone in London. It is hardly necessary to recommend to your notice an article in the *JOURNAL DES DEBATS* of this day, which demonstrates this determination, and which will hardly surprise you, as the matter appears to have proceeded very far indeed. For the Duke de BORDEAUX it is impossible not to feel respect; but I confess, that the men by whom he is surrounded, and those by whom, in the columns of the Paris press, he is defended and supported, are the last in the world entitled to British sympathy. The venom displayed towards England by the most rancorous of the Republican journals of France, has been transcended in the papers of the Legitimist party. Why or wherefore it is impossible to account, otherwise than on the often quoted paradox,—that men never forgive the benefits rendered to them."

The *MONITEUR* states, that the Government had learned only through *LE COMMERCE* of the alleged insult of which BEX GANNAH was said to have been the victim, and of its consequences to the province of Constantine. "We are authorized," says that official paper, "to declare that no accounts, either direct or indirect, have been received to justify, in the slightest degree, that assertion. We are, moreover, enabled to confirm our previous statement respecting the inaccuracy of the report of the desertion of the Kalifa of Tlemcen, and the defection of the tribes of that province, which was extracted by the *COMMERCE*, from the *Marseilles* paper."

The *COMMERCE* replies to this statement in terms extremely discourteous to Marshal SOULT for his "marvellous assurance" in contradicting the account given in *LE COMMERCE*, which was corroborated by letters received by several of its contemporaries. *LE COMMERCE* then proceeds to publish a long letter from Constantine, dated Nov. 14, which repeats and recapitulates the facts denied by the *MONITEUR*.

Accounts from Bologna of the 25th ult., state, that the bands of malefactors which recently infested the district of Galliera, had been dispersed, and that several of the individuals who composed them, were in the hands of justice. Their chief, TINTARRETTO, had succeeded in effecting his escape. The judiciary officers sent to examine the political prisoners detained at Pesaro and San Leo had returned to Bologna. The

proceedings were conducted with the utmost secrecy. The ramifications of the conspiracy were so extensive, that the Papal Government was terrified by its magnitude, and was afraid to divulge the truth. The Court of Rome had relinquished the idea of trying the offenders by military commissions. The tribunal before which they were to appear was to be composed of men of the legal profession. Cardinal *PEDICINI*, the senior member but one of the Sacred college, died at Rome, on the 19th, and Cardinal *PACCA* was dangerously ill.

The hateful and disgusting sports of Carnival commence to-morrow. We rejoice however, to read the following notice from the Police office.

Buenos Ayres, February 10th, 1844.
The Carnival being at hand, the undersigned Chief of Police, puts the inhabitants in mind of the decree of the 8th of July, 1836, which is now republished in order that no person may plead ignorance thereof; also that by order of H. E. the Governor, Brigadier General Juan Manuel de Rosas, it is absolutely prohibited that bladders be used in the sports on those days.
