BUENOS AYRES.

We have received three Bulletins of the Confederate army,—Nos. 54, 55 and 56.

The first contains a list of the persons who had come over from the town, during the fortnight ending on the 15th ult., and consist of 1 officer and 46 privates and civilians. These individuals confirm all that has been said respecting the distress prevailing in Montevideo, and add that the corps of the garrison are mere skeletons and are made to figure as full Battalions in order to deceive the unwary.

No. 55 relates the particulars of a smart action fought near the Cerro, on the 26th ultimo, in which the besieged had 2000 infantry and 600 horse engaged, and the besiegers but a comparatively small number of troops. The Riveristas notwithstanding their numerical superiority, were driven back with immense loss, as is stated in private letters from Montevideo. In order to gild over their discomfiture, the Riveristas have published a bulletin, in which it is gravely asserted that "an involuntary mistake in not obeying orders" prevented them from achieving a complete victory. It is a singular fatality that some untoward circumstance always occurs to damp their brightest prospects! The casualties of the besiegers in this affair were 3 killed 31 wounded, and 16 contused; among the wounded were 7 officers, including Colonel Serrano.

No 56 is composed of the despatch of Lieut. Col. Caballero, relative to the defeat of a party of Riverista marauders, consisting of 120 men commanded by Miguel Baez, who were overtaken on the 29th ult., by the above named officer, and cut to pieces, leaving upwards of 70 men killed on the field, a quantity of arms, and a large number of horses.

Our market is at this moment suffering severely from the effects of a monetary crisis, which has produced a suspension of payment by several respectable mercantile houses, both National and Foreign. The cause to which this state of things is, we believe, mainly attributed, is the great impulse given during the last year to every branch of commerce and industry, rendering the circulating medium insufficient to satisfy the exigencies of the active and extensive business carried on, as is evidenced by the high rate of interest paid for money, notwithstanding the large supply of specie constantly received from abroad, and which was employed in a considerable number of transactions. The paper money in circulation throughout the vast territory of Buenos Ayres is equivalent to little more than 3,000,000 of hard dollars; a sum which, if in ordinary times, was found barely adequate for the purposes of commerce, must be allowed at present to fall far short of what is required for a greatly enlarged sphere of operations. It has been suggested that as a measure of relief the mint might be empowered to discount bills to a certain amount, at a moderate interest; and that this could be done without in the least affecting the credit of the paper money, or increasing the responsibilities of the State, by conferring on the mint the same privilege as the Custom House

in the collection of its bills. We do not know how far advisable such a measure may be; but if it were at all practicable, without any serious detriment to any of the paramount interests of the State, we think it would prove highly beneficial, retrieving trade from its present stagnation, and enabling the embarrassed houses to fulfil their obligations towards their creditors without ruinous sacrifices.

Buenos Ayres, March 7th, 1844.

The Alameda and beach presented a most animated and imposing scene on Tuesday morning last, in consequence of the embarkation of 800 troops of the three arms, on particular service. They drew up on the Alameda, amid a discharge of rockets from the Marine Office, and excited much admiration from their steady orderly appearance, and equipment: they were all uniformly attired in scarlet, and embarked in the highest spirits, notwithstanding they left behind them on the beach a great number of female relatives and friends, whose tears evinced the grief they felt at parting. The weather was propitious, the spectators numerous, and the embarkation was effected with such expedition through the unwearied exertions of the Captain of the Port and his officers, that in three hours, the whole of the troops with their baggage were on board, and under way for their destination.

This truly fine body of men are commanded by that distinguished officer Colonel Hilario Lagos, and as the transports which conveyed them passed the national brig of war Vigilante, they were saluted with 13 guns, and three cheers, from that vessel.

It was altogether an imposing spectacle, not only from the appearance of the men, but from the spirit which pervaded them, so much so, that although for several days, they have roamed about town without control, not one was missing when the muster roll was called on the morning of embarkation, and several who were not drafted, came forward and volunteered their services. The flag at the Marine Office was displayed the whole of the day of Tuesday. Various reports are in circulation as to the destination of this expedition which we hear is to be increased to 1000 men:—they will, we are confident do their duty, wherever their services may be required.

Colonel Lagos, on the 1st inst., addressed a note to the Governor Don Juan Manuel de Rosas, in tenor as follows.—

EXCELLENT SIR;—

I have just received your orders to proceed again on active service, and confiding to me the command of a Division. This summons from Y. E. has inspired me with the most ardent enthusiasm. Language fails me in the expression of my gratitude for an honour so distinguished; deign therefore, Y. E. to permit me to prove it by deeds. The munificence of Y. E. has in various decrees, ordained rewards to the victors in different actions with the traitor unitarians.

Of these rewards some are meant purely to confer honour, whilst others possess a pecuniary value. If I understand aright, the option is reserved to choose either the one or the other. I therefore accept those which confer honour, and renounce for the benefit of the State, the others which decree lands and cattle; deign Y. E. to accept this resignation.

I am not indifferent to the value of the gift, and for this reason I cede it to my country. My desire is to lay down my life in its service; my glory is in being thought by Y. E. worthy to serve it.

So far from conceiving myself entitled to pecuniary reward, I am aware that I have yet much to effect, ere I can merit the honours which Y. E. has heaped upon me, and the esteem with which my federal countrymen have honoured me; this feeling has influenced me in the resignation I now make, which I trust Y. E. will accept.

God preserve Y. E. many years,

H. E. the Governor, under date of the 3rd inst., accepted the above donation, returning thanks to Colonel Lagos in the name of the Confederation.

OFFICIAL DOCUMENTS.

Buenos Ayres, March 4th, 1844.

The Government charged with the Foreign affairs of the Argentine Confederation has ordered and decreed.

Art. 1.—The Assessor General, Don Baldomero Garcia, is appointed Minister Plenipotentiary of the Argentine Confederation, to the Republic of Chili, with the assignation specified in the estimates of the present year, and sanctioned by the Honorable House of Representatives.

2.—Let this be published &c., &c.

A similar document to the above, appoints the Government Fiscal Don Eduardo Lahitte, Minister Plenipotentiary of the Argentine Confederation, to the Republic of Bolivia.

The same paper of 5th ult., contains the particulars of the cause between Dr. Andrew Dick, and the executors of Mr. Mathew Reed, with the decision thereon, of the same tribunal, dated 8th of January.

The same paper of 14th of December, contains the particulars of the examination of the Students of the College of Buenos Ayres,—recently established under the auspices of the Governor of the Province, Don Juan Manuel de Rosas,—on the 20th, 21st, 22nd, 23rd, and 24th of December, in the various branches of their studies.

The same paper of 18th of December, contains the nomination of the Justices of Peace for town and country, the Directors of the Hospitals &c., for the present year. The nominees are with few exceptions the same as in the last year.

The same paper of 24th ult., contains a communication from Don Celedonio Gutierrez, Governor of the Province of Tucuman, stating that the House of Representatives had re-elected him to that office, on the 20 October. Also the congratulatory reply of the Governor of Buenos Ayres, Don Juan Manuel de Rosas.

The same paper of various dates, in the months of December, January and February contains a list of donations in aid of the war.

The GACETA of 26th ult., contains an ingenious wood cut of the victory obtained by a division of the army of operations of the Argentine Confederation, on the night of the 24th of January last, at the Arroyo del Sauce, over the army of Frutos Rivera, from a sketch taken by Lieutenant Colonel Ramon Bustos, and dedicated by him to General Oribe.

THE EXECUTIVE OF THE REPUBLIC—
Considering:—

FIRST.—That the copper and silver money coined by the rebel unitarians in Montevideo, by the authorisation of the self called assembly of 3rd of December, 1843, is the product of the spoliations and notorious robberies of those wretches on the unfortunate inhabitants.

SECONDLY.—That this odious measure has been resorted to in order to satisfy the base cupidity of these rebels in the last moments of their infamous domination.

THIRDLY.—That money without credit or guarantee, as in the case referred to, being dishonourable and injurious to the State; has ordered and decreed, subject to what the Legislature may hereafter determine:

ART. 1.—The money coined by the rebel unitarians in Montevideo, by order of the self called assembly of 3rd of December 1843, shall not be considered as money of the Oriental State of the Uruguay.

2.—Its circulation is therefore forbidden throughout the territory of the Republic.

3.—Let this be published, &c., &c.
