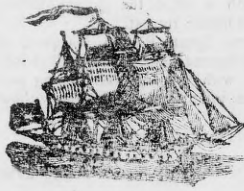

### BUENOS AYRES.

Where is Rivera? It is now nearly three months since his hordes led by himself in person were cut to pieces and dispersed at the Sauce Grande, and though the *Britannia* would have us believe that, phoenix-like, he would shortly spring up again from his own ruins more formidable than ever, the chances of the fulfilment of this rash prediction every day diminish. We are happy to learn that the hope entertained of obtaining fresh resources from Rio Grande has been frustrated; the Baron de Caxias, Commander-in-chief of the Imperial Army, having issued the most positive orders prohibiting Brazilian subjects from purchasing the stolen cattle which the Riveristas were in the habit of bringing in droves to the frontier, and bartering there for supplies. Both from this circumstance and the near approach of General Gomez, Rivera was compelled to strike his camp at Tacuarembó, and retreat precipitately in the direction of Misiones. At the date of the last advices he was in the vicinity of Cuareim, towards which point the Baron de Caxias was also directing his marches in consequence of Rivera having received into his ranks a number of *Farrapos*, or Rio Grande rebels, who had escaped from a late defeat. Some people seem to augur important consequences from this step of the Imperial Commander, and to regard his late energetic conduct in pursuing a band of rebels into the Correntino territory and taking from thence a large number of horses that they had conveyed there, as an earnest of a more frank and just policy on the part of Brazil. We confess we are not very sanguine in this respect, but certainly if the Imperial statesmen be not too purblind to discern the true interests of their country, it is not too much to expect that they will at last see the expediency of adopting a less ambiguous course than that which they have hitherto followed. All doubt on this head will soon be removed; for Fortunato Silva, who, subsequently to his defeat at Santa Lucia, had occupied himself in laying waste the departments of Maldonado, Minas and Cerro Largo, has been finally obliged by General Ignacio Oribe again to seek shelter in the Rio Grande territory, after having been ignominiously repulsed by the inhabitants of the town of Melo, in an attack he made upon that place. An opportunity is, therefore, now afforded the Imperial authorities to evince the sincerity of their friendly disposition towards the Argentine Republic by the performance of an international duty, the neglect of which on a former occasion was ill-calculated to sooth the irritation produced in this country by the unwarrantable proceedings of Messrs. Sinimbu and Ponte Ribeira.

We may now be asked, where is General Urquiza if he has not gone to Entrerios, as has been so confidently asserted by the Montevidean press? Our reply is that General Urquiza occupies a commanding position in the centre of the State, his headquarters being at Antonio Herrera on the Yi, at a distance of about 35 leagues from Montevideo. After the battle of Sauce

Grande, he continued the pursuit of Rivera as far as the Rio Negro, when he relinquished it to General Gomez, (who was at the time in the neighbourhood of Paysandú), and took up the position which he at presents holds. General Gomez was at the date of the last intelligence near the Arepey, whether acting or not in concert with the Baron de Caxias, it is not yet positively known.

Such is the state of the belligerents in the field on the arrival of Mr. Turner, H. M's Charge d'Affaires, at Montevideo. In the whole length and breadth of the Oriental Republic, with the exception of the besieged capital, the authority of the legal government is every where acknowledged and obeyed. Why Montevideo remains an exception to the general pacification of the State, a very few days' personal observation will enable Mr. Turner fully to comprehend. He will see a town deserted almost entirely by its native inhabitants, and submitted exclusively to the domination of foreign adventurers, fed by the money of *neutral* merchants; and he will readily perceive the hypocrisy of the outcry of the very men who are speculating on the misfortunes of the country, against the prolongation of a war, which they represent as so disastrous to their interests. In view of this anomalous state of things, we trust he will exercise whatever powers with which he may be entrusted, with such dignified energy as shall effectually prove conducive to the restoration of peace and legal order, and to the rescue of the British character from the odium cast upon it in these countries, by the gross misconduct of the agents who, in the late transactions, have represented H. M's government at Montevideo.

It appears that the French Admiral, Lainé, addressed a circular to the foreign agents in Montevideo, on Wednesday last, informing them that he had that day transmitted a note to the Riverista government demanding the disbanding of the French legionists; and stating that in case of non-compliance, in the term of 24 hours, he would treat it as the enemy of France. So, it seems, the plot thickens. What will be the upshot? From the tenor of the speech delivered by Admiral Mackau, in his quality of Minister of Marine, in the sitting of the 24th January last, of the French Chamber of Deputies we can hardly make up our minds to believe that Admiral Lainé's instructions—even were his character formed of less solid stamina—will allow him, after having gone so far, to re-enact the farce in which good old Admiral Clerval was made to play so unenviable a part.

We insert elsewhere at full the despatch relative to the action which took place on the 28th ult., near the Cerro, as it shows the superior courage and discipline of the Argentine troops, compared with the mercenary adventurers who fight under the rebel standard.

"PASSION WEEK" passed with the usual solemn observances. The government procession to seven churches took place as heretofore on Maundy Thursday, the Minister of Finance, Don Manuel Insiarte representing the person of H. E. the Governor on the occasion. The various temples on this day were thronged in the extreme, perhaps never more so, yet the greatest order prevailed. The police were indefatigable, not allowing loiterers at the church portals, so that the immense crowd (particularly of females) passed and re-passed without the least difficulty.

On Saturday at mid-day, the firing of cannon from the Fort and National vessels of war 25th of May and Vigilant, discharges of fire works, merry peals from the bells of the churches, and joyful strains from the bands of the troops in garrison, announced that the hours for mourning had ceased. In the evening rockets streamed from every part of the town, twenty bonfires from tar barrels blazed on the Alameda, where suspended on a gibbet, was a Judas, attired in sky blue, with an inscription denoting that it was meant to represent Frutos Rivera. This effigy was burnt amid gun firing, discharges of rockets, the playing of music, and loud shouts. The evening was fine and the spectators were numerous.

A number of Judasses were also burnt in other parts of the town.

### STATE OF TRADE: LIVERPOOL

Business appears to improve, and every week now brings a large consumptive demand for our leading articles of commerce, and in many cases, where prices offer an inducement, speculation is afloat, and money is being invested to a large amount in merchandise of all descriptions. Of course cotton takes the lead in transactions of this nature, and it would not do to estimate the amount of business in other channels by the extensive operations in the cotton market; the fever still continues, and seems to be infectious, as every day brings new parties into the train of speculators. Never at any former time have such enormous sales been made as during the present week, and not less than 75,000 bales have changed hands in the last four days, all of which, it may be useful to state, is paid for in cash within ten days after sale, and the aggregate amount will fall little short of £700,000. Spinners have bought freely, but their purchases are more extended and not so heavy. It is a fact worthy of notice as showing the present abundance of money, that a sum, fairly computed at one million eight hundred thousand pounds sterling, has during the last month, been laid out in cotton by speculators. Time will show the issue, and if money be as abundant in the American States, or if credit be as high as in England, a profitable result may attend these gigantic operations.

**Outpost at the Cerro, March 20th 1844.**

The Colonel commanding the battalion of *Libertos* and infantry force at the Cerro, to H. E. the President of the Republic, Commander-in-Chief ad interim of the vanguard of the United Army of the Argentine Confederation, Brigadier General, Manuel Oribe.

At 8 in the morning of yesterday I received orders from General Angel Maria Nuñez, Commander-in-Chief at this outpost to march with my disposable force, the Battalions *Independencia* and *Libres* of Buenos Ayres, towards the Horno de Paraldo, where 100 men of the Battalion *Independencia*, and 60 of the Battalion *Libres* of Buenos Ayres, were engaged in a heavy skirmish on the left, the former commanded by the brave Captain Luis Miltos, and the latter by the valiant Adjutant José Narciso Eguren. The column having arrived, two companies of the Battalion *Independencia*, and one of that of the *Libres* were, by order of General Nuñez, spread out in skirmishing parties, under the orders of Major Nicolas Martinez Fontes, and the firing then became general, the cowardly unitarians reinforcing their skirmishers from several strong columns, and having in the field 2500 infantry, supported by their cavalry. In this situation I received notice that General Nuñez was dangerously wounded, and an order from himself that I should take the command of the Line. Observing from the manoeuvres of the enemy that they had in view to surround us, their right wing being 600 infantry supported by two squadrons of cavalry, their centre 1000 infantry, and their left 400 sharpshooters, the whole flanked by 500 infantry and 300 cavalry, I gave orders to retreat, which was effected with the greatest order, although under the fire of the enemy's numerous infantry, and our force altogether of both battalions only amounting to 300 brave fellows. Our left consisting of 200 men of the Battalion *Libres* of Buenos Ayres, under the orders of the brave Major Nicolas Martinez Fontes, fought in the most gallant manner whilst retreating. The right composed of the Battalion *Independencia*, under the orders of their intrepid Colonel Geronimo Costa, acted in the same courageous manner when flanked by 500 infantry, and these with the skirmishers under the orders of the brave Captain Pascual Galvan, and Adjutant José Eguren, were sufficient to keep the wretches at bay.

The whole of the enemy's infantry continued vigorously to assail ours, until at last we had no ammunition left, and the firing ceased throughout our line after we had expended thirty thousand musket ball cartridge. We were yet 15 squares from the rivulet, and our fine fellows, without any other defence than their breasts, continued their retreat, Colonel Costa by the Picada de Pezzi, and Major Fontes by the pass of the Bayoda. In this critical situation, the enemy might have annihilated our little band of heroes, but they did not dare to close with them, and a company of their cavalry were infamous enough to employ themselves in mutilating with their lances some gallant men who had been killed by musket shot, without daring to approach our ranks, although our soldiers had not a single cartridge left. Shame to the infamous unitarians!! Eternal honour, Excellent Sir, to those brave men, who being pursued in an open country by forces so numerous, and without one cartridge, could yet, by their intrepidity alone, keep these wretches in awe.

The two corps of infantry formed as soon as they arrived at the rivulet, and the miserable poltroons their enemies did not dare further to molest them.

I can assure Y. E. that the loss sustained by these wretches is very great as they were exposed in mass to the fire of our infantry.

We have to lament the loss of the brave Lieut. Gregorio Aranzivia killed, the valiant Captain Pascual Galvan wounded, 8 soldiers killed, and 24 wounded of that battalion, and in that of the *Libres* of Buenos Ayres, killed, the brave sub-lieutenant Manuel Santos Suarez, and Francisco Morales; wounded, the gallant brevet Major Manuel Valle, and sub-lieutenant Leonardo Sanchez; 10 soldiers killed, 11 wounded and 7 missing.

It only remains for me, Excellent Sir, to recommend to the high consideration of Y. E. the heroic courage displayed by Colonel Geronimo Costa, Major Nicolas Martinez Fontes, and all the officers and soldiers who compose this division; it is not possible for me to particularise, but I have deemed it a sacred duty to annex to

this despatch a list of the gallant officers who were in this heroic retreat.

The brave Lieut. Ramon Marquez, of the Battalion *Independencia*, who was ill at the Cerro, came with a small skirmishing party to support the infantry, and this too without ammunition.

God preserve Y. E. many years.

## VICTORIA THEATRE
