### BUENOS AYRES.

The French steamer *Fulton* arrived at Montevideo via Rio Janeiro on the 10th inst., bringing passenger from France the new French Chargé d'Affaires to this Republic, M. Marueil. The honorable gentleman is daily expected in this capital, and it is to be hoped that his arrival will have the effect of promptly repairing the mischief caused by the ill-advised proceeding of Rear-Admiral Lainé.

In the mean time the Argentine Government seems determined, despite the gallant Admiral's veto on the strict blockade of Montevideo, if not to debar all intercourse with that port, at least greatly to curtail it, as is effectually done by the following decree:—

#### OFFICIAL DOCUMENT.

Buenos Ayres, February 13th, 1845.

The Government of Buenos Ayres, entrusted with the Foreign Affairs, and of those of peace and war, of the Argentine Confederation, has ordered and decreed:—

Art. 1. From the first of March next ensuing, all communication with the city of Montevideo shall be closed.

2. The Captain of the Port shall not allow to be entered inwards any vessel proceeding from the port of Montevideo, whether direct, or from having called or touched there, whatever be the motive.

3. Neither shall those vessels be allowed entry which, in order to evade the provisions of the preceding article, leave the port of Montevideo for some other south of the line, to reform their papers, and by this deception seek to enter Argentine ports.

4. H. B. M's. packets from Europe, and the vessels of war of friendly nations are alone excepted.

5. The present decree shall have full effect whilst the city of Montevideo is under the dominion of the ruthless Unitarians, and shall cease the moment the army of operations under the command of H. E. the legal President of the Oriental Republic of the Uruguay, Brigadier General Manuel Oribe, shall enter that city.

6. Let this be published, &c.

FELIPE ARANA.

Venancio Flores, the late commander-in-chief of the besieged garrison of Montevideo, left that place not long since with a squadron of horsemen, in five launches, for the purpose of making a debarkation on the coast. Flores and 8 more succeeded in effecting a landing, but the vigilance of the inhabitants prevented the remainder of his followers from doing the same, and they consequently returned discomfited to Montevideo. As soon as it was ascertained that Flores was on shore, an active pursuit was commenced after him, and he was finally overtaken on the banks of the Rio Negro, when he and his party, with the exception of Lieut. Col. Tabares, who was taken prisoner, threw themselves into the river and swam across, leaving behind them 6 lances, 2 swords, 3 saddles, &c. The fugitives then separated in different directions; but the pursuit, although for a moment interrupted, had not been relinquished.

### THE LONDON GAZETTE OF TUESDAY, DECEMBER 17.

#### FOREIGN-OFFICE, DEC. 13.

The Queen has been graciously pleased to nominate and appoint William Gore Ouseley, Esq. (now Secretary to her Majesty's Legation at Rio Janeiro), to be her Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary to the Argentine Confederation.

The Pampero winds last week did some damage in Montevideo. The French barque *Atlas* was driven on shore, and the French and other vessels of war drove considerably. The Argentine squadron off Montevideo did not move an inch.

The Weather.—The sea breeze, as it is termed, has blown with considerable violence on every afternoon lately, giving a refreshing coolness to the atmosphere, but filling the streets with dust.

We received by the barque *William Peile*, English papers to the 21st December. They contain no political news of importance. The winter had set in very severe in Europe, but less so in England than on the continent. The following are extracts in this respect from a Liverpool paper of 20th December:—

The thermometer (Fahrenheit) marked at Paris on Wednesday morning se'night, at six, 18½ and at noon 21½ degrees.

The frost in Paris had drawn forth the sledges of several wealthy Russians who live there. In many parts of the provinces the internal navigation was

suspended by the freezing of the waters, and much beetroot was destroyed. On Friday night a thaw commenced, and continued during Saturday.

The thermometer at Turin, in the night of the 6th instant, was down at 17 degrees below zero of the Centigrade scale (the zero point of Fahrenheit.) In the morning several sentinels were found frozen to death in their sentry-boxes. Upwards of a century has passed since Turin suffered from a cold so intense.

On Sunday evening se'night, a man named Turgis, a watchman on the Quai de l'Isle, at Havre, on retiring to his cabin, the cold being at 10 degrees below zero of the Centigrade scale (14 Fahrenheit,) took in with him a brazier of charcoal, stopped up all the apertures by which the inclement air could make its way in, and was found dead next morning.

The *Sud* of Marseilles states that on the 8th there was the heaviest fall of snow in that city that has been recorded for a hundred years. The snow was nearly 50 centimètres (about twenty inches English) in depth.

DORDRECHT, Dec. 9.—The river before this town, which has been for some days filled with drift ice, is now completely frozen over.

A letter from Antwerp of the 12th says,—“The Scheldt is fuller of floating ice than it has yet been; the cold continues, and the sky is perfectly clear.”

It is stated by a Brussels paper that the cold in Belgium, last week, was so intense that several children were found frozen to death in the snow.

### SPAIN.

Madrid journals of the 6th December contain an account of the trial and condemnation, by a court-martial, held in the capital, of Colonel Rensgifo, Captain Garcia, and twenty others, for a conspiracy, or pretended conspiracy, in July last. The only evidence against them was given by eight soldiers, who had, for this service been raised to the rank of officers. The unfortunate officers were condemned to death. At Quesca, two peasants had been shot, by order of a court-martial. The Chamber of Deputies has adopted unanimously, the liberal members having retired, a measure authorizing the Government of the day to establish organic laws, without the intervention of the Cortes. The next step will probably be the abolition of that subservient and contemptible body.

The Madrid journals of the 8th bring more accounts of butcheries in the northern provinces. The *Heraldo* announces that the Government had been officially informed by General Breton, Captain-General of Saragoosa, that twelve individuals implicated in the late affairs of Hecho and Anso had been shot on the 3d instant. Fortunately, at Madrid, executions have not followed so quickly after arrest. The decision of the court-martial condemning Colonel Rensgifo, with two others, to death, and eight to the galleys, had been reversed by the Supreme Military Tribunals, and the proceedings declared illegal.

Accounts from Madrid of the 10th state that Colonel Rensgifo, Garcia, and Arilla had been placed *en capilla* (in the chapel.) Their friends were making great efforts to procure a commutation of the sentence, with apparently little hope of succeeding; for Narvaez, despite the representations of Mr. Bulwer and the Count Bresson, seems determined upon more slaughter, or examples, as he terms his butcheries.

The Atlas of 12th October, in an article on "Journalism," says—

In France we have seen M. Thiers elevated to the highest office, and using his position to goad his countrymen into a crusade against Europe and to fill his pockets on the Stock Exchange; whilst, at the present moment, a knot of journalists and literary adventurers compose the formidable war party, which, from their ascendancy over the minds of the honest and pacific, but inflammable masses of French peasantry, are very likely to embroil them in a war with this country. If we look to Spain we find Gonzalez Bravo, the editor of a Madrid *Satirist*, elevated to the Prime Ministry, and a knot of editors of newspapers exercising among a half-educated, ignorant community their dangerous power, to produce nothing but *pronunciamientos*, intrigues, and eternal anarchy. In fact, it appears from past experience that all these middle-class democracies, composed of petty shopkeepers, farmers, and peasants, are peculiarly liable to become the dupes of these journalists, and to run imminent risks of being compromised by them with foreign nations. Such seems to be a well-founded danger with the war party in France, who, if in power, would certainly embark their countrymen in an European war to-morrow, to abrogate the treaties of 1815, to recover the boundary of the Rhine, and to enforce their Propaganda by means of arms.



We received by H. M's. packet Spider, London papers to 4th December, Paris to the 2nd; they are chiefly occupied with the affairs of Spain. Zurbano appears to have eluded his pursuers. The following particulars respecting the younger Zurbano's execution are given by the *Constitutionnel*:—

"We have related all the details of the arrest of the son and brother-in-law of Zurbano in the environs of Logroño, taken in an olive-grove, where they were found concealed, but without arms. We have now received an account of the sequel from our correspondent at Bayonne. The son, a young man, aged 28, esteemed in the army, in which he held the rank of Major, excited a lively interest in the inhabitants of Logroño, and even the Moderados expressed a wish that the Queen's Government would spare him. General Oribe, who holds the command at Burgos, listened to these appeals, and considering, no doubt, that the real if not the only culprit in the eyes of the Government was Martin Zurbano, and that the circumstances attending the capture did not imperatively prove the complicity of Benito Zurbano and his uncle, therefore, notwithstanding the general order issued by Narvaez for shooting Zurbano and his confederates, deferred the execution, and applied to the Government for express orders. The inhabitants of Logroño, profiting by the respite, sent to Madrid a numerous deputation, among whom were the most important men of all opinions, to lay a petition for mercy at the foot of the throne. The mother and mother-in-law of Benito Zurbano also went to Madrid, and drew tears from the eyes of the Queen-Mother, by throwing themselves in the attitude of supplication in the road by which Her Majesty was passing in her carriage. Their ardent prayers and bitter sobs were of no avail. The Government remained implacable. An order was immediately dispatched to General Oribe to consummate the execution, and on the 25th ult., Benito Zurbano and his uncle, with their two servants, were shot at Logroño. This was not all the stern rigour of the Government; General Oribe was dismissed from his command for not having blindly followed his first instructions, and it is even said that he is to be brought before a court-martial!"

The correspondent of the *National* furnishes the following report from Madrid of the proceedings there in connexion with this act of sanguinary justice. His letter is dated the 25th ult. :—

"The Government has just caused General Oribe to be deprived of his command of Logroño, for not having immediately shot Zurbano's brother-in-law and son, after having merely proved their identity. Oribe is not suspected of compassion, but he was on the spot; he saw what interest Zurbano's relations excited in that country, where the services rendered, in the name of Isabella, by all his family, were well remembered. Men of all ranks and all opinions had besought the execution to be deferred, and the prisoner's wife had proceeded without delay for Madrid, accompanied by a deputation from the town and province, who went with her to implore the Royal clemency. A most heart-rending scene took place on this occasion. At the moment when the two Queen's were leaving the Palace, the young wife of Zurbano threw herself at their feet, and, with her eyes streaming with tears, and her voice broken with sobs, prayed and supplicated them at least to spare the life of a being so dear to her. The deputation joined in her request, and from the whole group arose expressions of the liveliest grief. All the persons who stood around appeared most deeply affected. The Queen-mother, it must be acknowledged, could not behold such a spectacle without feeling a strong emotion; but her daughter, the worthy daughter of Ferdinand, remained cold and unmoved as a statue. Neither the cries and despair of the poor woman at her feet, nor the supplication of the inhabitants of Logroño, nor the pity which for a moment affected her mother's soul, nor the emotion of the bystanders, could even cause a palpitation in this wretched creature's heart, who contented herself with drily replying to the unfortunate wife, 'The Council will decide on the request.' The Council accordingly assembled; and, to be present, Narvaez interrupted the pleasure which he was enjoying at Carabanchel with the illustrious Muñoz. No delight in Narvaez's mind is equal to that of ordering an execution. He therefore hurried in, and after the Council orders were despatched, at the same time, for the dismissal of Oribe and for the execution of Zurbano's son and brother-in-law! Again blood! Always blood! They will spill it until its fumes suffocate them! Oribe, besides, is not the only one deprived of his post. Another dismissal, which has produced a great sensation here, is that of the political Chief Benavides, furious Moderado, a very bitter Conservative, a man of violence, if ever there was one; but who, however, is not equal to those at present perpetrated. The following is the cause of his disgrace:—At the first report of the insurrection the Cabinet ordered him to drive out of Madrid a crowd of persons of all ranks, whose very name gave umbrage. This list of proscription was so extensive and so absurd, that Benavides thought it necessary to pause; and at once the Minister of the Interior called on him to send in his resignation. The other replied that he had no wish to quit his post, and that he must be forced from it. This was done, and General Chacon was appointed in his place! This nomination of a General to a place essentially civil has raised an outcry even amongst the friends of the faction. But they will still behold other similar acts!"

#### DEATH OF HER ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCESS SOPHIA MATILDA.

This amiable and benevolent Princess expired at her residence on Blakheath on the 29th November, after a short illness. She had been unwell at intervals for some time past. The lamented lady was in the 72d year of her age, having been born on the 23d May, 1773, and was sister to the late Duke of Gloucester. She had resided many years in the parish of Greenwich, and was the Ranger of Greenwich Park. The poor and afflicted have lost in her a sincere friend and benefactor. Her Royal Highness, it is well known, expended a large portion of her income in works of charity, and in patronising all subscriptions for the benefit of deserving objects, not only in her own immediate locality, but elsewhere. As ranger of the park, she was always solicitous to afford accommodation to the residents of the neighbourhood as well as the public generally.

#### EDUCATION IN RUSSIA.

By an Imperial order published at St. Petersburg, it is declared that no person will be permitted to act as public or private tutor in that country who is not a member of some Christian community, and provided with certificates to that effect, and also as to the morality of his general conduct, from the establishment in which he was educated, and the authorities of his usual place of residence. If a foreigner, he must also have a favourable certificate from the Russian legation of the country of which he is a native. It is, moreover, necessary that he should be a graduate of some university or college, or at least have a student's certificate.
