Long live the Argentine Confederation!
The Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Government of Buenos Ayres, Charged with the Affairs of the Argentine Confederation.

Buenos Ayres, August 19th 1851.
His Excellency Mr. de Urquiza, Director of the Argentine Confederation.
The undersigned has the honor of addressing to you a peace treaty which the Government of Buenos Ayres has concluded with the Government of the Argentine Confederation.

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Original State so demanded; the Imperial Government of Buenos Ayres, in order to sustain the legality of that just war, resolved to recognize it, and giving greater extent to this proceeding spontaneously offered to the Confederation, in treaty which is calculated not upon the Argentine legislation in its own favor, but in favor of the Empire, to realize the peace and authority of the Argentine Republic, in the interests of the Argentine Republic and of the neighboring States.

The Argentine Government admitted the advantages that would result from a peace convention of Brazil against the party hostile to the Republic of the Plate. It duly appreciated the motives of the Empire, but refused to give its assent, because it was incompatible with the peace and security of the neighboring States.

The operations of the war and the exigencies of terminating the contest as soon as possible, induced the Confederation to consent to the peace treaty, which was signed in Montevideo, on the 27th of July 1851.

Notwithstanding these singular exigencies, the Argentine Government towards the Empire, and that worthy position which the interests of both States, with the republicans of Montevideo, and other citizens of the Republic of the Plate, were bound to support.

The impunity which the omission of both Republics have afforded to the Emperor's troops, has prepared in the territory of both States, for the return of the Argentine Government, without the Brazilian troops, and preventing them from entering the Argentine Republic, and the security of the reclamations of the Argentine Ministry.
