The fourth point in the difference between the two boats is the place of the deck and also the depth of water being over 4 feet more abaft than forward...

Now, all these are peculiarities in the water, instead of above it, and therefore materially affect the performance of the vessel... It is quite as essential to a ship's performance to have its hull so constructed...

It is when we come to the sails that we find the most remarkable point in the water-works... It is worthy of the attention of every sailor when he best of our sails will stand and America's will fly.

I must guard you against the error of coming against a large class as may be likely to do...

We must adopt the best scientific principles of sailing... instead of allowing old maxims of sailing to govern us...

We must thoroughly revise our own system of rigging and cutting sails. The true theory of rigging is that they act as levers...

In conclusion, I have only to express a hope... that we shall not degenerate into vulgar imitation of our victor...
