The Minister of Foreign Relations of the Provisional Government and Provisionary

Chief of the Oriental Republic of the Uruguay.

The undersigned Minister Secretary of State in the Department of Foreign Relations of the Province of Buenos Ayres, has received orders from the Provisional Governor to

endeavor to see all the public documents upon the administrative relations of the

Provinces of this Government, which through your mediation may be submitted to the knowl-

edge of H. E. the President of the Republic.

The undersigned Minister Secretary of State by the great allied Army, under the

orders of the worthy Comandante en Jefe, the

General and Captain General of the Province

of Entre-Ríos, Brigadier General Don

José Justo de Urquiza, both the Province of

Buenos Ayres in a position to restore the

peace of liberty, and of the principles which

it has followed, and from which it could

not be separated by a tyrannical and anti-

national Government.

The Provisional Government has considered

that the mission is to give execution to the

orders of the Provisional Government, and

it hopes will be seconded by all those

from the Argentine Republic.

To consequently endeavor to get its first

objectives to maintain and draw closer the

relations of peace and friendship between

the Provinces of the Argentine Republic, all

the necessary steps will be taken that are

indicated by the present laws of the Argentine

Confederation.

With respect to such intimate ones, as

with the Oriental Republic of the Uruguay,

the undersigned Minister Secretary of State

intends to acquire it of its principles, and

of all its vital interests, and for the

benefit of the Governments may be carried

to the degree of intimacy that is required for

the identity of both Republics.

Having fulfilled the orders of H. E. the

Provisional Governor of this Province, the

undersigned Minister Secretary of State

seizes the opportunity of rendering to you

the honor of such a note, in the confidence

of the honor of the Republic.

Mr. Minister,

The undersigned, Under-Secretary, provisionally entrusted with the Ministry of Foreign Relations, having acquired the knowledge of H. E. the President of the Republic, the note of Y. E. of date the 10th instant, with the attached documents enclosed in it, H. E. has ordered him to reply in the following terms:

Great has been the satisfaction experienced by H. E. the President, on being informed of the change that has taken place in the Government of the Province of Buenos Ayres, in consequence of the splendid triumph obtained on the Plains of Morón, by the allied Army, under the orders of the illustrious Chief, H. E. the Governor of Entre-Ríos, Brigadier General Don Justo J. Urquiza, and in the confidence and hope being made acquainted by the communication addressed to the Ministry by Y. E., with the principles that regulate the march of the Provisional Government, and with the policy which it pursues, which has with respect to all Nations—and particularly as regards this Republic.

H. E. the President is perfectly aware that the relations of perpetual Peace and friendship, to which both Republics are called by their most important interests, render it necessary that those should be drawn closer which ought to exist between their Governments, and that it is his wish that it will always afford him satisfaction to act in this sense, so long as he continues to exercise the functions assigned to him by the Executive Power.

Having thus fulfilled the orders of H. E. the President, it remains for the undersigned to offer to Y. E. the assurances of this high and distinguished office.

In view of the just observations that have

been presented to the Provisional Government of this Province, by Don Jacinto Allibier, Chargé d'Affaires and Consul General of Spain in Montevideo, which by the means of the anxious desire of the Government of the Republic, and friendly relations, founded on reciprocal justice and benevolence, in the most necessary among Communities, united by ties of bonds of blood, interests, religion and language.

Desiring in view of to facilitate, as far as may be practicable for the Government, the official recognition of Communities that have long ago laid down their arms, and treated each other as brothers, establishing between themselves important relations of commerce, which they wish to cultivate for their mutual good.

Bearing also in mind the dispositions of the Government of this Province, for recognizing the independence of the American States, very especially in regard to the Argentine Confederation, by the Chargé d'Affaires and Consul General of Spain in Montevideo, when on the 21st of October, 1834, and the 20th of October, 1834, and the 20th Decree of 1837, confined to the administration of the Government, that result of them has been as follows:

And, finally, wishing to give an unequivocal proof of its interest, which will accept the application of Sr. Don Allibier, that he should be allowed to appoint *ad interim*, and till he has given an account to his Government of the friendly sentiments that animate that of Buenos Ayres towards the Argentine Confederation, and of the Government of the Province of Buenos Ayres towards the Argentine Confederation, has accepted and decreed the following:

Art. 1st.—Don Jacinto Allibier, Chargé d'Affaires and Consul-General of Spain in Montevideo, is authorized to appoint as regards the discharge of the functions of Spanish Consul in Buenos Ayres, till he give account to his Government, of Sr. Don Jacinto Allibier, of this Province, whom he may appoint, and may accept the persons whom he think proper, under the following conditions:

Art. 2d.—The present decree will be submitted to the sanction of the existing Legislative Assembly, in the session of the 15th of March.

Art. 3d.—Let it be communicated to whom it may concern, published, and given to the Official Register.

To the Justice of Peace of Matanzas.

By the peace yesterday, from the Justice of Peace of the Matanzas, H. E. the Governor has seen with complacency, that the school-house, erected by the division of the Justice of Peace, to be erected by means of a School-house, and a Police Hall, for which purpose the Justice of Peace proposes to proceed to the appointment of a Commission of residents.

H. E. is thoroughly persuaded that the most prompt and efficacious for their attainment. Consequently he approves them, and appoints the Honorable Sr. Don Jacinto Allibier, of the district, who comprehend so fully its interests, and will not refuse to assist in the execution of the same, in any way that may at present be practicable.
