Viva la Confederacion Argentina!
Department of Finance—
Buenos Ayres, July 1st, 1852.
The Government of the Province, wishing to be enlightened in the measure of Finance it may require to dictate, and to fortify its march by the opinion of citizens respectable from their probity and intelligence, has accorded and decrees—
1st.—That the establishment of legal order in the Province, a Council of Finance formed, composed of nine citizens of the province shall be named the Government in the affairs it may submit to its deliberation and determination.
2d.—The following citizens, named by the Council—Mansur, Bernabé Escobar, Salvador Moya del Carril, Nicolas Anchorena, Francisco Pino, Ignacio Martinez, José Barros Pina, Felipe Llanos, Francisco Moreno, Amancio Alcaraz.
3d.—The Minister of Finance shall be President of the Council, and the Under-Secretary of the Ministry, Secretary.
4th.—The Ministers shall have a seat in the Council, and may explain and discuss the matters that are proposed to the Government.
5th.—The Council shall hold stated meetings on the Tuesday and Friday of each week.
6th.—The 5th of the current month is appointed for the installation of the Council, and the Councilors shall take the oath and the solemn promises to which they are sworn by the Governor of the Province, accompanied by the Ministers of Finance, and the Secretary.
7th.—Let it be communicated to the citizens elect, and to all whom it may concern; published and given to the Official Registry.

The Provisional Government of the Government—
Buenos Ayres, July 2d, 1852.
In order that the owners and operatives of printing establishments may not suffer further prejudice; and with the decided determination of protecting everything that may be essential to the welfare of the Government of the country, counteracting at the same time the license, whereby the press may be abused because there are persons who said abuse anarchical, and destroys the prestige of the Public Authorities, which always should be held to be the safeguard of order, and the chief support for the realization of lofty and benefic views, declaring in mind and deed, and in fact, that what has happened among ourselves, and the disorder arising from the press, are elements in nations infinitely older and more advanced—
The Government has accorded and decrees—
Art. 1st.—The Chief of Police shall proceed to remove the seats placed on the printing offices, allowing the continuation of their labors.
2d.—In case these establishments publish periodicals, they may treat without impediment all persons who wish to subscribe to them, and in case they wish to engage in what are called, questions of domestic policy, or personal polemics, must do so in the name of themselves, and not in their individual positions, such publications must be allowed to take place, until the approbation of persons enlightened and practically liberal in the opinion of the country, and of the Government.
3d.—For this purpose a secretary of the press is formed, which is charged to proceed to the realization of the aforementioned views.
4th.—General Don Manuel G. Pinedo, Don Marcos Sauro, and Don Fabian Molina are appointed to exercise the duties of the said Secretary.
5th.—In case of a direct or malicious contravention of what is provided in this disposition, with the previous opinion of the three above named persons, the Government will proceed to cause the establishment, whose it may have proceeded, to be shut up for two months, to a longer period, according to the gravity of the case.

6th.—Any communication or anonymous paper that may contravene this provision, shall render responsible the printing-office whence it may proceed to the Government.
7th.—The effects of this decree shall cease as soon as the ensuing Legislature dictates the Law that is to regulate the press, with the guarantee of order and public decorum.
8th.—Let it be communicated, published and given to the Official Registry.

Resolution adopted by their Excellencies the Governors of the Provinces of Salta and Tucuman, the Minister (Secretary) of the Province of Cordoba, respecting the Congress celebrated at San Nicolas de los Arroyos, between the Excellencies the Governors of the Argentine Provinces.
We the undersigned, Governor and Captain General of the Province of Salta, Tomas Arias, the Governor and Captain General of the Province of Tucuman, Don Benito Barcoza, the Provisional Director of the Government of the Province of Cordoba, Dr. Genaro Carranza; assembled at Palermo de San Benito, to take a resolution in consequence of the article additional to the Compact celebrated by their Excellencies the Governors of the Argentine Provinces at San Nicolas de los Arroyos, on the 31st of May of the present year, for which purpose we have been invited to meet in conformity with the aforesaid additional article, by H. R. E., the Provisional Director of the Government of the Nation, sanctioning the Compact celebrated by their Excellencies the Governors of the Argentine Provinces.
Taking into consideration; that said Compact is the expression of the will of the Provinces we represent, and prepares in a certain and an immediate manner, and in the belief of a General Congress, that most organ of the Nation, sanctioning the fundamental Charter of the Constitutive Provinces.
That it provides for the peace and tranquility of the whole Nation, and its security and respectability also.
That it conciliates and regulates the respective interests of the Provinces, in what concerns their commerce, their political relations, and the preservation of order in each of them.
And finally that it establishes a national authority during the period that must precede the organization of a National Congress, and the organization of the Constitutional Powers.
Have resolved to adhere, and do in fact adhere to, and subscribe the aforesaid Compact, of their Excellencies the Governors of the Confederate Provinces, in the name of those of Salta, Tucuman, and Cordoba, which we represent, and in virtue of the respective laws that have been conferred upon us for said purpose.
And for the due validity of this resolution, and that it be communicated to the other Provinces, we subscribe fifteen copies of the same text, two of which shall be transmitted for this purpose to the hands of H. R. E., the Provisional Director of the Argentine Confederation.

My Distinctioned Absolution—
I have the esteemed note of Y. E., of the 26th instant, I see the deference and approbation Y. E. has received in the determination I had adopted, and the suggestions I pointed out in my last, which affords me very great satisfaction.
On the 27th, I arrived at this point, and though from the great extent of this Department, it has not been possible to receive an answer to the notes I have addressed, I can assure Y. E. according to the information I have received, that all is now in complete tranquillity. The anarchical shout of the demagogues in the Capital has found no echo in the country, and on the contrary, there is evident in all the individuals a uniform execution of the duties of order, and in the determination of supporting the worthy and patriotic march of Y. E., and of the Magistrate who now presides in the Institutes of the Province.
Colonel Olimas, who had received an exaggerated account of the occurrences in the Capital, had already taken measures for maintaining order, and Colonel Serrano, who had obtained licence on account of his indisposition, to repair to the Capital for medical attendance, and who had already started, being likewise misinformed, returned from the neighborhood of the City, to place himself at the head of his regiment. The conduct of these two Chiefs manifestly suited it to the knowledge of Y. E.—
"The day after to-morrow, I set off for Dolores, having thought proper to remain here for this date, and to await Colonel Olimas, who was at a different point, definitively arranging his views. He assures me that he has the already enclosed fifteen hundred notes, and when I receive the necessary reports from the other points, I will return to Y. E., a general statement of the whole Department.

Foreign intelligence.
ENGLAND.—The leading Opionist journals are concluding that peace, and the love of, or rendering E. R. Derby more insignificant than Mr. Benjamin Disraeli, was the great object in that way was expected. The great after a close scrutiny of what Earl Derby has said, made, and intended to do, Earl Derby recently denied the *spissima verba* that he was quoted against him; and when in the end he concluded to have recourse to the press, he felt the general impression that he was not entitled to have his name mentioned.
If you can give me the precise terms in a verbal contradiction; but the *acts* look so shifty, and inconsistent, and involve so much, as to be English gentlemen, and not men of honor, as permitted by them."
The *acts* of the General Election is interesting, and matters not satisfactory to the country, and in putting themselves in their support, in the face of an extraordinary inconsistent position, by this unaccountable course, and in opposing to him Earl Derby as Prime Minister, declaring Protection, and the Navigations Laws finally and irrevocably settled, and in opposition to him, Lord Almonston, on the promise of *reviving* these same Navigation Laws. In fact, the Conservative Government are proceeding to put Earl Derby on those two points, exempting the remission of a duty on the article of corn; but when he has the assistance of the Government by Earl Derby and Mr. Disraeli, it is evident they have come out upon the country with extraordinary resolution, and in an unambiguous, but unmistakable upon no one point, and they have been very successful in giving in their classified report of the claimants, in consequence of the pillage of the 4th of August, and in the immediate distribution of the proceeds received from the articles recovered.
