Viva la Confederacion Argentina!
The Government of Tucuman.

Tucuman, 15th June, 1852.

To H. E. the Provisional Director of the Argentine Confederation, General Don Justo Jose de Urquiza.

Yesterday the undersigned had the honor of addressing to You, Sr. Don Marcos Sastrero, in consequence of acquainting you, that by the laws sanctioned by the Honorable Chamber of Representatives, on the 20th of May, Don Celedonio Gutierrez had been named from the Government, and the undersigned named Proprietor for the legal term of two years, and authorized to reprint presently, or by means of a Plenipotentiary, in the City of San Nicolas de los Arroyos, Tucuman, when the Plenipotentiary who was authorized had named, in exercise of the authorization of the Honorable Chamber, was allowed to set off a communication was received from Señor Gutierrez, in which he announced that the aforesaid Convention had finished its labors, and to which he appended a copy of the laws, as they are, to the Honorable the Governors of the Confederation, on the 21st of May last.

The undersigned, in discharge of his duty, immediately submitted to the knowledge of the Chamber the communication, in question and the comments. The Chamber, full of enthusiasm, has approved and ratified it on the part of the Province, and has ordered it to be sent as one of the laws, as well as to be informed by the certified copy, which the undersigned has the honor to send you, and which has been approved, which authorized me, as Plenipotentiary, to the Government of San Nicolas de los Arroyos, Tucuman, to sign and send Mr. Y. E., a Commissioner, in order to thank you in the name of the Province, for the services which you have rendered to the entire Confederation, laying the bases of the National Organization, and to explain to you the actual position which the Province has assumed.

On transmitting to You, and resolution of the Honorable Chamber, the undersigned feels much complacency in congratulating You, Sr. for the provisional direction of the Confederation, which, by the means of your Representatives, have so deservedly conferred upon you, and in the Government of Tucuman are secured, in that measure, and in the objects of the beautiful programme of You, Sr. of May of the preceding year. They are an infinite number of hopes. Most Excellent Sir, that the beginning now have thanks to You, Sr. that you are realized, and You, Sr. may rest assured of the gratitude of the Confederation, and in particular of this Province.

It is my mission which the undersigned has been authorized to send Mr. Y. E.—It has been committed to Dr. Don Salustiano Zavala, who is to start tomorrow to discharge it.

God preserve You, Sr. many years.

To H. E. General Don Justo Jose de Urquiza, Provisional Director of the Republic.

Tucuman, 14th June, 1852.

Most Excellent Sir,
The People of Tucuman, so agitated in the different crises of the Republic, have not ceased for a fortnight to remember the names of their martyrs, the names of the institutions, have shed their blood that some kind of sacrifice might be made for the Argentine Nation being organized, according to sound principles of order and liberty, the chief objects of which the resolution of they will be accomplished. Providence had reserved for you, illustrious General, the distinguished glory of your glorious deposition at Caseros, and disarming generally at San Nicolas. You have restored life and happiness to the Argentine Confederation, and you have crowned the aspirations of the People of Tucuman. As the works of God are perfect, so yours are perfect, and in your salvation, poised in this great enterprise, with the fact of wisdom and the firmness of immutable destiny. The hand that conquered at Caseros, has undone the guardian knot of so many opposite interests, so many conflicting parties, without using the sword as a hero of the old times; and the great character of your Argentine, against which four elements, and the

SUMMARY OF OFFICIAL DOCUMENTS.

(The italics reference to the official dates of their publication in the "Provincia.")

July 7th.—Decree rejecting all the offers presented for the duties on cattle introduced for the consumption of the City, Saladeros, &c., laying the following scale of duties, on cattle introduced for the consumption of the City, at the cattle pen to the North, 2 dollars each, at those to the West 3 dollars, and for Saladeros, &c., 4 dollars per head; with instructions to receive new tenders on said duties.

Note from the public Engineer, Don José M. Romero, to the Minister of Public Instruction, regarding account of the falling in of the roof of one of the saloons of the Public Library.

Note from the Governor of the Province of Santa Fe, to H. E. the Provisional Director, giving account of the measures adopted for the security of the property of the Church, threatened by the intrigues of a band of ruffians, who invoked as their pretext a sanction of the Honorable Chamber of Representatives of the Province of Santa Fe, by which the Treaty of San Nicolas is declared a law of said Province.

July 8th.—Circular from the Minister of Foreign Relations to the Argentine Provinces, urging upon them the importance of securing statistics, in proportion as to the extent of their respective territories, climate, products, manufactures, population, &c.; recommending a careful publication of the data, and that those which have not the means of sending them, should send their statistics to this City, where the publicist will be given to them.—Also announcing the cessation of weekly posts for all the interior routes, to foster business and intercourse by expediting correspondence.

Note from the Minister of Foreign Relations to the First Mayor General, desiring him to systematize the service of his department, by fixing out only the days of their arrival at the different stations in their progress, that they should manifest, on each day, at the precise period of their return. Said dispositions to be communicated to the Governments of Tucuman, Mendoza, Cordoba, and Rosario, regularly in the transmission and delivery of the public correspondence.

Note from the Ministry of Government, postponing till September 11th, instead, the customary solemnities in honor of the Ninth July.

Note from Don Marcos Sastrero, to the Minister of Government, expressing his appointment as a member of the Jury of the public press.

Notes from the Justices of Peace of Quilmes, San Andres de Giles, and Tuyo, requesting the suspension of the Property-tax for the current year.

July 9th.—Decree from the Department of Foreign Relations, appointing Don Ramon Alvarez, General of the Argentine Confederation in the Republic of Bolivia.

Decree from the same naming Don Basilio de Samuilin Vice-Consul of the Argentine Confederation in the City of La Paz.

Decree from the same, appointing Don Pedro de Arce, Consul General of the Confederation at the port of Tucuman.

Decree from the Department of Finance, authorizing the Peruvian Consuls to deal to attend personally or by substitute at all public sales, so as to ascertain the amount of duties on merchandise, and every article, understanding to be summarily decided by the Collector General.

Decree from the same, obliging auctioneers to present a certified copy of the amount of their sales, on the last day of each month to the Collector General.

Decree from the same, ceasing the market dues to Don Manuel Roset.

Circular commanding the attendance of the Masters with their respective Employes, on Sunday the 11th inst., at the religious celebrations in honor of the anniversary of the declaration of Independence.

Note from the Government of Tucuman, announcing the deposition of General Guzman, the submission of Don Manuel A. Espozosa, as Governor and Captain General of the Province. See Official Documents.

Law of the Hon. Legislature of Tucuman, annulling and ratifying the treaty of San Nicolas, and authorizing the appointment of a Special Commissioner near the person of the Provisional Director, to explain the actual position assumed by the Province.

Note from Don Salustiano Zavala, special Commissioner of the Government of Tucuman, announcing his arrival at Salalillo de Santiago on the 20th June, and that he was also bearer of a vote of thanks from the Province of Tucuman to General Urquiza for the important services he had rendered the Republic.

July 12th. Decree from the Department of Finance, regulating the rent of iron properties belonging to the State; whereby they will give \$1220 monthly, instead of \$205 as heretofore.

Communication from the Justice of Peace of Chivilcoy, relating to the petition of the said District, and suggesting the expediency of forming a central establishment, near the center of the District, by erecting a Church, a School House, a Police Office, &c. To accomplish these objects, an area of one square league of ground is required, to be subdivided into farms or villas, with a duty of 20 cents an acre, and a tax on other grain exported from the District, with a similar impost on each head of cattle. With these revenues it is proposed to pay the Chaplain, School-master and Surgeon; placing the benefits of religious and moral instruction, secular education and medical attendance within the reach of all.

According to a Census taken in 1850, the population of the District amounted to 9243, comprising 616 establishments, and 40 hours of business, expanding from 700 to 800, 900 dollars annually of home manufactures and foreign goods, besides the supplies received direct from the Capital. About 45000 English acres were devoted to the cultivation of wheat, giving an average produce of 135,000 fangs. In 1847 Property-tax was levied on \$14,000 dollars of capital, represented by cattle, and on \$2,029,500, represented by other property; which is supposed to be not more than one fifth the actual property of the District, as nearly all the native proprietors were then exempted from said tax.

13th July.—Decree from the Department of Public Instruction, admitting the resignation of Dr. Francisco de Paula de la Cruz, University, and appointing Dr. José Barros Pavia to fill said office.
