I am, therefore, who, with a spirit and decision hitherto unknown, have accepted the most arduous and most sacrificial of principles, rooted in rancid and inveterate aristocratic maxims,—are considerations, Mr. Minister, of a Minister, that could compel me in my turn to be defeated, and to die at that noble call.

Suffer me for a moment, Honorable Sir, to disburden a heart agitated by so many emotions; for who could fancy that in this very Buenos Ayres, the cradle of American liberty, it should have been usurped and withheld for 42 years from thousands of compatriots, who battled in bloody fields, securing her liberty and independence? And who can believe that in the year 1852, a principal of liberty has been inaugurated by a political regeneration, in 35 or 30 days, that has sufficed to destroy the prejudices, and to justice by opening the gates of the sanctuary of the law to her brothers and compatriots, who have contended in hundred battles?

Sir, in 1810, I grasped the sword in favor of liberty, encountering the most cruel vicissitudes of the war, and the shout of liberty then inflamed my breast, in the same that on the 11th ult., was raised, and I take part in the popular movement, and my heart is inflamed at seeing that the decision and my antecedents, which I regard as having been nothing else than a faithful compliance with sacred obligations, and that I occupy the position in which I now stand; and which I propose to discharge with the ardor and enthusiasm of an old soldier of the Independence.

With this manifestation I will proceed to comply with the order of the President. I avail myself of the opportunity respectfully to salute the Minister, whom

To the Minister Secretary of State, in the Department of Government, Dr. Don Valentin Alsina.

I have had to-day the honor of receiving the note of Y. H. of the 4th inst., by which you are pleased to acquaint me that I have been appointed to fill the office of Criminal Judge of the 1st instance at present vacant, charged by Dr. Miguel Esteva Sagui, Y. H. desiring to tell me, that you are ordered by H. E. the Governor, to request of me that he and the country expect, from my patriotism and interest for the public cause, that I will not recede the important services to which I am called.

After having served said office for more than eleven years, and with the affection which I always dedicated to a charge of such responsibility, I had formed the resolution of returning to my native land.

But at the appeal of my lawful Government in such solemn circumstances, I consider that my strict duty requires that I accept that may be allotted me, subordinating all to the exigencies of the cause of my country; because after the glorious proclamation of the 11th September, which has united all its sons, no one can refuse it his cooperation. Since, Mr. Minister, you inform me that I have offered it without reserve, and with all sincerity to my Government.

Be pleased, Honorable Sir, to manifest to H. E. the Governor, that possessed by these sentiments, I have not hesitated to accept, as I do gratefully accept the honorable destination assigned me, and that I will omit nothing to correspond worthily to the confidence thereinwith I am honored.

To the Minister of Government, Dr. Don Valentin Alsina.

I received yesterday the note of Y. H. of the 4th inst. by which you acquaint me that I have been appointed, by a decree of said day, to discharge the office of Attorney General of the State, Y. I will therefore serve for my Country, for this beloved land, with the same ardor to depress and degrade, I will serve without hesitation. I will serve, because the ardent patriotism of our countrymen, and because you now form the column on which our liberties and rights are supported. It is an invaluable honor to be placed in such a position. I resign myself, Sir, despite my individual interests, wherein of truth I am prejudiced, as I resigned myself in the same situation, though not so august as the present, to accept the office of Judge of the 1st Instance.

If fate has decreed that I shall be employed; if only thus I can be useful, I will resign my wishes of independence for a further term.

I shall not be the first to set an example of indifference in this respect, inasmuch as in which our Country is placed; I am never and H. E. was justified in expecting.
