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SHIPPING INTELLIGENCE.

This important British interest has found an able champion in Mr. Cardwell; and certain measures mooted in the House of Commons, have turned public attention strongly to the abuses connected with the department. In reference to these the Shipping Gazette of the 8th March contains as follows:—

Last night Mr. Cardwell, in moving for leave to bring in a Bill for the improvement of the Law of Prizes, alluded to a long course of measures intended for the relief of the Merchant Navy of the kingdom. The right hon. gentleman does not much think it actually to be done for the Shipping interest. It will only be when the several specific measures are before the house that we shall be able to give an opinion on the merits and the real value of the intentions of the Government. But, although we have no assurance of what Mr. Cardwell proposes to do, we can gather some idea of what he does not intend to do. He thinks it would not be desirable to consider the Light-houses of the kingdom—these, at the Trinity-house, the Dublin, the Wick, and the Commissioners of Northern Light-houses; but he does not state wherein the difficulty or the advantage of these was either from the expense in that the Shipping interest, although there may be a mitigation of it, by a strict limitation of the same; or from the expense of the Light-houses were intended; so we suppose the Shipowners must accept such "an arrangement" as they can get, and not presently for "a full measure of justice." Whether the passing tolls—Dover, Margate, &c.—are to be continued or not, we cannot say; Mr. Cardwell only announces that they are not to be charged on the coastwise trade. But it is no use dwelling further in the negatives of the President of the Board of Trade, as we shall have ample opportunity of considering them on other occasions.

We have more pleasure in noticing what we are sure the Shipowners will consider a grievance, and which we have long recommended, as being due to them on every principle of justice. They are no longer to be under the restriction of the tonnage of their vessels; they may engage as many foreigners as they think proper; and mercantile Marine, it will be seen, is not necessarily much longer the same. We have continued the reasonable restriction of our ships, without inflicting a serious injury on the Merchant Navy, or the shipping interest; but we cannot say, with this subject, Mr. Cardwell made no allusion to the registration and the tonnage of vessels, which, in our opinion, may now very properly be discontinued. Mr. Cardwell's will relate to Demerits, that clause are in preparation by which the evils at present complained of by Shipowners, will be removed. We are sure, we shall not venture to contradict the good intentions of the Government, one of the greatest evils that at present fall upon Shipowners engaged in the coastwise trade, is that Mr. Cardwell will find he has a Herculean task before him, and we hope may succeed in his efforts to the satisfaction of the Shipping interest of the country.

A GREATLY TRIMMED SHIP.—The *Guano* captured by the *Black Daily Advertiser*, says:—"A complete revolution in the means of steam navigation and locomotion is anticipated here from a recent invention by Dr. Casotto, of Italy. He has, it is said, succeeded in constructing an apparatus, the decomposition of water by electro-magnetism, which will introduce the gas generated into the engine in a way to save all the expense of steam, and which can be applied by means of valves and automatic engines, and a company has subsequently been formed in London, which has secured patents for the United States, with letters from our Minister at Turin to the heads of the Patent-Office at Washington."

MEXICAN LAWS WITH REFERENCE TO SHIPPING.—According to the laws at present in force in Mexico, the cargoes of all vessels clearing from any port in the state of rebellion against the constitutional authorities are immediately confiscated on arriving at any other port in the Republic. It matters not whether the goods be the product of the country or of foreign growth, the same incoercible law is enforced. We learn from California papers that no less than five cargoes, which have recently arrived at Acapulco from Mazatlan, have been confiscated, and the vessels carrying them heavily fined.—"Boston Post," Feb. 18.

In connection with this subject, we also recommend attention to the following notices of California, of date San Francisco, Jan. 15th.

"The almost incessant rains which have prevailed for the last several months over the plains, and out of all communication with many portions of the mining districts, have caused a stagnation of trade. Druggists and hardware are most unfavorably affected by the present state of the weather. Breadstuffs, provisions, and other articles are sold in moderate quantities to supply present wants. The price of flour, in consequence of the scarcity of this article for several months past, has been the extremely high price of flour and provisions, consequently the prices for flours. The chief cause of the short supply of flour, for which article we have been importers upon Call and the Atlantic States, is the miscalculation made upon incorrect statistical information. The merchant cannot ascertain the amount of our present population or its probable increase for any given time, and consequently the consumption of the prime articles of life have been underestimated for the last year. At the present moment there is not above a month's consumption of flour for the whole States, and on the whole of the west coast of South America, during the greater part of the present year, is consumed in the dominion of Australia. Very little wheat has hitherto been grown in California. The effect of the high prices ruling here is, however, leading to an extension of agriculture, and to the erection of flour mills.

"About the entire stock of flour has passed into speculators' hands, and is now held at rates varying from \$34 to \$35 per ton; but the present price of flour has been brought up on speculation at \$15 to \$18, but this operation has not yet caused a rise in price to the consumers. A cargo of Sydney coal sold the other day at \$23 50 per ton, and has been resold at \$26. The Vancouver's Bay Island coal will attract the attention of the Hudson's Bay Company engaged in the speculation. The price charged by the company at present is \$10 per ton, which is a very high price. This coal, if brought regularly to the coast, will sell in San Francisco at a trifle below the price of the best Sydney coal. For a voyage to the coast of California, a ton of coal would give \$14 per ton would give a good freight; and, if the trade is encouraged, it would be likely to give rise to an employment to some of the English ships frequenting this coast.

"While on the subject of the article of coal, I would mention that a late decision of one of our law courts fixes the duty to be charged on this coal on the rate of 10 per cent, of export, and not, as heretofore charged, on the price current at the principal ports of the country, in consequence of its destination. This decision is considered to operate materially in favour of the shippers of coal from England, and to the great advantage of the English coal is shipped at a port where the price rule is low.

"The bulk of general merchandise is heavy, owing to the suspension of sales, and the supply on hand has been considerably increased since the heavy rains which have been made to it since the 1st inst.—no less than 50 vessels, both American and foreign, having registered in the port of this city. There are at present 30 English vessels in port. The prospects of English vessels obtaining freight are bright, and not good."

Black Prince procured lately nearly a full cargo of whale oil and other articles for Valparaiso, at from \$8 to \$9 per ton; and an occasional shipment of oak-leaf from the mines of New Almaden, near San Francisco, at a freight of the per bush, is sent in Callao and Valparaiso. But return cargoes are rarely to be obtained, and not to be counted upon. Occasionally an American vessel obtains part of a cargo of hides for the States. The only return cargoes upon which English vessels can depend from the west coast are guano from the Chincua Islands, and copper ore and nitrate of soda from Chile. Whale and sperm oil may sometimes be procured from the Swedish Islands. As a general rule, it is advisable to secure cargoes more profitable than a horse-cargo, or from some of the ports of the west coast, or from China the East Indies.

While upon the subject of Shipping, I will take the liberty of again calling attention to the slow-sailing class of English vessels which frequent this port, and to the injury which the English trade sustains by their inability to compete with similar vessels of our American cousins. The disparity will be seen by the following facts:—Of the 24 British vessels which entered the port of San Francisco for five months ending with last December, 16 took over 300 days to make the passage; 10 took over 200 days; 2 took 200, and another 330 days to make the passage. The average time was 141 1/2 days; and only two vessels succeeded in making it under 101 days. The average time for this period was 191 days—was 205 days. These facts of great importance connected with these passages; for instance, the passage of the *Black Prince*, in 1852, incurred such unpleasant reflections as to lead our friends to suppose that the short voyages are complained of the satisfactory condition of their cargoes.

Turning to the subject of the Atlantic, I find that the average passage of American vessels of all classes from the Atlantic ports for the whole of last year was 191 days—speared which only two English vessels attained in five months; while the average passage of American ships to San Francisco was speeded to the best of our vessels. I called attention to this subject some time ago, and I do so again at the earnest request of some of the English merchants at this place, who are continually being placed in a false position, by their consignments arriving at the open port for their sale has passed direct from England to San Francisco. The recent state of the weather has unfortunately caused much suffering in the mining districts, and the supply in most of the mining districts is very short and in many quite exhausted, while the wretched state of the roads renders the prospect of obtaining fuel supplies out of the question. Some of the mines have taken place in the northern mines. The suffering in the southern districts has been much less, and no large quantities of fuel have been sent to the severity of the winter, the mines, from all accounts, continue to produce as much as usual.

The gold exported during the three months ending with December was in value \$3,000,000. The amount exported in the amount exported in December of a million of dollars, owing to the bad weather having retarded both shipping, and not travelling from the mines. The sum manifested per the *London* Golden Eagle today is \$744,300. The amount of the passengers, 510 in number, carry about \$250,000 to \$300,000 more, which is not the amount of the passengers.
