

them likewise to precipitate General Urquiza into greater aberrations; for availing themselves of the influence they acquired, by moving him towards the capital, and of the blind submission which certain Deputies to the Congress used to said General, they have obtained, that the resolutions of the Interior Rivers, which, according to their own stipulations, were to be approved by the Congress, have already been approved by the Constituent one.

The Government trusts that the Province will not sanction by their silence this scandal, that may at some future period compromise the tranquillity of the whole Republic.

Confiding in the friendly sentiments which it has accredited to this Province, the Government has requested from it the removal of the mutineers who took refuge in said Province after they had been expelled. They conspire against the public tranquillity of that of Buenos Ayres, and the Government confidently expects, that it will energetically accredit the truth of those sentiments, in reciprocity of those of peace, justice and fraternity, which form the underlying policy of the Government of Buenos Ayres.

After the confusion entailed upon the Province by the City, the Government seriously confined its entire attention to the regulation of the City and the country districts.

In the first moment, in accordance with public opinion, it devoted its efforts to the apprehension of those who had been encouraged by the impunity they enjoyed last year, were the first to run and enlist themselves under the banner of the Republic to continue there, as they did continue, their system of blood, assassination and robbery.

Surrendered to the Government, which Government fully expects, that on this occasion the laws will be executed, justice vindicated, and our society constituted.

With a view to the preservation of Peace, the Government also found itself under the necessity of retaining in the Capital certain bad citizens, who, abusing the clemency of the Government, promanaged the streets, when they had been expelled, which they had impudently fired upon this City, had hardly yet been despatched above the fortifications.

It was to test the forbearance of the good, and the Government considered it the least it could do, to retain in the Capital, for some time, who after having offended the Country, had not even the discretion to know how to conduct themselves.

During the struggle of the City in defence of the law, there were some public functionaries, who showed themselves so indifferent and as the Government could not be indifferent with them, it deprived them of their places and emoluments, and ordered that one or the other upon citizens, who in discharge of their duty had devoted themselves to the Country during the war.

It must afford you satisfaction to learn, Gentlemen, that the arrangements of elementary education continue to prosper. Their number has been increased in the City and in the rural districts, in the spirit of the youthful school, and the number of the Teachers affording reasonable hopes that they will be useful to the Country.

The University presents the most gratifying aspect, because our youth are now to be seen in it, devoting themselves to the usual studies, and to the study, as they ran to grasp their arms in defence of the laws, if badly directed and untaught, they would have been the first to assemble to devastate them from this virtuous youth. The Government devotes to it every attention and care.

The School of Medicine, and now entitled to the consideration of your Honorable Corporation, The Professors and Students, which were always the first during the siege to fulfill their delicate obligations even in the midst of danger, have also been the first who assembled to devote themselves to the study and cultivation of the sciences.

This department has received important improvements. Its regulations have been reformed; its studies systematised, and a Chair of Chemistry and Medical Medicine, which was treated, which had never before had, and which is of the highest importance.

The Hospitals are in a satisfactory state. The Administration of the Corporation of the General Hospital for Men, and the Beneficent Society in that for Women, render important services to the Country.

The College for Orphan Girls, and other establishments of education, thank to the zeal and intelligence of the Ministers entrusted with their direction, unquestionably promise, Gentlemen, that the education of our girls will be of a very good description. Supplied with good Teachers, with excellent Superintendents, and with all the elements which the Government can supply, the Beneficent Society justly develops, our country is entitled to expect much from this interesting portion of our population.

The Beneficent Society, with maternal solicitude, dispenses its indefatigable attention to the Foundling Hospital, which is in a situation that does credit to the Country, and affords real satisfaction.

Works have been re-established for the Interior Provinces, and three monthly posts have also been established in our rural districts, which will be of great service to the City, will powerfully contract the division which General Urquiza attempted to foment, and will be of great service in front of our City, tending the rebellion.

Public worship is conducted with all the splendour which our Country is entitled to. The Churches have been repaired and adorned; and the Government, animated by

a sense of duty, and also in imitation of the public duty, has aided, and will continue to aid them, as far as the state of our public tranquility shall admit. The Government has given special attention to the Parochial Charges, removing a few of the Curates, who, by the obligation of their sacred Ministry, and of the incumbency of them as citizens, had distinguished themselves during the war by their co-operation in favor of anarchy and disorder.

Said Parochial Charges have in general been filled up, and will continue gradually to be filled as said Curates receive a discharge with dignity their obligations; for the Government is determined, in filling up the vacancies, not to proceed by nomination, because it prefers that there be no Curates, rather than send unworthy Priests, who, by their negligence and their enormous harm by their conduct, to morality and public order.

Some reforms have been introduced into the administration of Justice by the Government; which were urgently demanded, and which will be given to your Hon. Corporation.

The formation of a new Code, or the reform of the present ones, has become, Gentlemen, an important business for the Government, during the short term of its command, has been able to do very little. Nevertheless, it has the honor of the Most Excellent Chamber of Justice, consulting at once economy and the best system, and in conformity with the views, to surmount great obstacles, arising from our legislation itself, extending its views to the public tranquillity, which has long been demanded by the interests of our immense population; diminishing the number of Courts, and abolishing, in commercial trials, abuses that seriously affected Justice, and tended not a little to favor it, and which, unfortunately, have unfortunately become prevalent, that the Collegues were mere defenders of the parties, and not promoters of the Cause, Judges, who sat in review. On this account the Government extended the nomination of the Judges, to all the provinces, to the exclusion or distinction of nationality; thereby intending to afford greater facility and to favor it, and thereby, moreover, giving the foreign commercial body, a proof of esteem and confidence.

The formation of the Government will present all these measures to you, for your examination and approval, and will manifest to you the reasons, which induced the Government had for putting them in execution.

Meanwhile it must be gratifying for you to learn, that the Magistracy daily and in a surprising manner, presents a considerable moral force; which justly applied in favor of our Society, gives as a fruit of its administration, the prevention of crimes, and an efficacious correction of offences.

The Members of the Courts of Justice have earned the esteem of the Government, and the gratitude of the community; for their sagacious and prudent management, and the discharge of their high functions, they are so surmounting formidable obstacles, arising from the situation of the Country, the Republic, and from the character of our legislation. The Government recommends them, and begs of you to be so.

The Provisional Government of the Province.

Buenos Ayres, Oct. 1, 1853.

To the Hon. Chamber of Representatives.—It having been determined by your honorable sanction, that the solemn opening of your ordinary Sessions should take place on the 1st of October, the Provisional Government of this Province, in compliance of placing in your hands the Message to the present Legislature.

In complying with this duty, it considers itself the honor to manifest to your Hon. Corporation, that its mission has ended, and that the moment has arrived when you must resign the reins of government to the permanent Government.

The Provisional Government on consenting to resign the reins of government to the strength, manifested to your Hon. Corporation, that he accepted it till the moment that he should be proclaimed Minister of the Proprietary, and moreover because he trusted that the Ministers who had passed through the hands of the Government, had captured, had offered him their assistance and cooperation till the day when, the Legislature should be proclaimed by the nomination of the permanent Government.

In consideration therefore that said movement has taken place, the undersigned, in the name of the Ministers, have of retiring to private life, the undersigned requests your Hon. Corporation to admit the resignation of all possible brevity to the election, which is now the more urgent, in that the undersigned is now the more anxious to be admitted to the resignation of the Minister of Finance, in consequence of the compromise entered into by him, in consequence of which, when he accepted said Ministry. This circumstance is about to enhance the difficulties of the Provisional Government, if it were to organize a Ministry, it will be difficult if impossible to find any nation who will consent to furnish the Finance for the present period, from the difficulty he will naturally have in undertaking anything in a limited period.

In this contest the Provisional Government presents to request of His Hon. Excellency, the prompt consideration of this subject, in order that the election being effected, the Administration that is succeeded it, may render to the country services of more positive results than the undersigned can render in his Provisional capacity.

God preserve your Hon. Corporation many years.

SYNOPSIS OF OFFICIAL DOCUMENTS.

[To facilitate reference we give the date of their publication in the "Tribuna."]

Sept. 30.—Decree cancelling the appointment of Don Estanislao de Velasco, Minister of the Synod of Clergy, and appointing Don Mariano Marin to the vacancy.

Decree ordaining that no individual can simultaneously hold an appointment from the Government of Buenos Ayres and from General Urquiza, as Consul in any foreign Port. Decree appointing Don Juan de la Cruz, Consul of the Province of Buenos Ayres, in the City of Malaga, Don Jaime Garez, in the City of Zaragoza, Don Juan Manuel de Goranua; Don Justo Mazorra at the Hannah; and Don Francisco Roget, at Matanzas, to hold appointments from the Provisional Government.

Decree cancelling the appointment of Don Juan Frías as Consul General of the Province in Rio Janeiro, and of Don Manuel de Yrigoyen as Consul General, in their stead respectively, Don Adolfo Galvo as Consul General, and Don Juan Milberg as Vice Consul.

Notice to capitalists, natives and foreigners to present estimates for the construction of docks, wharves, and other establishments in public markets and killing grounds, or other exercises of public utility; with the undertaking of the Superior Government, in propositions, which the Government will submit to consideration and submit to the Hon. Chamber of Representatives, in consequence of the privileges solicited, if within thirty days after the opening of their ordinary sessions, there should be no other competitors.

Oct. 21.—Message of the Executive to the Legislature of 1853.—See Official Documents.

Resignation of H. E. the Provisional Governor.—See Official Documents.

Decree suppressing the Office of admitting Physicians to the Men's Hospital; and thanking the late incumbent for the exemplary manner in which he had discharged his duties.

Decree appointing Don Augusto Milberg Consul General of this Province in the City of Hamburg, in substitution of Don Fernando de Salazar, who resigned his appointment from the Government under General Urquiza; but thanking Mr. Schlicher for the efficient manner in which he had discharged his duties.

Decree appointing Dr. Bartolomeo Villar, Consul of the Province of Buenos Ayres, in the City of Havana.

Decree appointing a Commission to elucidate the Military Law, the President of the Senate, Don Matias Aguirre, General, Colonel Echeagui, Torrijan, Nazari and Basilio, to be members of the Commission. Decree cancelling the proceedings, Generals Espinosa and Flores, and Colonels Ramon Rodriguez and Melendez, and appointing Felicio Janet & Brother, for lighting this City with Gas, to be contractors, for the year, with an exclusive privilege for 10 years, with a right to recover 288 monthly for each door to the Street, and 38 for those within a radius of six squares from the Plaza de la Victoria.

Decree cancelling the Wharf Dues at the Boca de San Juan Villanueva, for the sum of \$4550 monthly, being the most advantageous to the Country.

Report of the Captain of the Port, stating that 63 merchant vessels, of 50,300 tons, 1083 Sailing Vessels, of 13,417 tons, 7928 Tons.—Coasting craft, arrived 250 tons, of 2870 tons; sailed 3600 tons, of 4200 tons. Passengers, arrived, 960; departed, 570.

Note from the Captain of the Port to the Ministers of the Interior, the Chief of Police, Morbus and Yellow Fever, &c., had entirely disappeared, one Medical Inspector had resigned his office, and another, suggesting that Don Pedro Rojas should be retained.—Reply accepting the suggestion.

Decree appointing the Commandant of the South, stating that communications from Fort Independencia to the 24th Sept., 1853, had been received by the Commandant, and no symptom of any movement on the part of the Indians.

Decree appointing Don Juan Alvarez, requesting his discharge from the military service, which he may attend to his private affairs.—Reply accepting the resignation.

Oct. 16.—Commencement of the Constitution of the School of Medicine of Buenos Ayres, established by decree of the 29th October 1852.

Note from the President of the Hon. Chamber of Representatives, to the Government, announcing his own election; and that of Don Domingo Olivera as 1st Vice-President, and of Felipe Lavallol as 2nd Vice-President.

Note from the same to the same, announcing that the ordinary Sessions of the Chamber would be opened on the 1st inst., at noon.

Another from the same to the same, announcing that the Hon. Chamber had admitted the resignation of Don Bernabé de Valera, representative of the 12th Section of the Capital, as Deputy in the room of Sr. Estanislao de Velasco.

Decree, appointing the 16th inst. as the date of a Deputy in the room of Sr. Estanislao de Velasco.

Note from the same to the same, stating that Dr. Estanislao J. Torres, elected for the 25th Section of the Capital, had made male choice of the 1st Section of the 3d unrepealed.

Decree, fixing the 19th inst., as the date of a Representative in the 3d Section of the Capital, the Ministry of the Interior, admitting said resignation, and thanking L. Carrozza for his important services.

Decree appointing Don Juan Manuel Frías, under the charge of the Minister of Government, till the vacancy be filled up.

Decree appointing Don P. Zermeno, Consul of the Province in the City of New York.

Decree cancelling the designation of Plá of Misereiro to that of Market 11th of San Pedro, and of the "Cedi," San Pedro, and of the "Protección," San Pedro, to the Superior Government.

Note to the Government of Santa Fé, in consequence of the expulsion of the fugitives, as dangerous to the peace and tranquillity of this Province.

Decree from the Postmaster General to the Minister of Government, complaining of detentions and annoyances to the Public Reply, enclosing copy of a reclamation to the Government of Santa Fé, on this point.

Decree from the same to the same, reporting the result of the correspondence with the Interior Provinces and suggesting that the public posts, should in the meantime be relaxed, from 9 to 4.—Reply approving and sanctioning said arrangement.

Note from the Commandant of the Boca de San Juan, to the Government, announcing that he had destroyed to the extent of 1875 yards.

Decree from the Chief of Police, reporting the Alcaides and Tenientes Alcaides for the different sections of the Town of Buenos Ayres.

BUENOS AYRES.

The popular mind instinctively grasps at results; seldom stopping to notice or appreciate the slow and toilsome process by which they are obtained. In consequence of this ordinary cause it is perhaps best if should be so. A minute inspection of the ordinary manipulations, would add little to the zest of a good dinner, and our ignorance of the ingredients of a prescription may sometimes attend to the medicinal qualities, without detracting from its salutary quality.

In matters of policy and diplomacy, in which the result is so often the object, we are apt to fret, when they cannot soon be implemented, palpable results, on which to found their contentions, and to justify our confidence. Hence the unceremonious charges of infidelity and apathy, that have occasionally been directed against the Provisional Government, and from quarters where they were little to be expected.

The memorable events of July, the order and tranquillity of the Province, the activity of commerce, and the peaceful enterprise, the details of the Message, and the moderate and conciliatory Circular to the States Provinces, and our sign and dignified manner in our relations with the States Garcia Treaties, are the best eulogium of the Provisional Government, and a conclusive reply to the charges or insinuations that they show, not the little, but the much that has been done, and the individuals who support it, are as capable and worthy, as the deep debt of gratitude due to its members, and the community of Buenos Ayres, were a further proof wanted of patriotic disinterestedness, and of the prompt and judicious resignation undertaken by the Honourable Chamber of Representatives.

ELECTION OF THE PERMANENT GOVERNMENT.—This may now be classed as the epoch of our political history. The "Tribuna" and "Nacional" have arrived at conclusions diametrically opposed; the former in favour of an immediate election, the latter regarding the necessity of an immediate nomination. Truth or expediency may be pleaded by all parties, Representatives of the Sovereign People, are the only parties competent to judge and decide; and we have no objection to a contest of any nature, and in any form, not merely a tolerant forbearance, but a zealous and conscientious support of the duty appointed by the Constitution for the day. The practice of the great Model Republic, in this, as in various other respects, is deserving of careful study and implicit imitation.
