MESSAGE OF THE PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OF THE PROVINCE OF BUENOS AYRES TO THE LEGISLATURE OF 1853.

[Concluded.]

WAR.

The Army of the line of the National Guard have deserved well of the Country, for their valour, decision and virtues during the defence of the City of Buenos Ayres, and the other Chiefs who have conducted deserve the same praise for their firmness and triumph of the cause of liberty, and the firm establishment of order, and the legal institution.

The rebellion being concluded, the Provisional Government directed all its efforts to the consolidation of the National Guard, retaining for the Province a powerful army to combat its enemies, and guard its frontiers, inseparable from the difficult situation from which we had just escaped, and one that had been perpetuated to us by a tyranny of twenty years. The Government has endeavoured in the same time to alleviate the burden of the citizens, and to contribute to their welfare.

It would not be necessary to proceed immediately to the disbanding of the National Guard of Infantry. It was necessary to reduce to about 10,000 men, and to divide so many soldiers for the defence of the City, and to afford to devote themselves to their ordinary pursuits. It was necessary to obstruct the industrial and commercial progress of the Country, leaving for the latter time to the citizens under arms, and separated from their occupations. It was necessary to guard against the evils of the war, and to restore the riches of the Country, and to give to the Public Treasury, reducing them at once to their normal state of being. Finally, it was necessary to extend the same measures to the National Guards, that had so spontaneously made them, when demanded by the safety of the Country, and which it considers the Government had in view in deciding on the immediate disbanding of the National Guard of Infantry.

The Government regretted exceedingly not being able to reward the services of the National Guards; but the circumstances of the Exchequer did not admit of it, and it had to confine itself to decreeing certain honours.

Nevertheless the Government considers that the valiant National Guards will more than amply deserve these honours, and that all sums that might have been assigned them; and especially the approval of their conduct, and the consciousness of having worthily discharged so noble and sacred an obligation, is the greatest reward that can be conferred upon those who combat for the liberty of their Country.

It is a thing that the Government devoted its attention was the *Fuerza Legionaria*. The Valiant Legion and the Spanish Legion, are the most distinguished and the most important services to the defence of the Country, and covering themselves with honours and laurels, they have merited a title to the gratitude of the Community, for which they have shed their blood.

But your Hon. Corporation must be unaware of the inconvenience there is in having foreign corps, organized in the time of peace, and in all countries, and at all times, these corps have accepted only as an unavoidable necessity of the circumstances, and that experience has had to restore these active and intelligent hands to their industrial pursuits, and to their families.

To these considerations are to be added, that the Executive could not without the special permission of the Legislature, to maintain foreign corps in time of peace; nor could the Public Treasury support the maintenance of these corps, and the Legislature that enjoyed such high pay, and the terms of whose engagement had already expired.

But your Hon. Corporation must be aware that there have not been sufficient forces for the recovery of the Country. The Government has intended to reduce the Legion, confining it to duty by every means within its reach, the esteem and gratitude of the Government and people of Buenos Ayres.

It also sent to your Province the individual law of the *Corps Legionario*, and the law for the defence of the liberty of this Community.

General have become unnecessary; a better order and security in the expenses of said Department have been established, public utility which is the best guarantee of an Administration, has been increased, and during the short period elapsed since it commenced its functions, important savings have been effected.

The Government has also directed certain departments of the internal administration of the Army; and by means of them, and of those that may henceforward be dictated for the thorough organization, it will be possible for it at once to act in a normal manner, and such as becomes an army of the line. Thus the formation of exact estimates, indispensable to a good Administration, will be rendered still easier.

The present state of the army of the Province is the most satisfactory. The infantry forces of the line, after having combated with glory in the defence, are animated by an excellent spirit of discipline and morality; and are a guarantee for order and public security. Orders have also been given for the formation of corps of cavalry of the line, which are so necessary for the protection of the frontier; and a decree of enlistment for the purpose has been dictated.

The National Guard of its army, and the unenvying devotion of the National Guard, has nothing to fear from its enemies. These latter, if they should attempt to constantly threaten the frontiers, by their rapacious instincts, and other concealed means, will find themselves without any opportunity of hostilizing it.

With respect to the former, the Government has recommended to the general command of the ordinary Commander of the cavalry division. And it is in your country, and also from the success of the present military and valuable order in the country division, and to the National Guard of Infantry, expediting the suppression of the military Commandants, especially upon the frontier.

It is necessary to recommend to the Government that in the districts of San Isidro, San Fernando, Concha and Quilmes, and considers they ought to be suppressed likewise in other districts, which, from their vicinity to the City, may receive orders directly from the Government, and be in direct communication.

But it does not think that it can be done on points of the frontier, where the National Guard of Cavalry must be organized in a formal manner; an organization that cannot be left to the care of the Justices of the Peace, who in general are destitute of the knowledge and qualifications requisite for the purpose. About this, Hon. Representatives, a resolution that has been adopted according to the particular cases; and especially the special conditions of each district, and that is impossible to state in this respect a general measure.

The Government considers that by the measures which have been taken, and those daily dictated, the Province will be secure, and the tranquillity of the Province, and the better to guarantee this security, so essential to the tranquillity of our Republic, it has had to take the most diligent measures, both in the formation of cavalry corps of the line, and in the enrolment and organization of the National Guard of Cavalry.

As to the other enemies, the Government has not neglected to take the most effectual kind. Impoverish, without soldiers, without money, and without prestige, they have sought to be suppressed by the Government. But the Government, not choosing from a culpable impression, to expose the country to the fact effects which would result from an invasion, made by our enemies from the territory of the contiguous Provinces, has sent the distinguished general, Don Manuel Rosas, that, without aiming with a strong division upon our northern frontier, he may watch our enemies, and that he may report on our enemies. MARINE.

To accomplish the reorganization in our ranks of the Squadron that obeyed the orders of General Urquiza, it was necessary to spend large sums of money. This event also increased our Squadron in a considerable degree; and it was necessary to think on reducing it, to diminish the heavy expenses required for its maintenance. For this purpose of the Government. It also diminished the personnel of the Marine, discharging all the Chiefs and Officers of the Government had generously rewarded, by assigning them large sums of money.

DECLARATION OF THE GOVERNOR AND CAJAZAS GENERAL OF THE PROVINCE OF BUENOS AYRES TO THE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE.

The Honorable Chamber of Representatives that you freely elected to represent your rights, has designed to honour me by appointing its confidence that I might be charged the Office of Governor Proprietary and Captain General of the Province. In assuming this position, that I might be visually exercised, I have had occasion to know the immense difficulties that I have to surmount. I know it to be a task greater than my strength; but animated by the call of my Fellow-countrymen, I could not be indifferent to the voice of the Country. If in this exalted post I have consented to the sacrifice of my convictions, it has been in the thorough persuasion that my Compatriots are now animated by the ardent desire to maintain peace and internal order at all events.

Compatriotes and residents in the Rural Districts.—It is to address you from this place, belonging to no party, and to recognize no other enemies than the Tyrants that may attempt to humiliate the frontiers of our land; and the Military Chiefs that may attempt to plunder it, and depress the dignity of our Country.

Compatriotes!—You may all rest assured, you may all devote yourselves to your country, and to the welfare of the Country, that you will not be torn from your homes, to carry war to distant and foreign countries, that you will not be exposed to the laborious fatigues, in the assurance that your country, the fruit of your labour, will be put in jeopardy, and that you will not be obliged to arms for those small exigencies of public order, or should the land which supports you, and which you have so dearly attached to; then, and only then will you hear the word of war from your Governor and friend.

Address of the President of the Supreme Court of Justice, to H. E. the Governor Proprietary and Captain General of the Province.

"Most Excellent Sir!—If the high honor which has been conferred upon Y. E. by the Honorable Chamber of Representatives, by placing in your hands the reins of administration of the destinies of the Province, be a very just motive of satisfaction to Y. The Justiciary Sir, has received unequivocal proof of the liberal sentiments, and of the zeal and promptitude, wherewith Y. E. and your most meritorious Ministry have contributed as far as possible to its dignification and improvement. With unshaking confidence it therefore expects a practical continuation of the same sentiments; and it in fact and auspicious path, now opened up to the Country before Y. E.; the Justiciary can in any way contribute to lessen or remove the obstacles that may be put in the way; it now proffers its cooperation with all its strength, and with its most cordial and ardent sincerity. Meanwhile, on every occasion, it has the ineffable satisfaction of presenting to Y. E. its most cordial congratulations, for your auspicious and merited elevation to the first Magistracy of the Province, which distinguishes every thing, Sir, from the patriotism and capacity of Y. E.

To which H. E. the Governor replied:—"Most Excellent Sir!—I appreciate intensely the cordial felicitations addressed to me by the Supreme Court of Justice. The Government has already to acknowledge the solicitude and labour, wherewith Y. E. has so greatly distinguished himself, and which account. Foreign Intelligence.
