Order must be enforced, and security restored in the country districts, at whatever cost; otherwise the "Sacredness of the Government," to use the terms of Dr. Porta, is inevitable, with a train of other calamities, that we need not at present stop to enumerate. With such goings on, it is a farce to talk of immigration, or other projects of improvement. Who is to be benefited? We commend their acquaintance or countrymen to the encounter such a world!—At all events it is high time foreign immigration should be self-defence and mutual protection; throwing away the vote and making a nation of peace, order, security and a rational progress.

**CONFEDERATE PROVINCES.**—In our first paper will be found the text of the National Government, declaring a National Currency, and imposing restrictions and limitations that will be sufficient to protect and protect foreign import commerce. With a currency subject to the fluctuations already experienced in the market, and with such restrictions on time are quite impracticable, in the face of these arbitrary and obnoxious restrictions. Thus the blow aimed at the unfortunate, will not fall with unerring certainty, and at stunning effect.

We also find a glaring inconsistency, on comparing the terms of this Decree, with the 6th Article of the British Treaty of 1825, which stipulates that "freedom shall be allowed in all cases, to the buyer and seller to bargain and fix the price of any goods, wares, or merchandise, and to import or export, from the said United Provinces, as they shall see good."

In the Decree under review, this "absolute freedom" is reduced to tiny dimensions. But we deprecate the kind of interference, and diplomatic reclamations. The evil will cure itself; and the sooner in proportion to its violence and intrusion.

### Foreign Intelligence.

The News from Europe, down to the 1st of July, are less exciting and decisive than our Impulse led us to expect. In the absence of any great action, all the partial advantages, both in the Baltic and the Black Seas, are in favor of the Western Allies, whilst in the Danubian Principalities, the Russian are evidently in a disquieting position, that holds out some hopes of a Russian success. The following extracts are abridged from the European papers of the 3rd inst.

**SIEGE OF SILISTRIA.**—On the 5th and also on the 9th instant the Russians attempted in vain to force the fortifications of this latter location they lost nearly 2000 men. On the 13th three mines were sprung before Silistria, without effect, and on the 14th the Turkish sappers were ordered to the walls. The Russian storming columns were prepared to mount the expected breach; but, as they were not allowed to enter the walls, a fearful slaughter took place, and the Russians fled in terrible disorder. The Turkish sappers were ordered on the 15th in removing their dead. Three Russian generals were severely wounded, and all the Turkish sappers were severely wounded. General Schilder had just been transported to Kalarsch, severely wounded. It was thought a body of 1000 men would be dispatched to relieve Silistria took part in the battle.

Prince Paskewitch, who was on his road to Jassy, is said to have been ordered to retrace his steps, and to return to the siege of Silistria, is confirmed. He was killed on the 9th May, by a grenade, after an assault, which cost the lives of 1000 men; he had refused two millions, which Paskewitch had offered him to give up the siege of Silistria. The Russian general, Seirum Pach, with 30,000 men, who having feigned to give battle to the Russian army, retreated, and moved in an army which permitted him to introduce 2000 men into the city.

On the 15th inst. the garrison of Silistria made a sortie, attacked the Russians on all points, and drove them across the Danube. Pursuing their advantage, the Turks crossed an arm of the river, seized the opportunity of attacking the Russian batteries, and from which Silistria had been bombarded. The Russians fled to the Wallachian bank, and were compelled to witness the destruction of their batteries.

The Turks then brought out their guns and erected batteries on the Bulgarian bank of the river, before the north face of the fortress.

The Russian battalions cast and west of Silistria immediately began to recross the river, destroying the bridges as they withdrew. The garrison on this occasion was assisted by the Russian general, Pach, who was killed by Omar Pach. Some of the troops of the latter took part in the battle of the 13th, and the Russian general Pach, was killed on the evening of that day.

There was nothing voluntary or strategic in the rising general, and it is considered that which preceded the route of the 15th had been followed by extensive movements, with the object of reinforcing the besieged fortress. Constantinople, June 12.—Marshal St. Arnaud has returned from Varna, where another Council of War has been held. The division of the Duke of Cambridge is embarking for Varna. The division under Prince Napoleon is camped at Dooch Pacha.

Constantinople, June 15.—The Duke of Cambridge, with the first division of 700 men, left Constantinople for Varna on the 12th inst. and is expected to arrive to-morrow, and to be ordered to enter staff, goes to Varna to-night.

Advices dated Varna, June 15, state that the Duke of Cambridge, with the first division of the British army, had arrived there on the preceding day.

Prince Napoleon is about to embark for Varna on the 18th June. Four thousand French troops had arrived at Adrianople. The Duke of Cambridge's division had arrived at Pravaia. Adm'l Bruat's squadron will enter the Black Sea to co-operate with the British fleet.

MALTA, June 12.—The 41st and 6th regiments of Dragoons have arrived here. Captain Waller's regiment has been ordered to Varna, having been thrown from his horse.

Before the end of the month the entire army will be concentrated in Bulgaria. General Bosquet, with the advanced guard of his division, entered Adrianople on the 10th inst. and is accompanied by a numerous escort went out to meet the general, who was hurried at the gate by the Archbishop of the city. General Bosquet had also sent his aide-camp, Selim Bey, to Constantinople to report on the conduct him to Silistria. On the 13th, the remainder of the division arrived at Adrianople. That painful task had principally devolved on the 10th and 11th regiments of Chasseurs de Vincennes. The Sultan was to review the division on the 17th.
