### FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

**FRANCE.**—The fact of the Empress Eugenie being exiled is confirmed. It is generally reported that the French Government intend to increase the army of 25,000 men are to be sent to Varua with little delay as possible.

It is reported that Lord Stratford de Redcliffe and Marshal de St. Arnaud had serious differences since the arrival of the latter in Paris, and that the French Government is very anxious that Lord Stratford should be recalled. It is also stated that Marshal de St. Arnaud, in his recent despatches, strongly insisted on the recall of Lord Stratford, and that he had undertaken extensive ramifications in the department of Varua, has been discovered in the south of France, and that more than 150 persons have been already arrested. The conspirators have formed themselves into a secret society, and their object is said to have made an attack on the person of the Emperor during the visit which he is to make to the baths in the Upper Pyrenees, in the coming autumn. In the south a great deal of corn has already been destroyed, and the ear very full, and the stem strong and green, and there have been instances of very heavy rains here, and the weather which has prevented them doing any harm.

London was visited on the 13th by a most violent thunder-storm, during which the lightning killed several persons. A well-known man, near the chateau, the trunk of which eight persons with their arms extended were blown away, and between several horses were killed and carts overturned, and much damage done to the vineyards.

The *Monitor* announces that the resignation of M. de Persigny, as Minister of the Interior, has been accepted by the Emperor. M. de Persigny is named Grand Officer of the Legion of Honour, and the Emperor has expressed his regret to a letter to M. de Persigny that he has declined to accept the position of Minister without a portfolio. M. de Biliault, President of the Legislative Body, succeeds M. de Persigny as Minister of the Interior.

It is believed that the Emperor's *Empress* will leave Paris on the 20th instant for the Pyrenees, or perhaps on the visit which she is expected to make to the army at Marselles. The Empress, whose health is, it appears, by no means robust, will pass some time in the Pyrenees, and will often visit in other towns, and preparations are already making at Biarritz, which is only distant half an hour from Bayonne.

**PORTUGAL.**—We have accounts from Lisbon to the 13th inst. Disasters had arisen by the Government on one side, and the contractors on the other, which were likely to compel the latter to appeal to the tribunals, and possibly to stop the works. The Minister had been ordered to suspend the House of Peers respecting the two Operto vessels, *Guerra* and *Trojan*, which are said to have landed safely at Oporto, but no satisfactory information was elicited. Those vessels left Oporto about the time the Viscount's Embassy was ordered by the Government of London. Count Pahlen, one of the most zealous of Russian diplomats, had been dining at Lisbon for some time, and it was thought the agents of the *Czar* were preparing to depart for the coast of the Miguelite bays. Information had reached Lisbon that wives of Madeira had been sailing to universal destruction, and that within a few days of the date of the last account.

**GERMANY.**—The following is the summary of conditions made between Austria and the Swiss Confederation:—The Swiss promise to discontinue all revolutionary exiles out of the country. The other refugees will be sent into the interior. The Confederation promises to lend an attentive ear to reclamations of Austria, and that the Swiss Government shall always have a list of the fugitives residing in Switzerland.

—The *Corriere Mercantile* mentions a rumour current at Milan, according to which a camp of 40,000 Austrians is to be pitched at Val d'Aosta Mines, ostensibly for military evolutions.

The Military Commission at Massa has just published a report on the conduct of the landholder, to death; and an artist, named Fontana, to hard labour for life, for attempts on the life of the Duke of Modena in a republican sense.

The *Milan Gazette*, of the 14th, publishes an official order dissolving the Austrian military corps on the frontier of the eastern of Ticino.

According to advices from Turin of the 14th, it is stated that the Judge Gabryi who had been charged with the preliminary of the first order, the general order, the Duke of Parma, was mortally wounded with three strokes of a pistol in the street of Parma on the 12th inst. 46,000 troops in the vicinity.

**NAPLES.** June 14.—A French agent had arrived in Naples, and proceeded to the provinces for the purpose of purchasing Government cattle, to supply the army in the East. The agent, having learnt this, has published a decree, which forbids the exportation of cattle from Two Sicilies. This is an official act from France and England.

—The King has provisionally Gates, and returned there from the summer. The fortifications are increased daily.

**AUSTRIA.**—The Vienna correspondent of the *Times* states that the Emperor of Bohemia were not over courteous to the Emperor, and his bride on their recent visit to Prague. They dislike to see men of plebeian birth, and (as they consider) democratic principles in the cabinet. The same writer also says that the first general order of Austria having been consulted on the policy to be observed towards Russia, their duty was not to be altered, but to be more liberal than those of the other powers.

General Von Hirs is appointed Commander-in-Chief of the operations of the army under his orders the Archduke Albert, who will command in Transylvania, and General von Bismarck in Galicia.

**AUSTRIA AND TURKEY.**—The *Monitor* announces that, according to a telegraphic despatch transmitted the day before yesterday, the convention between Austria and the Porte for the eventual occupation of the Danubian Principalities is, in part, as follows:—The Convention was signed on the 14th inst.

**DENMARK.**—The *Monitor* publishes the following from Berlin:—

"The reply to the Confederates of Denmark is that the Emperor will not be submitted to the Diet, unless the majority of the States announce their intention to withdraw their consent."

**RUSSIA.** St. Petersburg, June 17.—An imperial ukase authorizes the Minister of Finance to take the necessary steps for the issue of paper money, which are to produce six millions of silver roubles, and completes the issue authorized by the imperial ukase of the 18th Jan. last. A mercantile house here has failed for 1,500,000 silver roubles.

The Israeli prisoners in Russia have received from the Government the intimation that they are not expected to offer up any more prayers for the success of the Russian army. The *Czar* appears to distrust the prayers of a community which he has mistreated.

**RECALL OF THE RUSSIAN AMBASSADOR AT VIENNA.**—The correspondent of the *Times* writes from Vienna, 13th inst. "On Friday night, June 30.—I am assured that Baron Meyendorff received his letters of recall from the Emperor, and that the Government diploamate relations with Russia will be broken off in consequence."

**RUSSIA.** St. Petersburg, June 20.—On the 20th and 23rd of June the Turkish vanguard, consisting of 15,000 men, was defeated by the Russian rear-guard, and drove it beyond Trajan's Wall. The details of the battle are wanting. It is stated that the Russian army has undertaken an expedition against the Crimea. 300 transports are being prepared in consequence at Varua and at the mouth of the Danube, and the Gallician frontier.

**EXCEPTIONS AGAINST THE CHINA.**—A letter from Constantinople states that the *Czar* has, in concert with the fleet, and under the personal command of Marshal St. Arnaud, ordered the Russian fleet to undertake an expedition against the Crimea. 300 transports are being prepared in consequence at Varua and at the mouth of the Danube, and the Gallician frontier.

**THE AUSTRIAN FLEET ORDERED TO THE EAST.**—It is stated in a Vienna letter of the 10th, in the *Corriere Mercantile*, that the *Czar* had been sent off by telegraph to Trieste that all the Austrian fleet, with the exception of the *Prinz*, should leave for the East, and the *Frigate Venus* had sailed at once.

The *Transylvania Messenger* states from Cronstadt, near Moldavia, that the Russian officer commanding the allied Russian and Austrian troops along the frontiers of that province have re-

ceived orders to transmit to head-quarters all the information they can glean respecting the movements of the Russian troops. The posts of Cossacks have been withdrawn from the frontier and concentrated at Kom.

**THIS WAS ON THE MARCH.**—A letter from Vienna, dated June 24, says:—

"General de Hess is appointed Commander-in-Chief of the third and fourth Army. He will have under his orders Archduke Albert and General Count Schlick. The cavalry is placed under the orders of General Count Clam."

"The appointment of General de Hess has an important significance. With a capacity of the first order, the general officer is most patriotic tendencies, and an absolute independence of the habits and opinions which have so powerfully operated in a sense so little favourable to the present policy. General de Hess enjoys great popularity with the army. The Emperor could not manifest his personal policy more clearly than by this appointment, which will soon conciliate all the opponents of that policy."

"The total force of the active army will amount in a fortnight to 300,000, reaching on a line from the frontiers of Dalmatia to those of the Bukovina."

"The retrograde movement of the Russian army appears to be no longer doubtful. It is only the character of their retreat which only remains a mystery."

They write from Bucharest that the evacuation of Wallachia and its capital will take place on the 26 to 27th inst. By superior order, the archives, the public money, the Wallachian military functions, and the civil administration, which thus appears to lose its political character, will be assumed that of a purely strategic combination.

Although the fact of the positive raising of the siege of Silistria is now known, yet we have learnt that the works have been interrupted since the action of the 19th, and every military movement is considering a prolonged occupation of the right bank of the Danube as impossible in the face of the offensive operations of the Austrians from day to day of the army of Omar Pacha and the auxiliary troops. Already several letters announce that the Russians have abandoned the Dobruddah. We shall soon learn that the line of the Serath and the Pruth.

The convention concluded on the 14th of June, and the Cabinet of Vienna, which has its final resolutions upon this subject after its last session of the Cabinet of St. Petersburg to its last session.

Colonel Mantouffil was only expected to arrive at St. Petersburg on the 10th or 20th. Nothing will be done before the delivery of the Prussian Note, and the reply of the Emperor Nicholas will not be known at Vienna until the commencement of July.

**SAILING OF THE FLEET FOR CROONSTADT.**—*Dantzig*, June 21.—The *Batavia* has arrived at Dantzig on the 20th inst. and on the 27th. The Admiral sailed for Cronstadt on the 27th.

**ASCENDING BOMBARDMENT.**—Bombardment was shelled on the 21st inst. by Her Majesty's ships *Hulk*, *Valorous*, and *Olin*. Admiral Boscawen's fleet, which was the Gulf of Bohemia to the Gulf of Finland, and is replaced by Captain Hall.

**RUSSIA.** St. Petersburg, June 22.—The allied armies continue their movement towards the Caucasus, and the movement will be continued. The Divan consents to reopen the ports of Turkey to the Russian troops, and the ratification of the treaty with Austria.

**EVACUATION OF THE DANUBE.**—The organs of the French Government deny that Russia has consented to evacuate the Principalities of Moldavia and Wallachia, and respect for Austria, and contend that the real cause of their retreat is the apprehension that the Russian capital will be in danger of being crushed. The silence of the Russian organs of the Paris press indicates that the attitude taken by the Austrian Government is not in their favour to the Russian cause. The ministerial *Constitution* remarks that Russia has yielded up the guarantee, and she had taken, and abandoned two provinces in which for nearly a century she has not consumed a single drop of blood.

**BECKAGE OF THE WHITE SEA.**—Orders have just been sent to the commanders of the allied Russian and Austrian stations, to be ready to depart on the 1st of August next, an office,

**RUSSIA.**—St. Petersburg, June 19.—The *Czar* has set out on his way to the south. After a short stay at Kalow, it is said that he will proceed to the Crimea to inspect the fortresses on the Black Sea. The works on the fortification of St. Petersburg are carried on incessantly.

**DENMARK.**—A Copenhagen letter, dated June 13, says:—The summons addressed by Austria to Russia has produced an excellent effect on the mind of the Emperor. The Russian party in part perplexity. The appointments of officers generally increased by the news of the Danube. The favourable impression as to the warlike preparations in Austria, to some extent, as his diplomacy, a very rich shock.

**THE RUSSIAN INSURRECTION.**—*Adena*, June 20.—*Karantass*, Spirio Mili, Papa Gosta, Bogris, and other officers of the Russian insurrection, have arrived at Athens. ### Insurrection in Spain.

We give a condensed account of the original progress of this insurrection, from the latest numbers of the *Shipping Gazette*.

June 28.—A military movement, which it is said will be succeeded by a popular one, has at length taken place. Last night the cavalry in Madrid (13,000 men), with General Dulce, inspector-General of that army, at its head, and two battalions of infantry (Principes, quartered in the barracks of San Francisco), with detachments of other corps, under Brigadier Echague, Colonel of Principe Regiment, marching at Madrid by the Gate of Alcala, and proceeded on the evening of the 27th inst. to the Plaza del Espiritu Santo, and during afterwards to Canillejas, a league or so in that direction. The *Alcazar* of the Duke of O'Donnell, Conde de Laguna (who left Madrid in disguise), and also by Generals Menier, and Lou de Olan. General Dulce had inspected seven squadrons of cavalry stationed at Alcala a day or two before, and is said to rely on their joining him. In order to add a poplar to the military character of the movement, the corporation of Canillejas was assembled, and that body proclaimed the Constitution of 1837, which appears to be the rallying cry of the insurgents. The names of the officers on the parrains given were, "Viva la Reina!" "Viva la Libertad!" "Murra los Ministros!" "Murra los Ladrones!" "Long live the Queen and Liberty, and death to the ministers and the scoundrels!" The military movement were shot on the spot.

O'Donnell, Rodolax and Merino, were at the head of the insurrection; and Brigadier Echague followed the ranks of the Duke of Madrid, taking the route of Saragossa.

The people took no part in the movement.

The following day the Queen and the ministers returned to Madrid, and were received by the Duke of O'Donnell.

An official *Gazette* was immediately issued containing decrees depriving General Dulce of his rank, and of his office, and claiming a state of siege, and appointing a military commission. A large number of the capital and its suburbs, insurgents, who have taken up a position between Forreico and Alcala.

The troops remain faithful, and exhibit much loyal enthusiasm. The news from the provinces is all in favour of the success of the government certain.

**PARIS, Monday.**—Madrid continues tranquil, and the garrison is faithful.

It is thought that the contest will take place between the insurgents and the royal troops, in which a considerable loss of life occurs to each.

The whole Peninsula is in a state of siege.
