LITERARY NOTICE.—GLANCES AT TIME, a Poem by ARAMBAH ROBINSON. — It affords us much pleasure to attract the attention of our readers. Less aspiring than Pollock in his "Excursions of Time," the author has limited himself to the past history of our race's recalling and commenting, in a sober, impartial style, on the administrative, political, and leading incidents, that mark the progress of human society, beginning with the Creation and closing with the illustrious names of the Nations at the Industrial Exhibition of 1851.

In this vast range, the topics are neatly selected, and the relations correctly Hence the rapid transitions, that impart the unity or continuity of the poem which seems so intensely what it professes to be. Written in this excursive style, and with a marked didactic tendency, it would be difficult to institute a comparison between certain of its passages and the elaborate production of others; such as the "Ode to Byron on the present state of Italy" or "Greece," authors who concentrated their genius on a single point, intensifying and exhausting their respective subjects.

But wanting claims to artistic pre-eminence, to which our author, moreover, makes no pretensions, the reader of "Glances at Time" will find himself abundantly indemnified by a condensed yet comprehensive review of the strange mutations in man's history, that have led to the present, illustrated by the corresponding reflections of an experienced traveller and accurate observer on the past, and pointing the way to the future. Superficially exact in its indications of sentiment and language, it may safely be placed in the hands of either sex, especially in the hands of the young, as it is itself a means of cultivating his taste, and whetting his appetite for researches of intrinsic merit and interest.

SYNOPSIS OF OFFICIAL DOCUMENTS TO FACILITATE OUR READERS WITH THE DATE OF PUBLICATION IN THE TABLE.

September 1st.—Decree delegating the despatch of the affairs of the Department of War and Marine, to the Minister of Government and Foreign Relations, during the temporary absence of Colonel Escalada, in conformity with the constitution.

Decree recognizing John Henry Cornelio Fiedje Esqr, as Vice Consul of His Majesty the King of Denmark, on condition that his Commission shall be presented as soon as received.

September 2d.—Note from the Justice of Peace of Baradero, reporting the election of Don Pedro B. Rodriguez as Senator for said Section, in the room of D. Marcelino Rodriguez resigned.

September 3d.—Note from the Vice President of the Senate, accompanying the decree which ratifies the election of Don Horacio Saenz Valiente as Senator for said Section of the Country.
