San Pedro, September 15th 1854.  
To H. E. the Governor of the State, Dr Don Pastor Obligado.

Esteemed and Respected Sir,  
To enhance the powerful reasons on which I found the resignation of my office, addressed to H. E. on this date, I add this confidential letter that Y. E. may also know the considerations of a different order that influence my judgment, and powerfully contribute to the determination I have now formed.

All sound policy must have for its object the happiness and contentment of the citizens, and this is precisely what constitutes the real patriotism of the person acting in public posts. Well then, convinced as I am of the desire of a part of my compatriots, that a change should be made of the person who occupies the Ministry of War and Marine, for the noble purpose of thus promoting the improvement of the State, by means of an election adequate to the requirements of the office, in which I can only see a commendable object, inasmuch as it emanates from patriotic principles—can I, Most Excellent Sir, fail to cooperate to the agrandissement of the State, and I do not think that a part assigned me for so noble a purpose? Can I consent to decelerate myself, relinquish my post, and yet not be satisfied with the office which my conscience tells me I cannot fill? Would there be any advantage in acting otherwise? I would I not be chargeable with the disunion my want of disinterestedness might occasion.

With the greatest confidence I submit to Y. E. my reflections on the public interest; I trust that should Y. E. be desirous of self-interest and patriotism) should regard them in a light that will further the attainment of the end.

If I persist in quitting the post which Y. E. assigned me, it is on account of the intimations that debilitate my frame, and also on account of "intimations that harass my spirit, which I shall cease to bear, as I am well convinced Y. E. is in the hope that Y. E. being convinced will allow myself defend and intelligent toward all.

Y. E. is placed at the head of an ingenious, brave and enlightened people; but Y. E. worthily occupies that elevated post, because your intellectual endowments are commensurate with its requirements; consequently you can effect the good so urgently required by a community that has suffered so many miseries.

But, Most Excellent Sir, am I placed in a similar situation? Am I the person qualified to lead you in the march of intelligence, the noblest employment of man? No, Sir, assuredly not. Thanks to Divine Providence, I am aware of my insufficiency, and humbly acknowledge it; and accordingly, overbearing by this conviction, I cannot consent to prolong a fruitless sacrifice, and worse than fruitless, since it is prejudicial to the Country, and that of myself; for my mind and body suffer simultaneously. I shudder at the apprehension of descending into the sea with the degradation of my countrymen, on account of my insufficiency, bequeathing to my children a sullied reputation, a sullied name, and a sullied fortune, crime alone that sullies, but also fortifies. When it leads us to consider ourselves capable of doing what we are unable to do, we complain. As already observed, I am indebted to Y. E. for the resignation of my office, before Y. E. with pertinacious persistence, to leave me, Most Excellent Sir, to retire to my home, with the calmness of the Country, and where I can finish the few years of existence that may yet be in my power to enjoy in obscurity where I can find peace of mind.

H. E. the Governor has been informed of

your Honour's note, of date the 14th Inst., in which you announce to him your determination of quitting the high post you occupy, and requesting in consequence his permission to retire to private life.

H. E. is aware of the need Your Honour feels of repose, after so many years devoted to the service of Your Country; he would willingly accede to so reasonable a request, and would have done so without hesitation had it rested only in the dictates of his own conscience. But when the interests of the public intervene, when to discharge the arduous mission, confided to him by the representatives of the people, he requires the most decided cooperation of a man, and especially of an man such as Your Honour, who brings a contingent of experience, patriotism and intelligence; additional to a sound conscience, and in its very name to request of Your Honour, as he requests still further assistance, he is obliged to do so, with courage to persevere in rendering services to this unfortunate land, despite all the obstacles that may occur.

H. E. cannot subscribe to the sensitively modest estimate Your Honour has formed, as to your insufficiency for discharging the high office you hold in the Administration. He is not the first time Y. H. has occupied that dignified position, and he is acting in the same as in this. Y. H. has uniformly merited the esteem of the Government and of your fellow citizens, by the extent of his capacity, intelligence and virtue of Your Honour.

H. E. therefore trusts that, imitating the patriotic example recently given by the Minister of Finance, and in similar circumstances, Your Honour will postpone for a more favourable opportunity, a resignation that would be a great loss to the State, and His Excellency to take into consideration.

To H. E. the Governor of the State of Buenos Ayres, Dr Don Pastor Obligado.

When on the 20th October of last year I undertook the Ministry of Government and Foreign Relations, Y. E. put my patriotism and deference to personal friendship to the test. But clearly foresaw the overwhelming weight, nothing could compensate the want of the merit that would have rendered it worthy of my undesired honour. Perhaps a few more days of vacillation would then have supplied the want, but I will now supply a man more adequate and better qualified. But under the immediate orders of the Chief of the Administration, so justly esteemed by all, under the imperative law of a fatal necessity, the order, the peace, the liberty the stability, unanimously denominated as the only necessity of the moment, by so many bereaved families, and by so many misfortunes still fresh in the memory of the people, and by the intentions and the unchangeable sincerity of my principles, might supply the place of merit, and I would have been content with resigning I cannot, I dared not say I will not.

A unanimous opinion raised to the first dignity of the Ministry, and which I was obliged to apply the pruning-knife with my own hand, to the compact mass of abuses, to request the resignation of the Minister. If not anticipated, he was fortunately found. At the side of such a Magistrate there cannot be a Minister, who will now supply a man able. I hold this language, because my resolution is firm:—I never falter.

But, Most Excellent Sir, in view of the situation, I do not meet the exigencies of public opinion, he is just or capricious, it is the question of the words. What different is there in complying with its will? In fact any one may please it at least for the moment. If it be reasonable, why will you not do it? I am obliged to accept the legal responsibility of all my acts; but the moral judgment before an ambulant Arospingo, formed in the collisions of the Government, and its conduct, conducted by random passions and interests, in all quarters, and even within the precincts of the Government, is not to be tolerated. This responsibility requires what I have not, what I am incapable of having, and what one who is not a Minister cannot support of your firm and well-founded opinion. For this very reason, I have never advanced a single step, and I will never do so. I made no pretensions to any of those

things which are sought in elevated positions, except the sincerity of my sentiments, a quality of which we may boast without indiscretion, because it neither inspires jealousy, nor provokes the envy of any one; a quality which in my case does not attain the character of a civic virtue, because it is weak, but in that of Y. E. is happily combined with an indomitable firmness; this quality of the poor and indigent, is the only one I brought to the Ministry, and is the only one I wish to save for my family, and for my private happiness, which alone centres on it, and in a respectful confidence, I cannot do more, Sir; and Y. E. is a witness of the importance of my resignation. I must be convinced of their justice, and of the necessity of accepting the resignation which I have now made in your hands.

MINISTRY OF FINANCE.  
Buenos Ayres, September 20th 1854.  
To the Minister Secretary in the Department of Government and Foreign Relations, Dr Don Leonor Portales.

H. E. the Governor has received the note which Your Honour addressed to him yesterday, in which, after reexamining the causes that induced the high resignation of the office of Minister Secretary, founded on the conviction you entertain, that you do not wish to discharge your public and official duties.

H. E. the Governor has directed me to reply to you, and to note of Your Honour's, and though I feel honoured by such a distinction on the same subject, since it treats of the separation of one of my esteemed colleagues during the arduous epoch of recess, during which we have the honour to accompany the first Magistrate of the State, in the most perfect union and concord.

H. E. the Governor experiences the most unwelcome impressions, on being informed of Your Honour's resignation. Thoroughly satisfied as to the intelligence and zeal wherewith you discharged the arduous duties of that office; and the Government, as also all the other Ministers, participating in the responsibility of the acts, which appear under the signature of Your Honour, he considers that single reflection of his sufficient to induce you to forego a resignation, which the Government has neither the will nor the power to refuse. In view of the present exceptional circumstances, and the indispensable continuance of Your Honour in the Ministry of Government and Foreign Relations.

As the estimates for the ensuing year are about to be submitted to the Honourable Chambers, and Your Honour having had the care of preparing them, the Government cannot fail to see the serious difficulties that would arise from your separation from the Ministry of Finance, and the serious difficulties are still farther enhanced, if he be focus in mind that the urgency of the time would not allow a new Minister to study them, and prepare them for discussion with the necessary information, but that neither of the accounts existing on the study, and on the estimates of Your Honour's Department, as to support and explain them with the propriety and accuracy that result from a careful study of the subject.

There are other motives of a higher order that oppose the resignation of Your Honour. Perhaps the very necessity of consolidating the order, the peace, the liberty, achieved by the Ministry of Finance, requires the continuance of Your Honour's services, doubly important. Those restless clouds that obscure our political horizon being dissipated, or the tempests averted, and the tranquillity secured, should the opportunity will to be taken of your resignation into consultation with you, and should no other alternative occur to your wishes.

Moreover, the violent attacks of which Your Honour has been the object, ought on no account to affect you. By your loyal procedure, by your patriotism, and unrelenting devotion to the public service, Your Honour is placed at an elevation where you cannot be wounded, either by the darts of the press, or by the passions of the multitude, or the stifled murmurings of those who make base professions, whose bitter consequences have already been too weighed carefully on this community.

Whether or not it may have been stu

dently calculated, in those attacks upon Your Honour, to excite the Chief of the Administration, and make all the responsibility of the acts fall exclusively on Your Honour, H. E. the Governor rejoices in the opportunity Your Honour has afforded him, of repeating here, aloud and emphatically, that H. E. clearly identifies the part which constitutionally appertains to him, and which he really has done. Complicity responsible, therefore, for all the acts that bear the signature of Your Honour, the praise or censure they may excite, must always be divided between H. E. and your Honour, as also between H. E. and the other Ministers, who accompany him.

It is on the strength of these considerations that H. E. the Governor trusts that Your Honour will not deem it necessary, for the time that may still be necessary, in the public service.
