OFFICIAL DOCUMENTS.

Bulletin No. 2.
BATTLE-FIELD, TALA, Nov. 8th, 1854.

To the Minister of State in the Department of War and Marine, General Don Manuel Rosales.

At this moment, 4 P. M., the forces under my command have had a desperate encounter with the rebel invaders. On the 5th they entered the territory of the State, and since yesterday I have been in pursuit of them, in forced marches, having succeeded in overtaking them at this point. About 11 A. M. we discovered the rebels to the number of about 900; the Cavalry commanded by Oates, and Laprida as second in command, Oros, Luelala, Lagos, &c. — On our approach, I detached Colonel D. C. Gorordo, with 100 riflemen of the Company of Blanes, under the orders of their Chief, Lieutenant Colonel Bernardino Molina, and a picket of the Volunteer Battalion of the Squadron Manuel Martinez, and two skirmishing parties of the National Guards of Argentine under the command of Messrs Mariano Tierta and S. Poratia, for the purpose of harassing them with a running fire, and the enemy and the remainder of the Cavalry could be got ready, of which force I had barely 200 men disposable. The above mentioned Chief, having discharged his mission, keeping up a close fire, in which all the enemy's Cavalry took part, having to retire to close quarters, I directed the incorporation of the column. The enemy, strong in numbers and well supplied, being attacked in its protection a company of the Lancers of Argentine, and the remainder of the Lancers of *Capitan Donato Dabas*, a picket of the *Escuela del Gobierno*, under the command of *Capitan* *Donato Dabas*, a picket of the Squadron Buenos Ayres, under *Capitan* *Cecilio Beron*, and ten Lancers of Pergamino, under *Lieutenant* *Samuel* *de* *la* *Guardia*, *Dragoons* of *Landi* (which afterwards dismounted) forming a platoon under *Major* *Avelino* *Sustival*. The hurry of these movements, caused said forces to get mixed up with the enemy, and for the moment, the Cavalry and Infantry and Artillery from acting. After repeated attacks of Cavalry and Infantry encounter, in which the 8th and 9th Battalion of the Line, with its brave Chief, *Lieutenant* *Colon* *Mitre*, and *Major* *Ignacio* *de* *los* *Rios*, were routed in all quarters by our Cavalry, although badly mounted, for during the internixture the enemy had cut off our horses, as well as our baggage and ammunition; the latter of which we retook in one of our charges.

The enemy completely repulsed, and suffering a heavy and unintermitted fire from our valiant Infantry, and the great aid of charges of our Artillery commanded by *Capitan* *Instarte*, as well as the aid of our Cavalry, retired from the field in all directions, disorganized and suffering a great consternation in consequence of the reports received every moment; the remainder breaking themselves in precipitate flight towards the sea, where they were being pursued by our Cavalry, in consequence of the loss of our horses, and those mounted on the sea being being exhausted.

In this defeat, Mr. Minister, the enemy have been completely demoralized, leaving a quantity of lost arms and accoutrements, including two Chiefs and eight Officers, taking with them a considerable number of wounded. I am sorry to say have been left in the adjacent valleys. All their baggage, two days' amount of ammunicions, and about 100 muskets, and a considerable number of number of swords, the commissariat, cartridges, several letters, and their papers and correspondence, &c.

On our side we have had the deployed loss of our Cavalry and two Officers killed, and ten soldiers and two Officers wounded, with several individuals missing, and some among the stragglers during the charges and internixture.

It only remains for me, Mr. Minister, to recommend to you the aid of the Superior Government and of the Country, the valiant Chiefs, Officers and troops that were wounded, and to recommend especially the gallant National Guards of Argentine, their three brave Officers; the intrepid *Lieutenant* *Colon* *de* *los* *Rios*, and his gallant staff of Officers; the Adjutant of *Colon* *Gorordo*, *Bernal*, *Quinteros*, and *Ledezma*; and my own, *Capitan* *Luis* *An-*

drado, Don Ezequiel Zapola, Lubones, and citizen *Alejo*; for all of Mr. Minister, all have discharged their duty and deserved well of the country.

To the Minister of War and Marine, General Don Manuel Rosales.
After the dispatch remitted to Your Honour from the field of battle, all the reports from the forces of the vanguard, confirm the complete dispersion of the invaders, their precipitate flight, and the disorder in which they retreat.

Twenty individuals of the enemy have been taken prisoners by our parties, amongst them one Chief and four Officers, and one Officer and eight soldiers killed by the same; the number of wounded they carry with them is immense, and according to the prisoners, it is still believed that the traitor *Lamelá* has perished. The detailed report I will remit to the first opportunity.

I also request from Your Honour five hundred camp colours, green, green and white, and a quantity of arms and accoutrements, and may be remitted to Arceifios.

The enemy have already quitted the State.

Note from the Military Commandant of San Nicolas de los Rios, giving account of the dispositions adopted to secure that the fugitive and the remainder of the fugitives from the rout of the 8th; accompanying a list of one Chief, three Officers, and forty soldiers captured by the parties employed in this patriotic service. To economize room we reluctantly suppress this document, which reflects great honor on the Authorities and inhabitants of San Nicolas.

To the Governor, Dr. Pastor Obligado.
Head Quarters, in march—
SAN PEDRO, Nov. 10th, 1854.

My Esteemed Friend—
It is only now that I have been able to write again, and congratulate you amon our victory which has been complete; for up to the present date our forces continue capturing numbers of the dispersed of the enemy, of which I will give a detailed account in due course. At the present moment I believe they have quitted our territory with the few men that follow them; and I will speedily remove from this point.

I have not words to recommend to you the brave fellows of this Division, who have fought like lions in the charges of Arceifios; and the coward Lieutenant *Danes*, of the *Escuela del Gobierno*, having run from the field of combat fighting; Send him back to me that he may be tried as a craven.

I am disappointed with my Adjutants, *Andrade*, *Zapola*, *Baen*, and all the others; all have behaved poorly.

I am glad that the people of San Nicolas have acquitted themselves perfectly, and as we expected they would, I consider them a vote of thanks from the Government.

I am going to organize the army with the Division under my command, and to take the forces of the Capital, and the Militia of the frontier; and await orders.

I am sorry to say for publication certain letters, taken among the papers of these malefactors.

I have been with *Muratori*. I can tell you that all the armament which the invaders had, that was conveyed by the steamer "Progreso" which does not venture to descend from the Roarrio, and is continually disappearing into the sea.

I could wish to recommend my Chiefs and Officers one by one; but I must at least mention the names of the brave Colonel *Gorordo*, who surpassed all in daring, and of the bravest of the brave, *Comodoro* *Progreso*, which does not venture by his serenity and bravery.

In short the country owes much to the brave and valiant men who have been worthy of the land of their birth, and the cause they defend.

To your Honour I accept an embrace from your inviolable friend, in the name of the

To the Governor, Dr. Pastor Obligado.
Encampment at San Pedro.
Nov. 11th, 1854.

My Dear Friend—
Yesterday I wrote to you by a special courier, and am anxiously awaiting your reply yesterday I also received your esteemed favour of the 8th.

Our enemies are now completely disbanded, and a number of our officers have been taken, all of whom I will attach to the Second of the Line.

I now await intelligence from Santa Fé, for all the dispersed who have escaped are now there.

In short, Sir, it appears that for the present we have finished with the enemies of the State with this chastisement, and the decision shown by the people of the rural districts, no one not even the *Mazorqueros*, will be disturbed.

I have received information from San Nicolas that the partisans of *Calcaufur*, in accordance with the promise of the Government to invade the South with 1500 Indians; it would be well to put that department on its guard.

Urgo the Ministry to send me the camp colours which I have requested; I stand much in need of them.

I accompany a general order of the *Mazorquero* invaders, that it may be published. Now that these miscreants have sustained a defeat, it may be easier to learn of some that Capital who are in search of them, I am making a list here to assort in something on the point.

Resolution.
Notwithstanding that the whole territory of the State has been declared in a state of siege, in conformity with the 11th Article of the Constitution, as this declaration does not import that the Country is under Martial Law, and the action of the Tribunals and Public Offices being now compatible with the said declaration; taking also into consideration that only a part of the National Guard are required for military service, the Government has accorded that in the mean time and till further notice, the Tribunals and Public Offices shall continue their functions, taking care, nevertheless, to harmonize their proceedings with the state of siege in which the State is placed.
