To His Excellency, the President of the Argentine Confederation.
 The Governor of the State of Buenos Ayres has received the note of Your Excellency dated 28th ult., manifesting to him your ardent desire for the preservation of peace, and for the re-inauguration of the trade on the territory of this State, by an armed force proceeding from the Province of Santa Fe, and for the re-inauguration of the navigation, which has accordingly been presented by Messrs. the Commissioners of Your Excellency.

The Governor of Buenos Ayres, forgetting the rights given him by the act of the most complete success; forgetting even the duties imposed upon him by the blood shed in that unjust and treacherous attack, and guided solely by considerations of a higher character, and by the respect due to the State of Buenos Ayres, and of the Communities forming the Confederation presided over by Your Excellency, he may say, unconditionally, and without exactions of any kind, disposed as Your Excellency is to establish a firm and lasting peace between the two States, without the fatal necessity of resorting to the arms of the State of Buenos Ayres, of seeking it by the force of its arms.

To be put in execution the bases presented by the Commissioners of Your Excellency, and reduce them to a formal treaty, as proposed by the gravity of the affair, it has found a difficulty in the form which Your Excellency alone can obviate. They are not authorized to deviate from the letter of the draft of Convention, which they presented in the name of Your Excellency to this Government, although in another equivalent the bases which Your Excellency has thought proper to establish might be completely varied.

The Government was not only disposed to accept the first of the bases, but also wished a more friendly and explicit expression, that might announce both to foreigners and to nations, that the Government of Buenos Ayres considered that it would be highly expedient for the moral and material interests of both States, that they should show themselves likewise disposed to regulate by themselves all their commercial relations, the security Government engaging to adjust them without having recourse to the force, as proposed by Your Excellency in the first of the bases. ing to the rank of a public Treaty the very basis which Your Excellency has been pleased to transmit to us, for establishing a permanent peace between the State of Buenos Ayres and the Argentine Confederation, and to be put in execution by Your Excellency, suggest that Your Excellency should furnish them to us, in order that we may be able to give them a more explicit and clear expression, or to amend them, if necessary, in order to approximate the day when all the Argentine Communities may be united and form a single Nation.

It has only added an article relative to those who made the invasion upon this State, which, though not to the bases proposed, the Commissioners of Your Excellency judge this Government to understand their instructions, and to be put in execution by the Government of Buenos Ayres, and which it is impossible for it to waive, fit to comply with its first obligation of securing the tranquillity of the territory under its command.

The Government of Buenos Ayres trusts that Your Excellency finding the enclosed draft in perfect consonance with the letter and spirit of the three bases which you were pleased to propose to it, will deign to authorize the Commissioners to sign it, and submit it to the terms of a Public Treaty.

The Government of Buenos Ayres avails itself of the opportunity, to salute with its highest respects the President of the Argentine Confederation.

To His Excellency the Governor and Captain General of the State of Buenos Ayres.

The President of the Argentine Confederation has received the note of Your Excellency of date the 11th inst., confined to explaining the reasons on which the alterations are founded in the bases which Your Excellency has thought proper to introduce into the bases that were presented to Messrs. José M. Cullen and Daniel Gowlard, and to make certain modifications in the form which the President of the Confederation was alone competent to modify.

The President of the Argentine Confederation, now as firmly, persists in making every possible effort on his part, to prevent the effusion of blood; and though he cannot

for a moment doubt as to the successful issue of a war which he has not evoked, and founded upon an occurrence for which he ought not to be held responsible, and respecting which he has not received any official explanations; nevertheless he cordially thanks the Magistrates who preside the State of Buenos Ayres, that in doing justice to his statements, they raise no obstacle to the attainment of peace, immediately adverting, and much more so prospectively.

As in the note of Your Excellency there evidently appears good faith and the intention of amicably granting a question, for the solution of which two armies were already posted in front of each other; and as the explanations given by Your Excellency to the State of Buenos Ayres, justify for modifying the first bases, are perfectly satisfactory to the President of the Confederation, he has not hesitated to accept textually the Articles of the Treaty, which has been submitted anew to his approbation.

In consequence of this determination of the President of the Confederation, Messrs. the Commissioners are fully and duly authorized to sign the aforesaid Treaty, conforming themselves strictly to its liberal tenor.

The Government of the Argentine Confederation avails itself of the opportunity to salute with its highest respects the Governor of the State of Buenos Ayres.
