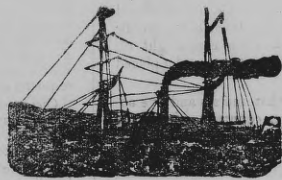

BUENOS AYRES. COSTA INVASION.

We prefer giving the history of this episode in the official and semi-official documents and notices, that have been submitted to the public. The following is from the *Orden* of the 1st inst.—

News.—The Adjutant of the Minister of War, D. Enrique Sunblad, arrived yesterday at 3 p.m. with the despatch of the Minister which we give in the Corresponding section. That Officer with three National Guards volunteers went to the army, escorting a cart with ammunition.

Yesterday a number of prisoners were in route for Lujan, with a relay of horses, in quest of the Government forces to join with them.

The group with which Costa fled, consisted, it is said of 100 men well mounted.

Benites said in Lujan that he was bound for the house of one Captain Alvarez, who lives in the marsh of Moron.

Costa and his followers compelled the people of Lujan to accompany them; but they had nearly all succeeded in escaping.

We insert in continuation an interesting letter from Colonel Conesa, of which we gave a short extract in our extra sheet published at half past one.

To H. E. Dr. D. Pastor Obligado Governor and Captain General of the State of Buenos Ayres.

My Governor and Friend,

I have just entered the Villa de Lujan at 6½ a.m., abandoned by the enemy that fled precipitately.

Subsequently on the arrival of the Justice of Peace of Pilar and Commandant Almandos with their forces, and after receiving the horse gear that I expected, I set out, and in the evening was encamped in front of this town, which I thought proper not to attack, as it would have caused many victims without advantage, as a small force and well mounted, as theirs, can easily escape.

I have in my power three prisoners. One of them is a Negro who says he was enlisted at Montevideo in the house of Lafine, for an ounce of gold, under the pretext of going to Entre Rios to work in a saladero.

According to the information I have been able to collect, it seems that the enemy fled in disorder, as soon as they saw my first detachments. They have taken a southerly direction for Chascomus or Lobos, on which account I have just acquainted the Minister, recommending him to detach forces in that direction.

I have also notified all the neighbouring Justices of Peace and I will immediately start in their pursuit with all the cavalry I can mount well.

I will duly acquaint Y. E. of any thing important that may be our.

Villa de Lujan Jan. 31st 1856.

Two youths National Guards, Don Maximo Guzman and Don Gomecido Arauz, volunteered to carry communications to the army in operations, which they did with astonishing celerity.

The National Guards that accompanied Adjutant Sunblad, are the brothers Campos and a youth Quintana. Their conduct merits the highest praise.

The Minister of War.

Villa de Lujan Jan. 31st 1856, (9 a.m.)

To H. E. the Governor of the State Dr. D. Pastor Obligado.

I acquaint Y. E. that the enemy was dislodged at day break this morning from the Villa de Lujan, and betook themselves in precipitate flight, by the Navarro road in the direction of Durazno, to the number of something more than 100 men. According to the report of a soldier that escaped from them, Costa, Bustos and Olmos were united with the greater part of their forces, and Benites with 13 men had lost their way in this neighbourhood, leaving Costa to the right. I received this information from a resident by whose house he passed. Accordingly Colonel Garcia marches in pursuit of the enemy, and has received or-

ders to detach a party of light cavalry to the van, and four or six upon the flanks, so as to make an effectual pursuit at the same time that they scour the camp. I have given similar orders to Commandant Naon, should the enemy take a southerly direction; that is to detach a squadron on their left flank with the same precautions.

Commandant Alvarinos with the National Guard of Navarro and Lobos will intercept them in the route they have taken. Major Vila must still be at the Villa de Mercedes, though I have received no despatch from him to-day; and Colonel Conesa with his battalion, and the cavalry forces of Pilar, San Isidro, Conebas and San Fernando occupies the Villa, so that the line of the river Lujan is completely closed against them. Commandant Rodriguez with part of the Division has set out in their pursuit in a westerly direction, to place himself in contact with Major Vila on the right, and at the same time with Colonel Garcia on the left, whilst the latter is to place himself in line with the pursuing forces that Commandant Naon is to detach on the flank.

The Minister of War.

Villa de Lujan Jan. 31st 1856.

To B. E. the Governor Dr. Don Pastor Obligado.

After my despatch of 9 this morning, nothing new has occurred, not having received up to this moment, noon, any despatch from Col. Garcia, who continues in pursuit of the scattered fragments of the enemy, as I have been informed by the inhabitants. I left Colonel Garcia at three leagues from this point, having reinforced his column with a company of sharpshooters.

Subsequently to my former despatch I received further information respecting the movements of the enemy. According to all accounts they never consisted of more than 100 men, and found sympathies nowhere. Though they took several men by violence, they were unable to augment their force. After what took place with the vanguard of our cavalry, Costa believed that he had nothing more to do, than to march in triumph to Buenos Ayres; and in consequence ordered Benites to advance at full speed and take possession of the Puente de Marquez; but he countermanded this order as soon as he learned that Colonel Emilio Conesa was advancing upon the Town with his battalion. The Colonel arrived before the town which he found in full alarm, and he immediately formed in battle array their resting on the river and the right on the town. Some skirmishes immediately took place, that lasted part of the night. Before day break the enemy abandoned their position taking the direction of the Villa de Mercedes, along the coast of the river, to conceal their real movement, for as soon as they reached the hollow they took the direction of Lobos; this apparently being the route they continue, and in which they are pursued by Colonel Garcia.

From Major Vila I have received no report: he is at the Villa de Mercedes, awaiting orders; and has received instructions to place himself in line with the Colonel and to protect his right, since commandant Almandos, who was to have done this, has been detached with a hundred men in the direction of Exaltacion de la Cruz, towards which Colonel Conesa had been informed that some small groups had fled.

The Justice of Peace of Pilar has returned to his District, having detached parties in different directions. The Justice of Peace of Exaltacion de la Cruz has left this morning to occupy his post.

The enemy has left in this town a feeling of hatred and contempt; in consequence of the vandalic exactions they committed. As soon as he got possession of the town Costa decreed a forced contribution of \$50,000 to pay his troops; the foreigners resisted, and the natives said they could do nothing in view of their small number. Costa then said that if they did not give what he asked, he would shoot some one, and the inhabitants being overawed made a sacrifice of \$5,100; in which were included \$2,000 that he extorted by violence, from the Parish Priest. Costa was content with this saying he would repay it in Buenos Ayres. These, Most Excellent Sir, are the self-styled liberators: whilst Flores is robbing mares, horses and cattle on the frontier, after the fashion of the Indians, Costa is plundering pacific towns; causing a scandal, the remembrance of which had been lost in these countries.

Should any thing new occur I will immediately acquaint Y. E. Meanwhile I must recommend to the consideration of the Government the Justice of Peace of Pilar, Dn. Mateo Pnerio, who reinforced the Cavalry division of Colonel Conesa supplying the greater part of the horses on which the force including the infantry is mounted.

The Justice of Peace of Moron has distinguished himself, by taking the lead in person of the Militia force of his district, which has not corresponded to the decision of the Justice of Peace. I should be guilty of a dereliction of duty, did I not specially recommend to the consideration of Y. E. the energetic and decided conduct of Don Juan de la Cruz Casas, Justice of Peace of this District, who, not merely as an administrator, but as the Chief of the National Guard of cavalry has distinguished himself by his decision; retiring to the encampment of Colonel Conesa, as soon as the enemy got possession of the town. As regards the soldiers they have done and continue to do their duty, rivaling each other in activity and decision; for which reason I confine myself to recommending to Y. E. those that have done more than their duty.

P.S.—On our part we have not had the slightest loss; the enemy has had two killed and left two prisoners in our power, one of them a brother of Benites who was taken this morning. They have also left in our power some lances and blunderbusses; the lances as usual are canes.

Mr. Governor,

I have this moment 4½ a.m. received a despatch from Colonel Don Estevan Garcia, in which he reports having overtaken the enemy at Villamayor's in the district of Matanza. The force of the enemy at the time was about 80 men. The pursuit had lasted 1½ more than three leagues, and so complete was the dispersion that not two men remained together. The number of killed is reckoned from 15 to 20, among them ex-Col. Ramon Bustos. Among the prisoners are Geronimo Costa and a Commandant Wiffe. Benites was pursued for two leagues, and escaped alone on a fleet horse.

I congratulate Y. E. on this new triumph.

District of Matanza Feb. 1st 1856.

Dearest Governor,

I had not time yesterday to write you giving account of the total defeat of ex-Generals Costa and Olmos, and ex-Colonels Benites and Ramon Bustos; for which reason I immediately despatched Don Socorro Villareal to announce to Y. E. verbally so glorious a result.

I now do so with a detailed account of all that has taken place.

Yesterday about 7 a.m. when the Minister of War reached us, being then at the estancia of Peñalosa in front of the Villa de Lujan, we received information that the enemy were gone in the direction of the Village of Moron. I immediately commenced a forced march with the National Guards of the suburbs, of Matanza and San José de Flores, collecting on the march information that enabled us to ascertain the exact route they had taken.

On arriving at the estancia of Gavino Alvarez we were told they had passed there about 10 a.m. driving before them every horse they could find. It was now noon. I had not proceeded two leagues when I was informed that they were at Villamayor's estancia, in the district of Matanza.

I then made a short halt to arrange the horse gear, and immediately continued my march to the estancia just mentioned. Before reaching it we discovered them at the distance of about 15 squares (say 14 miles) and I ordered three guerrillas to be formed, and one on each flank, and another in the centre. I put all at full speed in order to overtake them. As soon as we came up with them, they formed a guerrilla in front of about 20 or 30 men, leaving in column the rest of their force, which consisted of upwards of 100 men.

We opened fire and drove them before us, killing 10 or 12 men, among them Ramon Bustos; taking prisoner ex-General Costa, a Lieut. Colonel and other officers. In the despatch

which I send to the Minister of War, Y. E. will see at length and with precision the number and names of the prisoners.

On our side I believe we have had no casualty whatever. I am less three men of the Squadron Libertad, and of the Independencia; but I suppose they may have been taken by Major Canete, who with Capt. Videla, Capt. Andrade and Adjutant Salomon, with some 30 men, are in pursuit of a group about 20 men, that took the direction of Cañuelas, whither, I suppose Olmos will repair, for Benites separated from them making for the South alone.

I remit to you all the correspondence found upon Costa, and at the same time I wish Y. E. to say whether I may retire the National Guards of Matanza and Flores, as I consider it unnecessary to keep them embodied, as every thing here is concluded.

I congratulate Y. E. on so auspicious an event that ensures our lasting tranquility. Costa has already been shot.

To H. E. the Governor of the State Dr. D. Pastor Obligado.

I have the honor to forward to Y. E. the despatches I received on my way to the Capital, addressed to me by Colonels Don Emilio Conesa and Don Estevan Garcia, who have had the glory of giving the last blows that completely annihilated the enemies of the tranquility of Buenos Ayres. I recommend to Y. E. the activity and energy wherewith the two Chiefs just mentioned have fulfilled the instructions they received from me, as also all the Chiefs Officers and soldiers of the respective divisions, who have contended in arduous and desolating, especially the Division of Colonel Garcia who fought the enemy, and though it had not eaten for two days, vigorously undertook the pursuit, the moment I gave orders to do so. Our troops have everywhere found the most efficacious co-operation in all the pacific inhabitants, both in giving information and in supplying horses, and also personally taking part in the pursuit of the fugitives; which must convince the enemies of the State of Buenos Ayres that the present situation is supported by the entire community, that comprehends the importance of the rights it has acquired, and that has sufficient energy of itself to defend them.

On closing this note and returning to the Capital I have the satisfaction of being able to assure Y. E. that the campaign has terminated with the extermination of the enemy, without our having to lament the slightest loss on our side, with the exception of a soldier slightly wounded.

District of Matanza, Feb. 1st 1856.

To the Minister of War and Marine, Colonel D. Bartolome Mitre.

The undersigned has the satisfaction of acquainting Y. H. of the complete destruction of the invaders.

Yesterday after separating from Y. H. I continued a forced march, inquiring at the different establishments in the route as to the direction the enemy had taken; and on arriving at noon at the estancia of Don Gavino Alvarez we there learned that at 10 a.m. they had passed said estancia in the direction of Matanza, carrying with them every horse they could find.

I then caused to charge horses and hasten the march. We had not proceeded two leagues, when we were told at another estancia that they were at Villamayor's; and accordingly, when we came in sight of said establishment, we saw the enemy issue forth, and commenced to collect a troop of horses.

Immediately ordered the force, consisting of three squadrons, to form in divisions, the first under the command of Major Pantaleon Sotela, the second under that of Major Forest, and the third, under that of Major Manuel Baez, detaching at the same time three skirmishing parties from the company of sharpshooters of the 1st of the Line. As we advanced thus the enemy formed a guerrilla in front, the rest of their force which consisted of upwards of 100 men remaining formed in line.

Our skirmishing parties opened fire, and were responded to by some shots; but on the signal for the charge, they turned and fled in a cowardly manner; and I then ordered Major
