

The camps were never seen more luxuriant at this season of the year and of course the cattle in general are in prime condition; and as all classes of produce with the exception of tallow and jerked beef, are in brisk demand and daily rising in price, the Stockholders can afford to pay prices, which no one ever dreamt some two or three years ago. In this respect we have undergone a transformation so sudden and complete, that any one may be reasonably excused for doubting of his personal iduity.

The amount forwarded during the past month, will be found considerably greater than the average of the entire year. The reason is, that stocks accumulated in the country during the winter months have been also affected the apparent amounts for this and the ensuing month.

The amount however for 1856, shows a pleasurable falling off, compared with bygone years; and for which the high rates that rule, furnish only an indirect compensation.

Whatever may be the causes, those dependent on this State, must look forward to diminished supplies of ox and cow hides, and the correlative products that heretofore have formed our staple exports.

In compensation we can hold out the prospect of increased supplies of wool, of a quality that begins to command attention in the general market.

Owing to the greatly enhanced value of sheep stock, no pains or expense are spared, in improving the breeds, and getting up the wool in the best possible condition.

On comparing our prices current with those of last month, there will be found in nearly every article, an advance of from 3 to 15 per cent.

Social and Political Aspect

It so turns out that we have no space left to extend on this topic; and we hardly regret it, for in truth we have no cheering intelligence to announce, unless it be the great security that begins to prevail on the frontier.

We are happy to say that General Flores will remain in the mean time in command of the Azul; by the unanimous decision of the army, the civil authorities, the inhabitants, and what is more significant, of the Indians themselves. Elsewhere it might be reckoned a sort of military interposition; but in the circumstances we believe it to be the very best thing that could happen.

Mr. Christie has been residing among us for the last fourteen days, but preserves a strict incognito; whence we infer that nothing has been, or is likely to be done, as regards the rumoured negotiations for the reconstruction of the Argentine Nationality.

At the same time nothing farther is said about the Republic of the Plata; and as we are beginning a new year, it is better to live in hope than die in despair.

We have dates from the Paraná to the 25th, and from Montevideo to the 30th, but as happens at this particular season, political news are at a heavy discount.

Of local news the only thing worth reporting is, that on the 30th ult. we had 16 arrivals from the high seas, conveying inter alia, upwards of 500 immigrants.

THE DEFICIT OF 1856.

The 10 million of Public funds not being immediately required, the Government has decreed a temporary suspension of the law of the 16th Sept.

It appears that the Government declines recognizing the House of Messrs. Zimmerman & Co., as representatives of Messrs. Baring Brothers Agents of the London Bondholders.

UNITED STATES.—The new President is Mr. Buchanan, late Minister in London.

Appendix.

Observations made by Captain Joseph Pozzolo, in command of the Sardinian brig Hydra, during her voyage to Cape Corrientes in October and November 1856, which was undertaken by order of J. C. Meyrelles Esquire.

1.—It will be convenient for mariners coming from the North, in search of the Bay of Laguna de los Padres, that they should approach the coast following the parallel of 37° 22' S. L. and on their coming under the meridian of 53° 55' W., of Paris they will discover three Huts which belong to the Estancia de Sta. Elena. Then, by sailing along the coast Southwards they will make out the Loberia Chica Point the coast of which is considered to be ten metres high (11 1/2 yards). They will afterwards see the hill of the Chacra in a S. W. direction; and the Bay to the S. E. of the same. In the centre of the latter they will make out a brownish stone 6 metres in height, and at about 2 miles inland to E. S. E. of said hill another hill which having then no name was called "Cerro de la Hydra. This hill is similar to the other one, and both are skirted by stones along to the sea shore.

2.—The best anchorage for a vessel drawing 14 French feet will be found by bearing S. E. of the compass the extremity N. W. of Loberia Chica Point; and the centre of the "Cerro de la Chacra" W. 1/2 S. W. in 37° 50' S. Lat. and 60° 03' Long. W. of Paris. On the spot water will never be found in the lowest tide to be less than 2 1/2 English feet deep; 27 at the highest tide, 24 feet being the average, on a bed of coloured sands and small shells. The landing place is at about 1 1/2 miles thence.

3.—From that point in N. W. 1/2 W. W. 1/2 S. W. and S. W. 1/2 S. directions, the coast can be closely approached without the lead giving less than 18 English feet, on a hard

but very clean bottom. Neither the swell nor the ruddiness of the water should give any apprehensions to mariners even at three square's distance from the shores.

4.—The sea runs in continually from E. N. E. forming small sandbanks close on the sea shore, and which shift their position during stormy weather. They never, however, grow sufficiently to make any alteration in the soundings above mentioned. The tides there are not subject to invariable rules as in other parts of the Ocean. The current is about two miles strong at 8 or 9 of the coast, and runs Westward at flow, and ebb contrary at ebb; but its strength is perceptibly diminished at the anchorage, and it rarely forces the vessel at anchor to mark its direction, although its flow and ebb never cease to be visible. It is to be observed that the current is stronger when at ebb.

5.—Mariners coming from the North towards this place should be active with the lead, in order to be able to ascertain if foggy weather the distance of the coast, as after having left behind the Median Bank lying S. by S. 40° of Cape San Antonio, which is very dangerous, the coast is low, and at 6 or 7 miles off the same, not more than 8 or 9 fathoms water will be found, on a bottom of sand and small shells. It is necessary to bear in mind that both on the way, and at the Bay of the Laguna de los Padres, anchors hold well and that vessels can therefore come to an anchor with a light breeze.

6.—The safest way of mooring in the Bay is N. and S. casting the anchors judiciously separated from each other. The "Hydra" which cast anchor at one mile off the coast had her moorings in said manner and lowered besides a safety anchor to the E. They never sounded less than 23 English feet.

7.—At the foot of the Eastern declivity of Cerro de la Chacra, runs a muddy rivulet, and by excavating a well on the banks of the same, excellent and clear water is found. The Estancia nearest to the coast, which is the chief one in the establishment, is situated near the lake called "de los Padres", and is about 9 miles distant from the landing place.

8.—The port or harbour of the Laguna de los Padres affords shelter against the wind from the Sd and Sd quadrants, and is exposed to those of the 1st and 2d. The small bay of Loberia Chica lying 4 or 5 miles farther to the South, offers no accommodation nor shelter, and the same can be said of those bays North from Cape Corrientes. It would be useless to search at Loberia Grande for a better anchorage than the one above described, and which has been so entirely explored.

Observations. Thermometer 17° Ten pers are Fahrenheit 72° 00. Declination of the compass 14° 30'.

Miscellaneous.

A strange story.—The Court Journal publishes a wonderful story, derived from a brochure by the Princess de S., which is in circulation on the Continent. The authoress is the mother-in-law of the heroine of the romance, and she is about to take the black veil. Her daughter-in-law, the Princess Eleanor, is described as "a child of immense imagination and power." Transported to the castle of her guardian in the Hartz Mountains, she grew "wild and intractable;" and when her guardian was appointed Ambassador to Paris from the Court of W., he placed her in a convent. Here she proved still more intractable and mischievous; and, weary of trying "to tame this wild vehement spirit," the superior sent her home. Her guardian next transferred her to—Hammersmith. Here her temper changed, and she begged to be taken home. After a time, the Prince de S. reached Hammersmith. When his arrival was announced, she was found "on her knees alone in her own room praying, with a most fearful expression of countenance; and on being informed of her guardian's arrival, she uttered a most unearthly shriek, and rushed down the stairs like one possessed." Returning to Paris, she showed a subdued spirit; practised "exaggerated piety;" and gave out that she should surely die before she was twenty one. She insisted that every arrangement should be made with a view to this early death. She married; and, says her mother-in-law, "a judge of my dismay when she coolly told me that she had sold herself to the Evil One, and that she would be claimed before she reached the age of twenty-one! She confessed that her despair had been so great at being exiled, that weariest with incessant prayers to Heaven and the saints for deliverance without effect, she had at length addressed her vows to the Powers of Darkness, on the very Sunday morning when her guardian arrived; and the announcement of his presence was evidently the token of the acceptance of that fearful vow." She died full dressed for a ball, two days before she would have completed her twenty-first year.

Here on the 24th ult. after a short illness, Mr. Irvin Bell, master of the British brig "Gaulter," native of Harrington, Cumberland, aged 36 years; long well known in the trade between this port and Liverpool, and greatly respected by numerous friends and acquaintances, for his sterling worth and kindness of disposition.
