

In consequence of the auspicious settlement of the present question, between this Government and that of H. B. M., respecting the passports sent to Captain the Hon. Robert Gore, this Government has ordered the customary salute of 21 guns to the British Flag, from the Retiro Battery, to-day at 1 p.m. This salute as a matter of course will be returned by the "Harrier," thus re-establishing the bonds of amity and concord.

In noticing this auspicious event, our evening contemporary, "El Nacional," pays a merited compliment to Mr. Christie the British Minister and to Frank Parish Esq. H. B. M.'s Acting Consul General. In the justice of that eulogium we perfectly concur, and without detracting an iota from their relevant merit, beg leave to associate with them the name of Thomas Armstrong Esq.; a gentleman who omits no opportunity, here or elsewhere, in serving his countrymen and the land of his adoption; and whose services on this occasion impose upon us a new debt of gratitude.

In reference to said article of the "Nacional," of last evening, we are also authorised to state, that the "mutual salute" forms no part of the arrangement made for the satisfaction of the British Government. The British flag will be saluted by the Government of Buenos Ayres, and Her Majesty's steamer "Harrier" will then probably return the salute, in complimentary acknowledgment of the sufficiency of the satisfaction given.

We have also reason to believe that the British Minister to the Confederation, now in Buenos Ayres, will probably pay a visit to H. E. the Governor after this affair has been concluded; but such a visit forms no part of the arrangement which has happily been made for the termination of the difference so long existing between the two Governments.

At this late hour it would be superfluous to occupy another line, with the expression of our cordial felicitations.

Confederate Provinces.

For the benefit of whom it may concern, we reproduce the following decree of the National Government:—

Department of Foreign Relations, 12th Jan. 1857.
The Vice-President of the Argentine Confederation—in exercise of the Executive Power.—

Considering, that reclamations of the French and British Governments have been pending for years, for losses alleged to have been sustained by certain subjects of these Nations, in consequence of arbitrary acts of public functionaries of the Argentine Republic, in violation of their rights.

That the National Government wishes, in conformity with the principles that regulate its conduct, to attend as far as possible to these reclamations; but as equity and justice should preside in this settlement, as regards the rectitude and evidence of the retaining Governments, and the obligations of the Argentine one, it is requisite to institute a rigid examination as to the origin of the acts and occurrences that gave rise to these reclamations, as also respecting the real amount of each of those that have been admitted to their Governments.

That as these acts and occurrences are presented as having taken place in different parts and many of them referring to distant periods of the civil war, an investigation that demands time and a special edification.—

Having heard the Council of Ministers—

Article 1st.—A Committee of Inquiry is named, consisting of three members, in order that, in view of the reclamations presented by the French and British Ministers, if by proceed by its own means, or by means those it may appoint for that purpose, to opt the measures necessary for ascertaining the origin of the acts and events that gave rise to the reclamations, as also the real amount of the losses sustained by each of the foreign claimants.

Art. 2d.—Their excellencies the Provincial Governors, at the request of the Committee, shall cause to be remitted certified copies of all documents or vouchers that exist in the public Archives, and that serve to illustrate the points referred to in art. 1st.

Art. 3d.—The public functionaries, federal and provincial, shall comply with all orders transmitted by the Committee, and any citizen is bound to give declaration on his, should it be required for the said investigation.

Art. 4th.—Whenever the Committee or delegates receive a sworn declaration, it will be made before a Notary Public or two assessors.

Art. 5th.—As soon as the Commission has fulfilled the object of its institution it shall give to its report to the Minister of Foreign Relations, whom it will consult in any case of doubt.

Art. 6th.—To form the Commission created in this decree, the following gentlemen are appointed: General Don Tomas Guido; the Judge of the Supreme Court of Justice, Dr. D. Nicolas Molinas; and the Attorney General Dr. Don Ramon Ferreira; who having met shall appoint from their own number its president.

Art. 7th.—Let it be communicated, published and inserted in the Official Register.

Diplomatic Arrangement.

We are enabled to publish the official letter in which Mr. Christie, the British Minister to the Confederation, has announced to the Minister of Foreign Relations of the Government at the Paraná, the late satisfactory settlement of the question about Captain Gore's dismissal from this City.

This authoritative version is the best answer to the article which appeared in the "Nacional," an article which we have reason to believe, caused much uneasiness to the Government who have no connexion with that paper.

We believe we are also justified in stating, that the arrangement which has been made, was privately negotiated and concluded between Mr. Christie and Señor Riestra the Minister of Finance, and that the conduct of this Minister and of H. E. the Governor has been throughout frank and honourable.

Mr. Christie's note to Dr. Lopez.

The undersigned, Her Britannic Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary to the Argentine Confederation, has the honour to communicate to His Excellency Señor Don Bernabé Lopez, Minister of Foreign Relations, a copy of the Orden newspaper of the first of February, containing an official correspondence between the Minister of the Government of the Province of Buenos Ayres and Her Majesty's Acting Consul General in this City on the subject of the dismissal from Buenos Ayres in January 1857 of Her Majesty's late Chargé d'Affaires Captain Gore, and containing also an announcement of a salute to the British flag ordered by the Government of Buenos Ayres.

The undersigned, being in Buenos Ayres, has taken the responsibility of authorizing Her Majesty's Acting Consul General to accept of the satisfaction which has been offered.

The British flag having been saluted with twenty one guns from the Retiro Battery, H. B. steamer "Harrier," which was in port, returned the salute, according to custom, as an acceptance of the satisfaction.

This question having been arranged, the undersigned has paid an unofficial visit of courtesy to H. E. the Governor of Buenos Ayres, which, while the dismissal of Capt Gore was not atoned for by his withdrawal from doing.

His Excellency the President of the Confederation has always expressed himself in becoming language on the offence which had been given by the government of Buenos Ayres to that of Her Majesty in the person of Capt Gore, and has lost no suitable opportunity of testifying his respect for that deceased servant of Her Majesty. It will give His Excellency pleasure to learn that the Government of Buenos Ayres have now acknowledged error, expressed regret, cancelled the offensive act by withdrawing the note in which a passport was sent to Capt. Gore and the passport itself, and crowned this satisfaction by a salute of honour to the British flag.

The undersigned avails himself with eagerness of this opportunity of renewing to His Excellency Señor Lopez the assurance of his most distinguished consideration.

So far we have given a fair and unvarnished relation of this transaction; if exaggerated in any particular, the gentlemen of the "Nacional" have abundant means of defence. As true Englishmen we only ask a "fair field and no favour;" for old Franklin will be found right in the long run, that "honesty is the best policy."

Our only regret is, that the personal feelings, inopportunistly conjured up, and we must add, by special indelicacy and undiplomatic means, may retard other important arrangements; to the success of which the British Plenipotentiary, as mediator, might have contributed.

At the same time we feel perfectly assured that Mr. Christie will not allow any personal feeling to interfere with the discharge of

his public duty, where so many and important interests, British and Argentine, are at stake; and perhaps the patriotism of a certain high functionary may suggest an incident, that will save H. E. the Governor the disagreeable exercise of his constitutional prerogative.

Be that as it may, these are national arrangements that cannot be delayed; for with differential duties at the door, even three or four months is an eternity in the infancy of a new State.

On the first announcement of this obnoxious measure, we suggested the expediency of an active and energetic demonstration by the foreign merchants, here and elsewhere, interested in this trade.

It may be said that it is now late; but like other cases of repentance and reformation, "better late than never;" and we are certain, that any representation confided to Mr. Christie will receive the full weight of his official influence. At all events it is a case of sufficient importance, in our humble opinion, to merit a fair trial.

Weekly Summary.

We have so many and important public documents for this number that all minor topics are thrown into the shade, and inevitably postponed; and by the rule of contraries, it has been a week fruitful in incidents, of which we can only take a cursory notice.

Crimean Immigrants.—Of the military agricultural colonists intended for the Confederation, a part have preferred to cling in this State, and accordingly some 200 have landed here by the Menai and Panepero from Montevideo.

A subscription is being raised to defray the expense of their passage from Montevideo, and to relieve them of any pressing necessities, which we earnestly recommend to the attention of the humane and patriotic Allies in the dangers and glories of the Crimea; they cannot be objects of indifference to the British and French in the day of adversity.

Municipal Elections.—According to all accounts the parish of San Nicolas presented on the 1st inst. a scene of tumult and disorder pretty much resembling the usual ideal of British hustings.—The election for that parish has been annulled and is to be repeated on the 15th inst., at the risk we think of some broken heads and bloody noses.

\$20,000 Reward.—This sum is offered by his relatives for the discovery, apprehension and conviction of the murderer or murderers of the late Dionisio Campos and Juana Torres.—These are the parties in the District of San Vicente alluded to in our last.

Fatal Accident.—On Sunday last two youths passing along the public road on horseback, on crossing a lane in the neighborhood of Quilmes, came in contact with two others that were running a race. Three of them were thrown down with their horses, and one so severely injured that he only lingered a few hours in extreme agony. Deceased was a younger brother of Sr. Otamendi, the lamented victim of San Antonio. Another escaped with a broken leg; and the third, strange to say, hardly sustained any injury.

Communicated.

To the Editor of the British Packet.

Sir,

I beg you will do me the favour to publish in your valuable paper, the following statement of facts:—

The undersigned, three years since discounted a bill for Mr. Henry Munn [Broker] drawn by Mr. Winter to the order of Mr. Munn, for one month, which bill has been renewed monthly, up to the 29th December last, Munn receiving his commission on each renewal. On my first discounting this bill, Munn pledged his word that he would cash it any day that I required the amount, with this express condition I allowed the renewals, that I might have cash at hand for any emergency, but during the above mentioned period I had no occasion to use the bill until last November, when I required it to place in deposit, which bill I have in my possession delivered into my hands by Mr. Winter, endorsed by Munn. When this bill became due Munn renewed it for one month omitting his name, without informing me of his having so done, which bill I inadvertently put in my cash box without observing the omission. When due Munn again took the bill for renewal, bringing me a bill renewed for two months on unstamped paper, without consulting me on the extension of time; that led me to examine the bill, then it was that I discovered the omission of his name, which circumstance I named to him; when he replied it was a renewal of the last bill, and that he did not consider himself responsible for any of the bills from the first to the last, and that I could not make him responsible by law. That he was responsible, the bill I have in my possession is proof positive; but which responsibility he has now the hardihood to deny in the letter addressed to me on this question. The following are extracts from his letter.

"Mr. Bishop, "January 23d, 1857.

"Dear Sir,

"I received your note this morning; I am sorry that any dispute has arisen between us respecting Mr. Winter's bill; I cannot think you ever held me responsible, more particularly so, that account has been running for some three years, and during all that time you never said a word about responsibility or endorsement, that is to say, the bill was never endorsed by me."

I have to observe when Mr. Munn addressed me on this subject, he was not aware of my having the endorsed bill in my possession, otherwise he would not have committed himself in so gross a manner by denying his own signature.

"If you wish to remain on amicable terms with me I should be glad and will attend to your business, free of commission, until Mr. Winter's affairs are wound up, and at the expiration of that time, if I am in good circumstances, and Winter's affairs do not turn out so good as expected, I will have no objection to make the loss easier on your part."

Now I ask, why should Mr. Munn have made the above offer, if he considered himself free from responsibility for the bill in question?

To conclude, I leave the conduct of Mr. Munn in this affair to the impartial judgment of the Public.
