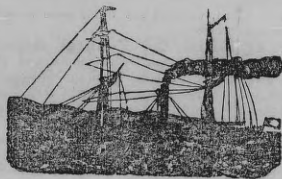

(Concluded from our last.)

WAR AND MARINE.

The Government now proceeds to inform you of all that concerns the department of War and Marine.

LAND FRONTIERS.

The Government has devoted the most serious and assiduous attention to the defence of the land frontiers, threatened by the incursions of the barbarians. It regrets to acquaint you, that notwithstanding it has put in requisition all the means at its disposal, concentrating upon the frontier all the warlike elements it could muster and, confiding the immediate command of the troops, that garrison it, to the most accredited chiefs in the Country, the results have not in all cases corresponded to the efforts made; but complete results are not to be expected till the Militia be definitively reorganized upon its old bases, and till that reorganization being complete, the present system of defence may be totally changed. For three years the Government has been labouring constantly to alter that system amid the difficulties by which it has been surrounded, difficulties that have repeatedly paralyzed its labours. These have not been fruitless, since it has succeeded in creating the elements that were wanting, augmenting those that existed, and establishing the bases and starting points of the operations, that will by and by be developed along the whole extent of the frontier, guaranteeing it against further depredations. The frontier will be completely guaranteed, and the question of Indians solved, the day when, the military spirit being raised from the prostration in which it was left by the Tyranny, discipline re-established, new Chiefs formed in the school of experience, and our forces supplied with all the means of mobility that said kind of war requires, we can take the offensive, and acquire the dominion of the desert, keeping the barbarians in constant alarm, and vanquishing them by the superiority of our tactics, of our discipline and arms, or submitting them by a peace when that superiority has once been obtained.

On a previous occasion the Government pointed out to you the importance of Bahia Blanca, as the natural base of any operation that may be undertaken against the desert on a large scale. The Military Agricultural colony that was organized for fomenting that interesting military establishment, and that commenced under such favourable auspices, has suffered a serious derangement, by a revolt of part of the force, and the irreparable loss of its valiant Chief, Colonel Don Silvano Olivieri, who was murdered in his attempt to put down said mutiny. The Government immediately adopted the necessary measures to submit the mutineers, and accomplished it by means of the firmness and prudence of the Chiefs who were commissioned for the purpose, submitting the whole without resistance; disarming and assigning to different points 150 individuals, and ordering those that appeared implicated in the murder of Colonel Olivieri to be put on trial. The trial proceeds, but with the delay inevitable when the evidence must be received from the distant theatre where the crime was committed; but at all events the Government must be inexorable in the application of the law to those that are proven guilty.

The military establishment of Patagonia has, likewise merited a serious attention from the Government. Without prejudice to augmenting as far as possible its means of defence, an attempt

contributed, by means of a subscription initiated by the abovementioned General, with competent authorization. The Commander-in-chief of the Army of the South, has earned a claim to public consideration, for the important services he has rendered in this negotiation.

The northern and western frontiers have been the theatre of some invasions of the barbarians, and notwithstanding that they were provided with sufficient means of defence, the Indians were not chastised as they ought to have been, for the causes already assigned.

On the northern frontier some measures of precaution have been taken that such occurrences as those that have taken place may not be repeated. Of these the principal are, 1st placing a strong reserve of 500 men in its vicinity, over and above the force that formerly garrisoned it, which, being exclusively composed of militia force of cavalry, the Government has ordered to be disbanded; 2d establishing an advanced line of forts, to combine a system of effective vigilance which may at the same time prevent invasions of small parties; and 3d by establishing a fortified encampment in the centre and rear of said line, so that they may promptly repair to the point menaced.

Several of the principal northern provinces have offered to co-operate with the Government for the realization of this plan, promising cattle to those that occupy the advanced forts; and their offer having been accepted, a Commission has been appointed for the protection of said Forts.

On the western frontier orders have been given for assembling a greater amount of warlike elements, both men and necessities, so as to enable the protecting division to take offensive against the barbarians, which is the only effectual way of defending the frontier.

The peace with the Indian tribes, isolating those that frequently made their incursions by the west, will facilitate the development of any offensive operation, and the residents of Bragado and the 25th of May, have presented to the Government a petition in the same sense, offering with the greatest decision to co-operate with their persons and property to the realization of an expedition of this kind.

On a previous occasion the Government pointed out to you the importance of Bahia Blanca, as the natural base of any operation that may be undertaken against the desert on a large scale. tempt has been made to adjust an offensive and defensive treaty with one of the most powerful tribes of that district, and a very advantageous arrangement may be expected, the result of which will be to place Patagonians in safety from future depredations.

Three new Squadrons have been created for the defence of the frontier; one at Fort Junin, another at Fort Esperanza, and the third at Fort 25 de Mayo. Of these corps the two first have nearly their full complement, and the latter has already a regular basis.

The forces that at present garrison our frontiers amount, the forces of the line to 2211, the National Guards to 1691, and the organized friendly Indians to 243; making a total of 4145 men. These forces are distributed on the north, north-west, west and southern frontiers, and at Bahia Blanca and Patagonia, without including the National Guards of the two latter, that may be considered disposable. This force has 10,500 horses for its use, without including the flocks in reserve. The latter amount to 9,100 which gives a total of 19,600 available horses for the frontier service.

STANDING ARMY.
 The Standing Army at present consists of 12 Generals, 182 Chiefs and 575 Officers, distributed in the different branches of the war service, and of 5,183 common soldiers without including the corps of Invalids, which makes in all a body of 5943 individuals under arms, or say nearly a sixth part of the native population, fit for military service; a number disproportion with respect to the population, and that ought to be diminished in proportion as the quality of the troops is improved.

The composition of the Army of the line in its different departments is as follows:—261 artillery, 1548 infantry, and 3655 cavalry; distributed in a regiment of artillery, three battalions of infantry, four regiments of cavalry, and the remainder in the garrison of the different military establishments.

The sixth regiment of cavalry remains to be organized, with which the organization of the army will be complete in its different departments, according to the existing organic regulations.

The Army of the line being definitively organized in conformity with the plan the Government had the honor of submitting to you in its former Message, it will be possible to attend to the internal security with the troops of the line alone, and consequently with fewer

expenses, without employing the National Guards, which should only be called out for service in extraordinary cases. For obtaining so important a result it would be indispensable that the corps had at all times their complete personal dotation, and this impossible with our actual vicious and defective system of recruitment, which has the double disadvantage of not fulfilling the exigencies of the service, and of withdrawing the citizens from their industrial occupations, compelling the National Guards to supply the deficiencies of the Army of the line.

To remedy these serious evils, the Government has had the honor of submitting to you a draft of Law respecting recruitment, the despatch of which it urgently recommended to you, and which is still pending before your Hon. Corporation. The Government recommends anew its prompt despatch, for without such a law it will be absolutely impossible to re-fit and organize the Army of line on solid and permanent bases.

The body of Military Surgeons has been regulated, in its classes and prerogatives, as was announced to you in the preceding Message; all the existing scattered regulations being collected into one code, and bearing in mind the dispositions of other countries applicable to our system.

The position and rights of the Officers of the Army, require to be regulated and defined, since it is not fair that those who have served little or none at all, and never have had an opportunity of exposing their lives, should enjoy the same advantages as those who have served and exposed their lives.

It is therefore now time that a general law should be dictated, in which it is provided, that the pay of those not in actual service being a reward of meritorious services, (the only circumstance that can justify the tax imposed upon the public.) The Officers that remain unemployed in the army, and who have not had at least four years of services or performed some distinguished action, should not be included in it, and in either of these cases be erased from the list. In like manner it is necessary to form a subdivision in the list of retired Officers, that those with more than four years of service and less than five, who are included in it shall only have a right to claim one fourth part of their pay, applying this rule to all who are placed in identical circumstances.

Should this just and provident mea-

sure not be adopted, the Country will eventually find itself overburdened with a Retired List, that should it not absorb our rents, will at least prevent the amelioration of the condition of the soldier and other classes of the Army, that really deserve it.

The Government within the sphere of its prerogatives, has already dictated some measures to this effect, and trusts time arrives, will give due attention to this matter.

PENSIONS.
 The Law of pensions sanctioned by your Hon. Corporation, with date the 6th September of last year, began to be put in execution from the beginning of the current year, in conformity with the existing estimate. The two million of dollars voted by your Hon. Corporation for the purpose, are not yet exhausted, though pensions have been declared to the greater part of the persons comprehended in the law; consequently it is to be hoped that with said sum the charges imposed upon the State by the new law may be fully attended to.

Some doubts have arisen in the execution of the law of pensions, many of which can be solved only by your Hon. Corporation; and which the Government will record in this document, that they may be borne in mind at the time of its revival, or that an immediate solution may be given to them.

The first doubt that has occurred is, if the despatches given by the Government of General Baicaria, from the 5th October 1833 to the 5th November of the same year, are to be considered valid or not; the said despatches having been invalidated by a law that was not published.

The second doubt is, if the widows of Chiefs and Officers that belonged to the State of Buenos Ayres, and died in the service of the Oriental State, during the struggle against the tyrant Rosas, can claim the pensions which the said law accords to those who remained without serving in any army during said epoch.

When the case arrives for the revival of said law, the Government will record some ideas that should be specially borne in mind, in as much as they are the result of a practical study of the different matters that have been presented.

The Government considers it an injustice that should be possible, if an in-
